Four candidates four six places

There is now one candidate for each of the three school trustee places on the May 4 election ballot, but two are still open on the city council.

School board incumbents Sherri Kennedy and Wendall House have both filed for re-election.

Applying for Place One on the board, which is being vacated by vet-

eran educator John Sibley, is Carmen Lozipone.

As of yesterday afternoon, with less than two weeks remaining for candidates to file in either election, only one candidate had filed for the city council election.

Incumbent Virgil Woodfin is seeking re-election. Alderman Diane Robnett has confirmed she will not seek

another term, and Alderman Johnny Coker has not yet stated his intentions.

Candidates must file by Mar. 20 to have their names on the election ballots for both the city and school elections.

Applications for the city election can be obtained at city hall, while the school board applications are available at the administration building.

Trustees approve bids

Iowa Park school trustees met in a called session Tuesday morning, primarily to act on several purchasing bids, but also accepted a revised letter of resignation submitted by Len Williams.

The athletic director and head football coach had submitted his first

letter concerning resigning some two months ago. In it, he asked that it be effective at the end of the current school year.

Williams has recently accepted a similar position at Waco Connally, and in his revised letter, asked that it be

effective Tuesday, Mar. 12.

The board approved the request.

The bids approved were for automotive tools and related supplies, and a typewriter.

A request from Dennis Yeager to use the two junior high school gymnasiums for a basketball tournament Mar. 14-16 was approved.

In Yeager's letter requesting permission, he said the tournament will be for boys ages 11 and 12, with teams coming from Sheppard AFB, the Boys Club, YMCA and Iowa Park.

Normally the tournament is held at Sheppard, but because of policies adopted by military installations during the Middle East crisis, an alternate site was needed this year, Yeager stated.

Tentative plans were approved for an open house to be held at the new junior high wing on Monday, Mar. 18.

Related to the event, the painting of the late W.F. George that has been in the old high school and junior high will be presented to Mr. George's son, W.A.

Additionally, the cornerstone of the old W.F. George School building will be returned by the George family to be installed in front of the new building wing, according to plans.

The board's regularly-scheduled meeting on the second Tuesday has been postponed this month until Tuesday, Mar. 19, because of conflicts.

Car stolen last week found in San Antonio

An automobile reportedly stolen here Friday night was recovered Saturday by police in San Antonio.

Sometime between 7 p.m. Friday and 7 a.m. Saturday, a 1984 Oldsmobile Cutlass was taken from the Woodbriar Apartments parking lot, police were informed.

A state-wide alert was put out by Iowa Park police, and Monday the local department was notified that the vehicle had been located in San Antonio.

The case remains under investigation.

Three reports of criminal mischief were received by the department in a two-day period.

The first was Wednesday of last

week, when it was learned a sliding glass door window on a portable office building had been broken out.

The structure was recently moved from the Chevrolet sales lot, next to Allsup's, to the 600 block of West Highway, just west of Thompson Tool.

The other two criminal mischief cases were reported to police on Thursday.

A window of a vehicle on the DJ's Auto sales lot, at West Highway and Fourth Street, had been shattered.

That evening, a spokesman for Colonial Heights Apartments on Johnson Road reported someone had been removing metal letters from the side of a building.

Bloodmobile needs donors

Eventhough Operation Desert Storm is over, the military operation is still contributing to a local shortage of blood needed by the American Red Cross, according to spokesperson Ann Bowling.

The Red River Bloodmobile will be at Faith Baptist Church from 4 to 6:30 p.m. Monday, and workers are encouraging a larger turnout than has been experienced in recent visits.

The local Red Cross chapter has not been involved in sending freshly-donated blood to the Middle East, as had been anticipated had military casualties reached anticipated numbers.

But, because so many active and reserve military personnel from the area have been sent overseas, their availability as donors has been temporarily lost.

The Red Cross is strongly urging local donors to be available Monday, because of the lagging of fresh blood donations in recent months.

Contributing to the lack of donors usually counted on by military personnel, the recent holidays and bad weather have also caused a shortage, Mrs. Bowling stated.

The normal age range for donors is 17 to 73, however, persons aged 65 are evaluated to determine their acceptability if they have never before donated.

