## Ordinances, bids face council Monday night

Two ordinances, several bid items and a lease agreement with the Recreational Activities Center are on Monday's meeting agenda of the city council.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

One of the ordinances sets speed limits in certain zones and establishes school zones. It also would provide for

a 40 miles per hour limit on West Smith, from Jackson to the city limits, if approved.

The other ordinance would amend an ordinance adopted in 1957, "abandoning any interest in the south half of block 19 of the First Addition..."

The block is located in the north-east corner of the city, near Gordon Lake.

The council will consider accepting bids for painting certain water tanks, as well as purchasing plumbing fixtures and installation at the RAC.

Administrator Gary Jones will ask permission to advertise for bids to sell surplus property, and also for construction of valley gutters.

A proposal will be made during the meeting to amend the term of lease for

the RAC building to the RAC board of directors.

This is in response to a request made by RAC representatives at the last meeting, when it was pointed out the contract's two-year lease was too short when foundation grants were being solicited.

The council will consider a request from the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. to close parts of Wall and Cash June 15, for the purpose of holding a fund-raising carnival.

Proposals will also be considered to change the next two council meeting dates, from May 13 to May 6 and May 27 to May 20, according to the agenda.

Also to be discussed is a change in ordinance to allow for wading and swimming in Gordon Lake.

## Absentee voting is underway

Absentee voting in the May 4 city and school elections has started off slowly, according to reports from the two absentee voting judges.

Six ballots had been cast by noon Wednesday at city hall and two at the school administration office.

Both locations are absentee voting polls for their respective elections.

Absentee voting in person will continue through April 30.

## Police have busy week

Iowa Park police during the past week investigated three cases of theft, one burglary of a building, two complaints of criminal mischief and made one arrest, according to the police blotter.

Police were notified Friday that a student-owned trumpet at Iowa Park High School was missing and has not been recovered.

The loss was noticed Thursday, but not reported until the following day, thinking it may have been a prank.

The instrument is valued at \$1,000, according to the report.

A resident in the 800 block of North Bond told police Monday a tool box had been taken from his pickup.

A nine-year-old boy was stopped Tuesday by police after he allegedly had shoplifted at a business on Johnson Road.

The youth was turned over to his parents.

Saturday afternoon, police received a call from a resident in the 900 block of

West Magnolia, stating two male juveniles had been seen lighting a grassfire next to a house and running away.

Police picked up the two youths, who were later turned over to their parents, and firemen extinguished the fire before any damage was done.

When officers responded at 2:56 a.m. Monday to a domestic disturbance call in the 900 block of South Wall, Jeffrey Martin Lewis, 24, was arrested on a charge of simple assault.

Lewis was released after signing a personal recognizance bond to report to municipal court, according to records.

A warrant is expected to be issued this week, according to police, on a man who allegedly kicked a woman in the face. The incident took place early Saturday morning in the 300 block of East Diamond, according to the blotter.

The two criminal mischief complaints included a home egged in the 900 block of East Pasadena, and sugar poured in a vehicle gas tank while parked in the 1000 block of Mary Drive, according to the blotter.

## Board hires new assistant coach; elevates teachers on career ladder

School trustees Tuesday night voted to accept resignations of two coaches, hire a coach, elevate several teachers to higher career ladder levels, and extend contracts to auxiliary employees for the 1991-92 school year.

Action on all personnel items came after an executive session that lasted almost an hour.

The two coaching resignations were submitted, in writing by Ray Sefcik Sr., assistant at the high school, and Mark Wilson, junior high coach.

Hired was Robert Clensay, head coach this past year at Deweyville and former assistant to Iowa Park Coach Lucky Gamble.

Clensay's contract calls for him to complete the current school year, May 6 to June 4, and all the 1991-92 school year as coach and teacher.

Four teachers were elevated to Level Two on the career ladder, bringing the local total to 49. They were Patricia Costello, Galyia Kasperek, Dean Kirkpatrick and Tracy Otto.

Ten teachers were elevated to Level Three, bring the local total to 28. The 10 named were Nancy Bauer, Debra Brandt, Linda Gray, Jo Ann Hale, Willa Mitchell, Earnie Reusch, Carey Dale Roberts, Judy Schneider, Annette Warren and Dick Wineinger.

Salaries, like those of all classroom

teachers, of auxiliary employees will be set when the 1991-92 budget is approved, according to the motion.

Also approved during personnel voting was a motion to employ Teresa Jameson 217 days during the next school year. She had been working half days in the school tax office, and her salary will be raised to Grade Two.

