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Aldermen will be asked to consider whether political campaign materials should be allowed on public property, and also to provide two police officers again this year for the Project Graduation program.

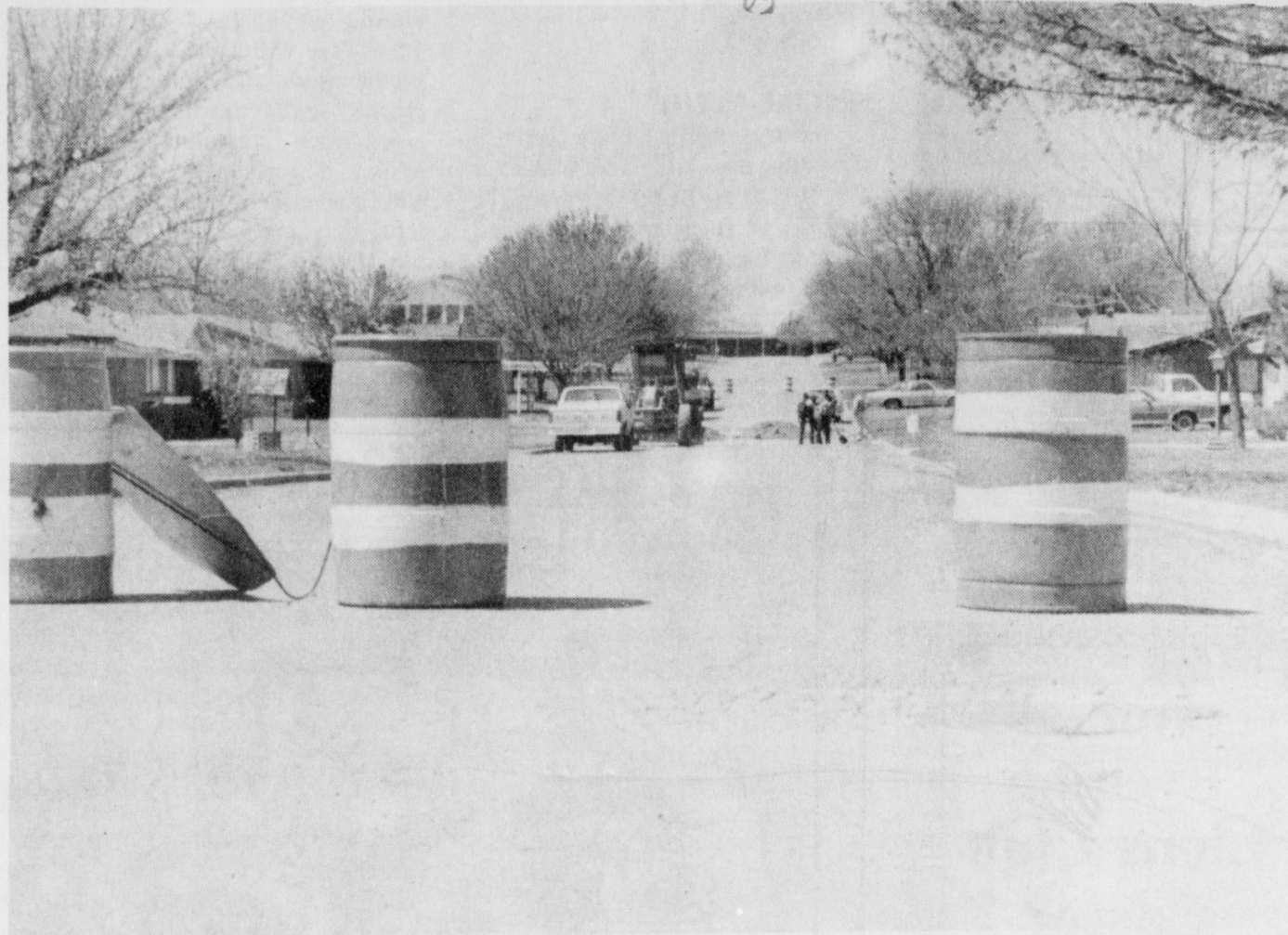
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A report is on the agenda concerning a solid waste management plan, through which a regional landfill could possibly be established here.

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## ALLEN SHEWMAKE

### Experiences shaped his philosophy

Allen T. Shewmake has a philosophy of life gleaned from his experiences since childhood. It is much like that of Helen Keller who once said, "It is by fighting limitations, temptations, and failure that we reach our highest possibilities."

Shewmake accepts challenges, always looks on the bright side of any situation and seeks daily spiritual guidance -- but it has not always been that way.

