# Baseball Day in Iowa Park

Saturday is the traditional Little League Day in Iowa Park -- complete with a lengthy downtown parade and season-opening games extending well into the night.

Girls' Softball teams will have to wait until April 27 for their season opening, however, even though that league is part of Iowa Park Little League.

All boys and girls teams are to organize into the parade formation on the north side of Dutton Funeral Home, and start through the downtown area at 9 a.m.

The route is to be down Park to Colorado, make a U-turn and back to Wall, south to Cash, and east to the junior high where it will disband.

Almost 600 players, 400 boys and 177 girls (after experiencing a 75-percent increase in registrations over last year), will participate in the parade.

All boys' games will be played at the fields on West Magnolia, except the Senior League, which is located next to Sonic and Harvey's.

The T-Ball game between the Braves and Royals will start at 6 p.m. The Angels and Bluejays will meet

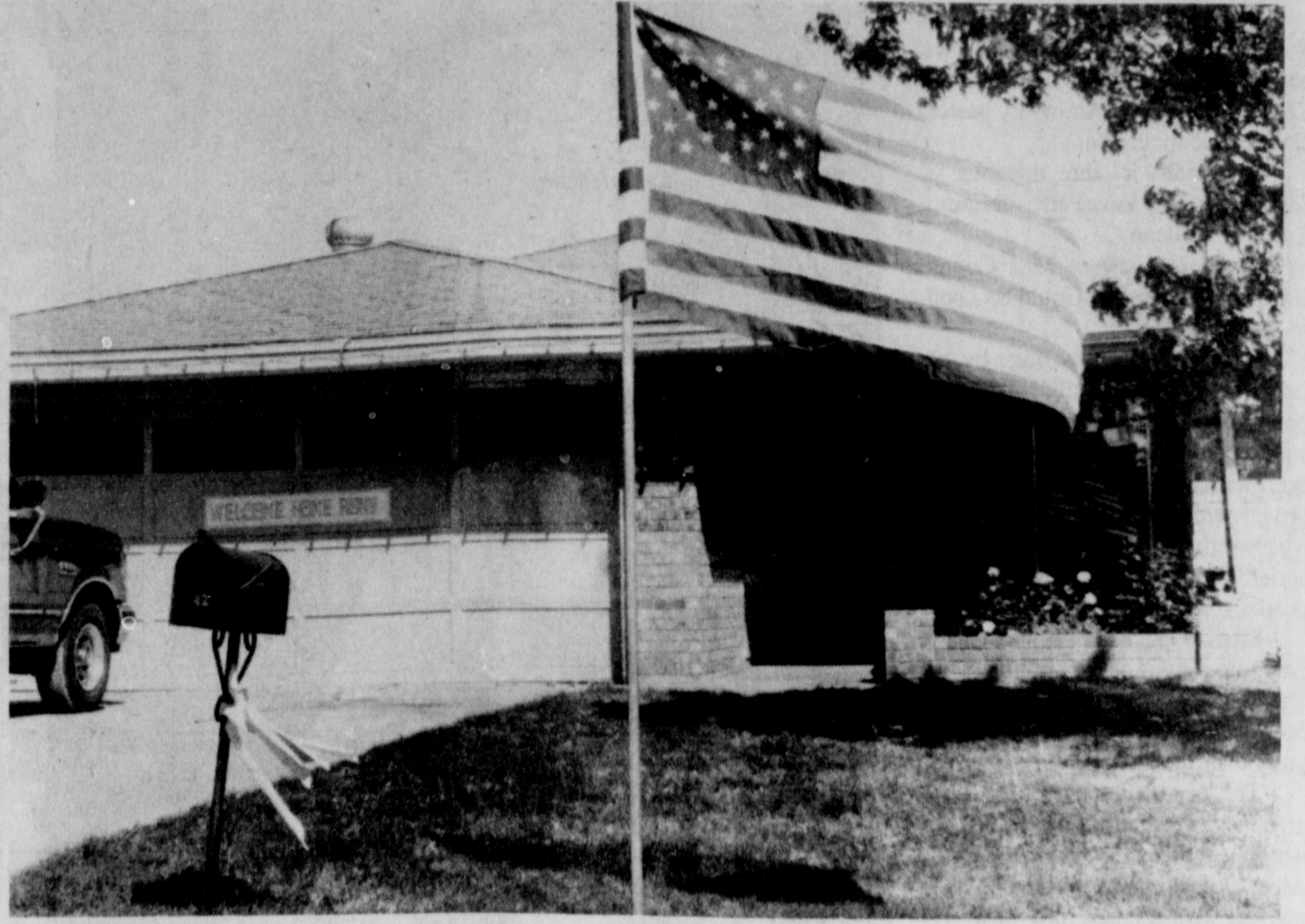
at 4 p.m. in 5-Pitch.

