## No tax increase seen for city

No ad valorem tax or user fee increases are anticipated for the 1991-92 year by the city council, despite a considerable decrease in tax values.

The council held lengthy work sessions on the budget both Monday and Tuesday nights, eliminating numerous projects and equipment purchases by cutting slightly more than \$1-million in deficit spending which had been proposed.

Final figures on the new budget have not yet been compiled by Gary

Jones, city administrator, but the year's budget for general operating fund and utilities fund are expected to be in the neighborhood of \$2.8-million.

Mayor Wayne House said he expects to maintain last year's tax rate of 80 cents per \$100 valuation.

This is despite a loss of \$2,031,804 in values, primarily attributed to the closings of the community's only two automobile dealerships.

In order to generate the same dollars as last year, the city would have to

set a tax rate of .814, Allen Shewmake, city tax collector, calculated.

Ad valorem tax values dropped from \$98,053,212 to \$96,021,408, Shewmake said.

The general fund expenditures next year are budgeted at approximately \$1.6-million, while the utility expenditures will be near the \$1.2-million mark.

The budget is to be finalized in the next couple of weeks, at which time the council will call for a public hearing, as required by law.

## School superintendents in dark about reforms

(Editor's note: The following article was prepared by Glen Mitchell, Iowa Park superintendent of schools. Because it reflects on the upcoming school year as well as the special legislative session currently underway in Austin, we felt it would be of major interest to *Leader* readers.)

Senator Carl Parker, who is chairman of the Senate Education Committee, spoke to about 200 school superintendents during a meeting in Austin on July 14, which was the day before the special legislative session began.

Senator Parker is a straight-forward talking man who says what he thinks, and he chided us as superintendents for not coming up with a plan to solve the financial problems the legislators are facing.

During a question and answer time, I told Senator Parker that the only solution to the problem was a state income tax. He said he agreed, but that most legislators are afraid to pass an income tax bill for fear of losing their jobs.

Senator Parker was asked how much of the education bill passed in May would be funded during the special session. He said that the legislators have no other choice than to fund the bill as it was passed in May or they will be back in the courts.

Senator Parker's response was what I wanted to hear since I presented the school board a preliminary budget in June based on the bill the legislators passed in May.

Our legislators are faced with the most difficult decisions that I have seen them face in my years as a superintendent. The problems began with the passage of House Bill 72 in 1984. The bill had many costly reforms. The most controversial was the Career Ladder.

This past week the House voted to do away with the Career Ladder and just to make things interesting they deleted the five additional days of instruction that they had added in May.

So the school superintendents in Texas do not know how much money to expect from the state, whether the Career Ladder is in or out, and how many days of instruction there will be.

However, most school boards have already approved a calendar with 175 days of instruction and one with 180 days of instruction. Hopefully, we will be able to use one of them.

Perhaps Billy Walker, who is Executive Director of the Texas Association of School Boards, explained the solution to the problem best when he said, "What we need is an income tax or a miracle. One is easier to pray for but the other is more likely to happen."

## News Briefs

### Street work areas detailed

The city's Street Department has announced a 15-block street slurry project for next week.

Residents of the listed blocks are asked to make alternative parking plans for the entire day, and not attempt to drive on the surfaces being worked, which will be plainly marked.

Commencing at 8 each morning will be:

Monday - 100 through 400 blocks of North Seneca.

Tuesday - 100 and 200 blocks of West Daisy, and 500 block of West Aldine.

Wednesday - 100 through 400 blocks of Valley Drive.

Thursday - 600 and 700 blocks of North Bond, and 200 and 300 blocks of Glenda.

### Low water pressure expected

Residents in and around the 400 block of West Poe will likely experience brief periods of low water pressure beginning around 1 this afternoon.

City water crews will be installing

a new fire hydrant on West Poe, and anticipate the project to take no longer than three hours, Mike Price, public works director, explained.

### 2.19 inches rainfall measured

Iowa Park received a total of 2.19 inches of precipitation from a series of showers last week, according to Virgil Woodfin.

Rains began Wednesday afternoon -- the first since June 18 -- bringing the city's total to a fraction under normal for the month of July, Woodfin said.

### Congressman plans visit here

Cong. Bill Sarpalius has announced he will hold a town hall meeting at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, Aug. 21, at the Iowa Park city hall.

The congressman said the meeting

is designed to give Iowa Park residents an opportunity to share their views and concerns with him and to ask questions about the activities of the federal government.

## Police solve two more cases

Police say they have confessions that will clear two different criminal mischief cases that were reported last week.

No arrests have been made, as some of the suspects are juvenile. But charges are being prepared for those involved who are considered by law to be adult.