Years of special interest in football, an enthusiastic cook, a love of animals and farm life, a shocking surprise a month after his wedding, a period of paranoia and suicidal tendencies, a stay in Red River Hospital for a nervous breakdown, withdrawal from alcoholism and 20 years with the Iowa Park Consolidated School District with the ramifications of each, pretty well sums up the life and times of the 40-year-old school and city tax collector.

But, in his words, "The most important thing that has happened to me was when I decided to turn my life over to Christ and let Him be in charge."

Born in Wichita Falls, much of his early life was spent on a farm near Iowa Park with his grandparents. He remembers riding on a cotton sack behind his mother as she pulled bolls. When he got a little older they fixed a gunny sack for him to "help."

He also remembers the first mechanical cotton stripper and that he got to ride behind it in the cotton trailer.

He moved to Iowa Park in 1961 and graduated Iowa Park High School in 1968. None of his family had gone to college and when he took the ACT test his senior year, the results showed he wasn't college material, but that he should be a barber or a bricklayer. That was a challenge. "I decided no matter what somebody tells you, if you want to do it, do it," Shewmake said.

He attended Midwestern State Univ. from 1968 to 1971.

In August 1970 Shewmake was hired by the school board as assistant tax assessor-collector under Bill Steger. This was just after Valley View consolidated with the Iowa Park ISD and Shewmake said there was quite a bit of opposition to the consolidation. Some Iowa Park students were required to volunteer to attend school at Valley View until appraisal and consolidation was completed. Finally, 36 students agreed to transfer and ride the bus. Shewmake drove the bus and was made director of transportation.

Shewmake credits two Iowa Park men with having a great influence on his life. He learned to cook when he worked for Charlie Metz at his restaurant. He says Metz influenced the way he thinks about work. "He expected you to work for your pay and he stayed with you during the

learning process until he felt you were ready to be on your own. He taught me a lot," Shewmake said.

His mother later purchased the restaurant and he kept books. She wanted Allen to take over management of the business, but he didn't want that for a livelihood. However, he does all the cooking at home because he really likes to cook.

The other man who had a great influence on Shewmake is Bob Dawson. "He is one of the finest role models a person could ever want," the tax collector commented. He recalled one time while he was in high school when Dawson was principal. He was sent to the principal's office for punishment, but told Dawson he was sent to the office to do a report on science. Dawson sat down and helped him.

When Shewmake went back to his classroom, the teacher asked what the principal said. He told her Dawson said he didn't want him to come back to his office and bother him. "But that man really helped me in the way I think and look at life. He is just a good, great person," said Shewmake.

He and his wife, Suzanne, an OB-Gyn nurse at Wichita General Hospital, were married in June 1975. She had two sons, five and three-years old, from a previous marriage.

She was ill much of the month of July and when she didn't feel any better by August she decided to see

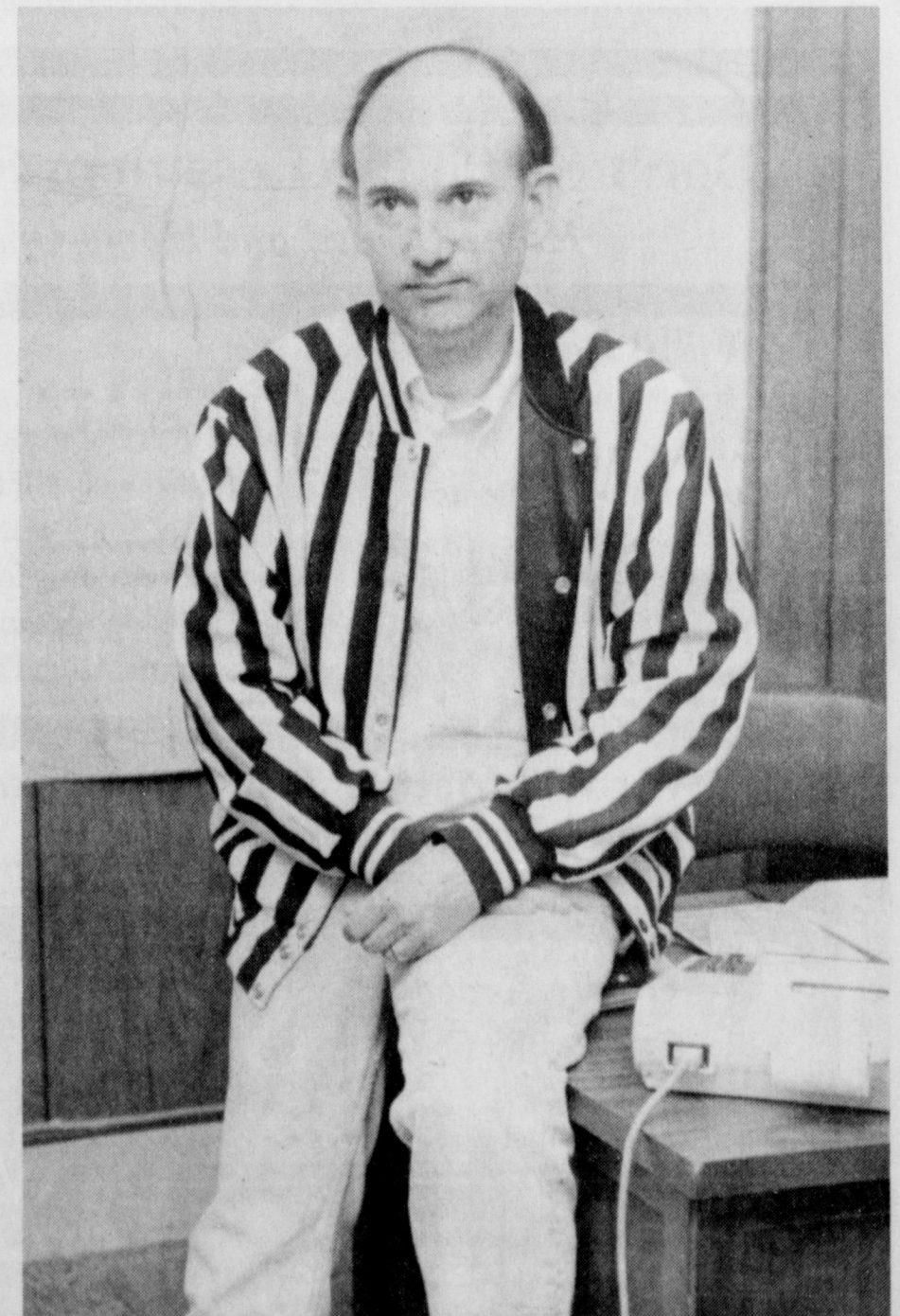
her physician. She hadn't given pregnancy a second thought because she had had a tubal ligation.

