TCI marketing plan to remain unchanged

Tele-Communications, Inc. (TCI) has announced an additional feature to its newest channel addition marketing plan where by none of its customers must pay for the service unless, on their July bills, they indicate their intention to subscribe by paying the separately listed amount shown on the bill for the optional service.

Both the local and area managers Wednesday morning denied any plans to drop the marketing campaign which has drawn a legal challenge from the state's attorney general.

The new program, called "Encore," is being offered free to all subscribers through the month of June. Beginning with the July bill and continuing one year, subscribers who do not indicate a desire to continue receiving the channel will be billed at a \$1-per-month rate.

After a year, according to mailings from TCI, subscribers will be billed at rates ranging from \$1 to \$4.95, depending on the number of pay channels they have subscribed on their service.

A suit was filed by the attorney general against TCI for the marketing practice last week in Austin.

A story in Wednesday's edition of the *Dallas Morning News* stated TCI was dropping the marketing technique for its newest premium movie service.

However, Weldon Laird, systems manager officed in Burkburnett, and Raymond Greenwood, district manager in Mineral Wells, both said they had received confirming communications from the company that the program was continuing.

Greenwood explained a series of seven direct mailings were being sent to all subscribers, explaining the Encore program, its costs and how a customer can reject the pay channel.

He also said, "When they receive their July bill with the additional \$1 billing is noted separately, they can just mark on the bill they don't want it, or simply discount the \$1 from the total bill, and it will be discontinued."

Asked if he had received any complaints about Encore and the mar-

keting practice which has drawn complaints not only in Texas but in a number of other states, Laird responded, "Not as far as I know. We've had a lot of good response."

Messages received by all system managers from TCI office in Dallas stated, "Contrary to any 'rumors' that you might have heard or read recently regarding TCI's response to the attorney general's legal concerns about Encore, the following press release is the official press release which states that TCI will be doing in the future..."

The release stated, in part, "On the July bill, TCI will notify its customers at least two different places and in written text that ENCORE is an optional service and what its monthly cost will be. Clearly written text on the fact of the bill will state that ENCORE service is optional, that customers may choose to subscribe to ENCORE by paying the separate charge on their July bill, but that no customer must pay subsequently for ENCORE unless they indicate their intention to subscribe by paying the separately listed amount shown or otherwise indicate they wish to subscribe. Customers who 'opt-in' for ENCORE will still have the subsequent option of 'opting-out' under the features of the original ENCORE marketing plan."

According to the *Dallas newspaper*, state attorney general offices in Texas, Florida and Iowa have sued the cable company, "saying the so-called negative option billing practice violated fair trade laws and was unfair and deceptive."

Other states, Montana and Wyoming, reportedly are considering similar suits against the giant cable television firm.

Annexation hearings set

Public hearings to consider two properties seeking annexation into the

city will be held during Monday's regularly-scheduled council meeting.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

One tract is located in the 400 block of East Diamond, and the other in the 1200 block of North Bell Road.

Two ordinances also are on the meeting's agenda.

One would authorize the city to allow the two utility companies that serve residents, TU Electric and Lone Star Gas Co., to apply a one-percent sales tax on residential utility bills.

Iowa Park is said to be among a very small minority of municipalities in this part of the country where a similar tax is not collected.

The other ordinance would amend a drug abuse prevention policy that was passed at the council's last meeting. If approved, a resolution would repeal the previous action.

Two agenda items concern the Recreational Activities Center. One would consider awarding bids for the building's floor covering, and the other would authorize the administrator to advertise for bids on furniture.

The council will be asked authorization for the administrator to pay contractor and engineering fees on completed projects.

One would be for the repaving of Vogel, \$35,318.19, and the other for the soil liner of the sanitary landfill, \$44,707.97.

Administrator Gary Jones will ask authorization to renew the city's group health insurance policy with Security Life Insurance Co. prior to the July 1 expiration date, unless a better benefit or lower cost policy is found by that date.

Jones is to report on the status of the city's general fund, and also suggest a series of dates when aldermen will hold budget work sessions in preparation for the 1991-92 year.