Three school board policies, having to do with advertising in the schools, visitors on campus and neutrality regarding religion, were approved.

The policies had been recommended by the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance at an earlier meeting, and no comment from either the audience nor trustees was ever brought out against any of the three.

No action was taken on bids received from eight contractors to construct a new bus maintenance facility. Lowest bid on the base proposal was \$43,600, and lowest bid of base and three alternates was \$76,700.

Trustees were encouraged to use the 30 days they have to take action on the bids while alternative options are considered.

Trustees agreed with Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer, who has as one of his responsibilities the transportation department, to purchase a new bus.

Palmer pointed out replacement buses had been cut back over the past three years, and mileage on the current fleet is "beginning to eat us up."

The three buses with greatest mileage run from 164,399 miles to 170,701, Palmer reported.

Trustees agreed to purchase a 72-passenger bus, expecting it to be delivered in about six months. And for the

first time, the new bus will be equipped with a diesel engine.

Estimated cost will be \$36,000.

### Sales tax picture is bright

Iowa Park's sales tax picture continues to improve as the year progresses.

The city received a check this month for \$11,143.71, which was a 12.99-percent increase over the \$9,862.76 in April last year.

This month's check reflects sales taxes collected by local businesses in February.

Thus far in 1991, rebate checks amounting to \$55,037.32 have been received by city hall, a 5.11-percent increase over the same period in 1990.

Electra has experienced a gain of 7.17-percent for the year and Burkburnett 4.78, but Wichita Falls thus far is a minus .35-percent for 1990, according to the state comptroller's office report.

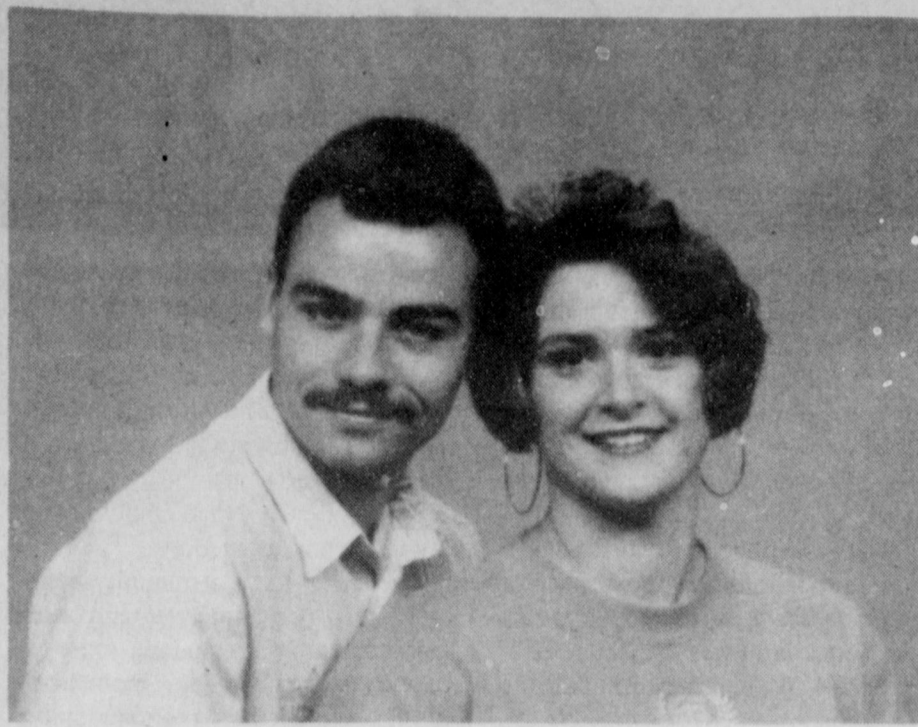

A special guest was the six-month-old grandson of Mrs. Ray Copening, Blake Hamilton.

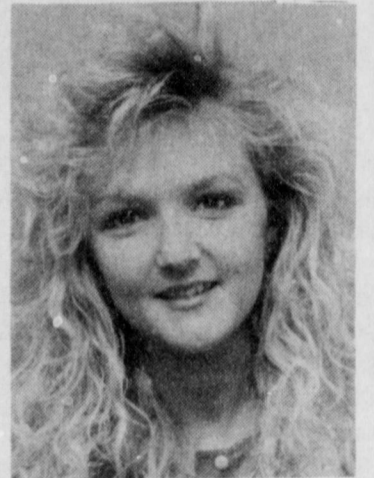

AUSTIN - With a court deadline facing them, lawmakers late last week voted mainly along party lines to approve a school finance reform bill which the governor promised to sign immediately.

