The pool is open from 12-noon until 6 p.m. seven days a week, and

It is located on the west side of the high school building.

## Fish feed to benefit cemetery

A fish fry benefitting Highland Cemetery Association will be served Sunday by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Serving will commence at 12-noon.

A new feature being introduced this year is a "drive-through" service, where patrons can drive up on the street in front of the pavilion and pick up their carry out meals.

Tickets are \$5 per plate. Advance tickets, which will be helpful in the preparation, are available from any Highland Association officer or at the cemetery office.

The fish fry has proven to be the single largest fund raising project for Highland Cemetery. MuleSkinners donate their time for cooking and serving, as well as their equipment.

The cemetery is maintained solely by sale of lots, donations, and such projects as the fish fry. Funds raised Sunday will allow completion of work in progress, as well as further beautification.

The general public is encouraged to participate in the meal.

Those planning to eat in the pavilion are asked to park at the rear of the facility if the parking lot is full, leaving the street open for drive-through purchasers.

## Street work is delayed

One street improvement project has been delayed a week and workers are to begin other projects next week, according to Mike Price, public works director for the city.

The two-week project of rebuilding Vogel was extended to approximately three weeks, Price said, when it was determined all the natural gas pipes beneath the surface had to be laid at a lower depth.

Vogel's asphalt surface has been removed and it will be rebuilt with a concrete surface.

Workers are to begin constructing valley gutters on several intersections, with the work on that project to start as early as Monday.

# Todd, Emberton exchange vows Saturday in candlelight ceremony

Dee Ann Todd became the bride of Dean L. Emberton Saturday evening when they pledged marriage vows in First United Methodist Church, in a 7:30 ceremony directed by Rev. John Mollet, pastor of Chapel Hill United Methodist Church, Dallas, and the pastor, Rev. Karl Klaus.

Following their honeymoon in the San Antonio area the couple will make their home in Houston.

The nuptial area was illuminated by white tapers burning in seven-branched candelabrum on either side of a central arrangement of Calla lilies and greenery in a large basket backed by a gold cross.

Additional lighting was provided at floor level on either side of the altar by 16-branch heart-shaped candelabrum entwined with vines of greenery. Twin arrangements of white roses and carnations were placed in close proximity to the two pulpits.

A unity candle near the greenery garlanded kneeling rail completed the decorations.

Pews were marked with bows of white lace caught in the center by spring flowers of mauve and wedgewood blue. They were made by the bride's mother, who made all of her daughter's wedding attire and the feminine attendants' dresses and bouquets. They also were designed by the bride and her mother.

The program of wedding music was presented by Dr. Shelley Archambo, harpist, and Dr. Ronald Hough, organist, both of Wichita Falls and both professors at Midwestern State University.

As the bride entered the sanctuary on the arm of her father, Dr. Hough played "Trumpet Voluntary" - Purcell, and for the recessional he played "Toccata" - Charles-Marie Widor. Donna Brinlee of Wichita Falls sang "Ave Maria" - Gounod, and Steven Coats, also of Wichita Falls, sang "The Lord's Prayer" - Malotte.

Soft satin and lace shaped the bride's romantically designed gown. The fitted bodice with keyhole back was overlaid with Alencon lace that also formed the long sleeves. The sleeves came to points over her hands and featured a self-covered five-button closure.

Adding back emphasis was the keyhole opening that was fastened at the neckline with five self-covered buttons. Nine strands of faux pearls formed drapes from side to side enhancing the delicate lace bound opening.



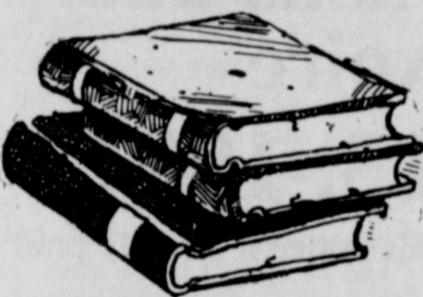

James, who is also a graduate of Iowa Park High School, has been employed by *Cryovac* over 13 years.