1.55-inch rainfall

Admitting doubt that his gauge caught all the rain that fell Saturday and Sunday, because of the hard-blowing winds that accompanied the downpours, Virgil Woodfin said he measured 1.55 inches of precipitation.

Woodfin's home is southeast of city hall.

Larry Godwin, a Kamay resident, said his gauge caught 2.1 inches.

Boy, dog bitten by snake

A young boy and small pup were bitten by a rattle snake Thursday morning in the back yard of a home at Johnson Road and Mary Drive.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Boren of 111 James, believed to be three years of age, sustained a single bite on his hand, according to Sue Hatcher, city animal control officer.

The pup was bitten once on a paw and again on its nose.

Hatcher said the incident took place about 10 a.m., when the dog was digging under a back yard fence at what apparently was the snake, and the youth was "helping" by pouring water on the target.

The youth was taken to Wichita General Hospital and reportedly was released Tuesday.

A small rattler was found about 7 that evening. Hatcher said it was about nine inches long and had one full button and part of another.

She said she suspects it came from an old pile of firewood and bricks in the yard.



QUICK RESPONSE by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department apparently saved the home of Darlene Gardner, 1107 Cornelia, shortly after midnight Friday. Firemen were able to extinguish the flame within minutes, containing it to the combination dining and living room. The rest of the home sustained heavy smoke damage, however. Mrs. Gardner said she was awakened by the crackling of the flames, apparently started by a faulty window air conditioner. She had no insurance to cover the damage, and friends have opened the Darlene Gardner Fire Fund savings account, number 461-68-9933 at Union Square Federal Savings in Wichita Falls, to which deposits may be made.

End of school problems

Police anticipated an unusual number of criminal mischief complaints that, according to records, always are noted at the end of the school year.

They were correct. Eight cases were recorded on the past week's police blotter.

A hood ornament was taken from a pickup parked at the junior high, according to the first complaint filed on Thursday.

That evening, a resident in the 800 block of South Wall reported a lock having been broken off the garage door. Nothing, however, was determined to have been taken.

The following day, a resident on Wagonwheel filed a complaint that toilet paper had been strewn in his yard, and obscenities written on the driveway.

of East Garden early Sunday morning, but not before a VCR was taken.

Entry reportedly was gained through an unlocked patio door. Police were notified at 7:45 a.m.

