Telephone improvements promised by '92

Iowa Park will have touchtone dialing next January.

Southwestern Bell Telephone customers here will gain access to the most advanced telecommunications network available when the utility company converts its central office here to the new digital switching system.

The change, according to Dan Adams, area manager for external affairs, will be on Jan. 18, 1992.

The new switching system will

serve 3,331 Iowa Park telephone customers in the 592 exchange.

Iowa Park will receive the latest in telephone digital switching as part of an agreement announced in November by the Texas Public Utility Commission and Southwestern Bell.

The company is installing the switch as part of an accelerated program designed to help boost the Texas economy and provide customer benefits worth more than \$1.2-billion

through 1994, according to Adams.

"The negotiated settlement was a product of months of intense discussion among the PUC staff, Southwestern Bell and 23 separate intervening groups," said Adams.

"The agreement provided an incentive to build a telecommunications network that should attract new businesses and jobs to Texas without increasing telecommunications costs to the Texas ratepayers.

"With this conversion, Iowa Park customers will be served by a switching system that is second to none," Adams said.

Adams explained that digital technology enhances a community's ability to retain and attract new business as well as improve telecommunications services.

"Digital switching enables Southwestern Bell to improve voice transmission quality and to make available a number of new customer services," Adams said.

New services made possible by digital switching include One-Plus Easy Access to long-distance carriers and Custom Calling features such as Call Forwarding, Call Waiting, Speed Calling and Three-Way Calling;

"Digital switching upgrades Iowa Park's status in the eyes of businesses and industry," Adams said. "Digital is the world standard for advanced telecommunications. It's a definite selling point for a community."

Those digital switching benefits give a community the capability to use a number of advanced data telecommunications services that can improve business efficiency and attract new business to a community.

The services include Bell's Plexar office communication system and Digital Link data transmission services.

Adams said another benefit to digital technology, is its cost-effectiveness in terms of space requirements and maintenance.

Computers in the system allow it to perform millions of switching functions each second. The system can diagnose itself, and, in many cases, correct a problem before customers are affected.

Once the cutover is completed, Iowa Park customers will have access to their primary long-distance telephone company of choice.

Clean-Up Week to be declared

Mayor Wayne House is to read a proclamation during Monday night's regular city council meeting which will designate April 15-20 as "Clean-Up and Fix-Up Week" in Iowa Park.

The city annually co-sponsors the week-long city-wide activity with the Chamber of Commerce.

While organizations and individuals are voluntarily cleaning up public areas such as parks and roadsides, the mayor's ordinance calls on citizens to make a special effort on their property and surrounding vacant areas.

The city meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Two ordinances are listed on the council's tentative agenda.

The first, if approved, would amend the city's pay policies, allowing for slight variation from the strict language of the current ordinance which would permit issuing payment to shift workers during their periods of work, Gary Jones, city administrator, explained.

The other ordinance would grant

a waiver to permit the Red River Trail Club to pass through Iowa Park in June. The group's agenda calls for spending a night in Oscar Park next to Gordon Lake.

In response to a request for changes in room rental fees at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, made last month during a council meeting, a resolution setting new rates will be presented for adoption.

Bids received in response to three advertisements will be proposed for acceptance. They are on the purchase of a new sewer cleaning machine, contracting a liner for the new landfill pit, and materials for work at the Recreational Activities Center.

Jones will request permission to advertise for bids to purchase equipment and materials for seven different projects.

To be proposed are advertising for bids for: dechlorination unit for the waste water treatment plant; heating and airconditioning ductwork, foyer partition, vinyl wall covering and electrical work at the RAC; asphalt

overlay for remaining blocks under the FEMA project, and materials required to slurry street projects.

Also to be proposed by Jones is authorization for him to enter into a contract with Governmental Services Agency to prepare application for an enterprise zone in the city.

Criminal mischief cases load police

Jack and Linda Coltrain, native Kansans, had lived in several places in Texas and New Mexico before moving to Iowa Park in 1979.

