All boys' games will be played at the fields on West Magnolia, except the Senior League, which is located next to Sonic and Harvey's.


The T-Ball game between the Braves and Royals will start at 6 p.m. The Angels and Blue jays will meet at 4 p.m. in 5-Pitch.

The annual effort is co-sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and City of Iowa Park.

At least 20 organizations have already registered to participate in the effort, and have been assigned areas of responsibility, according to Susan Dillard, Chamber secretary.

During the week, the city opens its sanitary landfill to free dumping by any documented resident of the city.

In addition, residents who have collections of brush, debris and large items and are unable to haul it to the landfill can have it picked up by city workers at no expense.

RAC dominates meeting

The city council was asked Monday night to amend its contract with the Recreational Activities Center board on the length of the new building's lease.

The lease, which had earlier been approved by both the RAC board and council, calls for a two-year term.

However, according to RAC board members, the shortness of the contract makes it virtually impossible for them to receive grants from foundations.

Mayor Wayne House told the group he felt they would not need grants for anything having to do with the building because it was the council's intentions to finish the structure and "...turn over the keys on July 1."

Several items on the meeting's agenda were, in fact, related to work and materials for the completion of the new structure.

Rev. Mike Grubbs, speaking for the RAC, told the council there were still several areas where grant monies could enhance the facility, but not be a permanent part of the structure, which would benefit from grants.

When told the RAC board was requesting a lease up to 99 years, House said, "I just have a problem of the city constructing a building and then turning it over to a group of people."

Grubbs said money raised by the RAC could be used for such things as finishing the building's kitchen, furniture and possibly completing the master plan of the area with playground equipment and landscaping.

The outset of the discussion was that a shorter term than 99 years, but longer than the two years, might be an alternative.

RAC representatives meet with him to discuss an alternative period which might be brought back before the council for consideration.

Detective Ray Smock of the Iowa Park Police Department was announced as the city's Employee of the Month.

Aldermen approved a proposal to enter into an agreement with the firm Governmental Service Agency, for the purpose of representing the city in applying for a Texas Enterprise Zone

Jones told the council the firm has an outstanding record of success in filing various applications with the state which are approved.

The contract calls for an expenditure of \$1,500, and carries a guarantee that if the first year the grant is not approved, it was be resubmitted three years without additional cost.

Jones said several things can be accomplished from establishment of an Enterprise Zone, including creation of new jobs and spurring investment in areas of economic distress.

The council approved a list of new fees for renting the meeting room at Tom Burnett Memorial Library, in response to a request made at a meeting last month.

The new fees include: Baby showers, wedding showers,

\$25 fee plus \$25 (refundable) deposit. Weddings and receptions, \$35 fee plus \$25 deposit.

Non-profit meetings, \$15 fee.

Several bid items were approved, including \$16,844, with trade, for a new sewer cleaner machine; \$33,750 for constructing a liner for the new landfill pit, and \$18,846 for materials to be installed at the RAC.

Also approved were proposed Administrator Gary Jones proposed changes in ordinances. One only changes the day city employees are paid, while the other was a waiver permitting the Red River Trail Club to pass through on horseback as well as camp at Gordon Lake in June.

Local library started 29 years ago

National Library Week begins Sunday, which coincides with the date 29 years ago that the first library in Iowa Park was dedicated. The annual book sale will be

from Tuesday through Saturday during regular library hours, 10 a.m.--8 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday, 10 a.m.--5 p.m. Wednesday and Friday, and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday. A large number of books will be

Paperbacks will sell for 10 cents and hardbacks will be 25 cents. All proceeds benefit the library. The sale will include both adult and children's fiction and nonfiction

for sale, Sue Maness, librarian, said.

books, as well as magazines. Children's books and cassettes were purchased with proceeds from last year's book sale, according to

Mrs. Maness. Through the years the library has continued to be an on-going project for improvement, and has shown steady growth and expansion of ser-

In its embryonic stage, the library was conceived by the Iowa Park

Evening Lions Club 30 years ago. From its humble beginnings as the Wichita County Free Library in the southwest corner room of the Chamber of Commerce building, it now is eloquently housed in a Texas Historical Landmark in the 400 block of W. Alameda.

Not only is the library settled in an imposing brick structure of Colonial Revival architecture (1924 vintage) but it is known as the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, bearing a name long associated with the history of

Tom Burnett and his father before him, Burk Burnett (for whom the town of Burkburnett was named) were identified with ranching and civic circles more than a century. The library now has 13,788 vol-

umes that may be checked out for a period of two weeks, and 322 videos with a checkout period of three days. In addition, approximately 40 magazines and periodicals may be

checked out for one week and audios for two weeks. A new service for the library is books on tape. They have a checkout period of two weeks. This is an excellent service for persons who are blind, or who have difficulty reading

small-print books.

Another section that generates interest is the Genealogy Section. Alma Francis has volunteered many hours of her time to this section, and had donated much of the materials. Mrs. Maness said a large amount of the material in this section has been donated.

Also included in this section is

genealogical material on microfiche

that was donated by Wichita Falls

Kemp Library. There is a lot of in-

formation in these shelves for those interested in researching their lineage.

There is a special item of interest in the Genealogy Room that might stir memories for those in the Iowa Park area who remember the old Rexall Drug Store and "Dr." Tommy Clark and Fenton Dale. The old manual typewriter they used to write prescription labels for containers has

been placed here. All volumes purchased by the library are selected by Mrs. Maness, by popularity of contemporary authors, what patrons are wanting to read, and other materials that she has special requests to purchase as funds are

available. The library has a computer that people may use at the library, and a copy machine. A fee of 15 cents is

charged for making copies. Tom Burnett Memorial Library is supported by the North Texas Library System out of Fort Worth. This allows the library to take advantage of special services that it would not be able to have otherwise, said Mrs. Maness.