## City-wide Clean-Up planned

By Sunday, April 21, the community of Iowa Park should look its cleanest and best.

That's because Clean-Up, Fix-Up Week is April 15-20.

The annual effort is co-sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and City of Iowa Park.

At least 20 organizations have already registered to participate in the effort, and have been assigned areas of responsibility, according to Susan Dillard, Chamber secretary.

During the week, the city opens its sanitary landfill to free dumping by any documented resident of the city.

In addition, residents who have collections of brush, debris and large items and are unable to haul it to the landfill can have it picked up by city workers at no expense.

Residents have only to call the Public Works office, 592-2642, informing them whether the items are stacked in the alley or along the front curb.

A list is maintained, and as workers and trucks become available they will be dispatched to pick up the items.

Homeowners are encouraged to clean up their properties.

Any organizations or individuals who might want to volunteer their time and effort to help clean up public areas are encouraged to call the Chamber of Commerce office.

## Local library started 29 years ago

National Library Week begins Sunday, which coincides with the date 29 years ago that the first library in Iowa Park was dedicated.

The annual book sale will be from Tuesday through Saturday during regular library hours, 10 a.m.-8 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday, 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Wednesday and Friday, and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday.

A large number of books will be for sale, Sue Maness, librarian, said. Paperbacks will sell for 10 cents and hardbacks will be 25 cents. All proceeds benefit the library.

The sale will include both adult and children's fiction and nonfiction books, as well as magazines.

Children's books and cassettes were purchased with proceeds from last year's book sale, according to Mrs. Maness.

Through the years the library has continued to be an on-going project for improvement, and has shown steady growth and expansion of services.

In its embryonic stage, the library was conceived by the Iowa Park Evening Lions Club 30 years ago.

From its humble beginnings as the Wichita County Free Library in the southwest corner room of the Chamber of Commerce building, it now is eloquently housed in a Texas Historical Landmark in the 400 block of W. Alameda.

Not only is the library settled in an imposing brick structure of Colonial Revival architecture (1924 vintage) but it is known as the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, bearing a name long associated with the history of this area.

Tom Burnett and his father before him, Burk Burnett (for whom the town of Burkburnett was named) were identified with ranching and civic circles more than a century.

The library now has 13,788 volumes that may be checked out for a period of two weeks, and 322 videos with a checkout period of three days.

In addition, approximately 40 magazines and periodicals may be checked out for one week and audios for two weeks.

A new service for the library is books on tape. They have a checkout period of two weeks. This is an excellent service for persons who are blind, or who have difficulty reading small-print books.

Another section that generates interest is the Genealogy Section. Alma Francis has volunteered many hours of her time to this section, and had donated much of the materials. Mrs. Maness said a large amount of the material in this section has been donated.

Also included in this section is genealogical material on microfiche that was donated by Wichita Falls Kemp Library. There is a lot of in-

formation in these shelves for those interested in researching their lineage.

There is a special item of interest in the Genealogy Room that might stir memories for those in the Iowa Park area who remember the old Rexall Drug Store and "Dr." Tommy Clark and Fenton Dale. The old manual typewriter they used to write prescription labels for containers has been placed here.