In Texas, 17 year olds must have written permission from parent or guardian before donating.

Cryovac earns safety award

For the second year in a row, Cryovac President Bill Sturgis has returned to Iowa Park to present the President's Award for Safety to employees of the local plant.

Sturgis praised the local employees for their personal acceptance of responsibility in this important phase of their total performance.

As part of his meetings with small groups during shifts, Sturgis also reviewed the strategic plan for the next seven years.

He reinforced the importance of the Iowa Park plant in Cryovac's overall plan for the future and also praised the employees for their impressive contribution to the overall quality of product and service.

When the city council meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, aldermen will be asked permission to advertise for bids on one piece of equipment and proposals for painting water tanks.

And in another portion of the meeting, according to the tentative agenda, they will be asked for authorization for financing two pieces of equipment already approved for purchase.

Proposals for painting the interior and exterior of the water tower on Johnson Road, and the exterior of the ground storage tanks east of the water treatment plant.

Bids also will be sought for the purchase of a sewer cleaner machine for the water maintenance department.

Financing of a slurry application machine that has already been delivered, and a new trash compactor truck,

will be considered during the meeting. Aldermen will be asked to approve the appointment of Jimmie Holland as a back-up municipal judge.

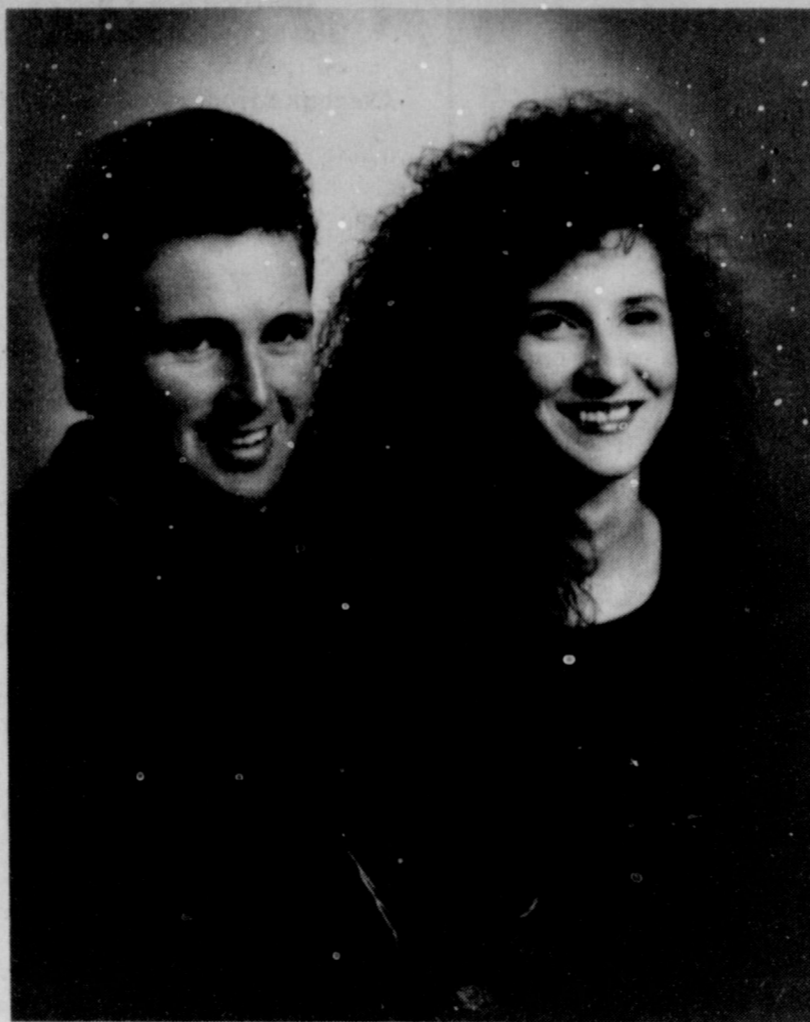
Poster winners are named

Big Brother, Sister program explained to Evening Lionesses'

Naomi Clark, director of Big Brother/Big Sister Program in Wichita County, spoke to the Evening Lionesses Club Thursday in a meeting held at the Lions Building.