A huge sigh of relief rippled through Democratic ranks as the final vote sealed the \$1.3 billion proposal, much as a tardy student might heave in handing in a long overdue term paper.

Relieved they were, but not especially proud or supportive of the hard-won compromise.

Even if the measure is approved by the court this week, the biggest unknown factor is how voters will react when large property tax increases kick in.

One member observed: This is unprecedented in Texas history: the Texas Supreme Court, holding a shotgun on the Legislature, forced it to raise local school property taxes with successive hikes over four years.

The resentment many lawmakers, particularly House members, feel toward the court is deep. Certainly, political careers may die over this vote alone.

The Good News

The good news is that it's over for now and members can get on with other business in the six weeks that remain.

It has also opened the door to tax reform; many think that too many dedicated funds have left lawmakers with discretionary control over only 16 percent of the state budget.

And in school districts, where

necessities are short and frills are non-existent, the bill is a rainbow of hope.

The Bad News

On the down side, many lawmakers think a new state income tax is much closer to reality now.

Others are worried that court liberals, in their zeal to interpret equality, have blazed a dangerous trail intruding too deep in local affairs and emulating federal judges.

A third complaint is that, like Mark White's HB 72 reforms six years ago, this bill doesn't reform as much as it kicks up the cost.

For now, voter opinions depend on whether you live within a winner district or a loser district; over the long term, only time will tell and voters have unpredictable memories.

Sideline Skirmishes

Sideline skirmishes during the school finance battle:

- Thirty-eight Hispanic and black House members joined to kill a provision giving students a choice of schools. "I think choice promotes old-time segregation," said Rep. Greg Luna, D-San Antonio, who supported the final bill.

- The measure added five work (instruction) days for teachers with no additional pay. "That's a slap in the face to teachers," said Rep. Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale, who also ripped the tax hikes.

Other Statehouse Action

In other, less dramatic, action last week:

- A Senate committee approved appeals court Judge Fortunato Benavides as the first Hispanic appointed to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

- The House approved what opponents called the "loan shark bill" allowing finance companies to charge higher interest rates, up to 28.3 percent on some loans.

- The Confederacy lost again: senators designated the third Monday in January as a state holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and bumped Confederate Heroes Day down to an optional holiday on June 3.

- The House added \$2 to the price of new tires to pay for

cleaning up an estimated 100 million scrap tires discarded in Texas and the 17 million annually we will discard in the future.

Ignore "Sacred Cows"

Vowing that there should be "no sacred cows" in state government, Gov. Ann Richards last week urged a new committee to scrutinize the dedicated funds that severely limit the Legislature's budget-writing alternatives.

The Governor's Task Force on Revenue indicated it would respond by inviting the highway department and universities that receive major restricted funds to testify before the panel.

The task force also will consider Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock's proposal for a state income tax, which faces strong opposition from many legislators and taxpayers.

"Question the straightjacket of dedicated funds," Richards said. "Question whether or not they make sense, and whether we are reserving money for lower priorities while higher priorities like education go begging."

The state treasury includes 628 separate funds, including 56 that are dedicated either by the constitution or by state law to specific uses, such as highways, teacher retirement, parks and numerous licensing agencies.

Other Highlights

- The Senate Natural Resources Committee, by an 8-0 vote, approved legislation to create a superagency for environmental protection. The proposed Texas Department of Natural Resources would take over the functions of the Texas Air Quality Control Board and the Texas Water Commission. It also would take over the solid waste functions of the Texas Department of Health and the water pollution duties of the Texas Railroad Commission.

- The Texas House voted to repeal the 32-year-old "LBJ Law" that would now permit U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm to simultaneously run for re-election and for president in 1996.

- Gov. Richards warned lawmakers to pass a strong ethics reform bill or come back and do it in a special session this summer.

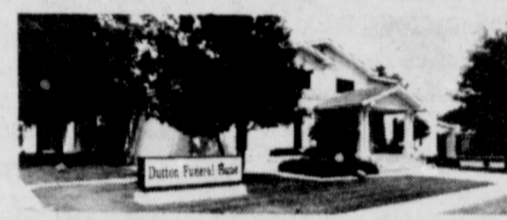

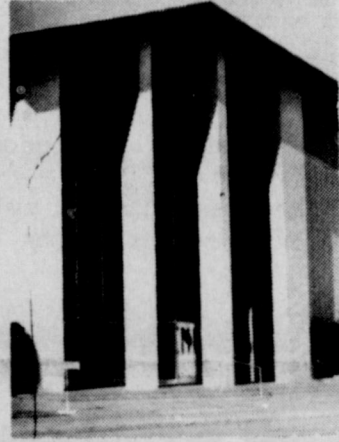

Many years ago two boys working their way through Stamford University decided to engage Paderewski for a piano recital. They agreed to pay a guarantee of two thousand dollars. The plan was to raise this in the promotion and all extra they could keep to help pay their board and tuition.