All volumes purchased by the library are selected by Mrs. Maness, by popularity of contemporary authors, what patrons are wanting to read, and other materials that she has special requests to purchase as funds are available.

The library has a computer that people may use at the library, and a copy machine. A fee of 15 cents is charged for making copies.

Tom Burnett Memorial Library is supported by the North Texas Library System out of Fort Worth. This allows the library to take advantage of special services that it would not be able to have otherwise, said Mrs. Maness.

These services include an interlibrary loan, video rotation, video recorder for library use, 16mm movies for public and library use, and a computer for the library staff.

The average number of patrons who check out materials per month is 1,167, and the average number of items checked out in that period of time is 3,689.

The city council was asked Monday night to amend its contract with the Recreational Activities Center board on the length of the new building's lease.

The lease, which had earlier been approved by both the RAC board and council, calls for a two-year term.

However, according to RAC board members, the shortness of the contract makes it virtually impossible for them to receive grants from foundations.

Mayor Wayne House told the group he felt they would not need grants for anything having to do with the building because it was the council's intentions to finish the structure and "...turn over the keys on July 1."

Several items on the meeting's agenda were, in fact, related to work and materials for the completion of the new structure.

Rev. Mike Grubbs, speaking for the RAC, told the council there were still several areas where grant monies could enhance the facility, but not be a permanent part of the structure, which would benefit from grants.

When told the RAC board was requesting a lease up to 99 years, House said, "I just have a problem of the city constructing a building and then turning

it over to a group of people."

Grubbs said money raised by the RAC could be used for such things as finishing the building's kitchen, furniture and possibly completing the master plan of the area with playground equipment and landscaping.

The outset of the discussion was that a shorter term than 99 years, but longer than the two years, might be an alternative.

Administrator Gary Jones proposed RAC representatives meet with him to discuss an alternative period which might be brought back before the council for consideration.

Detective Ray Smock of the Iowa Park Police Department was announced as the city's Employee of the Month.

Aldermen approved a proposal to enter into an agreement with the firm Governmental Service Agency, for the purpose of representing the city in applying for a Texas Enterprise Zone Program.

Jones told the council the firm has an outstanding record of success in filing various applications with the state which are approved.

The contract calls for an expenditure of \$1,500, and carries a guarantee that if the first year the grant is not approved, it was resubmitted three years without additional cost.

Jones said several things can be accomplished from establishment of an Enterprise Zone, including creation of new jobs and spurring investment in areas of economic distress.

The council approved a list of new fees for renting the meeting room at Tom Burnett Memorial Library, in response to a request made at a meeting last month.

The new fees include:  
Baby showers, wedding showers, birthday parties, luncheons, dinners -

\$25 fee plus \$25 (refundable) deposit.

Weddings and receptions, \$35 fee plus \$25 deposit.

Non-profit meetings, \$15 fee.

Several bid items were approved, including \$16,844, with trade, for a new sewer cleaner machine; \$33,750 for constructing a liner for the new landfill pit, and \$18,846 for materials to be installed at the RAC.

Also approved were proposed changes in ordinances. One only changes the day city employees are paid, while the other was a waiver permitting the Red River Trail Club to pass through on horseback as well as camp at Gordon Lake in June.

## Her second was a first

When Mrs. Marc Newman gave birth Monday night in Wichita General Hospital, it was her second baby.

But, it was the first time an Iowa Park City Secretary had ever left a city council meeting for that purpose.

While the blessed event was not expected to happen during a council meeting, plans had been laid for her substitute.

Donna Koehler had been appointed during the Mar. 25 meeting as assistant city secretary.

So, when Mrs. Newman signaled Mrs. Koehler, who was sitting in the audience, of her need to leave (at 7:34 p.m.), the assistant secretary replaced Mrs. Newman and continued to record the minutes.

Mrs. Newman's daughter was delivered slightly more than an hour of her departure from the meeting.

## Gun stolen locally recovered in Vernon

A .45 caliber automatic pistol that was reported Thursday evening as having been stolen from a pickup here was recovered three days later in Vernon.