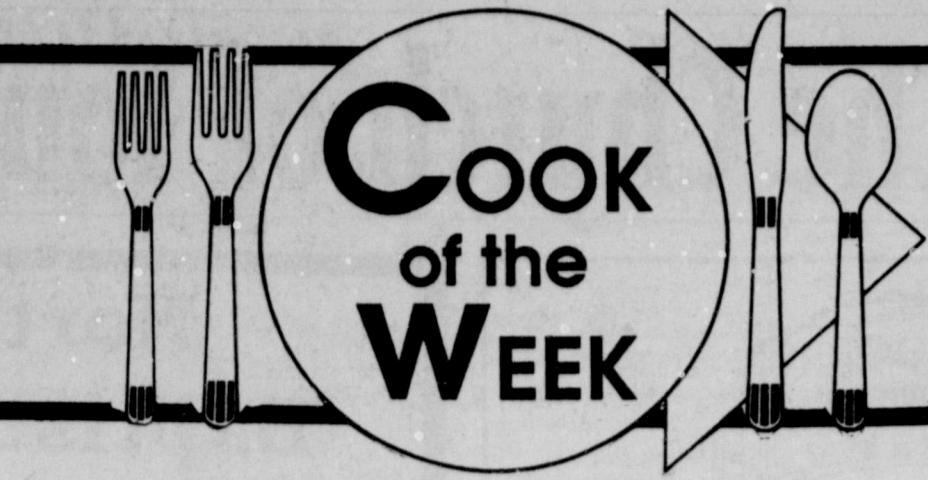

**Lattice-Top Chicken**

1 can (10 3/4 oz.) condensed cream of potato soup  
1 cup milk  
1/2 tsp. seasoned salt  
2 cups cubed chicken  
1 bag frozen broccoli, carrots, cauliflower combination, thawed and drained  
1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese  
1 can French fried onions  
1 pkg. (4 oz.) refrigerator crescent rolls.



Combine soup, milk, salt, chicken, vegetables, 1/2 cup cheese and 1/2 can French fried onions. Place in 8x12 baking dish. Bake covered at 375 degrees 20 minutes.

Unwrap crescent rolls; separate into two rectangles and cut into 3 strips. Place strips on casserole to form lattice top. Bake uncovered 15 minutes longer. Top with remaining cheese and onions. Bake an additional 3-5 minutes, until onions are golden brown. Serves 6.

**Acapulco Eggs**

3 corn tortillas, cut into strips  
3 Tbsp. margarine  
1/2 cup diced onion  
1 can (14 1/2 oz.) stewed tomatoes  
1 cup julienne cooked ham or turkey  
1/2 cup diced green pepper  
6 beaten eggs  
3/4 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese

In large skillet, cook tortillas in butter until brown. Remove and set aside. Add onion; cook until tender. Drain tomatoes and reserve liquid. Add liquid to skillet. Cover and cook over high heat 3 minutes, stirring often. Add tomatoes, meat and pepper and heat through. Reduce heat to low and add tortillas and eggs. Cover and cook 4-6 minutes until eggs have set. Sprinkle with cheese and cover until cheese melts. 4-6 servings. Excellent brunch!

**Nestle Toll House Pan Cookie**

2 1/2 cup unsifted flour  
1 tsp. baking soda  
1 tsp. salt  
1 cup softened butter  
3/4 cup sugar  
3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs  
1 - 12 oz. pkg. Nestle semi-sweet chocolate morsels  
1 cup chopped nuts

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a small bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt; set aside. In a large bowl, combine butter, sugar, brown sugar and vanilla; beat until creamy. Beat in eggs and gradually add flour mixture; mix well. Stir in chocolate morsels and nuts. Spread into a greased 15"x10"x1" baking pan. Bake 20 minutes at 375 degrees. Cool and cut into 2-inch squares.

**Shells & Vegetables Italiano**

1 Pkg. Velveeta shells & cheese  
3 cups broccoli flowerets, blanched  
1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved  
1 (3 1/2 oz.) can pitted ripe olives, halved  
1/2 cup Seven Seas Viva Italian dressing  
1/2 cup sour cream  
Prepare shells and cheese as directed on package.  
Toss shells and cheese with remaining ingredients.  
Serve or chill. Serves 8 to 10.

