Teenagers return \$3,950 to owner

Michael Williamson's faith in the younger generation is stronger than ever before. And he has good reason.

He lost a pouch containing \$3,950, his wallet and keys - and got them all back.

Thanks to 18-year-old Jackie Manry and his brother Cory, 14, of 506 E. Lafayette.

Williamson explained, he and his family were going to Wichita Falls Sunday to make a downpayment on a home. He had laid the pouch atop the family vehicle to assist in strapping the children in their seats.

And forgot it. The pouch stayed in its place, all the way from 612 S. Bond to the corner of Ruby and Bell.

That's where the Brothers Manry found it.

The boys opened the pouch, found the money and then located Williamson's drivers license. But it still had a Houston address.

They then decided to do the unexpected (based on comments of several interviews in town since the situation became known). They turned the pouch and all its contents in to the Iowa Park Police Dept.

"We searched the road, all the way from Wichita Falls back to here, the house, the yard and everywhere. About an hour and a half later, I was about to lose my mind, and as a last resort, I went to the police station," Williamson recalled.

His identification included in the billfold made determining ownership simple for police, and everything was returned to its owner.

Williamson, learning the names of the youths, went immediately to their home and rewarded them with \$100 ... and probably as many expressions of thanks.

Williamson, with his returned money safely in hand, went back to Wichita Falls Monday and made his intended downpayment.

Crews resume work on West Highway

Work was resumed this week on the Loop 370 (West Highway) reconstruction project, and if the weather cooperates it should be completed within two months.

Time was suspended and work halted during the winter and spring months to prevent undue hardships on businesses lining the route.

"We didn't want to get everything torn up, then have to stop because of bad weather and let the businesses suffer until the weather improved," said Ralph Self Jr., supervising resident engineer from Wichita Falls.

The \$530,328 project provides for

a continuous left-turn lane, structure widening, drainage and safety improvements. Zack Burkett Co. of Graham is the contractor.

Of the time allowed for the work, 89-percent of the time has been used. The project is 55-percent complete.

Should the contractor not finish the work on time, \$550 per day will be charged against the project, according to a highway department spokesman.

Field changes in the amount of \$75,000 have been added to further enhance drainage since the project was started. The limits of the project are from Johnson Road to Jackson.

Sales tax on utilities approved

The Iowa Park city council Monday night approved an ordinance that will lead to a one-percent sales tax on electric and natural gas sales here.

Iowa Park, according to Administrator Gary Jones, is the only city in this part of the state, and in a minority over the state, that does not already have the tax in force.

Jones explained the utility sales tax would help offset a loss of revenue caused by the closing of the two auto dealerships.

No comments were received during a required public hearing concerning annexation of two tracts of land into the city.

The city has been petitioned by owners of property at 401 E. Diamond and 1211 N. Bell Road seeking to be brought inside the city limits.

Two items on the agenda related to construction of the Recreational Activities Center.

One was awarding a bid for floor covering to Douglas Floor Co., lowest of two bids received at \$6,275. Materials included in the bid are carpeting for one meeting room and office, and tile

for the rest of the structure.

Also, authorization to advertise for furniture bids for the RAC was approved.

Aldermen approved the lowest of three bids to purchase a tractor for the water treatment plant. It was submitted by Construction Agricultural Supply Co. for \$11,966.

Payments for three projects that have been completed were approved: Vogel St. paving, \$35,318.19; landfill soil liner, \$44,707.97, and valley gutters, \$6,943.42.

No action was taken on renewing the city's group health insurance coverage with Security Life Insurance Co. of America, which has given notification of a 26-percent increase in premiums.

A search of other companies and their rates is being conducted, and action is expected to be taken at the June 24 meeting.

The insurance is provided by the city for all employees, and the current policy is to expire July 1.

George Roy told the council he has received almost five tons of glass and

aluminum cans since he opened his new business, Iowa Park Recycling Center.