The weapon reportedly had been stored inside the pickup's camper shell while it was parked in the 1600 block of Karen, and its owner filed the theft complaint at 8:35 p.m. Thursday.

As is the case of all stolen guns, the serial number was sent out to all law agencies in the state.

Vernon police are said to have been called to a scene in that city where there had been gunfire. No one had been injured, but the gun confiscated and identified as the one reported missing from Iowa Park.

The gun was returned to its owner. Iowa Park officers received a call

from juveniles at 12:22 a.m. Thursday, telling them that a man was beating their mother.

Clint Allen Owen, 31, was arrested in the 100 block of West Ruby on a charge of assault causing bodily injury and transported to county jail, according to the police blotter.

Risking being repetitious, I've gotta point out that some of the worst pieces of legislation enacted in Austin are those passed during the "eleventh hour."

That is exactly what is about to take place on the compromise school finance reform package.

There are always those who have their special interests that are tacked on as riders, or supplemented after most of a bill is studied in hopes it will be included.

The new one, which has never been discussed publicly while the reform was being worked on, but mentioned at various other times, is pre-kindergarten classes in public schools.

Tacked on as a description for justification are the words "for disadvantaged."

Folks, if you want pre-kindergarten care, you should go to a socialist government country.

My idea of disadvantaged, in this

term, is a kiddo in a family where the parents have thumbed their noses to the need of learning the English language, or a family that uses food stamps to buy cigarettes, potato chips and soft drinks.

The next thing to come, if this deal goes through, likely will be prenatal classes in our public schools.

Sound silly? Not any more than public schools "educating" a three year old.

I'm not sure whether the schools will be required to furnish diapers or not.

When I mentioned the subject to a highly knowledgeable resident this week, he pointed out that there is a term used for some certain areas of special education, that schools care for those students "from womb to tomb."

And that's a fact!

And the same compromise bill, if passed and approved by the state supreme court, would also get students

back in classes for 180 days, instead of the current 175-day school year.

They'd do that by eliminating the "inservice" requirement for teachers, which is something most of them have been disgusted with since it started.

Actually, we never know exactly what's in a piece of legislation, especially when it relates to public education, until after it's been passed and then interpreted by the Texas Education Agency.

And, folks, that also is a fact!

## Trustee meeting agenda loaded with personnel

Three of the 13 items listed on the tentative agenda for Tuesday's school board meeting relate to personnel.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the school administration building.

Contracts for all auxiliary employees will be considered for 1991-92, as well as employment of new personnel and a proposal for placement of teachers on Career Ladder levels Two and Three.

An executive session is listed on the agenda, as well as another note to "accept resignations."

Supt. Glen Mitchell did not elaborate on either of the latter two topics, even though there is considerable speculation in the community following the recent hiring of Lucky Gamble as the new head coach and athletic director.

Three board policies will be considered, all relating to last month's appearance by representatives of the local Ministerial Alliance.

The policies listed on the agenda are: advertising in the schools; visitors to the schools, and neutrality regarding religion.

A discussion is to be held on proposed guidelines and criteria for granting tax abatements, a topic currently being studied by all taxing entities in Wichita County, at the urging of the commissioners court.

## Worth Quoting

Excellence in education is not achieved because school districts are "wealthy" in terms of taxable property values. Canadian Independent School District has not always been one of the state's enviably wealthy schools, but it has been for many years one of the state's educationally wealthy districts.

In 1954, a year which may have been an economic nadir for Canadian ... the year in which the Santa Fe Railway pulled its division out of Canadian and enrollment in the Canadian public schools dropped overnight by more than 300 students ... one-third of its scholastic population at that time ... in the fall of that year State school authorities were making an inspection and evaluation of the Canadian schools and recognizing the district for its outstanding record in educating its young people. A.H. Breazeale was superintendent, and among the teachers on the committee greeting the evaluating team were two names which will be familiar to generations of students who were educated in these schools during the middle decades of this century: Maudaline Hutton and Bessie Mae Hext.