**Busy Day Individual Meat Loaves**

1 lb. lean ground beef  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2/3 cup cracker crumbs  
2/3 cup milk  
1 beaten egg  
1/2 tsp. each sage & thyme  
1/4 tsp. nutmeg  
1/4 tsp. black pepper  
2 Tbsp. brown sugar, packed  
1/3 cup ketchup  
1/2 tsp. each ginger and garlic salt  
2 Tbsp. soy sauce  
1 tsp. dry mustard

Crumble beef into large bowl. Add salt. Sprinkle with crumbs and milk. Let stand 5 minutes, then blend. Mix in egg, onion and next 4 spices. Shape into 4 loaves. Place on foil lined baking pan about 4 inches apart.

Mix brown sugar, ketchup, ginger and garlic salt, soy sauce and mustard. Spread mixture over each loaf.

Bake at 350 degrees 35 minutes. Sprinkle diced green pepper over each before serving.

**Quick New Potato Salad (chunky)**

3/4 cup Miracle Whip  
1/4 cup finely chopped onion  
1 Tbsp. dijon mustard  
1/4 tsp. black pepper  
1 1/2 lbs. new potatoes, cut in quarters  
1/4 cup water  
1 cub cubed ham or turkey  
1 cup cucumber slices, quartered  
1 cup red & green pepper, cut in chunk sizes

In large bowl, stir together dressing, onion, mustard and black pepper; set aside.

Combine potatoes and water in 2-quart glass bowl and cover. Microwave on high 11-13 minutes until tender, stirring after 6 minutes. Drain.

Stir potatoes and remaining ingredients into salad dressing mixture. Chill and serve over large green leafy lettuce and top with fresh sliced tomato.

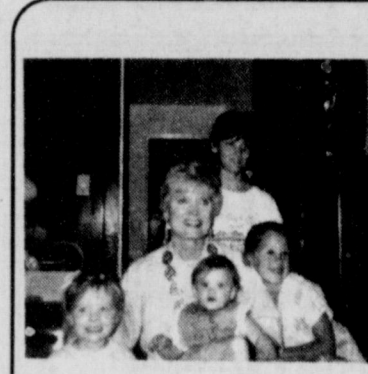
After graduation Dr. Keeter completed a year-long internship in

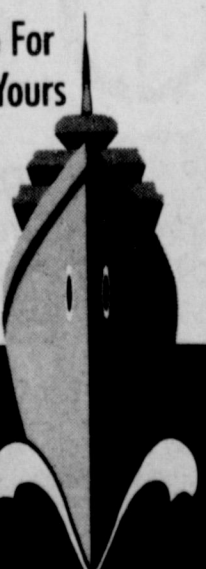

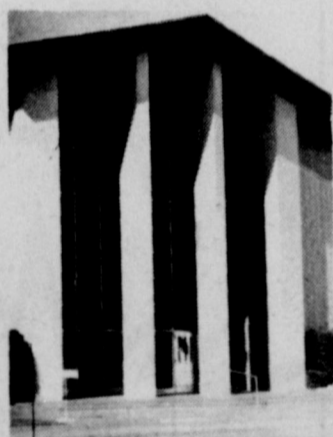

STATE CAPITAL



HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Lawmakers had a rare good week: Queen Elizabeth II of England stopped at the Capitol, and House members approved a controversial redistricting plan for their chamber.

As expected, majority party Democrats drew a map aimed to increase their strength this decade, but House Republicans plan to challenge the plan in Washington, D.C.

The Democrat's plan could increase their majority from 93 to 100, giving them a crucial two-thirds majority.

The number of Hispanic members could rise from 21 now to 30, blacks could gain two seats, and Anglos would, of course, lose seats.

Democrats have done their best to make sure that Anglos who do not return will be Republicans.

GOP Got A "Raw Deal"

The outcome was totally expected, but House Republicans, as Rep. Kent Grusendorf said, "got a raw deal."

Grusendorf, R-Arlington, said in the Dallas delegation, Republicans were stripped of a 10-7 majority to a 7-9 majority, ignoring the fact that growth took place in GOP areas of town.

"Something's wrong. We will definitely appeal," Grusendorf told reporters.

Friends Are Paired

The Houston delegation had a similar pattern. One of the tragedies of redistricting is that some friends get paired, or forced to campaign against one another for re-election.

