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Child abuse and neglect concerns Iowa Parkans

Results from the Needs Assessment Survey released last month by the United Way of Greater Wichita Falls revealed that services for victims of child abuse and neglect are perceived as serious needs in Iowa Park.

Eighty five percent of the survey's respondents from Iowa Park said they felt that protective services for children was a very serious or serious problem in their community, ranking it fifth out of 60 areas of need.

They also ranked children as the number one community group out of seven required services tailored to meet their special needs.

According to Lt. Ray Smock, criminal investigator with the Iowa Park Police Dept., Iowa Park is not immune to serious problems such as child abuse and neglect that plague larger cities.

Smock, who has been with the local department four years, has been involved with juvenile and delinquent investigations 12 years.

"There are good people in Iowa Park, and our motto *The Town of Friendly Living* is appropriate," said Smock. "But the bottom line is that we have problems that every city in the U.S. has."

Statistics for Iowa Park compiled by Smock from March 1988 to June 1991 included 62 reports of physical or sexual abuse or neglect, or a combination of the offenses.

The reports involved 110 children ranging in age from less than six months to 18 years. His office also reported 129

investigated reports of domestic disturbances involving a child from 1984 to 1990.

Smock said he understands why the survey results revealed a high priority on children's needs.

He said some of the factors leading to child abuse and neglect in a town the size of Iowa Park include drug and alcohol abuse, and stress resulting from depressed economy and unemployment.

He also said he has seen many two-income families that have experienced difficulty in handling problems at home at the end of a long work day.

Smock tries to be available for families that realize they are "at the end of their rope." He makes himself available to them 24 hours a day, especially if there is a situation they know they cannot handle alone.

He also encourages parents to come in and talk if they reach the breaking point. "Sometimes parents come in to my office and I can see it in their eyes that they need help," he said.

Unfortunately, not all families realize they need help or that help is available.

In such situations, Smock must rely

on others to report the abuse or neglect so that appropriate actions may be taken.

"The elementary school personnel are good about watching for and reporting abuse," he said. "The teachers can watch a child for mood swings and other signs of abuse."

After an incident of abuse or neglect is reported by an individual to the IPPD, Smock must take an initial report and collect photographs, medical records and any physical evidence available.

He then notifies Child Protective Services (CPS) in Wichita Falls of the pending investigation.

If probable cause exists, he will interview all suspects, victims, and witnesses, and he will check the suspect's criminal histories.

After careful review of all the evidence and a follow-up with CPS, Smock then files a case with the District Attorney's office if necessary. The length of an investigation varies case-by-case and the abuse is often hard to prove, he added.

Because of this, Smock said it is important for individuals to report abuse

Council plans meeting Monday

Three personal appearances are on the tentative agenda for Monday night's regular meeting of the city council.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Requesting appearances are A.C. Miser, asking for water service on South Gate Garden Road; Henry Zimmer, director of the Greater Wichita Falls United Way, in reference to the Recreational Activities Center, and Sidney Smith, concerning the 1992 budget for 911 Emergency Telephone Service.

Two appointments are listed on the agenda: Don Kirkham to the 911 board of managers, and confirming the mayor's appointments to the Planning and Zoning Board.

An ordinance, the required annual approval of the city's retirement system, also will be considered by aldermen.

A request by the Hotter 'N Hell 100 bicycle ride group for permission to put a relief station tent again on the library grounds during the race is to be presented.

County Education District trustees continue planning

In a meeting Thursday afternoon of the Wichita County Education District board, its second since being mandated by state legislation, trustees touched on a number of subjects but came to a conclusion on only one.

Primarily the meeting was called to explore the many solutions which must be reached before Sept. 1, in order for the CED to serve as a central tax distribution body for all five independent school districts in the county.

The lone decision reached was to seek bids from county banks wishing to serve as the CED's depository.

Each district is to continue collecting its own taxes which, in turn, are to be transferred, probably by electronics, to the depository. And funds received by the depository are expected to be electronically transferred back to the individual districts on a yet-to-be-determined share.

The minimum tax rate set by the state legislation is 72-cents per \$100 valuation. Districts are allowed to add to that base rate what is needed to retire bonds and for local enrichment.

