## Local library started 29 years ago

National Library Week begins Sunday, which coincides with the date 29 years ago that the fir

The annual book sale will be from Tuesday through Saturday during regular library hours, 10 a.m..-8 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday, 10 a.m.--5 p.m. Wednesday and Friday, and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday.

A large number of books will be for sale, Sue Maness, librarian, said. Paperbacks will sell for 10 cents and ceeds benefit the library

The sale will include both adult The sale will include boundion books, as well as magazines.

Children's books and cassettes ere purchased with proceeds from last year's book sale, according to Mrs. Maness.

Through the years the library has ontinued to be an on-going project or improvement, and has shown teady growth and expansion of ser vices.
In its embryonic stage, the library was conceived by the Iowa Park Evening Lions Club 30 years ago. From its humble beginnings as he Wichita County Free Library in the southwest corner room of the Chamber of Commerce building, it now is cloquently housed in a Texas Histori-
cal Landmark in the 400 block of $W$. Alameda.

Not only is the library settled in an imposing brick structure of Colonial Revival architecture ( 1924 vintage) but it is known as the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, bearing a name long assoc

All volumes purchased by the li brary are selected by Mrs. Maness, by popularity of contemporary auby popularity of contemporary auand other materials that she has special requests to purchase as funds are available.

The library has a computer that people may use at the library, and a copy machine. A fee of 15 cents is charged for making copies.

Tom Burnet Memorial Library is supported by the North Texas Library System out of Fort Worth. This allows the library to take advantage of spe-
cial services that it would not be able to have otherwise, said Mrs. Maness. These services include an interlibrary loan, vidco rotation, video recorder for library use, 16 mm movies for public and library use, and computer for the library staff.

The average number of patron who check out materials per month 1,167, and the average number of tems checked out in that period time is 3,689 .

greeting the evaluating team were two greeting the evaluating team were two names which will be familiar to generations of students who were educated in these schools during the middle de-
cades of thiscentury: Maudaline Hutton and Bessie Mae Hext.
It was teachers like those who made the Canadian schools outstanding ... not later ... but they helped set a standard of educational excellence which has endured, and still exists and which we feel sure will continue to exist in Canadian ...even if the Robin Hood robber barons in the Texas Legislature succeed in plundering the property wealth of this school district wenich hose which are poor in spirit.