Hostesses were Mmes. Herman Daymude, Sam Hill and C.L. Thompson.

Mrs. D.O. James initiated activities for the evening on a patriotic note. She asked club members to repeat the Preamble to the Constitution, then stressed that every word is still applicable today.

Mrs. Alan Bennett introduced the guest speaker who described the Big Brother/Big Sister program as an independent agency, support network and preventive program.

She said the organization began 80 years ago in New York and in Wichita Falls in 1982. She was one of the fund raisers at that time.

Mrs. Clark explained that the program is for boys and girls from six to 16 years of age, and at the present there are 95 families participating.

According to the organization director, the program goal is to match a young person with an adult. Currently 65 have been matched.

She said that careful research had identified the four critical factors that make people what they are. These were found to be home life, involvement in school, friends and church affiliation.

The speaker stated with confidence that the Big Brother/Big Sister program is very important, because families and children are important.

"Adults are important to children, but, unfortunately in today's world parents do not have enough time to spend with their children, so that is

where Big Brother/Big Sister can be a big help," Mrs. Clark said.

In discussing the program, she said volunteers are always needed and that they are screened very carefully, so carefully that only two cases of child molestation have been reported nationwide in 80 years.

Mrs. Clark explained that for one to become a volunteer, he or she, must be at least 20 years old, have time and transportation, and agree to spend at least three hours a week with the child.

She told club members that they could support the program with a monetary contribution if they could not serve as volunteers. She explained that the Big Brother/Big Sister program is not funded by United Way.

Mrs. Kenneth Via directed the business period following the program when members voted to give \$50 to the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance and \$15 to Big Brother/Big Sister.

A nominating committee, composed of Mmes. Joe Kennedy, Lem Tate and Riley Thompson, was selected.

Posters and tickets for the Lionesses Club-Just Because Style Show, slated March 14, were distributed to members. Mrs. Sam Hunter, publicity chairman for the show, gave a report.

I've heard all my life the saying, "The Lord works in mysterious ways." Well, He works quickly, too.

I'm sure all those folks who held that candle light prayer vigil Tuesday night of last week at the high school were impressed that within 24 hours their prayers had been answered.

Almost every one of those attending the vigil took a turn at offering a brief prayer. And in each prayer I heard, God was asked to bring a quick conclusion to the crisis in the Middle East, and protect our military people taking part in the action.

Well, the vigil started shortly before 8 p.m., and at 8 p.m. Wednesday, the coalition forces were directed to cease firing.

And, out of approximately half a million military personnel representing the coalition, fewer than 150 lost their lives.

So, the fighting of Operation Desert

Storm has been brought to an end. But with it, another end has developed.

Our nation has again found its pride and is again both patriotic and in support of its military.

I believe the majority of Americans have suffered ever since the minority assumed it spoke for us during the war in Viet Nam.

Our patriotic blood boiled when our national news media gave most of its attention to draft card and flag burners.

Notice, I used the term "our," because I feel the vast majority of Americans felt the way I did. There just weren't enough speaking out.

Consequently, our military felt we had abandoned them when those who survived Viet Nam returned.

Comparing Viet Nam and Desert Storm, I lay a lot of blame on our elected officials in congress.

If you'll remember, it took congress something like eight years to finally authorize the action that, by the way, had been initiated by Lyndon B. Johnson.

It was during that period, primarily, that the anti-war group, led by free-love dope-head hippies, got their hold

and never let up.

During Operation Desert Shield, the preparation portion of Desert Storm, congress was held up in its action, just like it was back in the Viet Nam days.

The elected opponents to the action, led primarily by major Democratic Party figures, dug their heels when asked to approve Pres. George Bush's plan of operation.

The president's son, George Jr., made a statement in Austin Tuesday that those heel-draggers had used "poor judgement." I agree.

But once the handwriting was on the wall, that the American public was in support of both the president and our military, those leading "aginers" came around and supported everything.

I sincerely believe that the lack of heel biting by those congressmen has meant a lot in the continuing and growing support of the military, and this new-found patriotism, by Americans.