It was teachers like those who made the Canadian schools outstanding ... not the property wealth which would come later ... but they helped set a standard of educational excellence which has endured, and still exists and which we feel sure will continue to exist in Canadian ... even if the Robin Hood robber barons in the Texas Legislature succeed in plundering the property wealth of this school district to enrich those which are poor in spirit.

Good schools are made by good teachers ... and by good communities which support them. Good schools cannot be created by legislative edict or by court order ... and poor schools will not be made "good" by money captured from their betters to make them financially "equal" by pulling them all down to the same level. There is a lesson to be learned by Texas lawmakers if they have the wit to learn at all. The Legislature will not improve the quality of education in Texas by tearing down the good school districts (and there are many of them) in order to give part of what they have to those which are lacking. They may take away some of their money under the guise of "equalizing" opportunities, but they cannot take away or transfer their talent or the spirit which drives it. The "Robin Hood" program is doomed to failure.

Legislators need to learn from these better school districts, even as their students do, and try to improve the State's school system by using them as standards of excellence, not by pulling their standards down to match an average "norm."

When parents realize education begins at home -- that there must be motivation, encouragement, and interest on the part of the parent -- then we will have a start toward a good Texas public school system.

Texas needs to improve on education, sure. But most of all Texas needs to improve on parents. When parents of every background start thinking of education, schools, achieving, reading, writing and arithmetic rather than how many videos we will watch this weekend -- then Texas education will have a chance.

Until then, taking from the rich and giving to the poor districts, and every other so-called plan to equalize education, doesn't impress me. You can fund and fund and fund and go no where. That's the thing I worry about.

Funding doesn't guarantee learning any more than a \$5-million contract guarantees Roger Clemens will win 25 games, strike out 300 batters and not make a fool of himself with umpires.

Education begins at home. We don't need more money. We need more homes!

served, and at 6:45 Carol Venhaus will again teach singing in Spanish.

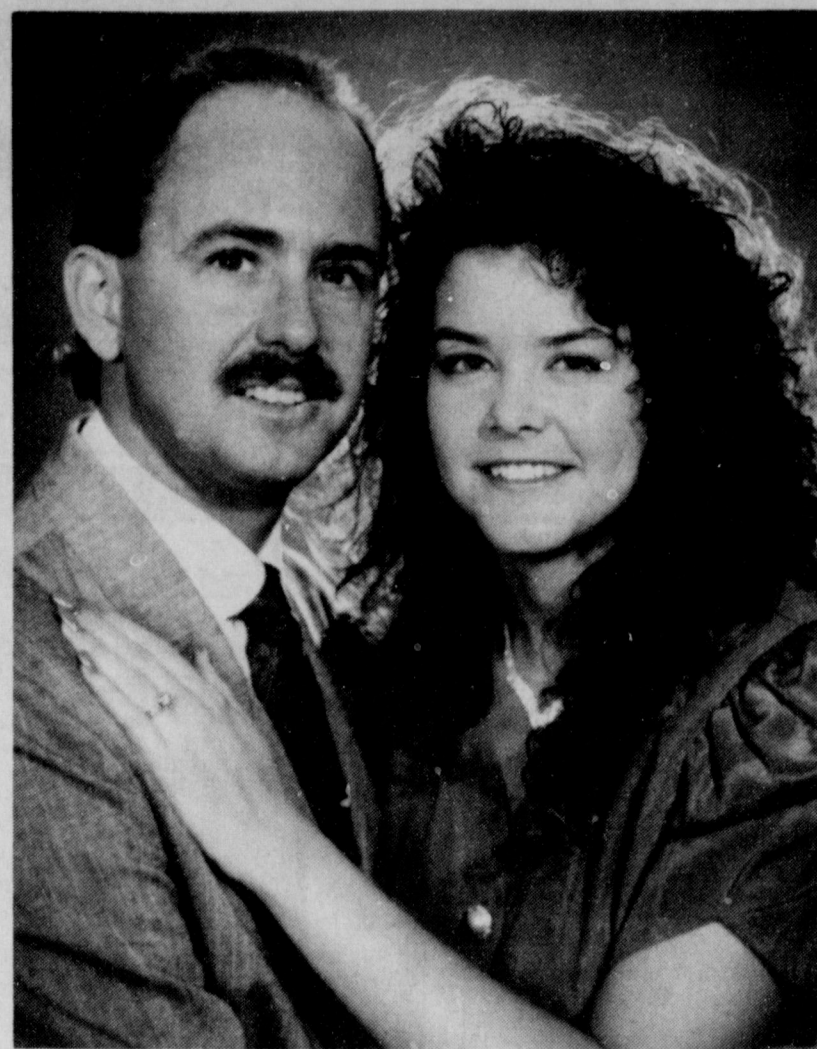
Dan Boyd will speak at 7 p.m. and 7:45 will be pinata time for the children.

