

Voter turnout less than predicted

Despite one of the largest number of absentee votes being cast in both the school and city elections Saturday, the total number of votes was fewer than had been predicted by observers.

There were 698 total votes cast in the school election, of which 44 were absentee, and in the city boxes, 592 ballots were cast, including 52 that had been turned in absentee.

A recount was ordered after it was announced only five votes separated Place Two trustee incumbent Wendall

House survives recount

House and challenger Max Henderson, 346-341.

The recount did not change anything, however, as House was again named the winner by a 344-341 margin.

Former trustee Martha Dudley emerged victorious from the crowded Place One race, which had attracted five contestants. All were seeking the position being vacated by John Sibley, who had chosen not to run for another term. Dudley captured 277 votes. Close

behind was Buddie Bridwell, with 184. The others were Sandra Lehman, 92; Carmen Lozipone, 73, and Walter Beeman, 60.

Incumbent Sheri Kennedy, who was unopposed in her bid to return to Place Three, received 501 votes.

The recount of votes in the House-Henderson race was requested by the challenger, who by law was required to post a fee of \$100. It was held Tuesday afternoon, with Joe Singer serving as

election judge.

CITY RESULTS

Virgil Woodfin, the only council incumbent seeking re-election Saturday, was successful in his bid, defeating two challengers for his Place One seat.

Woodfin drew 309 votes, easily outdistancing challengers Bob Birk, who drew 139 votes, and Ira Hambricht, 121.

Place Three, being vacated by Johnny Coker who had decided not to run for another term, was won by Bob Hamilton, a newcomer in local politics.

Hamilton's 200 votes narrowly edged out his two competitors: former alderman Bud Mercer, 191, and Bill Guthrie, 175.

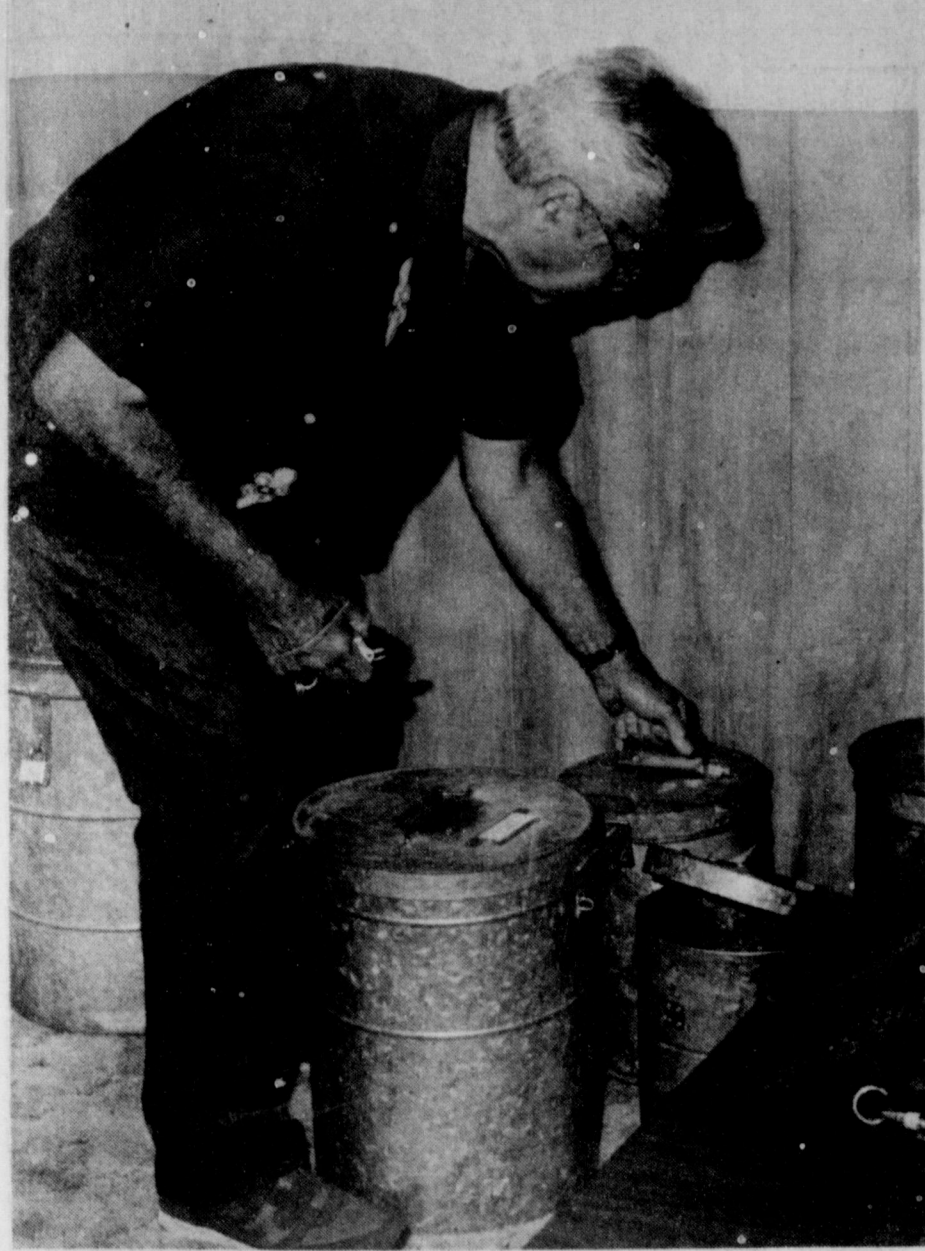
Place Five, held by Diane Robnett who also decided not to seek reelection, attracted the largest field of contestants in the city election.