That was just after the tornado in Wichita Falls and they didn't find a place to rent there. They came to Iowa Park, loved it here, and purchased a house.

Now their house is for sale because they are moving to Arlington in June or July.

Linda laughed and said, "When anyone says anything to me about cooking or a recipe, my kids ask which fast food place or Holiday Inn did I give them directions to. I don't cook as much as I did when they were at home, but I still can."

The Coltrains met in Pittsburg. She was working at a hotel and he had formerly worked there. He came by one day and the manager told him he needed a cook. Since he was working his way through Kansas State College, he took the job.

When they married Linda could cook, but she couldn't make pie crust without it coming out like a board, she said.

"My grandmother was a great cook, but she was the kind that used a pinch of this and a handful of that and my pinches and handfuls were not the same size, I guess." Linda was raised in a family of eight children.

Jack got a pie crust recipe from the pastry chef at the hotel and she shares that recipe today with our readers.

He has worked with hotel and motel chains since they were married. He now is vice president of Westbooke Hotels which manages franchised hotels and motels throughout the country. The home office is located in Irving.

Linda says her husband still cooks once in a while, but she isn't real enthusiastic about it. "He was used to having a pot and pan boy follow him around, and I don't like to be a pot and pan boy," she explained.

The Coltrains have four children, all graduates of Iowa Park High School. They are Danny, who is married and has two children. He is a policeman in Burkburnett. Sam is a policeman in Wichita Falls. Cindy, a former juvenile officer in Iowa Park, is now attending school in Arlington and she and her father have an apartment together. Jana is a music major at Midwestern State University.

Linda, a secretary for Barbour Trucking Co., says she used to hear people talk about how great it was to have grandchildren and brag about everything they did and she was just a little skeptical.

Now she says if she has a hobby it is being with her grandchildren all she can.



Linda used to live in a little Italian and German community, Frantenac, near Pittsburg. Everything she cooked then seemed to have an Italian or German flavor.

Now that they have lived in Texas and New Mexico, everything she cooks seems to take on the Tex-Mex flavor and the family loves it.

Jack's Pie Crust

2 cups flour
two-thirds cup chilled shortening
4 Tbps. ice water
1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. sugar or corn syrup
Cut shortening into flour quickly; dissolve salt and sugar or corn syrup in ice water and sprinkle over dough. Mix just enough to make a ball use at once. Bake at 425 degrees until brown.

The following recipe is one her family likes very much. She uses Jack's pie crust for it.

Hamburger Pie

Hamburger Filling:
1 lb. hamburger
one-half cup chopped onion
1 can (15-16 Oz.) green beans
1 tsp. salt
one-fourth tsp. pepper
1 can (10 oz.) tomato soup
1 tsp. garlic salt
2 Tbsp. chili powder
salt and pepper to taste
Brown beef and onion, drain excess fat. Stir in soup and seasonings. Fold in green beans, heat until mixture is hot and pour into prepared pastry shell. Place top crust on pie and bake about one hour at 350 degrees or until crust is brown.

The Chili Rice Bake is a big favorite with her family.

Chili Rice Bake

1 lb. lean ground beef
one-half cup each onion and green pepper
2 cups beef broth or bullion
1 6-Oz. can tomato paste
1 tsp. garlic powder
2 Tbsp. chili powder
3 cups cooked rice
1 cup grated cheddar cheese

Saute beef, onion and green pepper until meat is almost done. Drain and add broth, tomato paste and seasonings. Place in shallow baking dish (2 qt.). Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Serves 6.

Scalloped Pineapple

This recipe is a good accompaniment for ham or holiday meals. It also can be used for dessert.
one-half cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs, beaten
1 can (20 Oz.) crushed pineapple
3 cups packed bread crumbs
1 cup marshmallow bits

Cream butter, sugar and eggs. Add bread crumbs and marshmallows. Mix well and bake at 350 degrees, uncovered for about one hour, or until knife inserted in the middle comes out clean.