Police solve burglary same day it's reported

Iowa Park police not only solved a burglary case within five hours of receiving the report, but also solved a case for the county sheriff's department.

Police were informed at 11:19 a.m. Saturday that someone had burglarized all six coin boxes at Catlin's Car Wash on West Bank, according to the police blotter entry.

At 4:52 p.m. the same day, Lt. Ray Smock arrested Michael Ray Thorn, 20, in the 1000 block of Mary on the charge.

During the interrogation, Smock said Thorn admitted to burglarizing the Western Well Supply in Wichita Falls, a case being investigated by the sheriff's department.

Monday, Smock also arrested Brandon Stuart Green, 17, in connection with the Catlin burglary.

Iowa Park police also assisted two other agencies in making arrests during the past week.

Wednesday evening of last week, a county deputy radioed the local station for assistance in stopping a southbound automobile reportedly traveling at speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour.

Lt. Roy Ross spotted the car at Johnson Road and US 287, and began pursuit. They were joined by a Department of Public Safety vehicle near Huntington, and finally stopped the driver at Maurine Street in Wichita Falls.

While the DPS trooper was transporting Herbert Burl Jacobs, 66, to jail, Ross stayed with the man's car until it was impounded for the DPS, according to the blotter entry.

Monday afternoon, local officers assisted a policeman from Electra as he served a warrant on Carl Leon Robertson, in the 500 block of East Lafayette.

Robertson, who was taken to the county jail, was charged with unlawful delivery of a controlled substance, and held under a \$20,000 bond.

At 12:02 a.m. Tuesday, an officer observed a vehicle not stop at a marked intersection, and began pursuit. The driver did not stop until reaching the

area of Colorado and Lafayette, and then the man began running on foot.

Officer Connie Loudermilk, who was soon backed up by two other officers, arrested Bryan Wayne McMahon, 21, and charged him with evading and resisting arrest.

McMahon was transported to county jail at 2:02 a.m., according to the blotter entry.

Another arrest was noted on the blotter, after officers responded to a domestic disturbance in the 1300 block of Emma at 11:10 p.m. Tuesday.

Sidney Ray Waldrop, 31, was charged with class A assault and transported to the county jail. His wife was taken to a Wichita Falls hospital for treatment to a laceration on the back of her head.

An apparent burglar was scared off when he set off an alarm after breaking a window of a home in the 1900 block of West Access Road, at 12:35 p.m. Monday.

Police were notified by a neighbor who heard the alarm that a dark haired man driving a copper colored Ford pickup was seen driving away from the location.

Officers were unable to locate the suspect, but it was determined nothing was missing from the home.

Two complaints of criminal mischief were filed during the week with police.

A homeowner in the 1100 block of North Jackson told police Saturday evening someone had hit a mailbox and it was lying in the yard's home.

A residence in the 1300 block of North Fourth was vandalized sometime Monday night with toilet paper, eggs and tomatoes.

Chamber plans 2-day promotion

A final go-ahead was given by the Chamber of Commerce board of directors for a two-day promotion in Iowa Park Aug. 9-10.

During the two days, retail businesses will hold a Crazy Day promotion, and residents are being encouraged to have a Community-wide Garage Sale.

Chamber directors were holding their regular third-Monday luncheon meeting when they held the final preparations on the project.

All residents desiring to participate can contact the Chamber office to list their addresses, and the organization will have one large promotional ad in the *Iowa Park Leader* on Aug. 8.

During the merchants' Crazy Day promotion, sales clerks will be dressed in outrageous costumes, and, usually, the prices on their specials are equally and outrageously low.

The board also approved two

amendments to the rules which govern the annual Whoop-T-Do celebration.

One change specifies the approximate size of a booth space, and the other requires the sponsoring non-profit organization representative to sign a form stating the rules have been read and understood.

This was brought about by problem that developed last year, and directors felt the changes would close a loophole that was used by a promoter.

Directors approved a change also in a policy restricting all advertising in a community booklet to be within the Iowa Park school district.