Following the concert the two boys told the great artist the bad news. They had only raised sixteen hundred dollars but gave him the total amount with a promissory note for the rest. It looked like the end of their college careers.

"No boys," replied Paderewski, "that won't do." Then tearing the note in two, he returned the money to them as well. "Now take out of this sixteen hundred dollars all of your expenses and keep for each of you ten per cent of the balance for your work. Let me have the rest."

The years rolled by - World War I came and went. Paderewski, now premier of Poland, was striving to feed thousands of starving people. The only man in the world who could help was Herbert Hoover, who was in charge of the United States Food and Relief Bureau. Hoover responded and thousands of tons of food were sent to Poland.

Paderewski journeyed to Paris to thank Hoover. "That's all right, Mr. Paderewski," was Hoover's reply. "Besides, you don't remember it, but you helped me once when I was a student at college and I was in trouble."

One of the inherent principles of giving is the return. As Jesus promised, the words are clear. "Give and it will be given to you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over they will pour into your lap. For by your standard of measure it will be measured to you in return." (Luke 6:38).

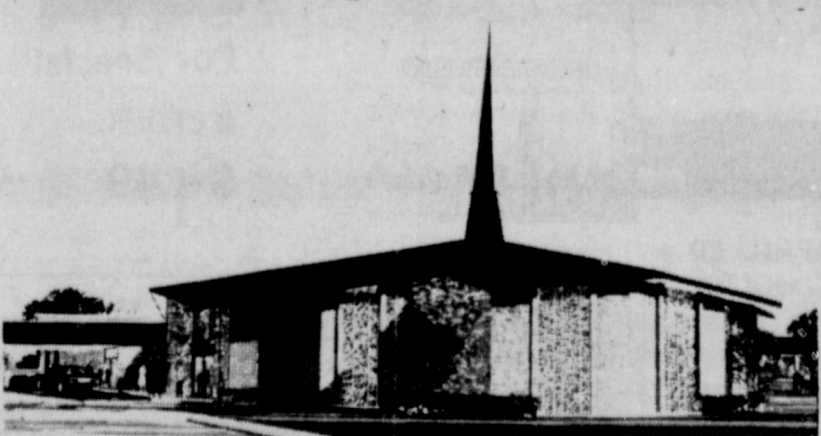

# Retirement earned by 50 years hard work

Delbert Sigafus retired April 1 after 50 years of working, many times all day and night--now he is looking forward to--you guessed it--more work.

He retired after 14 years with the City of Iowa Park as supervisor over all maintenance, in charge of four employees.

Among his many duties was overseeing the overhauling of water pumps, fixing water leaks, laying sewer and water lines. He did not only oversee these jobs, but worked with the rest of the men.

"I just never was the kind who could watch someone else work, and not work with them," Sigafus said.

When he first started with the city, he worked many times 12 to 15 hours a day, and has worked around the clock in times of emergency.