This happened with Angleton Rep. John Willy and Pearland Rep. Jack Harris, good friends, deskmates and Republicans. Two Democratic friends were paired, Beaumont Rep. Al Price and Port Arthur Rep. Frank Collazo, pitting black against Hispanic.

But Willy said rather than go against compadre Harris, he might move into the next county and challenge Redistricting Committee chairman Tom Uher, D-Bay City.

Uher said they were his buddies, too, but the pairing couldn't be helped.

'Political Slaves' Rebel

With new census figures indicating that Hispanics will soon outnumber Anglos, the Texas Democratic Party has been bending over backwards to draw several new Hispanic districts this session, angering Houston black lawmakers.

Last week, led by state Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, blacks rebelled by aligning with Houston GOP lawmakers to protect their own redistricting goals.

Wilson accused Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle and director Ed Martin of treating blacks "as political slaves" to their own selfish ends.

"They drew this plan and slammed us to the wall. We're going to have a better plan that protects us and doesn't throw us to the wolves," Wilson said.

Martin retorted that Wilson was invited into the process, "but chose to work with Republicans."

In the end, Democrats appeased Wilson by packing black districts with more minority strength.

Buy Prison Goods

Rep. Mark Stiles, D-Beaumont, succeeded in getting a bill added to another measure during debate in the House.

His amendment would force state agencies to buy furniture and other products manufactured by state prison inmates. It was added to a bill that would continue the State Purchasing and General Services Commission.

Stiles argued that his measure, which does not take into account the cost of prison-produced items, would save taxpayers money. Opponents disagreed, saying it would eliminate competition.

Other Legislative Action

A bill that makes it easier for authorities to prosecute husbands for raping their wives passed the Senate with an amendment requiring evidence of injury or serious threats to the woman.

Senators also voted to allow the state to fill prisons beyond the 95 percent limit set by a federal judge.

The House passed a bill outlawing open alcoholic beverage containers in vehicles, but it was expected to die in the Senate.

House members also passed a bill to control the amount of out-of-state waste imported to Texas.

Other Highlights

Cost overruns have hit the Capitol restoration project, which will not be finished on time, or at all, if the Legislature doesn't cough up millions more.

A key figure in the landmark school finance reform drama, San Antonio Edgewood Supt. James Vasquez, said he will resign to seek a job in higher education.

The parole board released more than 600 felons last month to avoid prison population over the federal limit. More than two-thirds of inmates considered were released after 547 cases were reviewed a second time.

Other Highlights

A new law signed by Gov. Ann Richards requires three state agencies to investigate whether the governor should grant clemency to battered women and juveniles which kill their abusers.

Ron Lindsey, chief of the Texas Department of Human Services, will step down at the end of the month.

Houston is fourth and San Antonio is fifth on the Census Bureau's list of cities with Hispanic-owned companies. In Texas, Hispanics own nine percent of all businesses, placing Texas second behind California.

Local students attend seminar

Sixteen Iowa Park and 11 from Burkburnett recently attended a Gifted and Talented High School Seminar, which featured speakers and solving of creative problems, according to sponsor Candice McKee.

Speakers included Mike Murphy and Robert Stewart from the Sierra Club; Paulette Koncelik, who spoke on stress management, and military reservist Paul Ritter, who served in Operation Desert Storm and spoke on Saudia Arabian customs.

One of the creative problems students had to solve was construction of a tower consisting of spaghetti, miniature marshmallows and tape, strong enough to hold a ping pong ball.

The other problem was a balloon vehicle.

## Man Caught With Classified Information

Claims information  
regularly published

Neighbors today were surprised to learn Melvin Kline, a seemingly quiet, well-mannered man was making extra money with classified information. When questioned earlier this morning, Kline professed surprise that everyone wasn't using the classified section to earn extra income and get rid of unwanted items.

"It's common," he said. Recent studies tend to bear Kline out. Consumer Data Service reported that over 85% of the public read the newspaper and over 80% of those read the classifieds. Kline claimed widespread use was being made of the classified information. "But you have to act quickly," he remarked.

"If I have something to sell, I can be in the paper by tomorrow. I do that a lot now," he confessed. "With classified, whether I'm buying or selling, I can reach a large market instantly. And it's easy... just pick up the phone."