The leaders voted to permit advertisements representing the three hospitals and colleges that are located in Wichita Falls.

The booklet, which is currently being developed, will be used to promote the community to potential homeowners and businesses.

Local sales above last year

Though Iowa Park's sales taxes have not matched the state's average, business here generally is still better than last year.

The city this week received a check for \$13,103.92, which is 9.78 percent greater than the \$11,926.85 received in July of 1990, according to the state comptroller's office.

The state average was 12 percent. For the year, Iowa Park is showing a 5.50 percent increase, having received a total of \$96,718.64, as compared to

\$91,677.64, according to the report.

Electra leads the county in percentage gain for the year with 10.37; Burkburnett is 7.84 and Wichita Falls is 1.28.

Holiday continues its rebound over 1990, apparently with the upsurge in the oil patch, with a 48.90-percent gain over the previous year.

July's checks include taxes collected on May sales and reported in June by businesses filing monthly sales tax returns with the state.

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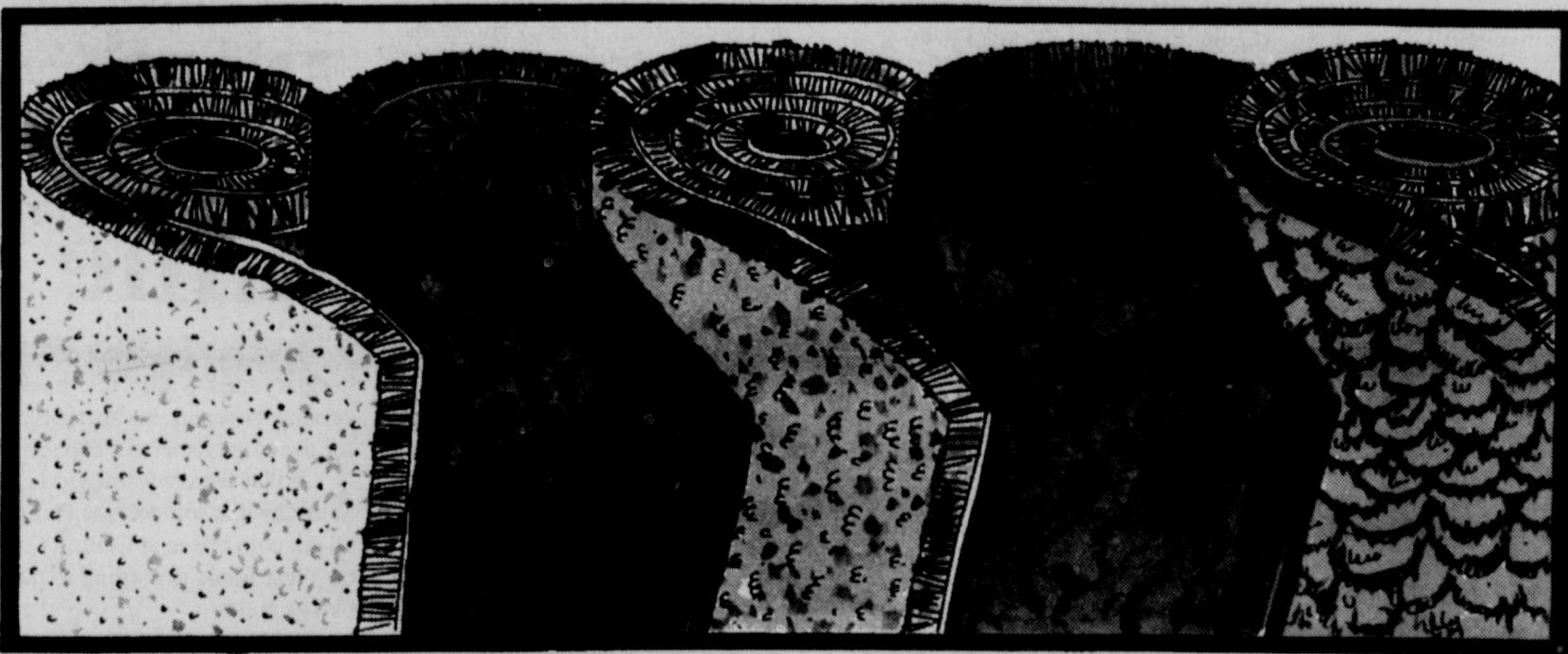

A **Mixed Triples Tournament** will begin play at 6:00 p.m. Saturday. \$30 registration fee.