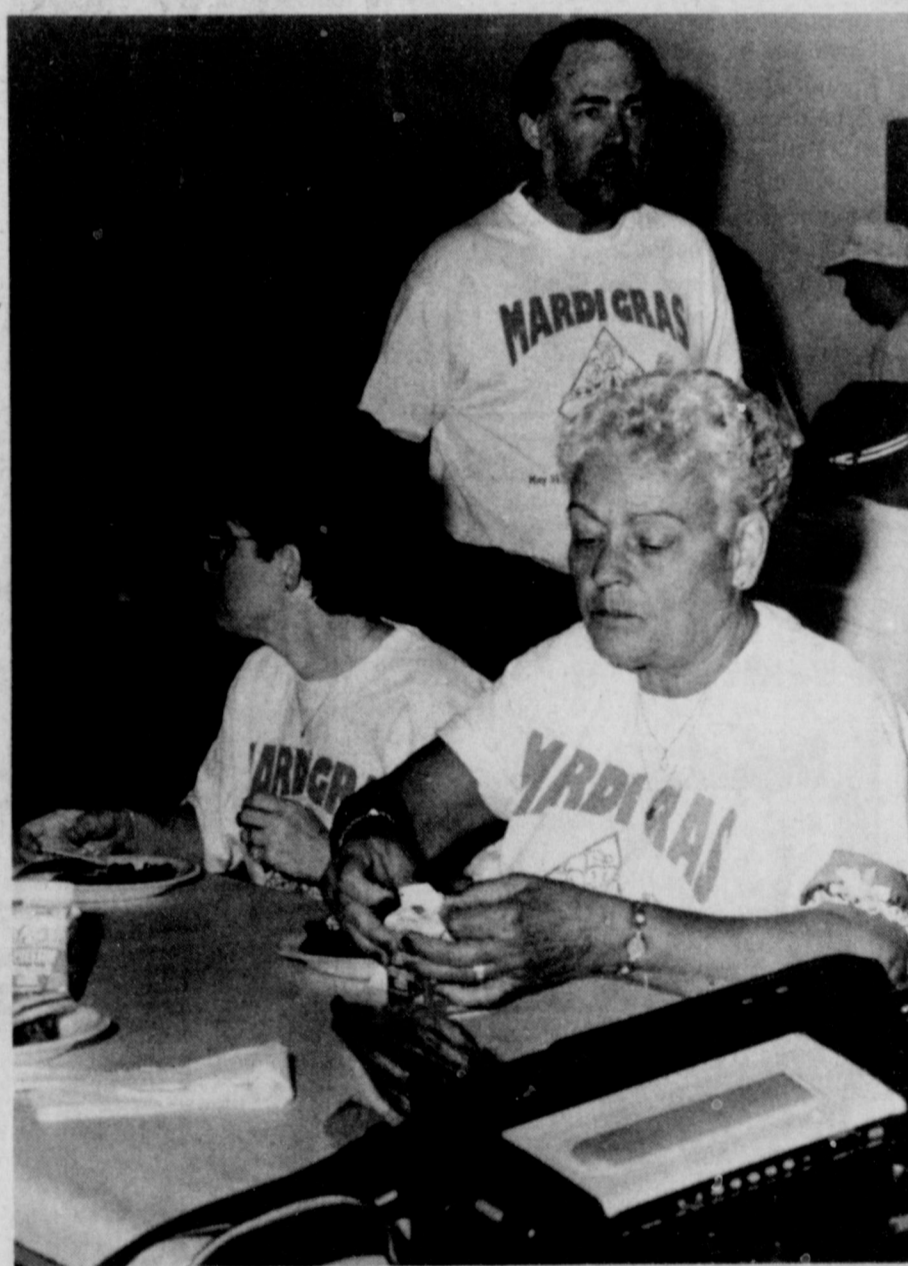
A resident in the 800 block of East Pasadena told police Friday that someone had taken a bicycle from the yard.

Riding group to spend night here Saturday

Iowa Park's Oscar Park will serve as the campsite Sunday night for the Third Annual Red River Trail Ride, according to Trail Boss Ed Harvill.

Sponsored by the Wichita County Extension Horse Committee, the group, composed of wagons and horse riders,

will spend the first of three nights on the trail here.

The Ride is to leave from the Mounted Patrol Arena on FM 369 at 8 that morning, and arrive here at approximately 4 p.m.

They will be fed a meal of brisket and beans prepared by the MuleSkinners and entertained by Rossell Kerr and the Quick Steppers.

Camping will be on the west side of Gordon Lake, in the area between the pavillion and US 287.