Police were notified by a citizen at 1:46 a.m. Saturday that three males were observed shooting out lights in Oscar Park, and gave police the direction in which the suspects were walking.

The trio was stopped by an officer at Wall and Aldine and, during an interview, one admitted to shooting out the lights.

But, while he was at it, he also admitted to having attacked windows at the junior high school on two different occasions with air rifles.

The juvenile of the trio was taken Monday before Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson, where his rights were read. He later wrote and signed a confession, police reported.

A warrant is being prepared for

servicing to a 19-year-old male, whom police have not identified.

Other juveniles have been implicated in one or more of the cases, but have not yet been interrogated.

The parent of two juvenile boys, ages eight and 11, has paid \$180 in restitution for damages caused to a fish pond at a residence in the 1100 block of Louisa last week.

Chlorine and other substances were put in the pond, killing some of the fish and plants, according to the report. The owner also had to spend several dollars to clean the water.

Both youths, the parent told police, are being enrolled in counseling sessions at a facility in Wichita Falls.

Neither, however, admitted to have caused considerable other damage reported last week in the neighborhoods of Lincoln and Kathleen.

Seven arrests on various other charges also were reported on the police blotter during the past week.

Officers, responding to a domestic disturbance in the 1200 block of South

Wall Friday evening, arrested Joseph Cleo Silvers, 55, on a charge of Class C assault by threat. He was later released after posting a \$69 cash bond, according to the blotter.

At 10:12 that evening, Jeffery Lynn Boyd, 19, was taken into custody in the 1200 block of West Magnolia on a charge of public intoxication. He was released at 7:50 a.m. Saturday after posting a cash bond of \$187.50.

Police took two black males into custody in the 200 block of East Highway at 3:41 a.m. Sunday, after it was determined both had warrants for their arrests by the Wichita County Sheriff's Office.

Keith Rogers Steine, 39, was wanted for violation of probation for possession of a controlled substance. Worth Culbertson, 29, was wanted on two charges of theft over \$200 and assault.

Both were turned over to a sheriff's deputy to be transported to county jail.

Officer Michael Dozier, according

to the blotter entry, stopped to assist a motorist at Fourth and Access Road Sunday afternoon.

While running the license number through the state computer network, it was determined the vehicle had been confirmed as having been stolen in Fort Worth.

Albert Lee Scarbro, 55, was taken into custody and transported to county jail. He was released the next morning, however, when the vehicle's owner, Scarbro's former employer, refused to press charges.

Police arrested Bryan Reader, 18, Sunday evening on a warrant from the Archer County Sheriff's Office. He reportedly was wanted for burglary of a vehicle, and possibly others yet undetermined.

He was released to an Archer County deputy for transportation to jail. Reader had been the subject of a harassment complaint reported Sunday

## Trustees approve bids

Iowa Park school trustees accepted the lowest of four bids to install air conditioners at the two elementary school cafeterias and junior high band hall.

The action was taken during a called meeting Wednesday, at the administration building.

Ferguson Veresh of Wichita Falls was the successful bidder, with a price of \$21,934.

The bid includes two six-ton units at Kidwell, two five-ton units at Bradford and a five-ton unit at the band hall, which will be in addition to a 3.5-ton unit already in place, officials pointed out.

The air conditioners are designed to cool the eating areas of the cafeterias, and not the kitchens, Supt. Glen Mitchell explained.

Trustees will hold a budget-study session at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building and, because of a conflict, decided to hold their regular monthly meeting the evening of Aug. 12, a Monday.

At least one additional meeting will be held during August, Mitchell said, to act on the 1991-92 school year budget.

Trustees are awaiting results expected to come out of the state legislature's special session, before acting on a final budget.

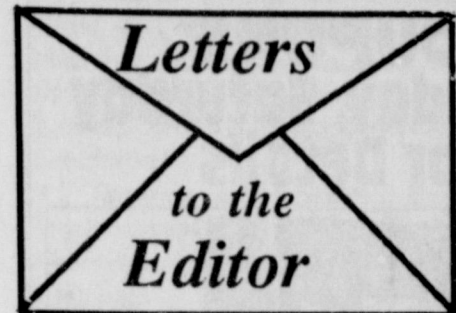
\* If you get stoned drinking hard liquor, why don't you turn brown if you sip on chocolate milk?