Wacky Cake

The following recipe makes a real good coffee cake and is easy to make. Linda said her aunt gave her the recipe when she was a child.
1 and one-half cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1 cup sugar
one-half tsp. salt
3 Tbsp. Hersheys cocoa
Make three holes and put in the following:
First hole, 1 Tbsp. vinegar
Second hole, 1 tsp. vanilla
Third hole, 5 Tbsp. oil
Pour 1 cup water over entire batter. Mix well. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes or until knife inserted in the middle come out clean.

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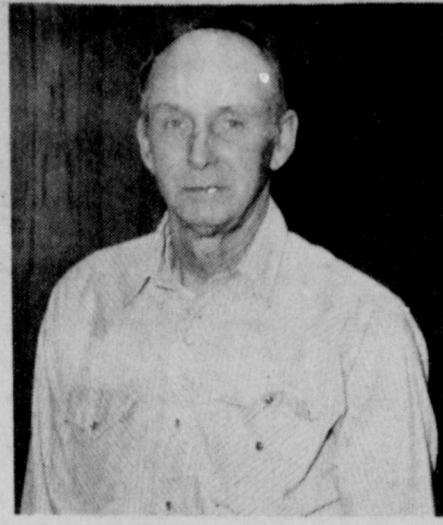

What is the magic of the date April 15?

That once was the date everyone looked forward to filing their federal income tax.

But, with the promise of earlier rebate checks for those who have income tax refunds coming, people are filing earlier than they used to.

Also, lots of folks are able to file earlier now that it can be done through electronic computer filing.

April 15 now has a new meaning. Especially with the folks involved in education.

State Judge Scott McCowan gave the legislature an extension, from April Fool's Day (which was very appropriate since it concerned the Texas legislature) until April 15 to come up with a new public education funding formula which he, and the state supreme court,

would accept.

Now April 15 is the day when local superintendents and school boards will find out what will happen to local school districts and how they will be funded.

And then, April 15 has gained a new importance in the Iowa Park school system. That's the date Supt. Glen Mitchell has instructed each of the five principals to put in his hands their budget proposals for the 1991-92 school year.

I'd hate to be a principal in the Iowa Park school system who hasn't yet begun working on his IRS Form 1040 and 1991-92 campus budget, and all the time wondering whether some appointed "master" was going to dictate to him, and all other educators in the state, how schools next year will be run and funded. That's cruel and unusual pressure.

Mitchell's comment about Cowan's giving the legislature two more weeks to come up with an acceptable legislative bill was, "I'm glad he gave them two weeks, and no more."

I'd feel the same way, if I were the one responsible for trying to work on a school district's budget.

Superintendents and school boards have not been treated fairly by our legislature lately. This business of not knowing how much money will be available makes budgeting tough.

The way things have been going the past few years, a school superintendent isn't doing his job if he doesn't "pad" his budget with extra money.

He likely will not know the effect of new legislation on how many people it will take to operate a district, under the mandates -- and interpretations of mandates -- handed down by the legislature.

And based on current experience, he cannot be held accountable for bud-

getting monies that the state identifies as a "shortfall," and reneges on making available what had been promised.

Public schools in Texas have been doing a pretty darn good job, since the Gilmer-Aiken Bill was passed. I believe that was either in the late 1940s or early 1950s.

But all of a sudden, the federal and state governments, and federal and state judges, have gotten into the act and, as evidenced by the situation today, things have deteriorated.

I used to think I wouldn't care what happened, once our five children were all graduated.

But now I've got the education of my grandchildren to consider. I hadn't thought about that.

Education in Texas, especially over the past 10 years, has been in a state of uncertainty.

I can only hope the legislation that comes out of Austin -- hopefully by the magic date of April 15 -- will be for the betterment of public education in Texas.

I just wish I had as much confidence as I have hope.

