Police keep busy answering domestic disturbance calls

Domestic disturbances over the past weekend led to the arrests of three persons, according to police blotter entries.

Officers were called to a home in the 300 block of West Pecan at 9:36 p.m. Friday, where they arrested Antela Sue Gregory, 18, on a Class C assault under the family violence code. She was later released after signing a personal recognizance bond.

At 11:16 p.m. Saturday, Eric Wayne Tidwell, 21, was taken into custody when police were called to the 300 block of East Washington. He was taken to county jail, but later released when family members refused to press charges.

A Class C assault charge was lodged against Paul Anthony Carter, 25, when police were called to the domestic disturbance in the 600 block of South Park at 12:13 a.m. Sunday. Carter was later released after signing a personal recognizance bond.

A man and wife were arrested Monday evening on charges of failing to identify to a police officer.

Police were checking into a reported bicycle theft in the 700 block of South Victoria Monday afternoon, and the two persons initially gave false identifications to the officers.

The charge was dropped against Leroy Hoof, 48, when it was determined an outstanding warrant had been issued for his arrest in Tarrant County for issuing hot checks.

But the charge remained on Barbara Hoof, 32, police said.

He was taken to county jail, and she was released after signing a personal recognizance bond.

Gloria Pulley, 31, was arrested Tuesday afternoon of last week on a warrant issued locally. She is alleged to have passed a forged check at a local grocery store in November.

After appearing before Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson, she was placed in the county jail under a \$1,500 bond.

Herschell Lynn Reynolds, 26, turned himself into police Tuesday of last week to face a charge of fleeing police on Dec. 29.

Reynolds also has an outstanding warrant issued against him by the Hayes County sheriff for criminal non-support, police said.

He was taken to the county jail after JP Robinson set his bond at \$500.

Three thefts and one burglary of a habitation were reported to police since Dec. 29.

Two young unidentified males were believed to have taken more than \$20 from purses Dec. 30 while services were underway at the First United Methodist Church. No arrests have yet been made in that case.

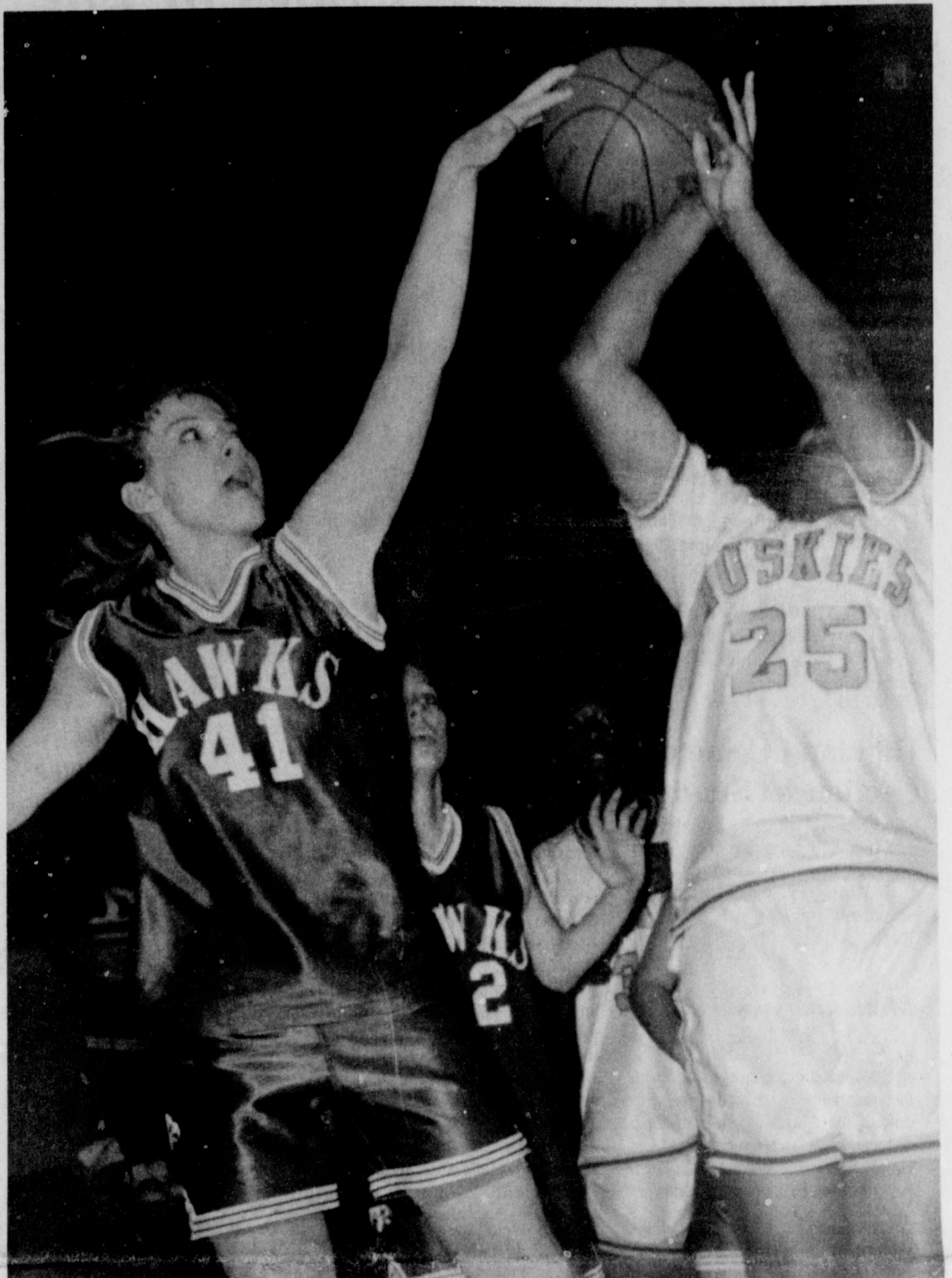
A 30.06 rifle was reported Thursday as having been stolen from a residence in the 700 block of South Victoria.