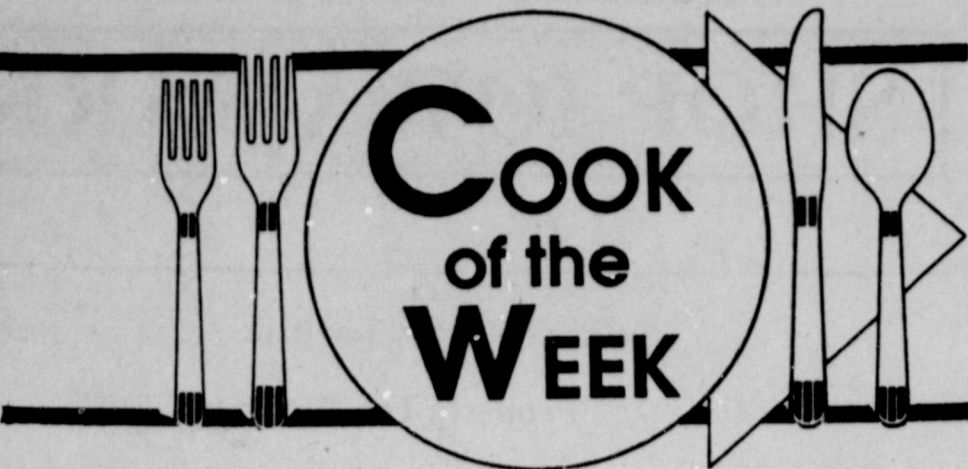

Susan said she gets her recipes mostly from family members. One of the family favorites is "Italian Delight," and she has requests quite often to make "Banana Split Ice Cream."

**Italian Delight**

- 2 lbs. lean ground meat
- 1 lb. pkg. spaghetti
- 1 can whole kernel corn
- 4 small cans tomato sauce
- Salt & pepper
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 can pitted ripe olives
- 3 small cans mushrooms
- 1 lb. grated Cheddar cheese
- Garlic salt

Brown onions and ground meat in a skillet.

Cook spaghetti in boiling, salted water, then drain.

Stir 1/2 the cheese into hot spaghetti, then add all other ingredients. Season with salt, pepper and garlic salt. Put in a large baking dish and cover with remaining cheese.

Bake in 300 degree oven about 1 hour until thoroughly heated and cheese is bubbling on top.  
Serves 12 to 16.

**Banana Split Ice Cream**

- 2 bananas, sliced
  - 3/4 cup cherries, chopped
  - 1/2 cup strawberries
  - 1/2 cup crushed pineapple
  - 1 tsp. vanilla
  - 1 cup nuts
  - 4 eggs
- Drain fruit and add:  
2 tsps. lemon juice  
2 cups sugar  
1 1/2 qts. half & half milk  
Fill with whole milk to full line.

**Mexican Dip**

- 1 can Hunt's tomatoes with tomato bits
  - 1 - 4 oz. can green chilies chopped (or 1 can of tomatoes and chiles)
  - 1 small onion, chopped fine
  - Garlic salt or garlic powder to taste
- Combine all ingredients and chill.  
(The longer it chills, the hotter it gets.)

**Red Enchiladas**

- 1 lb. ground meat
  - 1 can hot enchilada sauce
  - 1 can mild enchilada sauce
  - 1 pkg. corn tortillas (big ones)
  - Longhorn cheese, grated
  - 1 onion, chopped
- Brown meat, add sauce. Put layer of tortillas in 9x13 pan; add layer of meat and sauce, onions and cheese. Repeat layers, ending with cheese. Bake 30 minutes in 350 degree oven.

**Green Chilies**

- 2 lbs. ground beef
  - 3 cans tomatoes and green chilies
- Brown beef with 3 Tbsps. flour. Add 3 cans of tomatoes with chilies and simmer.

Put refried beans on a flour tortilla and roll. Place in microwave to soften. Then pour sauce over top and sprinkle with lettuce, tomatoes and cheese.

**Pear Salad**

- 1 large box lime jello
  - 1 large can pear halves
  - 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, room temperature
  - 1 - 8 oz. ct. Cool Whip
- Drain pears and use juice with directions on jello package. Let jello firm. Cut pears in half again and place in bottom of 9x15" pan. Mix cream cheese and Cool Whip together and add to jello. Mix on high; pour into pan and chill.