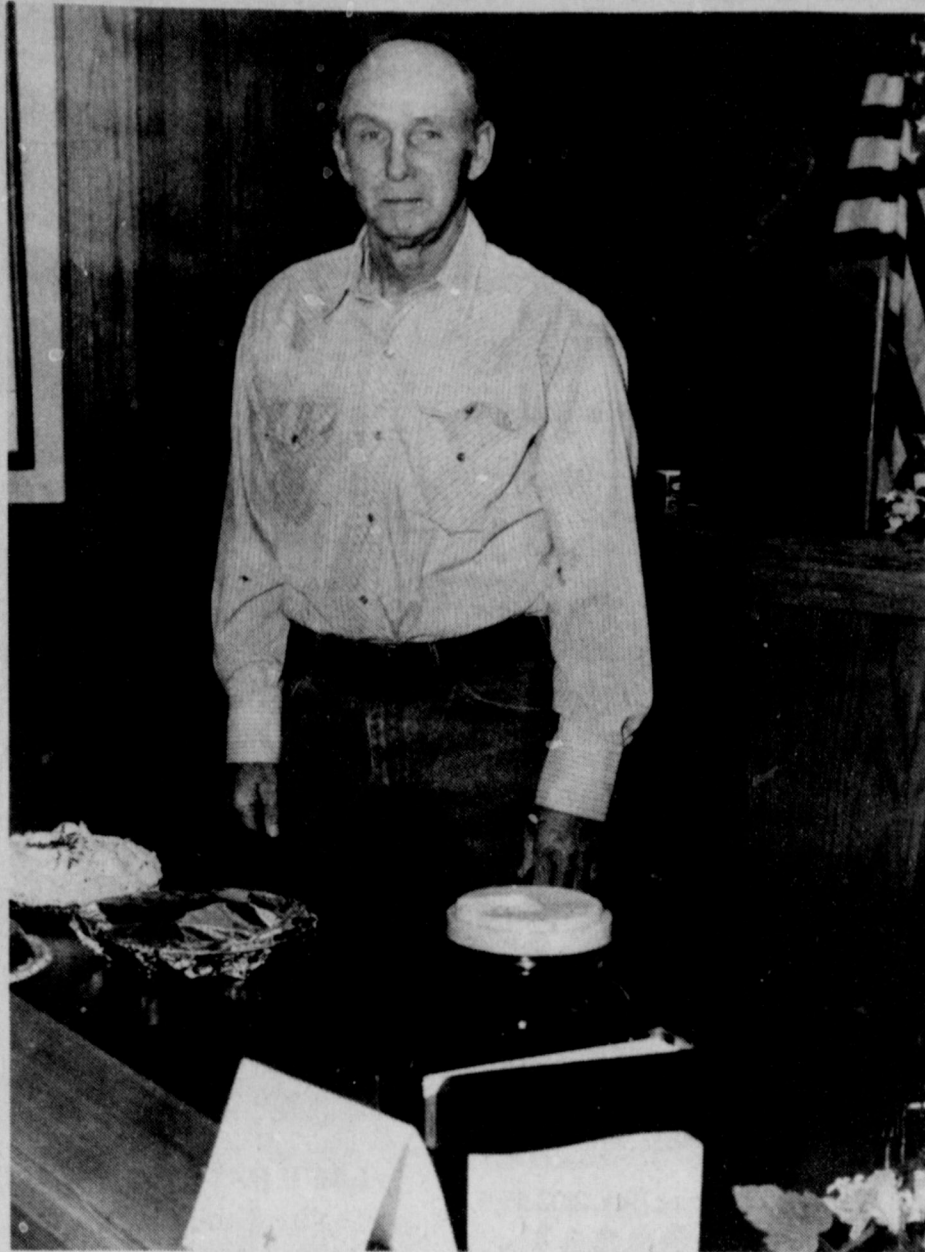
His wife remembers times in the winter when the men were having to work into the night and she would take them coffee and something to eat.

She said the men who had beards would have ice in them, and that she had seen them standing in water up to their armpits.

Mrs. Sigafus said she had seen her husband get up many times in the middle of the night, or in the middle of a meal when someone didn't have water, or something went wrong that was under his jurisdiction.

"I always tried to teach our children if a job is worth doing it is worth doing well, and I believe that," Delbert said. It is obvious that he not only taught, but provided the example.

A lot of changes have taken place during the 14 years he worked for the city. "The city has been so good to me, and they have been good about getting better equipment to work with as they could," he said. "One thing I am proud of is that we never had any serious accidents," he added in retrospect.

He continued, "I always had real good help, and so many good people to work with in all departments of the city."

Since his retirement he already has dug by hand a 14-foot water well, which he will use to water his lawn and garden. He has done some work for his church, and at home, and immediate plans are to refurbish their living room.

But, Sigafus and his wife are planning to live each day to the fullest, and take life "one day at a time", which happens to be the title of his favorite song.

"You might call me a handy-man," Sigafus commented. He does carpenter work and according to his wife, "He can do anything. He has sure saved us a lot of money, because he can fix anything that goes wrong around the house."

As a lad of 14, Delbert began working on a farm for three dollars a week, and then followed the wheat harvest. His money went to help support his parents and family.

Sigafus worked in an ordnance plant in Savannah, Ill. He joined the army in 1946 and was married in 1948. In the army seven years, he

served for one and a half years in Korea in ordnance.

Mrs. Sigafus remarked, "I told him when they took away his uniform and his guns, they took away his beauty."

Sigafus worked for Katy Railroad until it closed. The couple moved to Wichita Falls from Waurika, Okla. About 20 years ago they moved to Iowa Park and he worked at Texas Experiment Station for Virgil Woodfin, superintendent, five years.