When asked if price mattered at all, Kline stated he was in possession of Consumer Data Service documents that indicated newspaper readership increases as income increases. "The more money they make, the more they read the paper," he said, "and I can prove it."

Asked for a last comment, Kline replied "No matter what you're looking for, a new job, a great car, merchandise, or even a home, take a long look at the classified section.

**"Sure, I've made some money from classified information, but so can anyone who reads the paper."**

The information's all there." Response Analysis Corp. studies indicate the public does exactly that, with 98% preferring the newspaper over radio and 68% preferring the newspaper instead of TV.

Kline was last seen in the company of an unidentified man carrying two outboard motors.

# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Two developmental wells are planned by Primrose Operating Co. in the Wichita Regular Field, five miles northwest of Burkburnett.

The wells will be known as the Nos. 69 C, Birk K. "C" and "D". Both will seek production at total depths of 1,800 feet.

Location is in a 124-acre lease in the F.W. Huseman Survey A-93.

Louis F. Kent of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operator has 100 acres leased, with drillsite in the Samuel Anderson Survey A-3, and has designated the venture as the No. 12 O.L. Clark. Drillsite is three miles south of Burkburnett.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 16 T. J. Waggoner "EE", a 1,999-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operation will be located four miles north of Kamay in a 60-acre lease in the George Hezekiah Survey A-454. The operator is L and S Drilling Co.

The No. 15 Ramming "A," a 1,800-ft., developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field. Oscar Oil Co., is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 90-acre lease in the HT&B RR Co., Survey A-474, 10 miles northeast of Iowa Park.

J. Miller and B. Parker of Wichita Falls have filed for permit to drill the No. 18 Parker Heirs "F" a 1,400-ft. developmental well 10 miles west of Wichita Falls. Location is in a 320-acre lease in the Palo Pinto County School Land Survey A-241. The well is in the Wichita Regular Field.

Mountain Creek Oil Co. has posted first production figures for a pair of new wells in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles north of Valley View.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 12 and 13 Ford.

The No. 12 showed ability to pump 15 barrels of oil per day, plus 15 barrels of water, and bottomed at 868 feet; while the No. 13 pumped five barrels of oil and bottomed at 750 feet.

Production intervals will be in the Strawn Formation, ranging from 174 to 570 feet into the wellbores.

The wells are located in an 89-acre lease in the H. B. Balch Survey A-12.

The No. 3 Hamilton ET Al is scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field, with A.B.B. Drilling Co. as the operator. It will be a 1,900-ft. test and is located in a 20-acre lease in the Denton County School Land

Survey A-57, two miles north of Holliday.

Landrum West, Inc., has posted first production figures for three new wells in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles west of Burkburnett.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 2, 3, and 4 "L."

The No. 2 showed ability to pump 16 barrels of oil per day, plus three barrels of water, and bottomed at 668 feet. The No. 3 pumped 16 barrels of oil daily, plus two barrels of water, and bottomed at 640 feet; while the No. 4 pumped 15 barrels of oil and three barrels of water daily and bottomed at 697 feet.

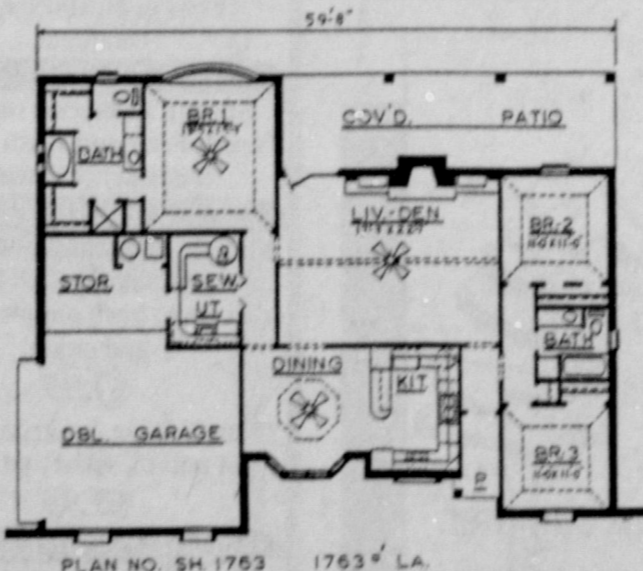

Don't try to scrub and pull anything off, and do try to get to the dentist within 30 minutes. He has a lot better chance of implantation if you don't linger! Some parents rush the child to the dentist, but in their haste, forget to bring the tooth. DON'T FORGET THE TOOTH.