He pointed out that the city's landfill has been spared at least 90 percent of that volume, since it likely would have been thrown in dumpsters.

A.D. Hambright asked that the council consider changing a part of its ordinance which prohibits possession of fireworks inside the city limits.

Besides disagreeing with the rule, Hambright told the council he plans to be involved in the operation of a fireworks stand this summer, and would like permission to take his stock home at night, rather than having to keep it in the roadside stand while it is closed.

The council agreed to have the topic on the June 24 agenda, but gave no

indication the ordinance would be changed.

The administrator gave a report on how much the city will have spent on completing the RAC building, after parking lot and other planned work has been finished.

Not including the shell structure which has already been paid for, Jones said an additional \$95,213 will have been expended out of the city's general operating fund.

It was predicted the general fund would be \$107,847 in the hole by the end of September.

However, Jones suggested that money could be transferred from the

Three men arrested

Three arrests were made this week by local police, including one for possession of a controlled substance and the other for public intoxication.

An officer stopped David Chris Wilson, 31, on a traffic check at 1:20 a.m. Wednesday in the 400 block of Texowa, and later found he had an amount of amphetamine sufficient for a second degree felony charge.

Wilson, it was learned, had been placed in the state hospital in Wichita Falls earlier, and left without authorization some time Saturday night.

He was released at 3:04 a.m. to a county deputy to be transported to the county jail, and later in the day was returned to the state hospital.

Another charge is being considered against Wilson. He reportedly spit in the face of an officer in the police station, according to Chief Wayne Parsons.

Bryan Wayne McMahon, 19, was arrested in the 200 block of South Bond at 1:50 a.m. Tuesday on a charge of public intoxication. He was released at 7:45 a.m. after signing a personal recognition bond, according to the police blotter.

The third arrest was Monday afternoon in the 400 block of South Victoria, when a complaint was received that a man had become uncontrollable and was tearing up the back yard of a home.

Officers arrested Johnny Wayne Owen, 30, who was found to have in his possession a set of num-chucks.

Owen, charged with disorderly conduct, was later released on a personal recognition bond.

Police received a complaint Friday morning from the 700 block of Johnson Road that someone had stolen a hood ornament from a Cadillac, valued at over \$20.

The Auxillary will be serving hot dogs, nachos and soft drinks.

The Knecht's lived in Farmington, N.M. seven years before moving back to Iowa Park over seven years ago. They built a new home here and say that is where they intend to stay.

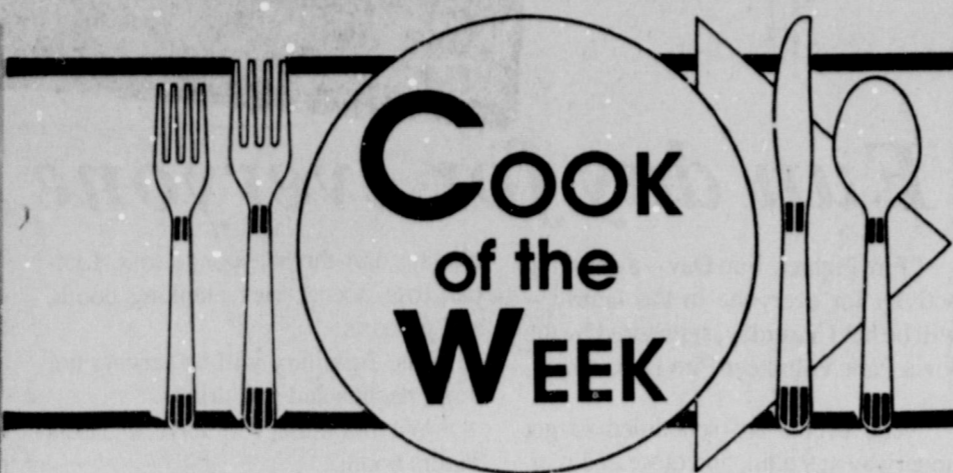
Jamie enjoys working in the yard and in the garden, and she cans or freezes most of the produce. Her other activities include sewing, crocheting, and playing with the grandchildren.