Now that the fighting is over, I hope we never again have to send our fighting forces into action.

But if we do, I'll be one of the first to call for a candle light prayer vigil around the flag pole that stands in front of Iowa Park High School.

quarters is in Duncan, S.C. The facility also houses a research center, where many breakthroughs for the packaging of foods and non-foods have been created.

Cryovac is international in scope, with European headquarters in Switzerland and a research division in Italy.

Manufacturing plants and sales offices are also located in Europe, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Central and South America, Africa and Canada.

The Iowa Park plant produces a wide variety of products and is considered one of Cryovac's most efficient operations.

The facility started production in 1975 with 168,000 square feet and has grown extensively.

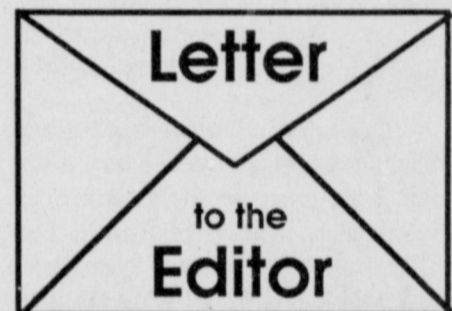
It now has more than 430,000 square feet and employment exceeds 550.

Sam Laird is the general operations manager for the Iowa Park plant.

During 1990, the Iowa Park facility paid \$993,000 in local property taxes with 60 percent of that amount going to the Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District.

The annual payroll and benefits now exceed \$23-million.

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Soldier writes from Saudi Arabia

10 February 1991

Dear Family and Friends of Iowa Park,

I am writing to you from the middle of nowhere in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, where I and many others are locked in the midst of war. When growing up in our small town, I never would have believed that I would, someday, be a part of such an historical event. Over the five months that I have been involved in this crisis, I have had an opportunity to reflect upon the values that I learned growing up in a small Texas town. I would like to take this moment to share with you the perspective of one soldier.

I am an American service member currently fighting in Operation Desert Storm in the war against Iraq. I support the decision of our leaders and the reasons which have brought me and others like me to be involved in this crisis. I believe that the United States, as the corner stone of the world community, has the responsibility of enforcing world law and order, with the ultimate goal of maintaining world peace. Throughout history, the United States has played a significant role in the suppression of an aggressor nation, and in more recent history, the prevention of aggression, through the "Cold War" with the USSR. For many years, the USSR has been our adversary, but now their government is in turmoil, because the Soviet people are seeking their own rights of freedom. Since the conflict in Vietnam, the people of the United States have been reluctant to intervene in international problems. This avoidance attitude brings us back to the pre-World War II Isolationism attitude. I, personally, feel that it's time we started being more responsible toward world affairs. If the world community can come together in the voice of the United Nations to denounce aggression as with Iraq's attack against and destruction of Kuwait, then the most powerful country in the world must take a stand and support the world cause one hundred percent. We, the world community, made every attempt to attain a peaceful solution to this crisis, but Saddam Hussein chose to ignore world opinion. "War is hell!", but war is intended to be that way to remind us to teach those like Saddam that peace is the best way to solve problems. Saddam chose war, because he felt that he was above international law. Through the skill and technology of our coalition forces, we will demonstrate to Saddam and the world the catastrophic destruction of a war, and by doing so, we will reaffirm to the world community and its many new, younger members that the search for peace is paramount. As with all wars, out of this war will come peace. The world community must be ready to achieve peace when the opportunity becomes apparent. Peace is our ultimate goal, but not at the expense of the Kuwaiti people and their country.

I pray for the safety of all involved and for a speedy conclusion to this crisis. I wish you all good health and I thank each and everyone of you for your outstanding support. Take care and I hope to see you soon.