One afternoon while Shewmake was having coffee with a friend she came in the restaurant and announced to him that he was going to be a father. "I was shocked. Just married, no money to speak of and with two children already, I didn't know what we were going to do," said Shewmake, who accompanies all of his conversation with gestures to emphasize his points.

He asked the doctor what happened, he thought he had taken care of that. The doctor answered, "I did what I was supposed to do, but the 'Man upstairs' wanted you to have a child, so now do the best you can by it."

The son, Derek, now 14 and in the eighth grade, has been "such a blessing and made me understand fatherhood so much better than I would have otherwise," the father commented. He chose to name Derek for a student who rode the bus to Valley View, because he was so well behaved. Their other two sons, Scott, 20, is a student at MSU, and K.C. is a senior at Iowa Park High School.

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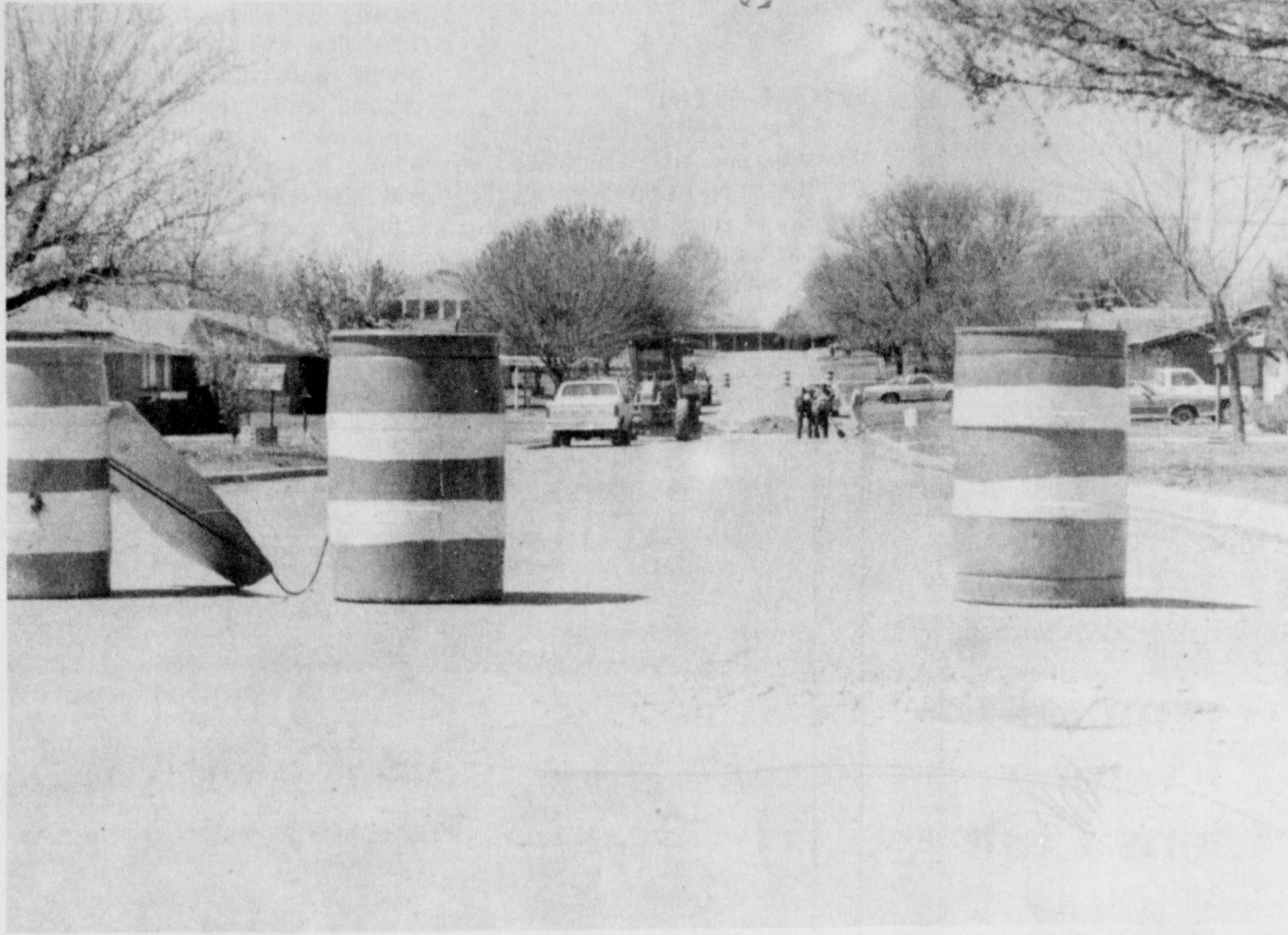

