Iowa Park, according to Administrator Gary Jones, is the only city in this part of the state, and in a minority over the state, that does not already have the tax in force.

Jones explained the utility sales tax would help offset a loss of revenue caused by the closing of the two auto dealerships.

No comments were received during a required public hearing concerning annexation of two tracts of land into

The city has been petitioned by owners of property at 401 E. Diamond and 1211 N. Bell Road seeking to be brought inside the city limits.

Two items on the agenda related to construction of the Recreational Activities Center.

One was awarding a bid for floor covering to Douglas Floor Co., lowest of two bids received at \$6,275. Materials included in the bid are carpeting for one meeting room and office, and tile

furniture bids for the RAC was ap-

Aldermen approved the lowest of three bids to purchase a tractor for the water treatment plant. It was submitted by Construction Agricultural Supply Co. for \$11,966.

Payments for three projects that have been completed were approved: Vogel St. paving, \$35,318.19; landfill soil liner, \$44,707.97, and valley gutters, \$6,943.42.

No action was taken on renewing the city's group health insurance coverage with Security Life Insurance Co. of America, which has given notification of a 26-percent increase in premi-

A search of other companies and their rates is being conducted, and action is expected to be taken at the June 24 meeting.

The insurance is provided by the city for all employees, and the current policy is to expire July 1.

George Roy told the council he has received almost five tons of glass and

He pointed out that the city's landfill has been spared at least 90 percent of that volume, since it likely would have been thrown in dumpsters.

A.D. Hambright asked that the council consider changing a part of its ordinance which prohibits possession of fireworks inside the city limits.

Besides disagreeing with the rule, Hambright told the council he plans to be involved in the operation of a fireworks stand this summer, and would like permission to take his stock home at night, rather than having to keep it in the roadside stand while it is closed.

The council agreed to have the topic on the June 24 agenda, but gave no indication the ordinance would be

The administrator gave a report on how much the city will have spent on completing the RAC building, after parking lot and other planned work has been finished.

Not including the shell structure which has already been paid for, Jones said an additional \$95,213 will have been expended out of the city's general operating fund.

It was predicted the general fund would be \$107,847 in the hole by the end of September.

FINAL PHASE OF WEST HIGHWAY WORK STARTED

Work was resumed this week on the Loop 370 (West Highway) reconstruction project, and if the weather cooperates it should be completed within two months.

Time was suspended and work haulted during the winter and spring months to prevent undue hardships on

businesses lining the route. "We didn't want to get everything torn up, then have to stop because of bad weather and let the businesses suffer until the weather improved," said Ralph Self Jr., supervising resident engineer

from Wichita Falls. The \$530,328 project provides for a continuous left-turn lane, structure widening, drainage and safety improvements. Zack Burkett Co. of Graham is the contractor.

Of the time allowed for the work, 89-percent of the time has been used. The project is 55-percent complete.

Should the contractor not finish the work on time, \$550 per day will be charged against the project, according to a highway department spokesman.

Field changes in the amount of \$75,000 have been added to further enhance drainage since the project was started. The limits of the project are from Johnson Road to Jackson.

James Kaspar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tim Kaspar and student at Iowa Park Junior High School, was honored for his academic achievement during a statewide ceremony Monday at Texas Christian Univ.

The ceremony is sponsored by the Duke University Talent Identification Program (TIP) to salute the seventh graders from Texas who qualified in the 11th annual TIP search.

All students invited to the ceremony earned scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and American College Testing Assessment (ACT) comparable to the average scores of college-bound high school seniors.

Kaspar, a Star Scout, was outstanding in math, science and band this year. He was first in science and math,

and second in dictionary skill, in the spring UIL academic contest.

TIP conducts recognition ceremonies in each of the 16 states it serves in the Southwest, Midwest and Southeast. Over 57,000 mathematically and verbally able seventh graders were identified by the program this year.

The program offers additional educational opportunities for gifted students in seventh through 10th grades.

Students receive certificates of distinction at the ceremony. The highest scorers receive summer program scholarships and books.