The winner was Mark Raby, who was unsuccessful in his bid for a seat last year. He drew 214 votes.

His closest competitor was Bruce Palmer, a freshman at Midwestern State Univ., who attracted 156 votes.

The other two contestants in the race finished one vote apart: Sherry Wood, 107, and Jo Lynn Cockrum, 106.

The difference in the Place Three race was in voting precinct 32 and ab-

Projects approved despite split votes

By narrow 3-2 voting, the city council Monday night approved increasing the speed limit on portions of Magnolia and Johnson, and also to accept bids to rebuild the 800 block of Vogel with a concrete surface.

Those votes came after the council had canvassed Saturday's voting tabulations, declared the winners and set the next meeting, May 20, as the date when the oath of office would be administered to the winners.

The speed limit was increased to 40 miles per hour on Magnolia, from West Highway to Mockingbird, and on Johnson between West Highway and the water tower.

The speed limits had been 30 MPH, which remains unchanged between the water tower and Mockingbird.

Aldermen Johnny Crawford,

Charlie Helms and Virgil Woodfin voted for the speed limit change, while Diane Robnett and Johnny Coker voted in opposition.

During a discussion preceding the voting, it was pointed out the changes were opposed by the police chief and Cryovac's administration.

At the council's previous meeting, Crawford had argued for the change despite a survey made by the police department that the majority of drivers were observing the 30 MPH limit on Magnolia, and an observation made that the street passes athletic fields used by young children.

In the voting on the rebuilding of Vogel, the block between Third and Fourth streets, Robnett, Coker and Woodfin were in favor and Crawford

and Helms were in opposition.

McGrath Brothers Concrete had submitted the lowest of two bids received, at \$34,762.

Crawford argued the cost was in excess of using asphalt.

Zack Burkett Co. was the low bidder for asphalt paving on portions of four streets, with a bid of \$30 per ton installed.

Funding for the work is provided in the form of a grant from the federal government.

The streets on which the material will be used are Smith, part of the 800 block of Second, 300 and 400 blocks of North Penn, and part of the 100 block of West Diamond.

The work will be accomplished as Burkett crews complete the widening project on West Highway, Administrator Gary Jones told the council.