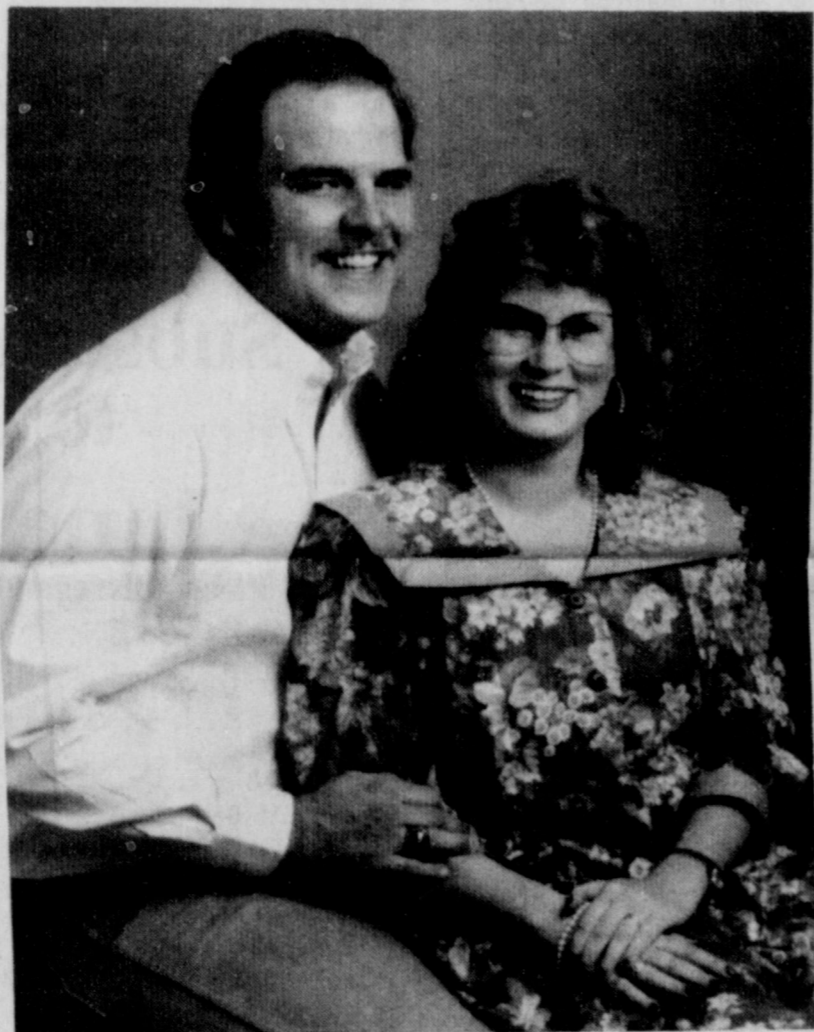
A reception was held in Lucy Park Pavilion, hosted by the bride's mother. The wedding cake was decorated by Karen Parson.

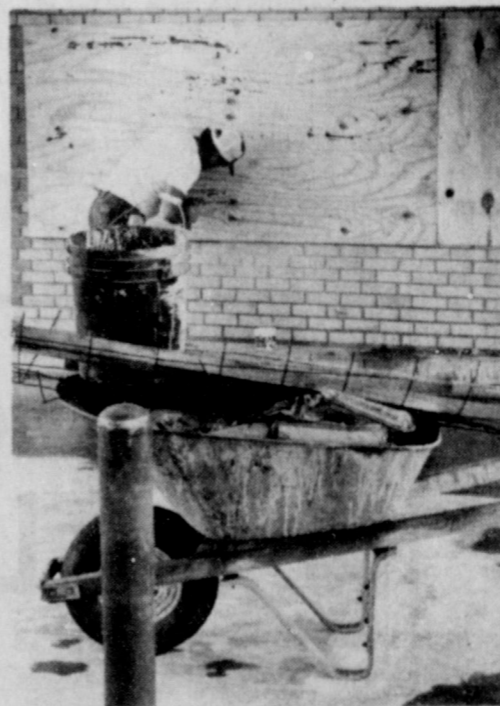

Tech team to compete in challenge

An Iowa Park High graduate is on a seven-member team of Texas Tech Univ. engineering students who have converted a pickup truck to run on natural gas to compete in the 1991 Society of Automotive Engineers Natural Gas Vehicle Challenge June 6-11 at the University of Oklahoma.

He is Steven Biddy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Biddy, a senior at Tech.

Other members are Mike Walser, senior from Canadian; Gary Bourne, Slaton junior; Bill Capshaw, Clear Lake City senior; Robert Steele, Dallas senior; and two May graduates, Joe Reed of Whitesboro and Chris Brune from Portland, Ore.

Pickup trucks were donated to 24 universities throughout the United States and Canada by General Motors Corp. The project focuses on reducing the nation's dependence on foreign oil and utilizing the natural gas reserves in Texas.

The Tech student team was selected to participate in the project last September after submitting a detailed proposal for a natural gas conversion method to the Society of Automotive Engineers, according to Tech faculty advisor Timothy Maxwell, associate professor of mechanical engineering.

The converted trucks have been undergoing extensive testing at the National Institute for Petroleum and

Energy Research (NIPER) in Bartlesville, Okla., since mid-May.

NIPER is examining the trucks for compliance with 1991 emission standards for light trucks. Tests also will be performed to evaluate fuel efficiency and cold-starting capability at minus 20 degrees Fahrenheit.

The teams, vying for prizes totaling approximately \$21,000, will be judged on conversion, emissions and fuel economy.