TIP is a non-profit educational organization established in 1980 with a five-year grant from the Duke Endowment. The program receives continuing support from student fees, individuals, corporations and foundations.







The amendment, if the bill is signed by the governor, would benefit five House members' retirement benefits.

The five, if they "retire" this year from the legislature, would receive \$18,314 annually.

Drafting the amendment was Rep. Nolan "Buzz" Robnett, a Republican from Lubbock. No, I don't know if he is

who is vacationing this week.

This jerk attached his provision onto a bill dealing with state employees' health and retirement benefits.

It provides for legislators who are And some of those elected officials 50 years old and have served 12 years to receive the retirement motherload.

Robnett, according to the article, has just turned 50, and has served just over 12 years. Sound suspicious?

Actually, I hadn't known that any elected legislator got a retirement. But the article says they do, if they have served 30 years and are 55, though it did not specify how much.

If that is true, no wonder our state is in such a financial situation. We keep on reelecting people to the job, which I had thought consisted of 180-day sessions every two years.

They, the legislators, have tried any number of times to have their \$7,200 annual salaries increased. Each time it is put to the voters, it is turned down.

I had no problem with their increasing their per diem a few years ago, knowing what housing and food costs

It's stuff like this that gives me even more encouragement to stay with my statement in this space recently, that I will not vote for the reelection of any state politician again.

I hope others are of the same opinion.

## Worth Quoting

You could almost hear the sound of backslapping from Austin here as legislators congratulated themselves on a "successful" session. Both the rookie Governor and Lt. Governor called it "very productive."

A closer look at what was accomplished during the past 180 days in the state capital would seem to nullify that notion. It, to paraphrase Shakespeare, was full of sound and fury, signifying nothing.'

Probably the most far reaching legislation gaining approval was the destruction of the school financing system. If the measure stands the test of the courts, it will forever change the way the public school systems of the state are run. Many communities will be forced to give up their local schools and students will be bussed to other schools in the multi-county districts.

This sweeping change will devastate many small towns. The loss of the payroll of the school system, usually the largest single employer, will hasten the depopulation of rural Texas.

Another legislative feat was the institutionalizing of gerrymandering. With firm control of both Houses of the Legislature and the Governor's office. Democrats have thrown off all pretense of equal apportionment of legislative districts. In addition to the traditional method of forming districts -- economic interests, geographical locations, etc. -the Legislature has added a new criteria. It is called euphemistically, "political

In layman's terms that phrase means protecting the districts for all the incumbent Democrats and forcing incumbent Republicans to run against each other. The result is new districts that are formed for political reasons and have little else in common. Court challenges have already been filed to contest the Democratic redistricting scheme.

In the waning hours of the session, an ethics reform bill was approved. Many have called it the "stealth" bill because no one read the complete measure before it was passed. Past midnight on the final day of the session changes, amendments and deletions were being made until the final tally.

Blindly casting their vote, many legislators had little or no idea what was contained in the bill. Only a few representatives, our own David Swinford among them, resisted the leadership and voted against such hurriedly cobbled together legislation.

The most outstanding trait of the 72nd session of the Legislature was what it did not accomplish. There is still no state budget for the next two years, or any idea of how that budget will be financed. Prison problems still plague the state, the mental health department is facing huge budget shortfalls and hundreds of other problems were left unresolved.

When the record of the Legislative session is totaled, there is no cause for backslapping or joy. The only positive

thing that can be said about this congregation of our lawmakers is that is over.







Legislation passed during the recent session in Austin extended the school year five days, to 180, and that was done after a tentative calendar had already been approved by the board.

The new calendar will reflect where those additional days will be scheduled.

The County Education District also was a feature of the school reform bill passed by the legislature. Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Electra and City View will each have one member on the board, while Wichita Falls will have two.

Local district boards will continue setting of policies of the respective districts, but the county district will have the responsibility of equally distributing the taxes to the respective

A county-wide tax rate will be established by the county district, but individual districts are allowed to set rates above the county district for local enrichment and bond retirement.

## Iowa Parkan enroute to West Africa

By Myrna Smith

Culminating a series of plans, studies, preparations, and months of waiting for the right opportunity, Clark Waters departed Sunday enroute to Senagal, West Africa.