Joe Gray

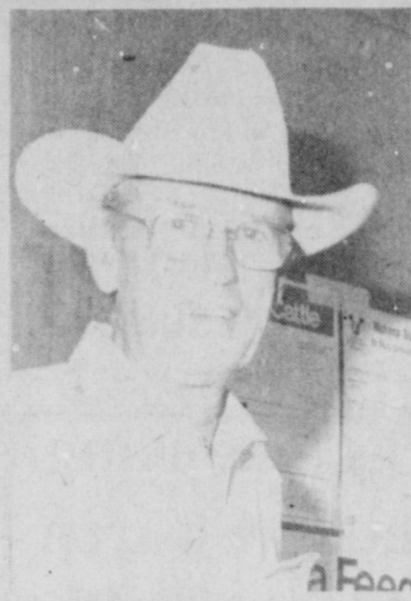
Graveside services for Joe Gray, 65, were held Monday at 11 a.m. in Wichita County Cemetery.

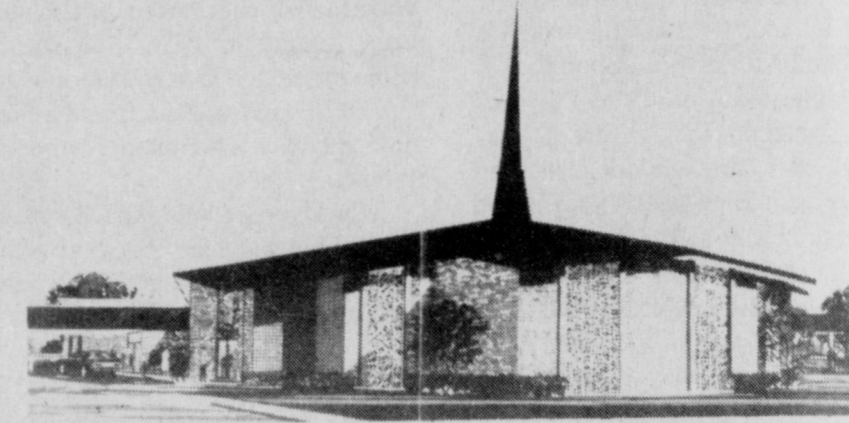

THE GOLDEN RULE

"Just as you want people to treat you, treat them in the same way. Do not judge and you will not be judged; and do not condemn, and you will not be condemned; pardon and you will be pardoned. Give, and it will be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, they will pour into your lap. For by your standard of measure it will be measured to you in return." (Luke 6:31, 37, 38).

The Golden Rule applies to marriage. You want a wife who is gracious, forgiving, tolerant, and supportive? Start with her husband! Jesus put it this way, "Treat her exactly as you would like her to treat you."

Do you want your associates at work to be cheery, unselfish, free from catty, caustic comments and ugly stares? The place to begin is with that person who glares back at you from the bathroom mirror every morning. The Golden Rule is remarkably consistent. Children echo their parents; pupils in a classroom usually echo their teachers; a church usually is the reflection of the preacher. If the one who is communicating is negative, severe, blunt, and demanding you know people reflect the same characteristics, almost without exception.

Not long ago I read about a teacher who asked her students to write down, in thirty seconds, names of people they really disliked. Some students could think of only one person during that thirty seconds. Others listed as many as fourteen. The interesting fact was the ones who disliked the most people were themselves the most widely disliked.

The Golden Rule. If you want others to judge and condemn you, you start it. If you want them to be understanding, broad-minded, allowing you space to be yourself, then begin by being that way yourself. Love begets love. Smiles beget smiles. A positive attitude and enthusiasm are as powerful as dynamite and as contagious as the measles. On the other viewpoint so also are frowns, sighs, and harsh words.

Think about this. What is the nicest thing someone could do for you today? Go do it for someone else!

Crime, blood are Optimist programs

Optimist Club members have heard two informative programs in recent meetings.

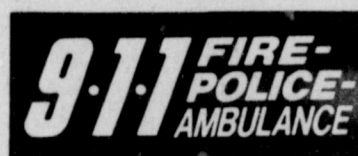
The most recent was given by Artie Wood from the Wichita County Sheriff's office, who spoke on crime prevention, drug education and motorcycle gangs. He gave information on how organized each gang is and how they operate.

An earlier program was given by the American Red Cross. It was explained that blood delivers oxygen, food and hormones; removes carbon dioxide and other waste; transports protective antibodies, cells and clotting factors, and acts as a coolant.