Points also will be awarded for vehicle performance in eight categories, including a 180-mile road rally at Oklahoma City Sunday and a 250-mile endurance run from the University of Oklahoma campus to Lake Murray, near Ardmore, beginning Monday.

All of the universities that outlined an efficient method of conversion will receive cash grants totaling \$5,000 from General Motors.

The trucks will be on display at the Norman campus Friday as student team members make oral presentations to a judging committee. General Motors engineers will perform General Motors Unified Test Standards on the trucks to assess the driving of a cold engine.

Throughout the day the vehicles will undergo acceleration tests at the Max Westheimer Airpark on the university's north campus. Teams also will compete in an against-the-clock

drag race with the vehicles carrying a 1,000-pound load in the truck's bed.

Walser, Tech's team captain, said natural gas is advantageous as an alternative fuel source because it is more efficient than gasoline and cheaper per unit. In addition, he said, the United States possesses a larger supply of natural gas.

"Unlike gasoline, natural gas cannot be wasted through vaporization because it is put directly into the tank under pressure. One of the primary problems with natural gas, however, involves the size and location of such a stout fuel tank," said Walser, adding that natural gas also is better for the environment because the fewer emissions result in cleaner air.

Sponsors for the alternative fuel project include the U.S. Department of Energy, Energy, Mines and Resources-Canada, Argonne National Laboratory, the Society of Automotive Engineers, General Motors, and the state of Oklahoma.

The grief of someone very near becomes very real. We wonder what would be the best way to express our love, sympathy, compassion, and understanding.

As we reach out to others, we must be ourselves. If this news of death shocks you, say so. If you feel tears, cry. One may be a Christian with a firm belief in eternal life, but death still hurts. Show and tell the bereaved of your pity and compassion.

Your quiet presence will be more appreciated than you ever know. The person who brings the most comfort is the one who simply comes and sits beside the mourner. The fine art of listening, answering briefly, and a prayer helps far more than most of us realize.

Those who comfort must have a heart full of wisdom and understanding. One does not come to quote verses or leave a mountain of pamphlets. They come to comfort simply because they care. There are few things that help heal the hurt more than a supportive embrace.

When I read John II, I am mindful of how Jesus Christ reacted when a friend died. Jesus simply took an angry rebuke, wept with those who were mourning, and stayed by their side. Jesus never made an attempt to correct misunderstanding nor did anything that suggested the disapproval of their actions. Jesus let grief run its full course. Perhaps this explains why so many are grieving and so few are comforting.

Discover The Joy

Former teacher born in 'Indian Territory'

Born 88 years ago in Indian Territory, Floyd Zion migrated to Texas in 1951 and spent the next 18 years teaching.

Thirteen of those years were spent in Iowa Park High School as a classroom teacher of Social Studies. The remainder of the 18 years were in Saint Jo as high school principal.

Rounding out his 40 years in the field of education when he retired here in 1969 were spent in Oklahoma as an administrator.

Now, almost 35 years after his arrival in Iowa Park he will be moving Friday to Sherman where he has relatives.

Zion will take up residence in a retirement home similar to Rolling

Meadows in Wichita Falls. He is in good health, but his relatives just would like to have him nearer. "I have always been fortunate to have good health, I've never been sick," Zion says proudly.

Since his retirement from the classroom Zion's efforts have been focused on working in his yard (which is evident by his well manicured lawn), gardening, and his church, First Presbyterian, which he has served 44 years as an elder in Texas and Oklahoma. He also has managed to do some traveling in the states, including Hawaii.

Members of the local First Presbyterian Church surprised Zion Sunday in honor of his 88th birthday

which was Friday, and as a farewell gesture.

"They really surprised me," Zion said. "I was under the impression we were just going to have lunch following the worship service. When I got to church there were about 25 of my relatives to greet me."

Several church members made speeches extolling Zion's work and dedication to First Presbyterian Church during his 35 years here and to express appreciation and admiration for him. They also presented him with a certificate of appreciation.

Zion was born the son of a peace officer in a rural area near what is now Durant.

He really can't tell the stories that some his age can about how far he had to walk to school. "I walked about a mile and a half one year before my family moved into Durant."