Lewis Hillard Trucking and Elf Asphalt, Inc. were the low bidders for slurry seal aggregate and slurry seal oil, to be used on this summer's surfacing program on existing asphalt streets.

Council vote on the latter two bids were unanimous.

Also approved were a request to advertise for the purchase of a four-wheel tractor for the wastewater treatment plant, and a bid submitted by Gary Crawford to supply materials for the water treatment plant drying beds.

The tractor, which has specifications including a mower attachment and front end bucket, is estimated to cost between \$8,000 and \$10,000, according to Mike Price, Public Works director.

Crawford's bid was for \$4,005 for approximately 300 tons of washed pea gravel.

Alderman Crawford, the bidder's father, abstained from voting on the contract.

No bids were received in response to advertisements for heating and air conditioning duct work, and also for vinyl wall covering, to be installed at the Recreational Activities Center.

Jones said, on the advice of city attorney Jay Cantrell, the city must rebid for the items.

Mayor Wayne House announced the city's Employee of the Month was Eddie Browning.

Recommendations expected for improvements of schools

School trustees will receive recommendations at their meeting Tuesday night for improvements being made by the Educational Improvement Council.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Members of the Council were appointed by the board earlier in the year. And their recommendations are part of the district's goal of enhancing education for all students.

Included in the recommendations are computers, the at-risk program and homework policies.

During the agenda's segment on personnel, Supt. Glen Mitchell said the board will be asked to accept resignations and hire new personnel, though he did not elaborate with any names or positions.

Trustees will be asked to act on accepting or rejecting bids for the construction of a new bus maintenance barn.

The facility was one of the topics in the recent bond issue election. Bids

were received last month, but action was postponed until next week.

No action will be taken on a new district policy concerning use of school facilities. Mitchell explained Tuesday's meeting will be for the first reading of the policy only, and whatever action is to be taken on it will be made at a later date.

Trustees will canvass the results of the election vote recount that was held Tuesday afternoon and declare the winner, which was incumbent Wendall House.

The other election votes were officially canvassed at a called meeting Tuesday morning, and winners Sheri Kennedy and Martha Dudley declared. Supt. Mitchell said if the approval card is received from the secretary of state's office in Austin in time, regarding the election results, the winners will be administered their oaths of office.

News Briefs

Week's rains produce 3.35

Storm clouds Thursday and Tuesday prompted weather spotters to take up positions around Iowa Park, but the only thing that fell was a total of 3.35 inches of rain.

The city received 2.5 inches

Thursday, according to the measurement reported by Virgil Woodfin.

Then, Tuesday night, .85 of an inch was measured at the city's sewer treatment plant's gauge.

Food commodities next week

Distribution of U.S.D.A. food commodities will be held from 12-noon until 6 p.m. Thursday, May 16, at the Christian Church Fellowship Hall.

Seven items are on the list for distribution this month, except they will

not include cheese.

The Area Food Bank does not know from month to month what is available, Frances Park explained. She added, "Cheese will probably not be a regular monthly item."

Pet vaccinations set May 25

The annual pet vaccination clinic sponsored by the Iowa Park chapter of Future Farmers of America will be held from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. Saturday, May 25.

The clinic is located at the Vocational Agriculture building on the campus of Iowa Park High School. Patrons use the parking lot between the building and Hawk Stadium.

Dr. Don Morris D.M.V., assisted by Brent Patterson, will administer ap-

propriate preventative care to dogs under five years of age, including vaccinations for rabies, \$7, and distemper, hepatitis and parvo, \$12.

Cats may be vaccinated for distemper, \$7, or leukemia, \$12. It is noted that leukemia is the number two killer of cats nationwide.

Dogs over five years of age may receive a vaccination for parvo for \$5. Distemper and hepatitis is not necessary for dogs of that age.

Child sexual abuse case is investigated

Iowa Park police are awaiting the results of an investigation into a local case of sexual abuse of a three-year-old child.

Chief Wayne Parsons said a woman took the child to Bethania Hospital Sunday, and a nurse telephoned his office that afternoon of the situation.