In discussing the use of blood, it

was pointed out that red cells are often administered during surgery; serum albumin is given to accident victims; gamma globulin helps combat infectious diseases, and platelets are given to patients who have blood problems.

The Red Cross collects blood only from volunteer donors. Persons 17 through 65 years of age are eligible to give blood.

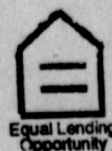

Hawks, Lady Hawks win their divisions

Eight stadium records are established Saturday

The Lady Hawks successfully defended their divisional title in Saturday's annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays, and the Hawks also took their place on the champion's stand.

While the meet was considerably smaller than last year's 50 teams, with only 30 showing up this time, and temperatures plummeted throughout the afternoon, there still were eight stadium records established.

Needing a win over arch rival Graham in the final event (mile relay) of the day to retain their title, the Lady Hawks defied the 21-degree wind chill temperature to beat the Lady Blues by a decisive five seconds.

The Hawks also won their mile relay event, but it wasn't necessary. The boys had amassed major points in the field and distance events to amass 132 points, well above their 1990 showing of fourth place and 89 points.

Of the four girls' stadium records set Saturday, Iowa Park sophomore Erica Knight set two and was tied with another athlete in a third. Her 16.33 in the 100-meter hurdles broke her existing record of 16.99 set last year, and her triple jump of 35-9 bettered the 33-6 held by Jeter of Childress.

Graham's Cypret won the high jump because of fewer misses. But Knight also cleared the 5-2 bar, breaking the old record of an even five feet held by Bailey of Pampa.

Wichita Falls Lady Coyote Ritter also broke her record in the discus, 108-2, with a heave of 112-1/2.

Lawton Eisenhower athletes were involved in all four of the new records for males. The 400-meter relay team's 43.48 bettered Wichita Falls High's 43.56; 1600-meter relay, 3:28.49, broke Olney's 3:33.17; Jackson's 2:04.30 edged out Graham's Theford record of 2:04.54, and Austin's 40.91 in the 300-meter hurdles cut Olney's Rogers' 41.24.