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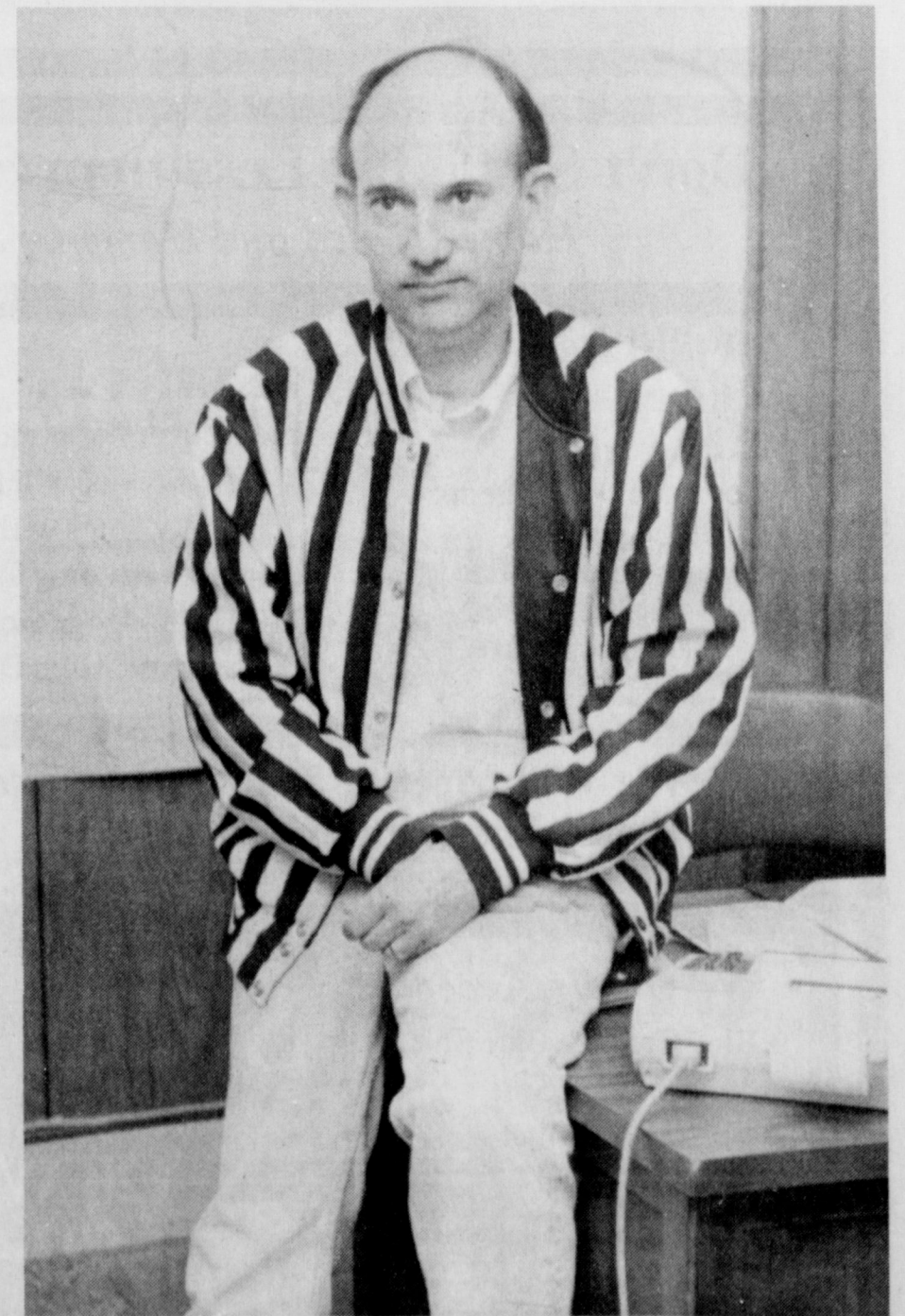
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## McDonald, Browning wed here recently