The Child Protective Agency in Wichita Falls is conducting the investigation, and charges are expected to be filed once completed, Parsons said.

A complaint was filed Monday against a high school student for committing a class B terroristic threat, and the student was later arrested.

Parents of a student filed a complaint Monday morning against Justin Goodknight, 17, and produced a letter he is alleged to have written their daughter in which the threats were stated.

Goodknight was taken into custody, transported to the police station and that afternoon transported to county jail, according to the police blotter.

Three other arrests were also noted on the blotter during the week.

Officers arrested Sepherino Perez Jr., 25, in the 200 block of West Highway Saturday afternoon on a charge of public intoxication. He was released that evening after posting a bond of \$69.

Ronald Lynn Meador, 40, was taken into custody Monday afternoon on a charge of theft between \$20 and \$200.

Meador, who is accused of taking cigarettes from a local store, was transported to county jail.

Tuesday evening, during a traffic check in the 100 block of East Highway, police determined the driver, Monty Lee Thomas, 34, was wanted by the Ector County sheriff's department.

The Odessa office confirmed it had a warrant for the man's arrest on a charge of parole violation, and no provision for bond.

Thomas was later turned over to a Wichita County deputy to be transported to Wichita Falls.

No charges were filed against a man who allegedly allowed his vehicle to strike merchandise and part of the Wal-Mart building Thursday evening, but he was taken to Bethania Hospital.

At first police thought David Chris Wilson, 31, to be intoxicated. But they received a telephone call from a relative stating they believed he would attempt suicide by overdosing.

Wilson was taken to the police station where he was checked by EMTs, and then transported to Bethania Hospital.

A girl's bicycle was reportedly stolen from Woodbriar Apartments Wednesday of last week, according to the blotter.

The bicycle had been chained to a post, and the chain was cut.

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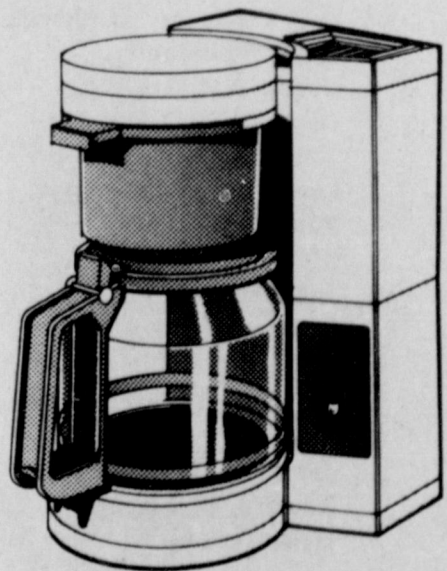
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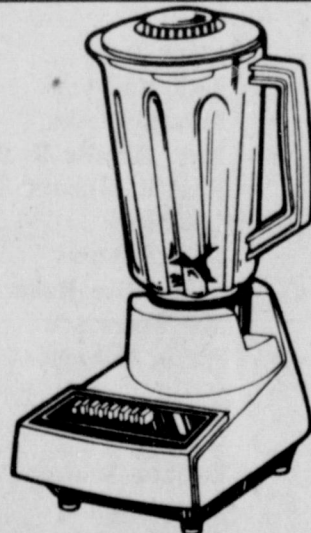


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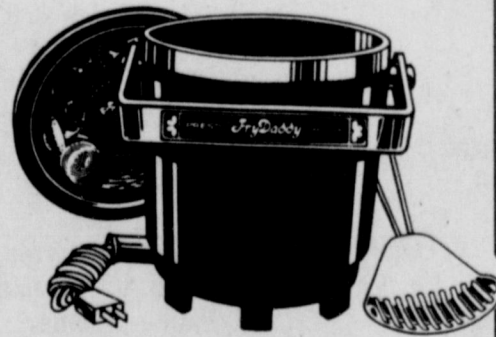


