I am writing to you from the middle of nowhere in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, where I and many others are locked in the midst of war.

would, someday, be a part of such an historicalevent. Over the five months that I have been involved in this crisis, I have had an opportunity to reflect upon the values that I learned growing up in a small Texas town. I would like to take this moment to share with you the prospective of one soldier.
I am an American service member currently fighting in Operation Desert Storm in the war against Iraq. I support the decision of our leaders