Cowboy Stew

1 1/2 lbs. ground chuck
1 bell pepper
1 onion
4-5 medium potatoes
2 cans kidney beans
2 cans whole tomatoes
Salt and pepper to taste
Chili powder to taste
Brown ground chuck. Add chopped onion and bell pepper, peeled and diced potatoes, and remaining ingredients. Cook on medium heat until potatoes are done. Serve with crackers.



COOK of the WEEK

Lasagna

1 1/2 lb. ground chuck
Salt and pepper to taste
2 cloves of chopped garlic
2 cans whole tomatoes
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1 - 8 oz. can tomato sauce
6 lasagna noodles
1/2 lb. Mozzarella cheese slices
1 - 12 oz. ctn. cottage cheese
Brown meat. Add garlic, salt and pepper and simmer 10 minutes. Add tomatoes and sauce, cover and simmer 30 minutes. Meanwhile, boil lasagna noodles in salted water; drain and rinse. Pour 1/3 meat sauce into large baking dish. Cover with layer of noodles, slices of Mozzarella cheese and spoonful of cottage cheese. Repeat, ending with meat sauce. Bake in 350 degree oven until cheese melts and is bubbly.

Pecan Pie Filling

3 eggs beaten
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
1/8 tsp. salt
3/4 tsp. vanilla
4 1/2 Tbsp. melted butter
1 cup pecans
Beat all ingredients until thoroughly mixed. Add pecans. Bake at 350 degree oven 45-60 minutes.

Crisco Pie Crust

1 1/3 cup sifted flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup Crisco
3 Tbsp. water
Sift flour before measuring; spoon lightly into measuring cup and level without shaking or packing down. Combine flour and salt in a mixing bowl. With a pastry blender or two knives cut in Crisco until uniform. Mixture should be fairly course. Sprinkle with water, 1 tablespoon at a time; toss with a fork. Work dough into a firm ball with your hands.

Press dough into a flat circle with smooth edges on a lightly floured surface. Roll dough into a circle about 1 1/2 inches larger than inverted pie plate. Gently ease dough into plate. Trim 1/2 inch beyond edge of plate, fold under and flute with fingers or fork.

Cherry Cream Pie

1 graham cracker crust
1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
2 Tbsp. powdered sugar
2 1/2 Tbsp. milk
Mix above ingredients and spread in graham cracker crust. Refrigerate 15 minutes. Sprinkle with pecans and spread small carton of Cool Whip on top. Add 1 can of cherry pie filling for final layer.

Tim Kaspar receives honor for academic achievement

James Kaspar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tim Kaspar and student at Iowa Park Junior High School, was honored for his academic achievement during a statewide ceremony Monday at Texas Christian Univ.

The ceremony is sponsored by the Duke University Talent Identification Program (TIP) to salute the seventh graders from Texas who qualified in the 11th annual TIP search.

All students invited to the ceremony earned scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and American College Testing Assessment (ACT) comparable to the average scores of college-bound high school seniors.

Kaspar, a Star Scout, was outstanding in math, science and band this year. He was first in science and math,

and second in dictionary skill, in the spring UIL academic contest.

TIP conducts recognition ceremonies in each of the 16 states it serves in the Southwest, Midwest and Southeast. Over 57,000 mathematically and verbally able seventh graders were identified by the program this year.

The program offers additional educational opportunities for gifted students in seventh through 10th grades.

Students receive certificates of distinction at the ceremony. The highest scorers receive summer program scholarships and books.

TIP is a non-profit educational organization established in 1980 with a five-year grant from the Duke Endowment. The program receives continuing support from student fees, individuals, corporations and foundations.