I want to encourage everyone to vote in the party primary runoffs Tuesday, and especially Democrats who live in County Commissioner Precinct 4.

State wide, there's not a whole lot of interest, other than deciding the Democratic nominee for governor.

But locally, it is extremely important in the commissioner's race, where Electra resident Bill Davis is pitted against Harold White Sr. of Wichita Falls.

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# Worth Quoting

Remember the name Monte Hassie of Lubbock?

He's the fellow we elected to represent this district on the State Board of Education. He's the fellow that listens to school board members, superintendents, principals, teachers, and parents in our area and acts accordingly.

That he and some members of the state board pay more attention to local people than they do to legislators has landed him into a heap of hot water. Lt. Gov. Hobby wants, in this special session, to do away with the elected board and return to a board appointed by the hierarchy in Austin. But too much flak was forthcoming on Hobby's proposal and now he simply wants to render the board harmless.

But there's a columnist down at San Antonio named Roddy Stinson who writes for the Sunday San Antonio Express, who puts the whole matter in a better perspective than we can. He wrote:

"In a rare open display of megalomania, Hobby told reporters: 'I would much rather go back to an appointed board, but I guess it doesn't make much difference whether it is made appointed or elective, just as long as the board is rendered harmless.'"

"And one of his hatchet men, State Sen. Carl Parker of Port Arthur, added, while commenting on the plan to take power from the elected board: '...the Legislature wants a little better handle on getting state policy implemented.'"

"Read that: 'We want to run the educational system. And we are going to run the educational system -- the public be d---ed.'"

"Never mind that Hobby, Parker, and Lewis and their legislative cronies are responsible for the current educational middle."

"Never mind that in 1987 Texas voters sent them a clear message to leave the state board alone so it could clean up their mess."

"These self-appointed Texas gods will not be satisfied until they and the failed political/educational coalition they represent are in charge of

turmoil, confusion and havoc caused by Austin's abortive scheme.

"It took a few years for the 'experts' to agree with voters, but eventually, they came to the same conclusion."

"Last Friday, the executive director of the national Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development told members of his organization, meeting here: 'There's no evidence . . . it (legislative-mandated education reform) has helped.'"

Most people think the minimum wage is \$3.35 and raised to \$3.85 this year.

It is more than that to the employer because he has to add 37 cents for every dollar in wages to pay for the payroll costs incurred in state unemployment taxes, federal unemployment taxes, matching Social Security taxes, worker compensation premiums, health insurance premium costs and retirement benefits.

Thus a wage of \$3.85 an hour to the employee translates to a wage payment of \$5.27 an hour for the employer.

This is one reason why more and more jobs are exported to other countries where not only the wage rate is lower, but the employer is not required to pay for the benefits.

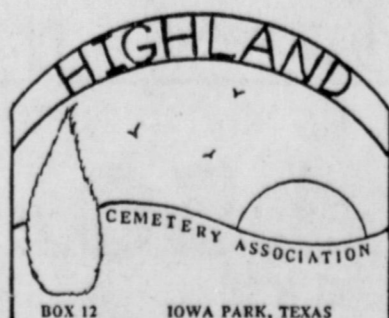

## Students, teacher recognized by Tandy Scholars program

### GRANDMA'S POTATOES

- 32 oz. hash browns
- 1 stick butter
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 12 oz. Cheddar cheese
- 8 oz. sour cream
- 2 cups corn flakes
- 1 stick butter

Melt one stick of butter in pan. Put hash browns in the pan. Mix together cream of chicken soup and sour cream, and pour over hash browns. Sprinkle on top grated cheese and corn flakes, then dot with one stick of butter. Bake 45 minutes at 350°

### SPINACH BALLS

- 2-10 oz. pkgs. frozen chopped spinach
- 2 cups herb seasoned stuffing mix
- 2 med. onions, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tsp. garlic salt
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- 1 1/2 tsp. thyme
- 1/2 cup margarine, melted
- 5 large eggs, beaten

Cook spinach per directions (omit salt). Drain and pat dry with paper towel. Add next six ingredients and toss with fork. Mix well. Add margarine and eggs and blend with a fork. Form into balls the size of walnuts. Bake on greased shallow pan 18 to 20 minutes at 350°.