A nursery will be provided.



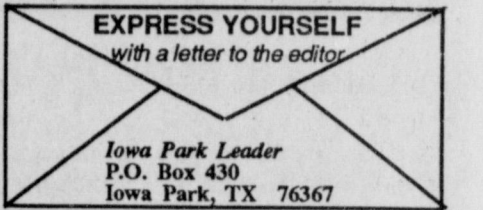

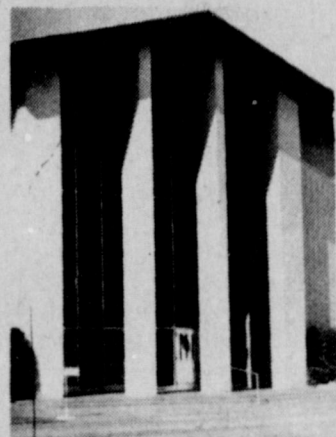

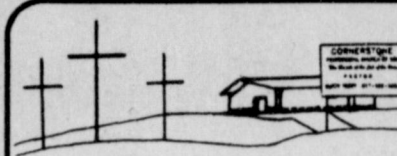

I have read many stories of people who have overcome adversity and have grown as a result. In 1741, George Fredrick Handel seemed a broken man. George was paralyzed on his right side and could barely hold his pen. He was broke and his creditors were threatening to imprison him. Her first job was with two attorneys in Childress. Then she moved to Wichita Falls and worked over 44 years for American National Insurance Co.

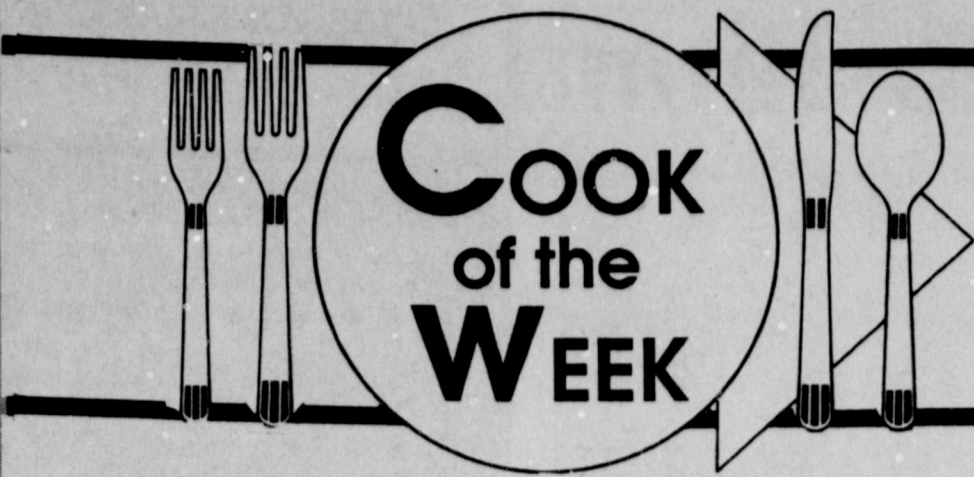
Beatrice and her first husband, George Boles, moved to Iowa Park in 1961. He passed away in 1985.