Lady Hawks to begin title defense Friday

The Lady Hawks will carry a two-game winning streak into their Dist. 4-AAA opener Friday night at Breckenridge.

They will return home Tuesday to host Vernon.

At Breckenridge, the varsity team will follow Freshman and Junior Varsity games, with the opener set to start at 5 p.m.

Defeating a pair of Class AAAA like Burkburnett and Hirschi could be major confidence builders as they begin defense of their conference crown.

The Lady Hawks knocked off the Lady Bulldogs at Burkburnett Friday night, in a tight defensive contest, by a 29-25 margin.

Burkburnett led 6-4 at the end of the first quarter, but Iowa Park claimed a 12-11 lead at the half, and extended that to 21-16 as they entered the final period of play.

Marcy McCarthy led scoring with 12 points.

Tuesday night's contest against Wichita Falls Hirschi looked like it might be a runaway for the Lady Hawks, as they jumped out to an 18-10 lead by the end of the opening period.

But from that point on, Iowa Park had to fight off a determined challenge by the hosts, who outscored the Lady Hawks 16-9 in the second quarter to trail by only 27-26.

The Lady Huskies, down 44-34 as the game entered its final period, put on a determined rally, but fell short to Iowa Park, 59-58.

Misty Cook and McCarthy both had 13 points for Iowa Park, and Cheri Halady was close behind with 12.

Playing an unscheduled game here last week, the Lady Hawks again fell victim to Holliday by a 52-46 margin.

As was the case of their Dec. 20th game, Holliday surged into the lead in the final quarter after trailing Iowa Park

38-32 at the start of the period.

Melody Gray was high for Iowa Park with 12 points.

The Lady Hawk Freshmen extended their season record to 13-0 Tuesday night with a 38-32 win over Hirschi. Friday, the club ran all over Burkburnett, 37-14.

Jodi Young and Brandi Catlin each

scored eight points against Burkburnett, while Ginger Taylor and Mandy LaBriar led the Frosh against Hirschi, racking up 12 and eight points, respectively.

The Junior Varsity also had an easy time against Burkburnett, winning by a 42-28 margin.

But that was not the case Tuesday at Hirschi, where they couldn't find the bottom of the basket and lost 44-29.

Water line replacement to cause brief outages

Residents in the 300 block of East Aldine will experience a brief outage of water service next week.

City workers are to replace the old, original water line serving that area, according to Mike Price, Public Works director.

This will be the first of 15 similarly-scheduled projects being undertaken to upgrade water service, as well as replace water protection services within the city.