### SHAZAY

- Crust:**  
Mix and press into a 9X13-inch pan:  
1 cup flour  
1 cup chopped pecans  
12 stick softened oleo

Bake 20 minutes in a 350° oven.

- Cool.**  
**Mix:**  
1 cup Cool Whip  
1 cup powdered sugar  
8 oz. cream cheese, softened
- Spread over crust.  
Beat until thick:  
4 oz. pkg. instant vanilla pudding  
4 oz. pkg. instant chocolate pudding  
3 cups cold milk.
- Spread over cream cheese mixture.  
Top with Cool Whip and grated semi-sweet chocolate. Refrigerate.

### ICE BOX PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup peanut butter
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. vanilla

- 2 cups flour
  - 1/2 tsp. soda
  - 1/4 tsp. salt
- Mix in order given. Roll into two or three rolls, wrap and store in the refrigerator. Slice and bake 12 to 15 minutes at 350°.

### SUGAR COOKIES

- 1/2 cup butter, at room temperature
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg, medium or large
- 1 Tbsp. milk or cream
- 2 cup flour
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg or cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. baking powder (optional)

Cream together the butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in the egg and then the milk.

Mix the dry ingredients together in a separate bowl. Stir into the butter mixture. Chill dough 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Use ceramic cookie mold. Oil and flour the mold, take a piece of dough and press into mold and tap lightly and lay on cookie sheet. Re-flour the mold after each cookie, but do not re-oil it. Bake at 375° until cookie is light brown, about 10 to 12 minutes.

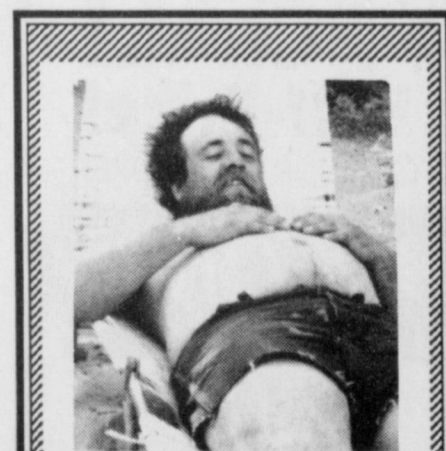
### DATE ICE BOX PINWHEELS

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 3 eggs
- 4 cups flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Cream butter and sugars. Add eggs and vanilla. Mix dry ingredients and add to sugar mixture. Chill while cooking the filling.

**Filling**  
2 cups finely cut dates  
1 cup finely cut nuts  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup orange juice

Cook 10 minutes, let cool slightly. Divide dough into four parts. Roll out and spread with filling. Roll up, wrap in wax paper or foil and chill overnight or freeze. Slice and bake at 350° 12 to 15 minutes (light golden). Cool on cake rack.

Also, during the business, plans were finalized for the District VI meeting to be hosted by Epsilon Eta on April 22.

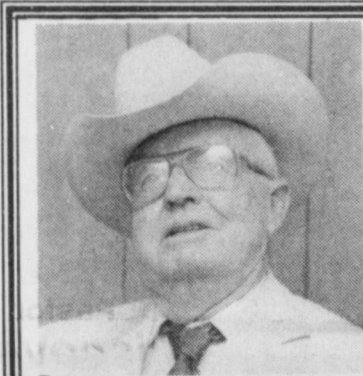

# Errors, injury skuttle Hawk game

Two seventh-inning errors and an injured player led to a 5-3 extra inning loss to Childress here Tuesday for the Hawk baseball club.

The visiting Bobcats were able to tie the score at 3-3 in the seventh inning, even though they didn't have a hit in that frame.

Then, in the eighth inning, the Hawks were forced to play with only eight men on the field after Ken Schlaud was injured. And Childress took advantage, scoring three runs on four singles.

Because his club had been out of action due to weather -- Friday's

game with Holliday was cancelled due to field conditions -- Coach Daryl Frazier had used all his players during the game, and had no reserves on the bench when Schlaud was hurt.

There were other players on the bench, in uniforms, but they were junior varsity players who, because they had played Monday and have another game this week, could not be pressed into action.