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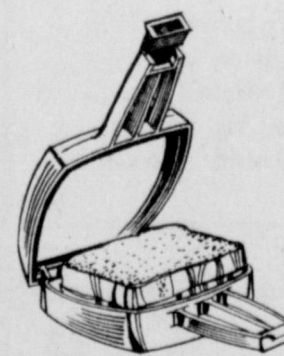
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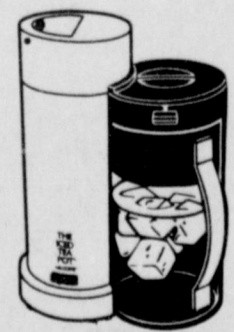


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As I See It. ■ ■ By Bob Hamilton

I did everything I could to not give the impression I was using my position as publisher of the paper in order to gain an undeserving upper hand through the paper throughout the campaign.

In fact, I did far less advertising than I would have recommended, in view of the fact that both my opponents had lived here far longer and likely were better known.

But I do want to tell those who supported and voted for me how much I appreciate the opportunity to serve our community as an alderman.

A lot of my friends who have served both on the council and school board have questioned my sanity.

I'd only ask you to not bring them up on Wednesdays, however.

That's press day for us, and my time is extremely limited, just trying to get the paper out to our readers.

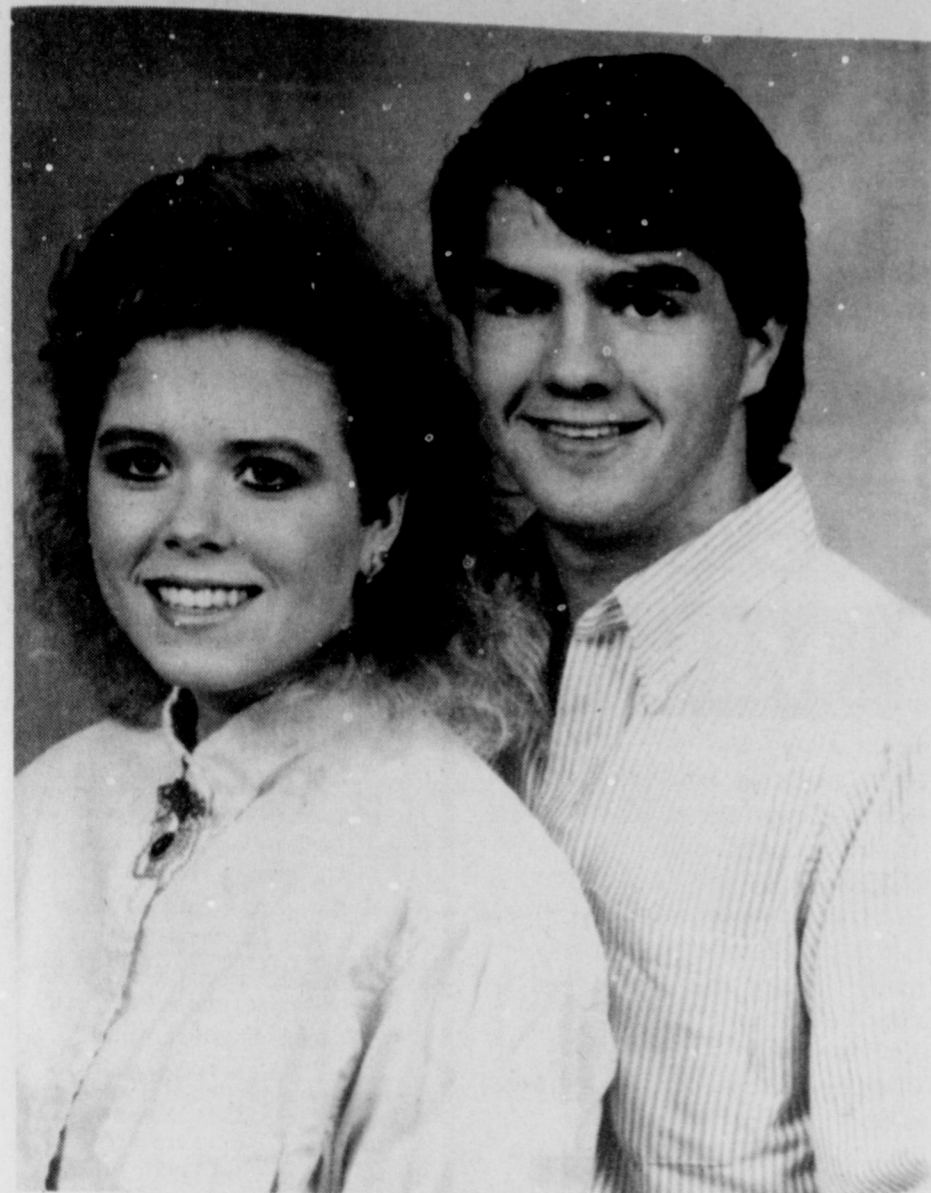

A MOTHER'S INSPIRATION
The Lazy B Ranch is comprised of 260 square miles of brush on the New Mexico and Arizona border and has been in the Day family since 1881. When Harry and Ada Mae Day were ready to have their first child, they traveled 200 miles to El Paso for the delivery, and Ada Mae brought her baby, Sandra, home to a difficult life. The four-room adobe house had no running water and no electricity. There was no school within driving distance. One would have thought that with such bleak prospects, Sandra's future was dark.
Harry and Ada Mae were dreamers who were not limited by surroundings. Harry was forced by his father's death to take over the ranch instead of entering Stanford University, but never gave up hope that his daughter would study there. When Sandra was four, her mother started her on the Calvert method of home instruction and later saw that she attended