With a grin, he admitted there were times he had trouble with his name and people pronouncing it or spelling it right. He says it is a Swedish name. Many people (this writer included, have wanted to pronounce it Siga-fus, with a long U, but that isn't correct, I found out.) It is pronounced Si-ga-fus, with a long A.

Mrs. Sigafus said, "I was married to him 10 years before I could pronounce it right."

He interposed, "Well, it got me out of a lot of work while I was in the army."

To explain, he said when the name of those who were to do KP duty were listed, they were to tie a ribbon on their bed and they would be called at the proper time. Finally when he was "called on the carpet" for not doing KP, he told them his name wasn't listed. It wasn't because, his name was not spelled correctly.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Sigafus say they would not want to live anywhere else here. They love Iowa Park and agree that people have been so good to them, they could not be happy anywhere else.

They have six children and 11 grandchildren. Some of them come in and out all day, and especially when the grandchildren aren't in school. The first place they go is to the refrigerator or the cookie jar.

Mrs. Sigafus still works five days a week. She loves to keep house, so she satisfies that love by keeping house for other people. She says she isn't ready to quit yet.

She is a collector of both antiques and collectibles. She has 150 kerosene lamps and a number of antique dolls she has collected through the years. Every room in their house is filled with keepsakes, antiques or collectibles. Her husband has added shelves in almost every available space to display them. They quite often go to estate sales and to antique stores.

She says, "I know when I'm gone my kids will probably throw it all away, but I will enjoy them as long as I'm here."

Their children are Louise Cokendolpher, Jimmy Sigafus, Bill Sigafus, Vicki Lopez, Brenda Lane and Jeannette Christopher.

A son-in-law, Hector Lopez, took the job Sigafus left.

Mr. and Mrs. Sigafus are very active members of the Assembly of God.

They look forward to their years together with their family, while they can do the things families like to do.

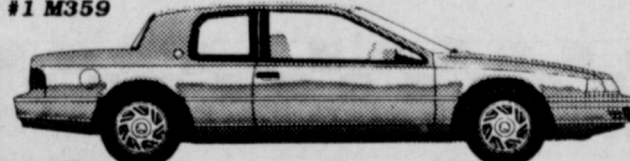

# Lady Hawk talent shines at district

There was no doubt Friday in Breckenridge that the Lady Hawks had the superior talent of the Dist. 4-AAA track meet, but lacked depth.

As a consequence, Iowa Park's girls finished in second place to their hosts, even though they qualified two relay teams and individuals in eight events for the April 26-27 Region One meet in Odessa.

The Hawks, who placed fourth among varsity teams, qualified only two athletes for the region, but neither was a surprise to followers of the sport.

Another indication of lacking depth among female athletes was the fact that Iowa Park did not field a junior varsity team.

The Hawks did, however, and placed second in the JV division.

Winning district was not new to the Breckenridge girls, as they have now claimed the title 11 out of the past 12 years. They also won the girls' JV division.

The biggest surprise of the meet was Breckenridge winning the 800-meter relay, because the Lady Hawks had dominated that event throughout the season. All four Breckenridge runners were freshmen.

Leading the Lady Hawks to Odessa will be senior Kerri Dorner and sophomore Erica Knight. Besides qualifying in three events, they are also members of the two qualified relay teams.

Both Dorner and Knight have made it all the way to the state meet before. Dorner had to sit out the Austin meet last year, suffering from mononucleosis, and watched Knight place third in two events.

Christi Welch and Dee Ann Warren are the other two members of the relay teams.

With them at Odessa will be team mates Jennifer Ricks and Gina Inman.

Dorner won the long jump and 200-meter dash, and placed second in the triple jump despite posting a personal best in the event.

## Two Hawks qualify for regional

Knight won the triple jump and 100-meter hurdles and placed second in the high jump.

Ricks qualified by placing second in the discus with a personal best, and also had a personal best in the shot put, but was fourth in that event.

Inman's second in the 800-meter run was a personal best for her.

Green, who won the discus with another personal best, continues to steadily improve in the event. His 168-10 is nearing the school record set in 1979 by Kip Fuller, 172-7.

The senior's win in the shot put, 53-1 3/4, also is nearing the school record in that event, set by Mike Ray when he tossed the weight 56-10 1/4.

Traveling with Green to Odessa will be another senior Hawk, Patrick Birk, also a two-event qualifier.

Birk placed second in the 800-meter event with a 2:02.57, a personal best, and won the 1600-meter run with a respectable 4:47.82, seven seconds ahead of second place.

Breckenridge also won the varsity boys' division, outdistancing Vernon by 47 points.

Graham won the boys' JV competition, edging Iowa Park 113-108.