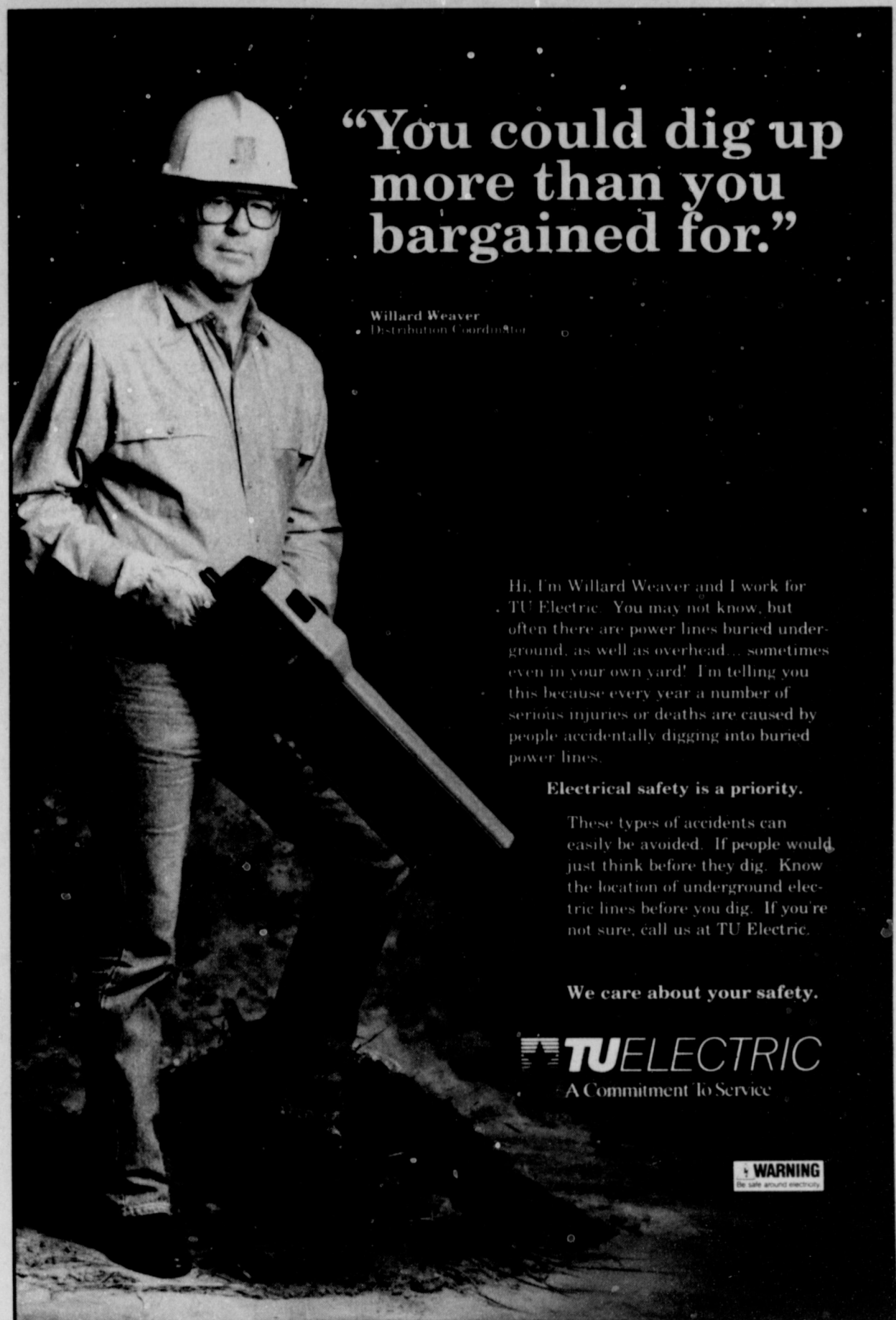

**VOTER REGISTRATION**

DO YOU KNOW?  
from your Voter Registrar

- Why do I keep getting a Voter Registration Certificate every two years for a spouse or child that is deceased or has moved out of the county?
- Why didn't the post office forward my certificate to my new address?
- Why shouldn't I cut my certificate to fit my wallet?

**ANSWERS**

- As we mentioned last week, a person's immediate kin can make changes to a voter's registration information. However, to remove someone from our list, a person related with the second degree: your spouse, your parents, your children, your aunts, your uncles, your nieces, your nephews, your grandparents, and your grandchildren. When we receive this information, we will remove the deceased person's name from the rolls and investigate and eventually drop the name of the person who has moved from the rolls. You can mail this information to us at the address on the front of the Voter Registration Certificate.
- On the front of your certificate, you will see the words "DO NOT FORWARD" in bold print. The post office will not forward certificates because if you have moved, it is likely that you have moved into a new precinct. You are supposed to vote in the precinct where you reside. It is important that you vote in the proper precinct because in the 1990 General Election, 12 different ballot styles were used in our county's 61 precincts.
- The best reason for not cutting your card is all the information it contains. When is the last time you read all the information on both sides of the certificate? We will discuss this information next week.