These services include an interlibrary loan, video rotation, video recorder for library use, 16mm movies for public and library use, and a computer for the library staff.

The average number of patrons who check out materials per month is 1,167, and the average number of items checked out in that period of during National Library Week, the library hosts open house that coordinates with the Christmas lighting festivities. Members of the Iowa Park Garden Club decorate the library each year for Christmas.

Tomato-Cottage Cheese Salad

3 medium fresh tomatoes 12 oz. lowfat cottage cheese 1/2 cup grated carrot

1/2 cup diced cucumber 1/4 cup chopped green onion

Lettuce leaves

5 small radishes, grated Pinch of garlic powder (optional) 1 Tbsp. low calorie dressing

Cut tomatoes in half crosswise. Spoon out and drain tomato pulp and seeds. Set aside tomato shells. In medium bowl combine drained tomato pulp, cottage cheese, carrot, cucumber, onion, radishes, garlic powder if desired, and dressing. Mix lightly. Spoon into tomato shells. Arrange on lettuce leaves and serve.

Frosted Zucchini Casserole

- 3/4 lb. lean ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 3 tsp. cornstarch 18-oz. can tomato sauce
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 Tbsp. snipped parsley
- 1/2 tsp. dried oregano
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
- 5 Tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese 3 medium zucchini, cut into 1/4-inch
- slices
- 1/4 tsp. salt 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 egg, beaten slightly

In skillet cook meat, onion, green pepper and garlic until meat is brown and onion is tender. Drain. Stir in 1 tsp. of the cornstarch, tomato sauce, Worcestershire'sauce, parsley, oregano and cinnamon. Simmer uncovered for 5 minutes. Stir in 2 Tbsp. of the Parmesan cheese. Set aside.

Cook zucchini in unsalted water for 3 to 4 minutes until crisp-tender. Drain well and set aside.

In small saucepan stir together remaining 2 tsps. cornstarch, salt, pepper and milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until thick and bubbly. Remove from heat. Gradually stir hot mixture into beaten egg.

In 1 1/2-quart casserole arrange half of the zucchini slices. Pour meat mixture over zucchini. Top with remaining zucchini slices. Pour egg sauce over all. Sprinkle with remaining 3 T. Parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 25-30 minutes. 6 servings.

"Gary never missed a practice or a workout in four years. He never said, 'I'll try'. He said, 'Coach, I will do it'. And he did."



Also in this area is a small cabinet with storage space and a sink. There is a built-in refrigerator and a microwave oven and coffee pot, making it convenient for preparing refresh-

Two weeks ago the Philia Study Club donated an American and a Texas flag for the room.

In 1961, the committee to work on the acquisition of a library for Iowa Park was chaired by Wayne House, current mayor, who at that time was president of the Evening Lions Club. Others on the committee were Bill Sawyer, Chuck Bowman and Harold McClung.

The idea was presented to the County Commissioners Court, of which E.E. "Buck" Voyles of Iowa Park was a member. It was unanimously voted there was a need for a free county library and it was designated to be located in Iowa Park since it was the center of the county.

An eight member board was created to govern libary affairs, headed many years by Mrs. James A. Sewell.

Books were donated by citizens and books were received on loan from the Texas State Library at Austin. The first library was dedicated April 14, 1962.

Volunteers kept it open every afternoon, except Sunday, for five years. It operated without a budget, no money from city or county.

Citizens began donating money. That was the beginning of a long period when volunteer workers and citizens helped to keep the library

Through the efforts of Mrs. William D. Owens, a member of the library board, and a professional librarian, it became a unit of the State Library System.

It began receiving several hundred books at a time on temporary loan. A field representative visited the library and recommended jurisdiction be changed to the city instead of the

The commissioners changed the name to Iowa Park Free Library in March 1967. In 1969 the city council voted to accept jurisdiction.

Mrs. George Bludnick was hired as the first fulltime librarian in December 1967 and her salary was paid by the city. The salary then became a regular item in the city budget.

The following year, a unit of Friends of the Library, a national organization dedicated to helping libraries, was organized. This was instituted by the 23 Study Club with Mrs. M. L. Hines as president.

Interest in the library continued to grow and 14 other clubs and organizations joined the 23 Study Club to help in various ways.

Under leadership of the late Miss Ethyle Kidwell, longtime Iowa Park Elementary School principal and a member of the 23 Study Club, an Arts and Craft Show began. Iowa Park Garden Club and Philia Study Club helped to sponsor the first show for the benefit of the library.

In 1974 \$2,000 was raised for the exclusive use of a Special Book Fund. Co-chairman with Miss Kidwell was Mrs. Lita Watson. They were assisted by Mrs. W.A. George and the late Mrs. China B. Smith.

By 1970 the library had outgrown the room at the chamber office. The Home Economics Cottage belonging to the school system was no longer used, so the city rented it until a permanent building could be built.

Again citizens and organizations joined to help. Material for a large bookcase was donated by Friends of the Library and Carl Sullivan built it free of charge.

Money was donated for an air conditioning system which was installed free by Frank Guyette and Jack White, except for the cost of materials. Names of the many donors and donations have been kept in the library

The goal remained to have a permanent home for the library and citizens have continued to be interested in helping when needed. However, currently there is not a library board and Friends of the Library is no longer organized here.

A permanent library became a reality when Anne Burnett, president of the Burnett Ranches, Inc., donated her grandfather's buff brick mansion and its surrounding grounds to the city in 1981.

After Tom Burnett's death, the home was purchased by his cousin, Will Burnett, and after his death, his