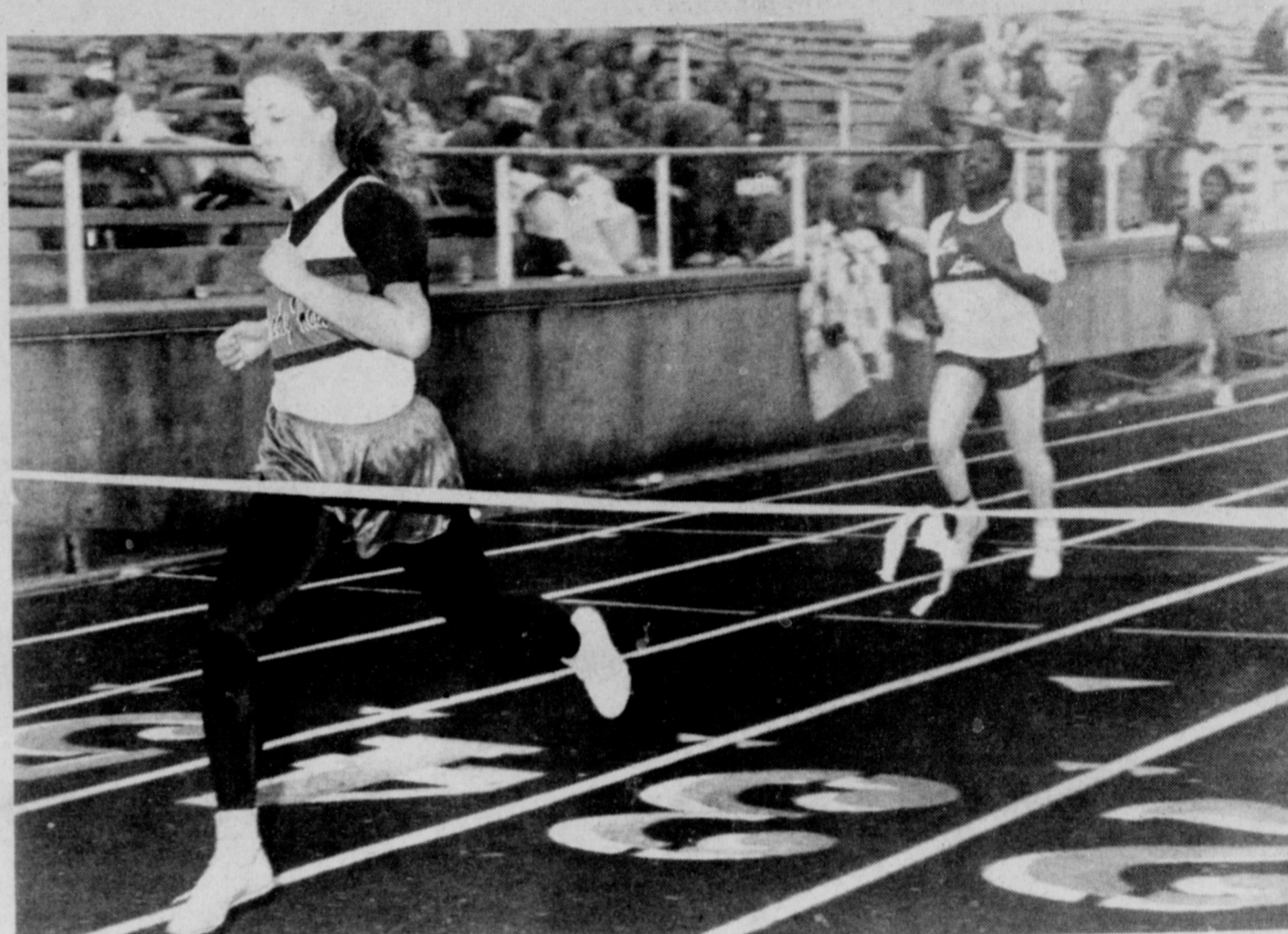

Both are located about 5.5 miles west of Kamay in S&J's r, 640-acre leasehold in the William H. Spillers Survey A-257.

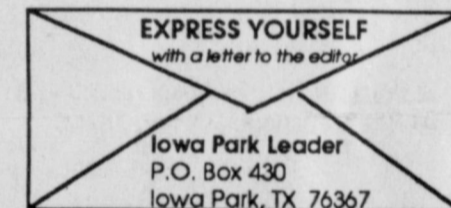

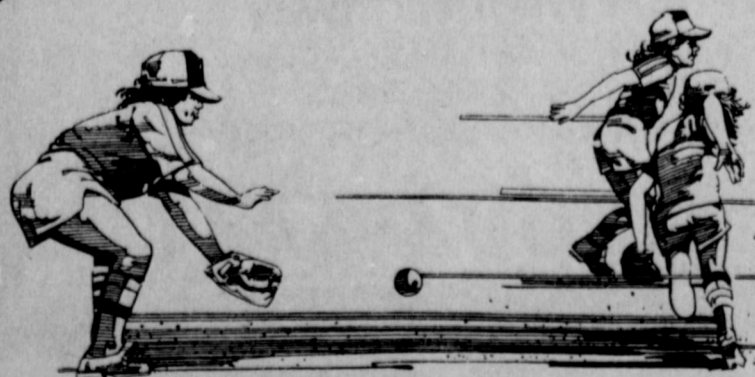

Going into the 1990 season, Connally returned only nine starters from a club that finished the 1989 schedule with five wins and five losses.

Connally currently has an enrollment of 615, larger than the 497 Iowa Park High was reporting in February.

Williams' first team here won only one game, but in 1989 the Hawks went 7-3. Last year the Mean Green started out short-handed, with only 72 players reporting for the varsity, junior varsity and freshman teams.