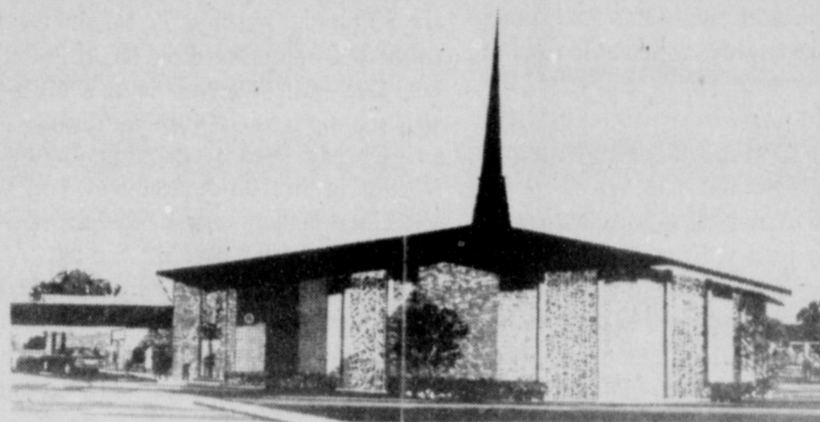

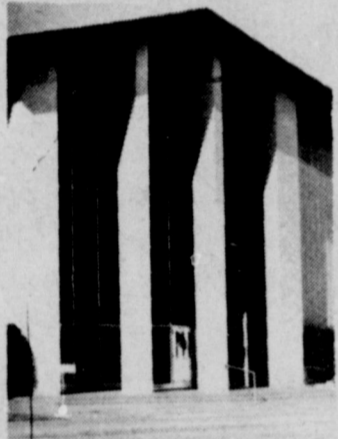

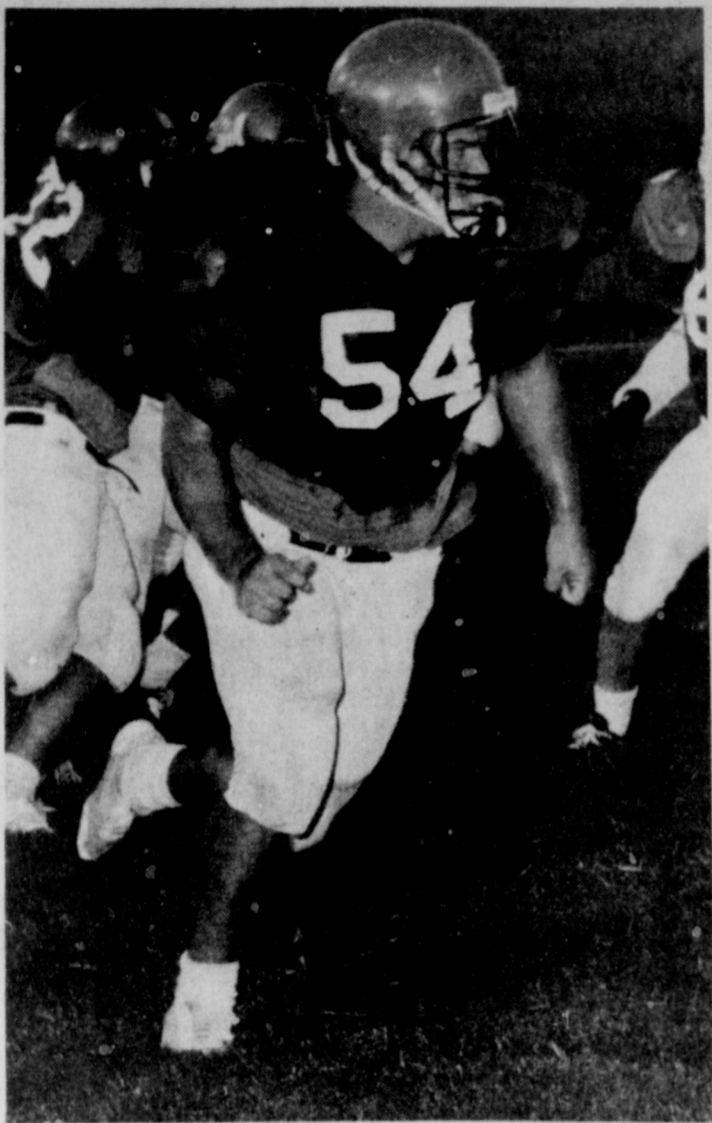

Lady Hawks run away with Olney title

The Lady Hawks virtually ran away and hid from the rest of the field Saturday in the Olney Cub Relays.