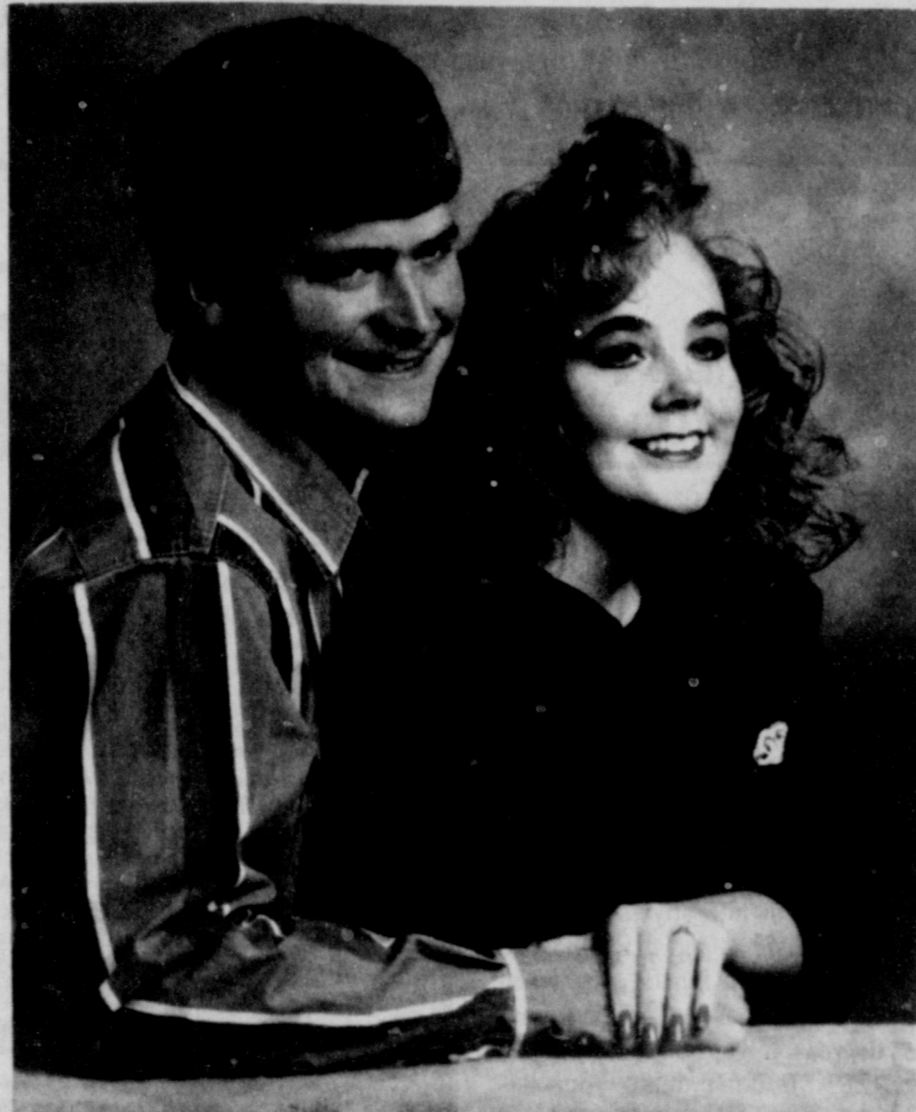

Traffic signs to be installed

Two major intersections on highways in Wichita County will have modified and improved traffic control systems beginning Monday, July 22.

District Traffic Engineer Bruce Preston, of the Texas Highway Dept., says all-directional stop signs will be erected at two locations that have experienced traffic problems dealing with failure to yield right-of-way.

He explained the all-direction stops are an attempt to reduce accidents at the two locations.

One of the new signs will be added to existing signs at FM 369 and US 287. The stop signs on US 287 are on the frontage road.