That is where he graduated high school and received his Bachelor Degree from Southeastern Oklahoma State College. For his Masters Degree he attended what was then Oklahoma A&M, now Oklahoma State University in Stillwater. He served 12 years as principal at Fort Towson and 10 years at Hugo, Okla., before he and his wife moved to Saint Jo. Then in August 1956 they moved to Iowa Park and never regretted it.

"My wife and I always taught school in the same town. She was an elementary teacher. She taught at Kidwell until her death in 1963," Zion said.

The former teacher and administrator always enjoys seeing former students and just this week he had a call from a school in Oklahoma wanting him to return for a reunion. "I would love to have gone," Zion said, "but because of moving I couldn't."

He says he can look with pride at most of his former students. "Many have gone on to pursue their livelihood in the professions of teachers, lawyers, doctors, or to excel in the business world," he commented. He has always been proud that so many who graduate in Iowa Park do so well on their college entrance exams.

Not only has the school plant made many changes since Zion came here, but the town also has seen many changes.

"For instance, when we built our house here in 1956 (at the corner of Pacific and Aldine) there were only four houses on the block. All the rest of the land north and west was in mesquites," Zion said.

Zion does not "live in the past," however he does like to reminisce occasionally.

He mentioned that when he was growing up "you either walked or rode a bicycle. I walked eight blocks to school. By comparison, now the school has to have a much larger

campus just to accommodate the students' cars. We had an hour off for lunch so had plenty of time to walk home for lunch and get back to school in time for class."

Zion said, "sometimes you hear people talk about the 'good old days' and really think they would have liked to live then, but I wonder.

"There were some good things about the early days, but very few would want to go back to the times I can remember. Like drawing or pumping water to be used for wash water, drinking and cooking water. You had to build a fire under a wash pot in the yard to heat water for washing. The women had to do the washing on a rub board, cook on a coal oil or wood stove and read and study by lamp light."

He recalled some things that seem strange or even humorous to the younger generations. The "crank" telephones with several on the party lines. If anyone on the line heard someone's "ring" and wanted to know what was going on they just picked up the receiver and listened. Zion remembered their ring was "two shorts and a long."

He also remembered that the telephones could be used as a source of entertainment. "My grandparents had a victrola. They called it 'a talking machine'. Everybody on their party line listened as they played the victrola. Another person had a fiddle and he would play fiddle music for the rest and another had a French harp and he would entertain for a while."

Zion said he was almost grown before his family had a radio. He remembers that a lumber yard got a radio and built some speakers on the roof so people outside the building could hear it. When there was a ballgame the area around the lumber yard would be filled with people listening.

As might be expected of someone who has spent so many years working with youth, both in the school system and through his work with the Presbyterian Church, Zion's concern is the youth of today and the future.

One of the things that was better in the "olden days" and later, Zion believes is the difference in the way children are growing up now.

"It is a concern of mine," he said. "My generation and several after grew up with both parents being home at night and seeing that we got our lesson assignments and help when we needed it, and had time to spend as a family."

"So many young people today are from broken homes and when a child gets home from school no one is there. The first thing a child usually does when he gets home is turn on the television, or does whatever else he wants to do.

"Most of the shows they watch

Burk man killed in wreck

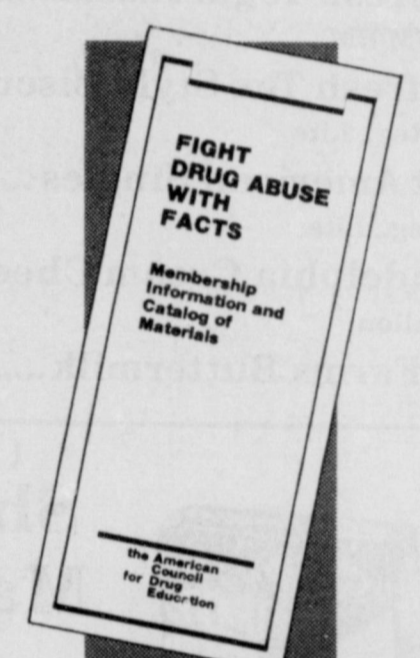