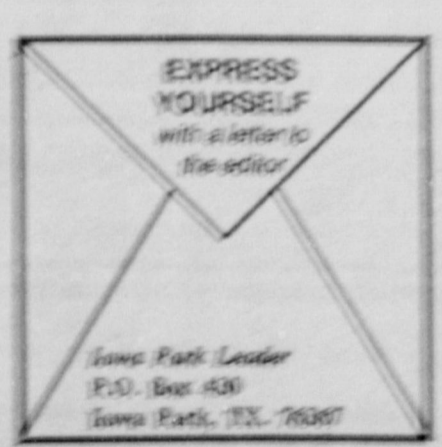
He was named one of the three coaches of the Texas all-star team in last summer's Oil Bowl in Wichita Falls.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Activist Governor Ann Richards, striving to install her "New Texas" theme in the halls of state government, won some and lost some last week in skirmishes on the House floor, Central Texas voting boxes and the Supreme Court bench.

Central Texas voters, including some from Richards' hometown of Waco, threw out tradition and elected a Republican for the first time in a special Senate seat election.

And enough House members ignored her personal beseeching to defeat one of her pet issues, a proposed constitutional amendment creating a state lottery.

But two days later, with the announced resignation of state insurance board member James Saxton, Richards found herself on the brink of controlling insurance board votes - a key step to fulfill her campaign promise to lower insurance rates.

Another resignation scalp that fell her way was Texas Department of Commerce director Bill Taylor.

Tax Bill Looming After the House scuttled the lottery, Richards said lawmakers had better be prepared to raise taxes.

The following day, a Texas Supreme Court ruling on school finance reform indicates the tax bill, when it arrives at her desk, may be larger than anticipated even with lottery money.

Democrats have advanced legislation which takes local tax dollars from rich districts and gives them to poor school districts.

GOP Court Victory In a stunning defeat for liberal Democrats on the Court, the majority ruled that local taxes cannot be considered state taxes, subject to statewide capture and redistribution.

Voting with the majority were the four Republicans and Justice Jack Hightower, a former Democratic congressman.

The Court also decided that additional local tax dollars could be used for local enrichment, even if doing so causes inequities between the rich and poor districts.

The defeat prompted Justice Lloyd Doggett, a pillar of liberalism, to cry foul by the conservatives.

But Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, translating legalese for the press, said, "It means that you can't take local money to make a system efficient. It takes state dollars."

House Defeats Lottery A hard-to-define coalition of Democrats and Republicans kept the lottery proposal from receiving the necessary two-thirds majority, causing the sponsor to postpone indefinitely a second try.

The "no" votes included 31 Republicans and 25 Democrats, including three blacks. The speaker, most of his chairmen, and all Hispanic Democrats voted for the lottery.

The vote marked the first major defeat for Richards, and probably took the Legislature a step closer to a vote on a state income tax.

New GOP Senator Another blow to the governor and fellow Democrats occurred when David Sibley of Waco won the special election for the traditionally Democratic state Senate seat vacated by Chet Edwards, who went to Congress.

The win ups the GOP Senate membership to seven, still far from dominating that chamber,

but Republican claims of new momentum have Democrats privately worried.

Why? Because Sibley defeated state Rep. Betty Denton, a House member for some 15 years, and the district includes part of Waco, Richards' hometown.

Taylor Resignation Embattled Texas Department of Commerce executive director Bill Taylor resigned last week amid allegations of fiscal wrongdoing.

Before she took office, Gov. Richards called on Taylor to resign, but he resisted. Chalk up a win in her war to gain control of state agencies, but it was really House Business and Commerce chairman Steve Wolens, D-Dallas, who forced Taylor out by calling on the Travis County DA to investigate breach of duty.

Panel Backs Income Tax The Texas Association of Taxpayers' executive committee has recommended a state income tax as part of an overhaul of the state tax system.

If endorsed by the group's board of directors, the association would become the first major business group to come out in favor of the highly controversial income tax.

The association is made up of 2,500 members representing business and professions.

Other Highlights State Rep. Sam Johnson, R-Dallas, said he will run for the congressional seat being vacated by Steve Bartlett, who will run for Dallas mayor.

The Legislature must begin redistricting now, even though U.S. census figures are provisional and may be adjusted later, Attorney General Dan Morales ruled last week.

Following Senate passage of a tough ethics bill and a constitutional amendment that bans lawmakers from accepting honoraria for making speeches, Lt. Gov. Bullock said, "I do not know of a state that has a bill stronger than this in all of its aspects."

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