the best boarding schools possible. Sandra's brother, Alan, says that one summer their parents packed them in the car and they drove to all the state capitols west of the Mississippi. Sandra did go to Stanford, law school, and went on to become the first woman Supreme Court justice in the United States.
Why has Sandra Day O'Connor risen to lofty heights? She is intelligent of course and a go-getter. Much of the credit must go to a determined little ranch lady sitting in an adobe house at night, reading to her children hour after hour, and to parents who exposed her to government.
Perhaps Abraham Lincoln expressed it best, "all that I am, or hope to be, I owe to my angel mother."

Despite losing one of their three games played in a four-day period, the Hawks are still in the hunt to retain their Dist. 4-AAA baseball championship.

They travel Friday to Graham for the final game of the regular season.

Vernon's rally in the final frame started when Merrick had control problems. He hit the first two batters and loaded the bases by walking the third.

The Lions scored on a fly to deep center field. The ball relayed from the outfield to cut off another runner, but the throw was off target.

The ball bounced off the backboard behind home plate. Merrick picked it up and picked off a runner trying to reach third from second. That was the second out.

A diving catch just beyond second base by fielder Jason Miller ended the rally and game.

Pitcher Chad Thompson handcuffed the Bowie Jackrabbits here Tuesday, limiting the visitors to only one hit and giving up one walk.

Meanwhile, Hawk batters were having a field day, pounding out 12 hits and scoring 11 runs.

Born July 1, 1905, in Bonham, she and Bill Etheridge were married in 1935 in San Antonio. He preceded her in death in 1942.

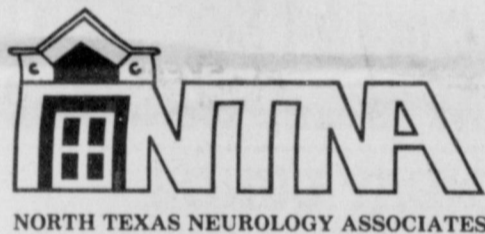
Mrs. Etheridge was a retired waitress and had lived in Vernon for 80 years. She was a member of First United Methodist Church.