Clark flew to Chicago for a threeday orientation and his final inoculations before going to New York where he will enplane for a non-stop flight on Air Afrique to West Africa. Waters is looking forward to spending an exciting 26 months there.

He will be working with the Agricultural Architecture Program of the Peace Corps.

His first two months will be spent in Thies for intense training in the language (French in particular) and culture of the area where he will be working. "You don't live like an American," Clark remarked, and jokingly added, "I think they do give you a little more than a loin cloth, however."

From Thies he will move into the southwest edge of the Sahara Desert to work with a rural development program.

There he will introduce to the natives new seed hybrids for food staples. These varieties, with characteristics desirable for growth in the arid and semi-arid areas of West Africa, have been developed in America and Europe.

He will be teaching vernacular architecture. This primarily concerns demonstrating to the natives how to rethink the method of using adobe bricks that has traditionally been used for 2,000 years.

Research has been done specifically on the use of adobe bricks in the ceilings of vault domes such as are used for storage and other structures.

Waters commented, "They can make a brick for a penny and they have little else to do." He said peanuts is their primary staple crop.

He said the natives do a lot of fishing. "That might sound contradictory since the country is geographically located in the northwest part of the continent at the edge of the Sahara Desert, but the country has four rivers."

Waters explained that on one side is the Atlantic Ocean, to the south is jungle and the northern part is Savannah grassland. He added that the Desert is slowly creeping south.

Clark graduated Iowa Park High School in 1984 and Texas Tech University in 1989. At Tech he studied Land Planning.

He spent two summers of his undergraduate interneship in Palm Springs, Calif., working for a golf resort developer. Waters said, "That was when I decided there was something more to do in a desert than build golf courses.'

He made his decision to pursue graduate work at International Center for Arid and Semi-Arid Land Studies at Texas Tech.

He received a travel stipend from CRSS Architects of Houston and circumnavigated the globe in 1989 and 1990, studying arid and semi-arid lands and returning at intervals to continue his post-graduate studies at Texas Tech.

While on his travels he studied vernacular architecture in Egypt, Morocco and China and golf course development in Ireland, Scotland and Japan. Last year Clark made a trip across North Algeria and Morocco by camel.

He was invited to present a paper at the World Conference on Desertification in China, which was a work he did toward his Masters Degree.

This will be Waters' third trip to the Sahara Desert. He said, "The first time I will be able to leave Senagel will be in November when I will go to Timbuktu in the country of Mali. A camel trading caravan will be leaving at that time. Sometimes there are as many as 3,000 camels in a caravan." This also will be his first opportunity to journey on his own.

Clark decided some time ago that he wanted to join the Peace Corp, but he had to wait until a country with arid and semi-arid land "came up".

"I think serving with the Peace Corp is a good way to help another country and the natives as well as to gain more experience in my field," Waters said. "It also is a good way to get to go to other countries," he added.

Clark is a son of Ronnie Waters of Wichita Falls, Don and Judy Haselden of Columbia, S.C., and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Dwain Holmes of Wichita Falls and Mrs. R.E. Waters, Iowa Park.





## **AREA OIL & GAS NEWS**

Robert F. Campbell, Jr., has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Wichita Regular Field. The No. 21 Karl Mertins "A" showed potential to pump 10 barrels of oil per day, plus 40 barrels of water.

The operator has 139 acres leased, with drillsite in the GC&SF RR Co. Survey A-365, nine miles east of Electra.

The well will produce from perforations in the Gunsight Formation, 1,376 to 1,384 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,900 feet.

The No. 4 Roller Estate has been written off as a dry hole in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles south of Burkburnett. Drilling got underway April 15 and went to total depth of 1,406 feet. The well will be plugged and abandoned. F.T. Johnson, Jr., was the operator.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 26 Wigley, a 1,990-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operation will be located 10 miles southwest of Iowa Park in a 160acre lease in the Patience Castleman Survey A-36. The operator is Mitchell Oil Co.