With one out in the eighth, Schlaud was attempting to catch a high foul ball near the right field fence, and hurt his knee when it struck a pipe post. He was playing in

right field at the time.

All four of the singles that followed were in right field, and the Hawks had only two outfielders trying to cover the entire area.

After two scoreless innings, Iowa Park got a run on the board in the third, but that was tied in the fifth.

Childress took the lead in the top of the sixth with another run, but the Hawks scored twice in the bottom, and appeared on their way to their eighth win against two losses.

The first Bobcat batter in the seventh hit a grounder to shortstop Todd Pulley. He fielded the ball cleanly, but his throw was low and Danny Tatom was unable to scoop up the ball, allowing the runner safe.

During the next two outs, the leadoff runner stole second base and, with two outs, attempted to steal third.

Catcher Jimmy Nicholson's throw to third baseman Kelly McClure appeared to be in plenty of time to put the runner out, but the ball apparently was lost in the late-afternoon sun, and it bounced through McClure's legs and into left field.

That allowed the game-tying score.

Iowa Park's last three batters went hitless, and Childress, a team the Hawks defeated 8-2 two weeks earlier, was their winner.

Not only did Coach Frazier give his entire varsity time on the field, he rotated his entire pitching staff of Schlaud, Robert Denton, Tatom and Jimmy Duggins. Each worked two innings.

Schlaud didn't allow a hit. Denton gave up one, and Tatom three and Duggins four.

Iowa Park was credited with three hits, all singles, by Schlaud, Tatom and Duggins.

Frazier is still trying to find a team to fill Friday's game, since that game was cancelled by Olney. If he is unable to line up another team, he will be forced to have an intrasquad game for practice.

The Hawks open Dist. 5-AAA play Tuesday, when they travel to Bowie for a 4:30 p.m. contest.

And that is the team's only game next week, because their next scheduled contest is the following Tuesday at Vernon.

Iowa Park's first home game against a conference opponent will be April 20 against Graham.

irrigate because his grandfather had let him go with him to irrigate his land. But his first time, Shewmake decided there was a lot more to irrigating than turning the water on and off. One thing that made him so sure of that was when his neighbor informed him he had flooded his barn!

The Shewmakes bought two Hereford cows. One is bred by artificial insemination to a Centopole bull and will calve in about six weeks, and Shewmake is excited.

Their son showed a calf for a doctor at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show and Shewmake and his wife "were hooked." Their goal is to eventually have the European-American cross breeds to show at Fort Worth.

"I've had a problem with alcohol," Shewmake said, "but I didn't see it as a problem. It started out with the 'after five syndrome.' What was first a social drink after work hours continued to get worse," he explained.

It took their oldest son to make him realize he did have a problem. The son had a problem with marijuana and as Allen was reprimanding him about his habit, the son asked, "What's the difference in me smoking marijuana and you always having a six-pack of beer in the refrigerator?"

Shewmake said, "That shook me up and I told him I would quit drinking if he would quit marijuana. I still didn't realize how much of a problem I had," he added.

He continued the story of the turn-around in his life. "After I stopped drinking for three or four months, my body went through so many physical changes that I developed a severe case of paranoia and had a complete nervous breakdown." That was when Shewmake went through the process at Red River Hospital. He said even after that he still had very paranoid thoughts and considered suicide.

"One day I was sitting here in this chair (at his desk) and I had a feeling come over me that is hard to explain. I got up and closed the office and went to talk to Mike Grubbs (minister of First Christian Church). We talked for a long time and that is when I turned my life over to Christ for Him to take charge," Shewmake continued, "and that's the way it has been since."

He had been a member of First Christian Church since he was 17, but had never been very faithful in attendance and had not really sought spiritual guidance in his life. He finally came to realize "you can't depend on the physical world to carry you forever," indicative of the truism that the real culprit in drastic motivations is inner conflict between private spiritual and physical desires. He now is an elder in the church.

"Without Christ in my life today, I wouldn't even want to live. I give credit to Him for my life. He gave me a son I wasn't supposed to have. During all my problems I did not lose my life, my wife and family. I didn't lose my job and I've been blessed in so many other ways,"

said Shewmake.

He had always wanted to play football, he loves the sport. But in high school he weighed around 90 pounds until he was a senior, he was manager-trainer for the Iowa Park Hawks. That way he felt he had an important part in the game -- carrying water to the players, helping the injured, etc.

Then last year he saw an advertisement asking for applicants for football game officials. Shewmake applied and the 1989 season marked his first year as an official with the junior varsity teams. The first game was at Saint Jo, with all rookie officials except one.