The new signs will be erected on FM 369.

The other intersection is north of Wichita Falls, on the IH 44 service roads at Missile Road and Reilly Road. Stop signs will be erected on all sides of the intersections, on both sides of IH 44.

Preston said the signs should alleviate some of the current problems which can, and sometimes do, lead motorists into collisions.

when it happens.

"Don't wait a week or even a day. One phone call can often give us the direction we need," he said. "Ignoring abuse or looking the other way does not make it go away."

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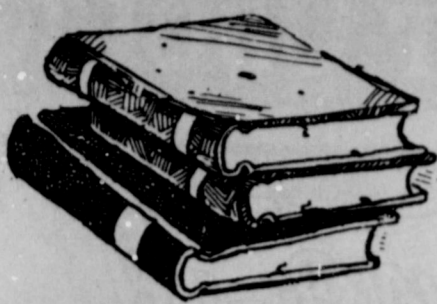

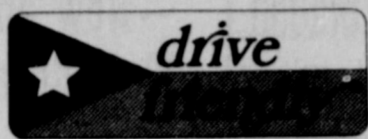

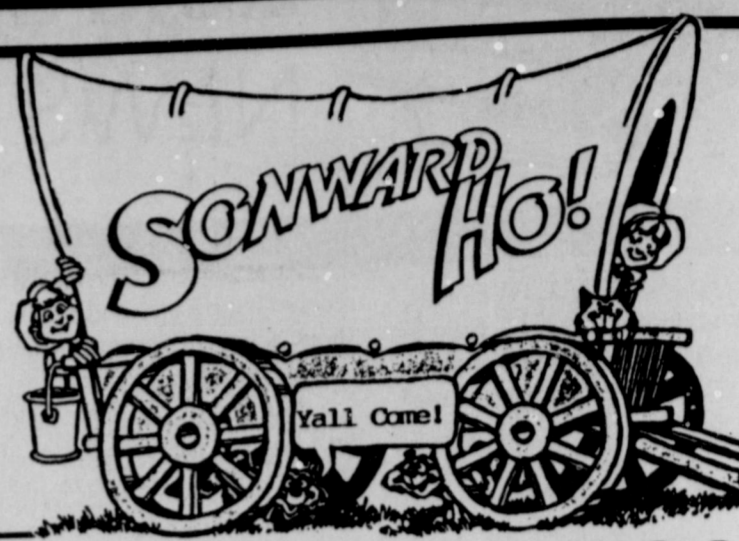

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FOR TRUTHSEEKERS #1

1. WHAT DENOMINATION ARE YOU AFFILIATED? The church is not a denomination; we are seeking to produce the church of the New Testament. The church Jesus promised to build, and built, is not a denomination; it belongs to Christ. (Matthew 16:18). The church is the body of Christ (Col. 1:18; Ephesians 1:22-23). 3. WHAT CONSTITUTES TRUE WORSHIP? Teaching the Word (Acts 2:42); contributing of our means on first day of week (1 Cor. 16:1, 2); praying (Acts 2:42; 1 Cor. 14:15; 1 Thess. 5:17); singing (Ephesians 5:19, 20, Col. 3:16, 17). (as we seek to restore New Testament Christianity, we cannot restore an instrument to be used in singing because it was never used in the church of the New Testament). The fact God did not command it is proof God did not intend for an instrument to be used. Do you think God would have left it out if God intended for us to use an instrument? Lord's Supper (Acts 20:7; Matthew 26:26-28).

Please study your Bible and see if these things be so (Acts 17:11; 1 John 4:1). If you would like to study further the will of God for your life, we would be very happy to assist you.

This week's featured cook, Vickie Bright, has an interest in many things, all of which culminate into staying busy.

Vickie and her children, Colleen, eight years old, and Richard, six, moved to Iowa Park three years ago from Cisco. She was born and raised in Houston. She and Dr. Kenneth Breeze, a Disciples of Christ minister, are engaged to be married later this year.

One of her favorite things to do is to cook, and judging from her recipes, she enjoys trying many different types of dishes. She also enjoys baking and decorating cakes, a trade she picked up while working in a bakery after graduating high school.