**Asparagus Soup**

6 diced potatoes  
1 chopped onion  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp nutmeg  
Cook above in 2 cans of chicken broth until potatoes are well done.



Then add:  
2 cans chopped asparagus with juice  
Cook until asparagus begins to fall apart.

Add:  
2 jars cheese spread and stir until melted.

**Blender Broccoli Soup**

1-10 oz. pkg. frozen chopped broccoli  
1 1/2 cup milk  
1 cup light cream  
1 Tbsp. instant minced onion  
2 beef bouillon cubes  
1/4 tsp. salt  
Dash pepper  
Dash ground nutmeg  
Dairy sour cream  
Snipped parsley or chives

Partially thaw broccoli and bread in small chunks. Place in blender container with 1/2 cup milk. Blend until broccoli is very fine. Add remaining milk and next 6 ingredients. Blend until smooth, 45 to 60 seconds. Chill thoroughly. Serve topped with dollops of sour cream and snipped parsley or chives.

**Tomato-Cottage Cheese Salad**

3 medium fresh tomatoes  
12 oz. lowfat cottage cheese  
1/2 cup grated carrot  
1/2 cup diced cucumber  
1/4 cup chopped green onion  
5 small radishes, grated  
Pinch of garlic powder (optional)  
1 Tbsp. low calorie dressing  
Lettuce leaves

Cut tomatoes in half crosswise. Spoon out and drain tomato pulp and seeds. Set aside tomato shells. In medium bowl combine drained tomato pulp, cottage cheese, carrot, cucumber, onion, radishes, garlic powder if

desired, and dressing. Mix lightly. Spoon into tomato shells. Arrange on lettuce leaves and serve.

**Frosted Zucchini Casserole**

3/4 lb. lean ground beef  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
1 clove garlic, minced  
3 tsp. cornstarch  
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce  
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
2 Tbsp. snipped parsley  
1/2 tsp. dried oregano  
1/4 tsp. cinnamon  
5 Tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese  
3 medium zucchini, cut into 1/4-inch slices  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
3/4 cup milk  
1 egg, beaten slightly

In skillet cook meat, onion, green pepper and garlic until meat is brown and onion is tender. Drain. Stir in 1 tsp. of the cornstarch, tomato sauce, Worcestershire sauce, parsley, oregano and cinnamon. Simmer uncovered for 5 minutes. Stir in 2 Tbsp. of the Parmesan cheese. Set aside.

Cook zucchini in unsalted water for 3 to 4 minutes until crisp-tender. Drain well and set aside.

In small saucepan stir together remaining 2 tps. cornstarch, salt, pepper and milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until thick and bubbly. Remove from heat. Gradually stir hot mixture into beaten egg.

In 1 1/2-quart casserole arrange half of the zucchini slices. Pour meat mixture over zucchini. Top with remaining zucchini slices. Pour egg sauce over all. Sprinkle with remaining 3 T. Parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 25-30 minutes. 6 servings.

**Flower arranging is Amity program topic**

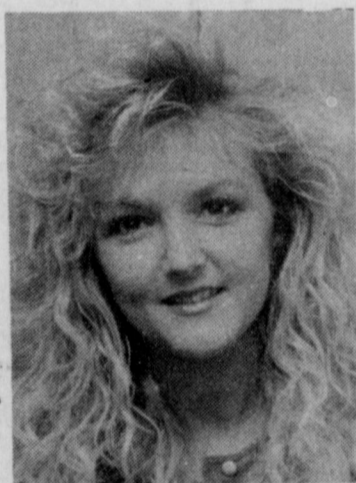

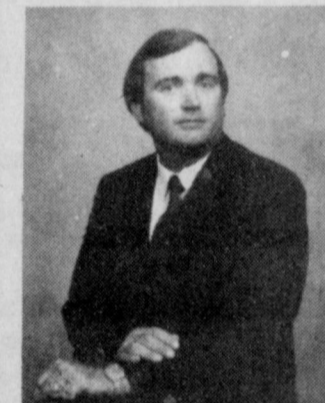