Since Heacox's retirement he spends time fishing and is an avid golfer. Bobbie shares his love of fishing and they have a new boat, that will add to this pleasure.

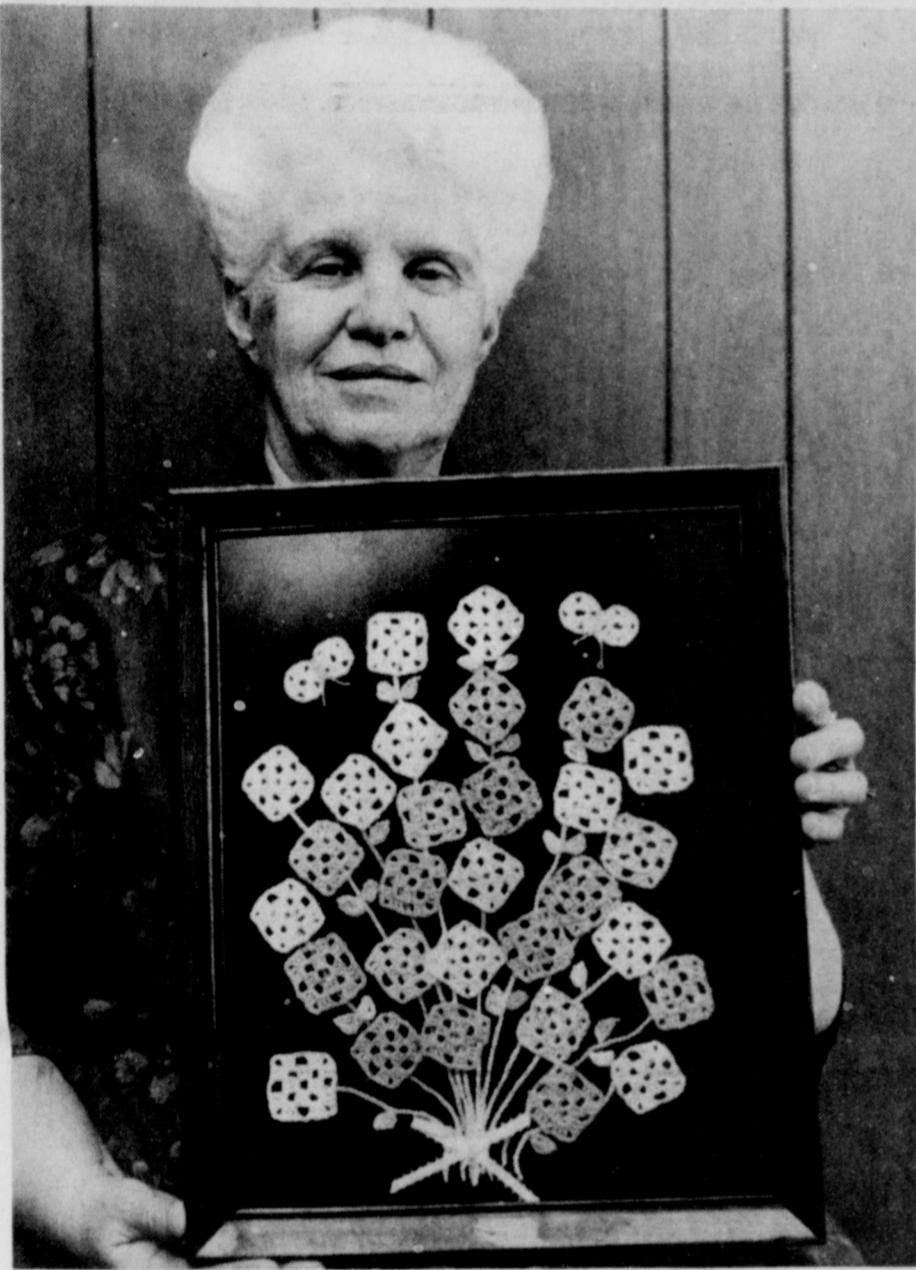
Fishing and working in her yard are Bobbie's main hobbies, in addition to doing handcrafts.