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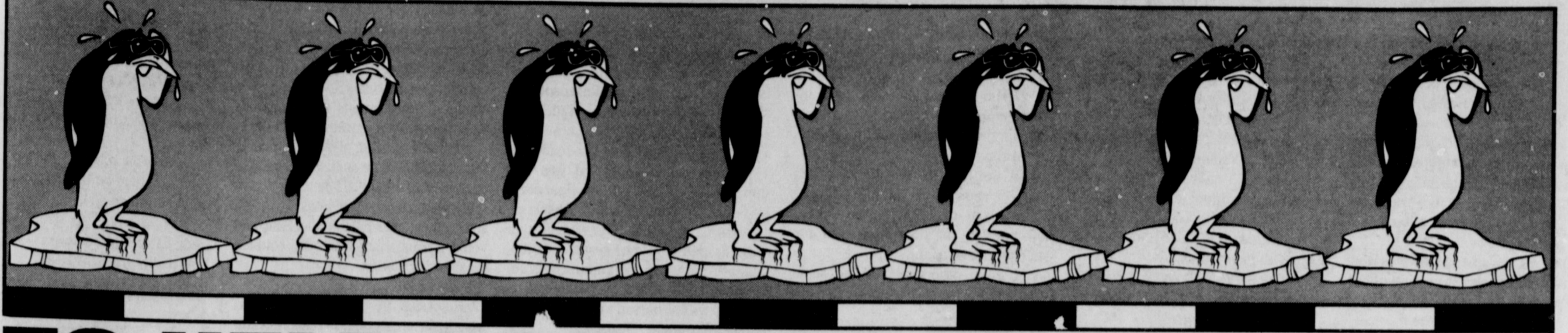

Trustee meeting set this evening

School trustees in their meeting this evening will spend a lot of time preparing for the 1991-92 school year, including revising the school calendar, appointing a member to the state-mandated County Education District and other related topics.

The meeting, normally held on the second Tuesday of each month, will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Legislation passed during the recent session in Austin extended the school year five days, to 180, and that was done after a tentative calendar had already been approved by the board.

The new calendar will reflect where those additional days will be scheduled.

The County Education District also was a feature of the school reform bill passed by the legislature. Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Electra and City View will each have one member on the board, while Wichita Falls will have two.

Local district boards will continue setting of policies of the respective districts, but the county district will have the responsibility of equally distributing the taxes to the respective districts.

A county-wide tax rate will be established by the county district, but individual districts are allowed to set rates above the county district for local enrichment and bond retirement.

Iowa Parkan enroute to West Africa

Culminating a series of plans, studies, preparations, and months of waiting for the right opportunity, Clark Waters departed Sunday enroute to Senagal, West Africa.

Clark flew to Chicago for a three-day orientation and his final inoculations before going to New York where he will enplane for a non-stop flight on Air Afrique to West Africa. Waters is looking forward to spending an exciting 26 months there.

He will be working with the Agricultural Architecture Program of the Peace Corps.

His first two months will be spent in Thies for intense training in the language (French in particular) and culture of the area where he will be working. "You don't live like an American," Clark remarked, and jokingly added, "I think they do give you a little more than a loin cloth, however."

From Thies he will move into the southwest edge of the Sahara Desert to work with a rural development program.

There he will introduce to the natives new seed hybrids for food staples. These varieties, with characteristics desirable for growth in the arid and semi-arid areas of West Africa, have been developed in America and Europe.

He will be teaching vernacular architecture. This primarily concerns demonstrating to the natives how to rethink the method of using adobe bricks that has traditionally been used for 2,000 years.

Research has been done specifically on the use of adobe bricks in the ceilings of vault domes such as are used for storage and other structures.

Waters commented, "They can make a brick for a penny and they have little else to do." He said peanuts is their primary staple crop.

He said the natives do a lot of fishing. "That might sound contradictory since the country is geographically located in the northwest part of the continent at the edge of the Sahara Desert, but the country has four rivers."

Waters explained that on one side is the Atlantic Ocean, to the south is jungle and the northern part is Savannah grassland. He added that the Desert is slowly creeping south.