Iowa Park racked up 224 points, while runner-up Electra had 112 and host Olney 80, in the girls' division.

Thirteen first places were earned by the Lady Hawks, including two relay events.

One of those first places came out of a decision reached while the team bus was enroute to the meet.

Gina Inman had not run a hurdle event in competition since junior high. The sophomore won the 300-meter hurdles in a highly respectable time of 51.63.

In addition, she won both the 800-meter and 1600-meter events with timings of 2:39.90 and 6:13.54.

Besides running legs on both winning relay teams, Erica Knight was a triple individual event winner. Her time in the 100-meter hurdles was 15.63, while in her two field event specialties she went 35-3 in the triple jump and 5-

2 in the high jump.

Kerri Dornier, also a member of the same two winning relay teams, won the 200-meter dash in 26.53 and long jump, 16-3 1/2.

Jennifer Ricks also was a double winner, for the first time this season. She had a personal best with a 99-5 discus throw, and also won the shot put with a 32-7.

The other first place was in the 400-meter dash, won by Lychelle Munday in 67.30.

Marcy McCarthy placed second in the 300-meter hurdles, 51.74, and third in the 100-meter hurdles, 16.50.

Dee Ann Warren, with a 13.39, was second in the 100-meter dash.

Christy Welch was right behind Warren in the 100-meter event, 13.73, and Cheri Halady was third in the 400-meter dash with a 68.42.

The 400-meter relay team finished in third place with a time of 56.07.

The only major points for Iowa Park in the boys' division were earned

by seniors Gary Green and Patrick Birk.

Green won both the shot put and discus with respective tosses of 52-9 1/4 and 155-2. Second places in the same events were 44-1 and 126-8, indicating he had very little competition.

Birk won the 1600-meter run with

a clocking of 4:55, and placed second in the 3200-meter run in 10:32.28.

Both teams will compete Saturday in the Panther Relays at Seymour, which will be their final tune-up meet before the Dist. 4-AAA championships Friday, April 12, at Breckenridge.

Hawks open district Friday against Lions

The Baseball Hawks closed out their non-conference schedule with a win and a hail-out, and will open Dist. 4-AAA play at Vernon Friday with a record of 8-7.

The Hawks knocked off Nocona 5-1 Friday, but were forced to take cover here Tuesday, with the score standing 1-1 with Childress, when a hail storm and rain cancelled the contest.

Iowa Park's conference opener against Vernon's Lions will be followed here Tuesday when the Buckaroos of Breckenridge come to call.

The Hawks are the defending district champions.

Those games, as are all Dist. 4-AAA contests, start at 4:30 p.m.

As the winds built and clouds began moving over the field Tuesday, the Hawks pulled into a 1-1 tie

with Childress on a successful bunt by Patrick Kennedy that drove in Tony Lozipone.

Then, with two outs against Iowa Park, the hail hit, followed by rain, and officials called the game in the bottom of the second inning.

Chad Thompson was working on the mound.

The Hawks scored all five of their runs in the fourth inning Friday at Nocona, and gave up the hosts' lone run in the seventh.

J'Bill Merrick pitched the first five innings, and Thompson finished the contest in relief.

Iowa Park had only six hits, but four of those were for extra bases.

Kennedy had a triple, while Lozipone, Scott McNeely and Todd Pulley each had doubles. Singles were credited to Lewis Skinner and Thompson.