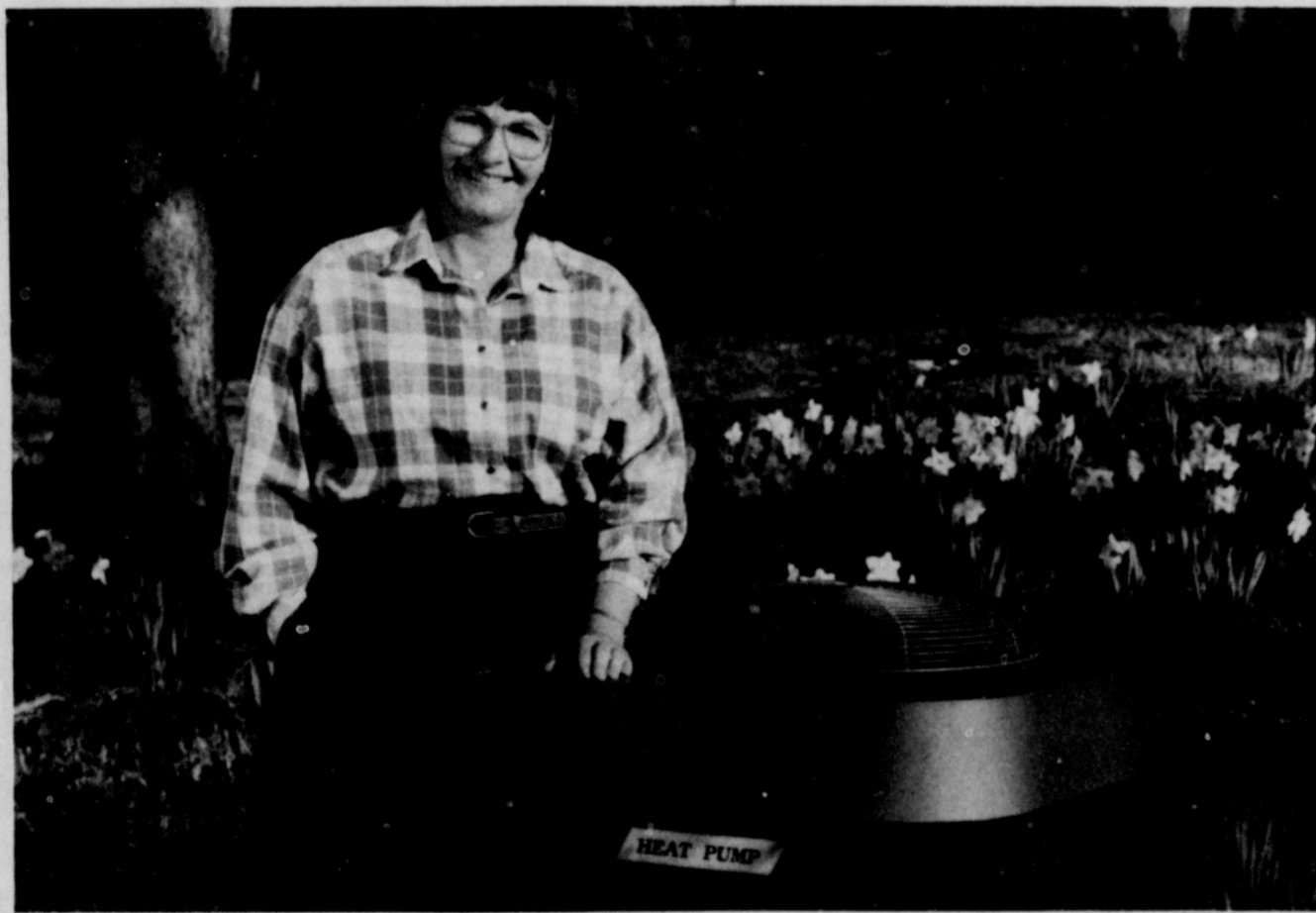

# Area Oil & Gas News

S&J Operating Co. has re-entered the No. 11 TJ & JL Waggoner "B" in the Wichita County Regular Field, three and a half miles north of Kamay.

No. 4 Cullum "C," 800-ft. TD, 3.5 miles north of Holliday. Finnell Oil, operator.

No. 14 S. L. Heiserman "E," 1,900-ft. TD, seven miles northwest of Iowa Park, Exmoor Oil and Minerals, Inc., operator.

Mountain Creek Oil of Austin has filed for permit to drill two 875-ft. developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field, about two miles north of Valley View. The wells will be known as the No. 12 and No. 13 Ford. They are in an 88-acre lease in the H.B. Balch Survey A-12.

Operating out of Dallas, Victory Oil and Gas has staked location for the No. 15 Prothro "V" in the Wichita Regular Field, about five miles northwest of Burkburnett. The well is under permit for 1,800 feet of hole making. It is situated in a 37-acre lease in the Red River Valley Subdivision.

Two developmental wells are planned by Exmoor Oil & Minerals, Inc., in the Wichita Regular Field, six miles north of Iowa Park.