Clark graduated Iowa Park High School in 1984 and Texas Tech University in 1989. At Tech he studied Land Planning.

He spent two summers of his undergraduate internship in Palm Springs, Calif., working for a golf re-

sort developer. Waters said, "That was when I decided there was something more to do in a desert than build golf courses."

He made his decision to pursue graduate work at International Center for Arid and Semi-Arid Land Studies at Texas Tech.

He received a travel stipend from CRSS Architects of Houston and circumnavigated the globe in 1989 and 1990, studying arid and semi-arid lands and returning at intervals to continue his post-graduate studies at Texas Tech.

While on his travels he studied vernacular architecture in Egypt, Morocco and China and golf course development in Ireland, Scotland and

Japan. Last year Clark made a trip across North Algeria and Morocco by camel.

He was invited to present a paper at the World Conference on Desertification in China, which was a work he did toward his Masters Degree.

This will be Waters' third trip to the Sahara Desert. He said, "The first time I will be able to leave Senegal will be in November when I will go to Timbuktu in the country of Mali. A camel trading caravan will be leaving at that time. Sometimes there are as many as 3,000 camels in a caravan." This also will be his first opportunity to journey on his own.

Clark decided some time ago that he wanted to join the Peace Corp, but he had to wait until a country with arid and semi-arid land "came up".

"I think serving with the Peace Corp is a good way to help another country and the natives as well as to gain more experience in my field," Waters said. "It also is a good way to get to go to other countries," he added.

Clark is a son of Ronnie Waters of Wichita Falls, Don and Judy Haselden of Columbia, S.C., and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Dwain Holmes of Wichita Falls and Mrs. R.E. Waters, Iowa Park.



Rinehart, Bennett tourney winners

Jim Rinehart and Dick Bennett were the two first place winners in the First Annual Iowa Park Golf Tournament, played Friday afternoon at the LaVista Country Club.

Forty three golfers, all residents or full-time employees of firms in the Iowa Park school district, participated in the meet which was sponsored by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

Tournament coordinators Robert Palmer and Bob Hamilton both said they were elated with such a large turnout for the event's initiation. Plans are already underway for the 1992 meet.

Despite a brief rain delay, Rinehart won the low gross category by shooting a 36-39=75.

Second place went to Earl Bennett, 76; third place, Mike Negri, 77, and Kent Lambert's 80 placed him fourth.

Low gross scores were determined by the Calaway scoring system, which is a formula for "throwing out" unusually-high scores on holes.

That's where Dick Bennett's game benefitted. He shot a 44 on the front side, with an eight on the number eight hole, and 51 on the back side, including a nine on hole number 16, for a gross 95.

After his handicap was figured in, Bennett had a net 68.

Second place net was Doug Johnson's 69, followed by Bart Jameson, also 69, and Robert Palmer, 70.

In cases of ties, such as Johnson and Jameson, their gross scores on the 11th hole, where Johnson had a five and Jameson a seven.

First through fourth place prizes in both gross and net categories were the same: \$90, first; \$72.50, second; \$45, third and \$22.50, fourth. All was in the form of script which is redeemable at participating Iowa Park businesses.

In addition, there were special prizes for longest drive on the first and 14th fairways, closest-to-the holes on the seventh and 16th greens, and also for the low net score shot by a female.

Jerry Cotterly had the long drive on number one, and Dolores Hamilton's drive on number 14 was the longest. Both received putters, donated by Robert Palmer.

Closest to the hole on number seven was won by Murfield and Rinehart had the winner on the 16th hole. Murfield received a dozen balls donated by Phil Welch, and Rinehart a putter.

Teresa Jameson's net 72 earned her a putter. Dolores Hamilton shot the low

gross score among the four women who played, 119.

Chamber of Commerce caps were given to the high male and female

scorers: David Collins, 123, and Patti Hughes, 128.

John David Padgett actually had the longest drive on the first hole, but

was not eligible to accept a prize because of his high school eligibility.