If the tooth is not completely out... don't remove it from the socket. Hold it in place. The dentist has material that can be used to anchor the tooth in place until it becomes solid again.

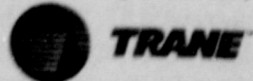

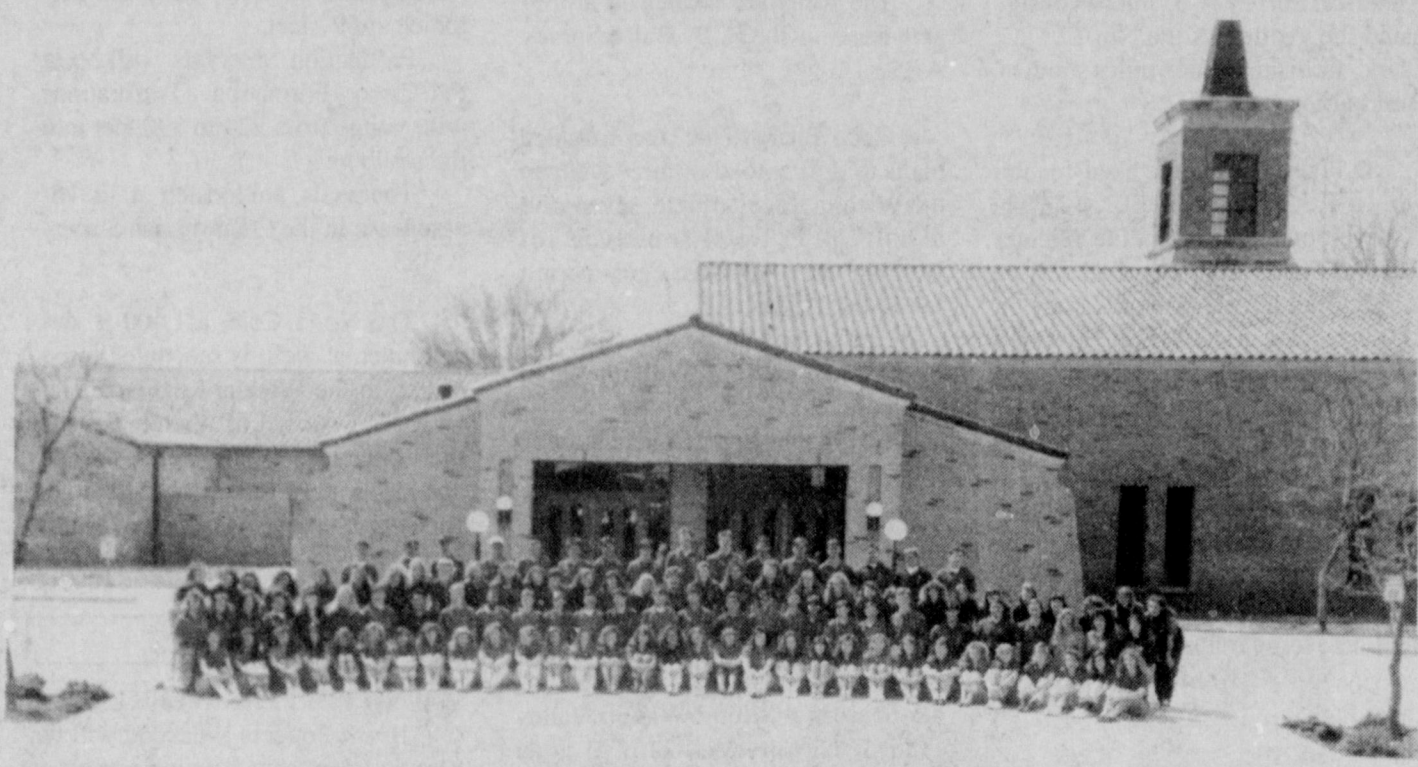

# Tourney deadline nears

Less than a week remains for local golfers to enter the first Annual Iowa Park Golf Tournament.