"A lot of funny things can happen out there on the field and people in the stands can't see all the action and can't understand the reason for some of the calls." About that first game, he laughed as he recalled that one rookie official called a touchdown on the five-yard line.

One of the most memorable games last year for Shewmake though, was a game between Jayton and Goree. It was raining and cold and he had on his best white pants. A 260-pound guard recovered the ball on a play and was extremely jubilant. Shewmake was standing too close and in the excitement was hit in the nose and knocked out for a short time.

"When I came to my nose was bleeding and I had blood all over me. I was most concerned about the blood on my best white pants," Shewmake laughed. His nose wasn't broken, "But it did change direction. I've lost a lot of hair too, but that's been on my job," he commented as his hand brushed his bald pate.

Almost every game produces something comical if you look at it that way, according to Allen. In one game last year one of the officials told a player to "watch his mouth." When the team went into a huddle, he heard the reprimanded player tell the other, "Will you watch my mouth, I can't see it."

Shewmake says for him refereeing is a relaxation for mind and body because you sure don't have time to think about anything but the game. And, he said, "When you've been chewed out by a coach or the fans and called more names that I knew existed, you know if you have control of yourself or not. It is really a learning experience and a challenge for me." He can hardly wait for football season to begin in September.

In 1979 the state gave assessor-collectors five years to become an RTA (registered tax assessor). "That test was the hardest I have ever taken," said Shewmake. He took his State Board examination and received certification in 1986. Although he does not assess taxes, he has to know the legal procedures, the tax codes and responsibilities of the office.

"You can have some interesting learning experiences in this office also," Shewmake said, adding, "It has taught me something about my demeanor. I have found that when a person comes in upset about his taxes and takes his hostilities out on

me that the calmer I am, and if I can inject a little humor in the situation, it is so much better. I try always to do that and to treat every taxpayer alike. I have found the world is so full of negativism, that it helps to release positive thoughts and they just may catch on. A few disgruntled taxpayers have gone so far as to express their feeling that this is a communist country, but that doesn't happen very often and when they realize I don't set the tax rates, that helps."

"How can you be a good guy and a tax collector? I have an older lady, a friend, who jokingly calls me Zacheus Jr. (the short, hated, tax collector in the city of Jericho you read about in Luke). She calls me each year and tells me she has her tax money, but that I will have to come and get it." He does.

Shewmake says the school system has been good to his office. It is one of the first for a school its size to have a computerized operation. The system allows the office to cut down expenses and postage. "We have 10,000 accounts and about 95 percent of the current taxes have been collected since Oct. 1. The next three months we will be going to court to collect remaining taxes," he said.

Considering his future after retirement from the school system, Shewmake returned to MSU last year in pursuit of his college degree. He took courses to see what a social worker does, because he has an interest in that field. He worked in the children's ward at the State Hospital as assistant to the teacher of music therapy. "I wouldn't take for the experience I had. I could see myself being shocked back into reality. You can be warm and compassionate, but can't become emotionally involved." Shewmake said, "but I just didn't have what it takes to stay with that."

Shewmake became a charter member of the local Optimist Club chapter in 1973. He has served as secretary and president, and in 1983 was district secretary. "The Optimist Creed says it all for me and my way of thinking," he said, "because you deal with helping youth and the elderly, and the organization just fits in with my philosophy of life."

## Alexander arrested

A former Iowa Parkan has been arrested in Wichita Falls on a charge of aggravated robbery of the Texaco Food Mart on Central Freeway in that city.

Ricky Dean Alexander, 34, was placed in county jail in lieu of posting a \$10,000 bond on the charge, and an additional \$3,500 bond on a retaliation charge.

A former prison convict, Alexander reportedly matched the description of a man who robbed the clerk of almost \$200 at gunpoint late Wednesday night of last week, leaving the scene in a yellow Ford Maverick.

Alexander is alleged to have threatened the police to have a contract out on those who arrested him.

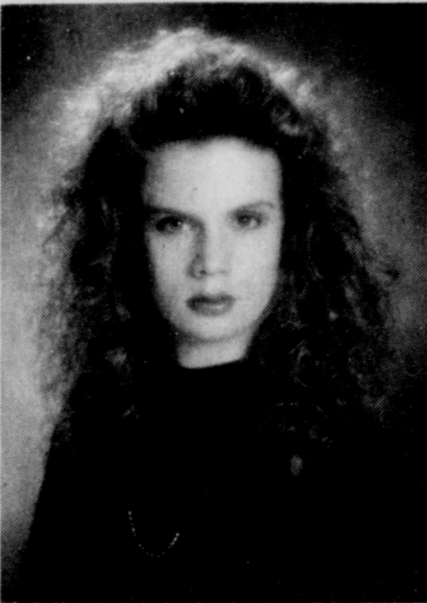