The No. 4 George, a 1,800-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field. Krot Oil Co., of Wichita Falls, is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 15-acre lease in the TE&L Survey A-292.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **AUGUST 10, 1991** 

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.





AUSTIN - After years of warnings and criticism, Texas stands on the brink of tax reform, prodded by a \$5 billion deficit to be resolved in next month's special session.

Reform does not mean lower taxes; at best lawmakers are expected to spread the tax burden around a bit to make it more equitable.

A key player will be the freshman tax collector, Comptroller John Sharp, who last week proposed an overhaul of state business taxes.

He calls it the "Texas Business Tax."

Sharp wants to replace the corporate franchise tax, which takes \$5.25 per \$1,000 of taxable capital and surplus, with a tax based on business activity, modeled after Michigan law.

Sharp predicted 207,000, including 14,000 partnerships and 33,000 sole proprietorships, would pay the new tax. Currently 275,000 businesses pay the franchise tax.

#### Taxes, Cuts & Mergers

Sharp hasn't recommended a tax rate, and small firms would be exempt, but a 2.39 percent rate like Michigan's would likely raise \$2.1 billion in the first two years.

The remaining \$3 billion might be raised by a new state income tax proposed by fearless Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

The political formulas will remain foggy until its done, but

the leadership is resolved to rely on a combination of new taxes, budget cuts and state agency mergers to balance state books.

#### State to Buy SBA Loans

The state will purchase \$50 million in Small Business Administration guaranteed loans in an effort to spur growth of small ventures in Texas, State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison announced last week.

Hutchison also unveiled a series of other initiatives aimed at spurring the growth of small businesses statewide.

"We want to help open capital markets to small businesses so that we can have economic development within Texas," Hutchison

The State Treasury will work with the Texas departments of Commerce and Agriculture, Texas Chamber of Commerce, Independent Bankers Association and other groups to spread the word on financing assistance.

Representatives of those agencies will travel the state, holding seminars in 15 Texas cities. The program will start in Midland and Odessa on June 15 and end in Amarillo on Oct. 18.

#### **Companies Leave Texas**

Two major insurance companies are pulling back from the Texas workers' compensation insurance troubled market.

Ohio Casualty is pulling out entirely and ITT Hartford will not be renewing coverage for small businesses this summer. Both companies cited losses and the assigned risk-pool expenses.

Company officials said a recent court decision, which held unconstitutional the current law limiting jury trial awards, was discourag-

#### Lone Star in U.S.S.R.

The flag of the Lone Star State will stand somewhere in Moscow, once prominent Texan Robert Strauss is installed as the new U.S. ambassador to the Soviet Union.

President Bush, in naming

Strauss, made a bipartisan choice of a Democrat with credentials few in either party can match.

A top power-broker and versed in world trade, Strauss was a Mideast envoy under President Carter, a former national chairman of the Democratic Party, and has the largest Texas-based law firm in Washington.

#### White vs. Perot

Attorneys for former Gov. Mark White and Dallas businessman H. Ross Perot will face each other in court next month over a \$2.5 million letter of credit.

Ironically, White and Perot as allies were the two top principles on the political team which rammed the controversial HB 72 education reform through the Legislature in the mid-80s.

Perot's company supplied the letter of credit to back up a \$5.1 million loan White used to buy a Beaumont radio station last year.

Now the company wants to withdraw the letter, claiming that White still has not paid \$7,800 in fees under the agreement. White argues Perot's collection procedures were not proper.

#### Other Highlights

· Gov. Ann Richards signed a major insurance regulatory bill last week and then said she will bring the Legislature back to Austin next year to tackle the issue of health insurance.

 Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry launched his campaign to process Texas-grown farm and ranch goods in new plants here, not out-of-state. By exporting our raw commodities, we are, in effect, exporting jobs, opportunities and dollars that would otherwise go into Texans' pocketbooks," Perry said.

• Here's a new twist: Federal law allows Indian tribes to operate casino gambling on their land, if a state allows casino gambling anywhere within its jurisdiction, a Connecticut judge has ruled. Now, Indian tribes in Texas say they might open casinos if the Legislature allows cruise ships gambling in Texas waters.