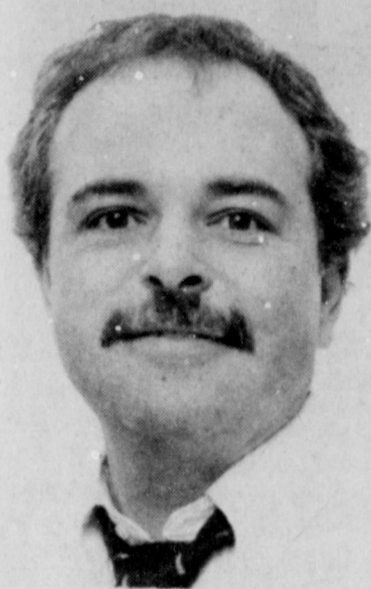

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Darrell K. Jolly

"I'm not a gourmet cook by any means. When I cook, it's the easy way out. I enjoy cooking but I do not like to clean up the disaster," says this week's featured cook, Darrell Jolly.

After reading through his recipes, we agree that they should be simple to prepare, but also, they are different and good-tasting variations of old standbys.

Jolly, a 1972 graduate of Iowa Park High School, received his BA Degree in Business Administration from West Texas State Univ. in Canyon.

He has been employed at the local Wal-Mart store, where he is customer service manager, nine years. In addition, Darrell has been selling real estate for the past five years. He was a million dollar seller for a Wichita Falls real estate company before opening his own company, Regency One Realtors, in Iowa Park, a year ago.

When time permits, Darrell enjoys singing country and western songs, dancing, playing racquetball, and collecting old models and pictures of ships.

"Working two jobs is not easy. It's a matter of scheduling your time," Darrell said. "Usually my time is limited and the meals I cook are quick," he explained. The following are some of his favorite recipes.

Grilled Ham & Cheese Sandwich

Take three pieces of bread and butter one side of each. Brown the unbuttered side, then turn over on the buttered side. Add cheese, using two pieces of bread, making a grilled cheese.

Lay the third piece of bread on the buttered side and brown. Once you've completed browning, cook a slice of



ham to your liking. Place the ham on top of the grilled cheese, plus lettuce, tomato and mayonnaise. Then place the third piece of bread on top.

Cubed Steak Sandwich

Cook tenderized cube steak very, very slowly on top of the stove. DO NOT ADD GREASE. The steak makes its own juice.

Sprinkle garlic powder on top. Brown both sides very slowly. Either cut a piece of onion or sprinkle onion powder on top.

Once the steak is cooked, place between two pieces of bread with mayonnaise, lettuce and tomato.

Homemade Sloppy Joes

Brown one pound ground beef over low temperature. Add one-half chopped onion; sprinkle garlic powder and Mrs. Dash spices; let cook

awhile on low temperature. Add one 8-oz. can tomato sauce and stir.

Spoon over plain or toasted slices of bread.

Makes a delicious meal by itself or you can fry potatoes to go with it.

Homemade Meat Loaf

Place one pound of ground beef in a large bowl; mix in one package of salt-free crackers and one chopped onion. Sprinkle garlic powder to taste and add one egg and work into mixture. Add one 8-oz. can tomato sauce and mix well.

Place in a large cake pan and spread another 8-oz. can of tomato sauce on top. Bake approx. one hour.

"I usually open a can of green beans and cook mashed potatoes with cheese to go with the meatloaf. This is one of those messy meals to cook that I don't like to clean up." - Jolly

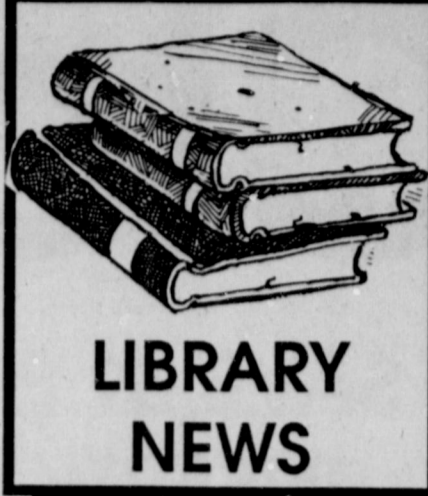