She said she bakes cakes for birthdays and weddings of friends and family, and plans to make her own wedding cake.

Sewing and stitchery are also on the list of Vickie's hobbies. Having recently competed seven quilts for her



family, she also sews, does crossstitch and crochets. She said she also plans to make her own wedding dress.

Genealogy is another of her interests, and she recently completed her and her fiancé's family books.

The recipes she shares this week warrant a try for cooks who want something different and tasty. The recipes for "Cake Bread" and "Baklava" are German and Turkish, respectively. The "Cake Bread" recipe is one given to her by her late grandmother.

Creamy Beef 'N Corn Casserole

- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 1/2 cup chopped onions
 - 1-10 3/4 oz. can cream of mushroom soup
 - 1-12 oz. can whole kernel corn
 - 1/4 cup chopped pimentos
 - 1/4 tsp. salt
 - Dash of pepper
 - 1-7.5 oz. can refrigerated biscuits
- Brown meat, drain, add onion and cook until tender. Add soup, mix well. Stir in corn, pimentos and seasoning. Pour into 1 1/2 quart casserole. Separate dough into 10 biscuits. Cut each in half, forming 20 half circles. Place biscuits cut sides down around edges

of casserole. Bake at 375 degrees 20 to 25 minutes or until biscuits are done. Serves 6.

"Baklava"

- 4 cups finely chopped walnuts, almonds, pecans, or a combination of nuts to equal 1 pound.
- 2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ground nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. ground cloves
- 1 lb. melted butter
- 1 pkg. (16 oz.) frozen phyllo leaves, thawed
- Honey syrup

Prepare honey syrup first. Cool. Mix nuts, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves. Brush bottom and side of jelly roll pan (15 1/2x10 1/2x1-inch) with some butter. Unfold phyllo leaves. Gently separate one leaf and place in pan, folding edges over to fit pan if necessary. (Keep remaining phyllo leaves covered with a dampened towel to prevent them from drying out.) Brush lightly with butter. Repeat 7 times. Sprinkle 2 cups of the nut mixture over the top. Layer more phyllo leaves in pan, brushing each leaf with butter. Sprinkle remaining nut mixture over the top. Layer remaining phyllo leaves over the nuts, brushing each with butter.

With a sharp knife, cut pastry in pan 1/2-inch deep and about two inches wide. Pour remaining butter over the top. Bake in 350 degree oven until golden brown, 1 to 1 1/2 hours. Remove to wire racks. Pour honey syrup over pastry top. Cool. Cut along scored line to bottom. Cover and refrigerate no longer than 2 weeks. Remove from refrigerator at least 2 hours before serving.

Honey Syrup

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cup water
- 2 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 3-3 inch cinnamon sticks
- 6 whole cloves
- 1/2 cup honey

Heat all ingredients except honey to boiling in 3-quart saucepan, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Boil 5 minutes or until candy thermometer registers 220 degrees. Remove from heat. Discard cinnamon and cloves. Stir in honey.

BAKLAVA is a dessert made of paper thin layers of pastry, chopped nuts and honey. This is a Turkish dish.

Cream Tacos

- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 tall can evaporated milk
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 10 oz. pkg. grated cheese
- 1 can chopped green chilies
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 package tortillas
- Salt to taste

Using a large, heavy saucepan, cook onions in small amount of water until tender. Add chilies, soups, milk

and one soup can hot water to onion. Bring to a boil.

Break tortillas into pieces and layer in bottom of casserole dish. Layer soup mix and grated cheese on top of tortillas. Bake 20 minutes until thoroughly heated.

If desired you may add a small can of chicken or hamburger meat. I sometimes use a can of cheese soup instead of a package of cheese.

Sausage, Cabbage & Potatoes

- About 8 potatoes
- 2 heads cabbage
- 2 pkg. German sausage

Put cabbage on bottom of large saucepan. Put the potatoes on top of the cabbage, and top with the sausage. Add just enough water to cover cabbage and cook until potatoes are tender.

Pecos Pasta

- 1 pkg. elbow macaroni
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 1 sm. green pepper, chopped
- 1 sm. onion, chopped
- 2 cans chili with beans
- 1 can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 tsp. seasoned salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Prepare macaroni according to package directions. Drain. In a large skillet melt butter, add green pepper and onions and cook until tender. Do not brown. Add chili, corn, seasoned salt and pepper. Simmer on low heat five minutes. Stir in cooked macaroni. Top with shredded cheese. Cover and heat on low five minutes. Serves 6.

Cake Bread

- 1 cup luke warm water
- 1 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 square block of yeast
- 2 cups milk, warmed
- 6 Tbsp. shortening
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3 eggs
- 4 to 6 cups sifted flour
- Raisins to taste.

Put yeast in 1 cup warm water and set aside. Warm milk and put into a bowl. Add shortening. Stir until dissolved. Add 1 Tbsp. sugar and 2 cups flour to milk mixture, and stir to make a batter. Add one egg at a time, stirring after each one. Add the salt, yeast and the remainder of the sugar and flour. Mix until smooth. Mix in the raisins. Let rise until doubled in size in the same bowl as mixed in.

After rising, put dough on a floured surface and divide into as many breads as you want or have pans for. Knead only 3 times. Spread into baking pans with your hand. Brush tops with melted butter. Add the topping and let rise again.

Topping

- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 3 Tbsp. butter, melted
- 2 tsp. cinnamon

Mix all ingredients together until it comes to a crumble stage and put on top of buttered cake bread. Let finish rising. Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until light brown on top at 350 degrees.

Primrose Operating Co. has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operator has 80 acres leased, with drillsite in the HT&B RR Co. Survey A-474, and has designated the venture as the No. 35 Heiserman. Drillsite is 12 miles northeast of Electra.

A new producer has been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field, with SEP, Inc. as the operator.

Located one-half mile northeast of Kamay, the well is in a 10-acre lease in the Kemp Wichita Valley Farm Land Survey A-270. It is designated as the No. 1 Munger "J."

The well pumped 16 barrels of oil per day, plus 80 barrels of water. It bottomed at 1,892 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Gunsight Formation, 1,742 to 1,743 feet into the hole.

At a location three and a half miles north of Kamay, S and J Operating Co. has finalized a new oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 10 J. and J. Waggoner "A," pumping 11 barrels of oil per day, plus 34 barrels of water.

Location is in a 40-acre lease in the George Hezekiah Survey A-454. Bottomed at 1,550 feet, the well will produce from perforations, 1,380 to 1,388 feet into the wellbore.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 10 Roller, a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operation will be located three miles southeast of Burkburnett in a 67-acre lease in the Charles Larbatelier Survey A-370. The operator is Primrose Operating Co. of Wichita Falls.

At a location four and a half miles east of Kamay, Athens Resources, Inc. has finalized three new oil producers in the Wichita Regular Field.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 2, 3 and 4 Pearl Boyd.

The No. 2 pumped eight barrels of oil per day, plus 40 barrels of water and bottomed at 1,900 feet; the No. 3 pumped four barrels of oil per day, plus 40 barrels of water and bottomed at 1,863 feet; while the No. 4 pumped eight barrels of oil daily, plus 75 barrels of water, and bottomed at 1,900 feet.

Location is in a 150-acre lease in the John T. Lewis Survey A-462. The wells will produce from perforations in the Gunsight Formation, ranging from perforations 1,776 to 1,804 feet into the wellbores.

Landrum West, Inc. has plugged and abandoned an unsuccessful developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, one and a half miles northeast of Kamay. The well was spudded in 1990 and was drilled to total depth of 892 feet. It was known as the No. 6 Thomas and Thomas "EE" and was located in a 40-acre lease in the Kemp Wichita Valley Farm Land Survey A-246.

The Wichita Regular Field gained a new producer when A.B.B. Drilling Co. completed the No. 3 Hamilton Et Al, two miles north of Holliday.

The well indicated ability to pump five barrels of oil per day, plus 60 barrels of water. It was taken to a 1,858-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations, 720 to 728 feet into the hole.

The operation is in a 20-acre lease in the Denton County School Land Survey A-57.