Beginning Tuesday morning, the water maintenance crew will replace a one-inch line with a six-inch line in the 300 block of East Aldine.

Once the larger line is in place, it will be connected with a 14-inch main on North Bond.

Following that, the crew will begin to tie in the residences with the new line, thereby keeping the time of lost service to a minimum of approximately two hours, Price explained.

Replacement of old lines and fire plugs is a project being pursued to lower the fire insurance key rate for all residents of the city.

Since the city council initiated the program, the key rate here has been lowered three cents per \$100 of property valuation, Price said.

Commodity recipients must register

Residents who will be receiving U.S.D.A. food commodities this year must register Thursday at the First Christian Church.

Registration and distribution of commodities will be from 12-noon until 6 p.m.

To register, residents must have with them the following information:

1. Proof of address, such as a utility bill or something with address on it.

2. Identification for receiving food stamps, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Medical Assistance Only (MAO), or AFDC.

3. If none of the benefits in paragraph 2 are received, an applicant must be able to prove his/her gross monthly income.

Registration is required, even for those who registered and received food commodities in 1991.

COUNCIL MEETING MONDAY

Bids, projects tops on agenda

Action on bids and two major project proposals will highlight the first meeting of the council this year.

The council, which has not met since Dec. 9 because of the holidays, is to begin at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Major projects to be considered are a lagoon near the sewer treatment plant and the city's assuming of right of way through Park West Shopping Center, in the 400 block of West Park.

A lagoon at the sewer treatment plant, if a proposed plan is approved by the state, would be dug so raw sewage could be stored there for brief periods while major maintenance is done to the

plant itself.

Equipment in the plant has worn badly because it has never been shut down for repairs after more than 20 years of continuous operation, aldermen were told during their December meeting.

The city's engineer, Kerry Maroney, said all sewage intake would have to be stored elsewhere while repairs were made. The sewage stored in the lagoon would then be pumped into the plant for processing.

Key to the proposed project, however, is whether the lagoon's use will be approved by state regulators, Maroney explained.

The council Monday night will consider giving Administrator Gary Jones authority to immediately commence work on the lagoon when and if the state's approval is given.

Construction of the lagoon is estimated to cost several thousands of dollars.

However, Maroney told the council that if the plant's equipment were to ever cease operating and raw sewage were released, the city would be liable to many more thousands of dollars in

finances and penalties.

Whether the city will assume the right of way through the heart of the shopping center, to extend West Park from Colorado to Pacific, also was discussed during the council's last meeting.

Aldermen asked for more definite plans on how the street would be identified through the parking lot, and those details, as well as others, are expected to be presented Monday.

Council members also are expected to authorize Administrator Jones to advertise and accept bids on: three-year contract to audit financial records; renovation of the water plant; additional sewer lines, and leasing grazing rights at Lakes Buffalo and Iowa Park.

The council will be asked to approve expenditure of at least \$500 as the city's share to renovate a freight elevator at the County Annex in Wichita Falls.

The amount, if approved, would be the city's share of the portion to be paid on the project by the County Tax Appraisal District. It was explained last

Under the watchful eye of their leader, Patti McLemore, and co-leader Wanda Phillips, the girls go on campouts where they cook over an open fire; do research projects such as investigating why Iowa Park is a bird sanctuary; and, every Monday afternoon they take down the American flag at Bradford Elementary. Butterscotch Cookies

- 3 cups sifted flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1 cup butter

- 2 cups brown sugar, firmly packed
2 eggs
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Cream butter and sugar. Add egg and mix well. Add flour and baking powder. Shape into two rolls, about two inches in diameter, and chill thoroughly. Slice 1/4-in. thick. Place on ungreased baking sheet and bake at 350 degrees 5 to 6 minutes. Makes about 6 dozen.

- 1 1/2 lbs. hamburger
1 - 24 oz. can tomatoes
1 can tomato paste
1/2 tsp. garlic salt
1 1/2 tsp. salt
3/4 tsp. pepper
1 tsp. oregano
8 lasagna noodles
16 oz. cottage cheese
3 - 4 oz. pkgs. Mozzarella cheese
1 large can Parmesan cheese

Brown meat; drain; add tomatoes and seasonings. Simmer 30 minutes. Cook noodles; drain. Place 1/2 of meat in bottom of pan. Add 4 noodles, 1/2 cheese, meat, noodles, and cheese. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

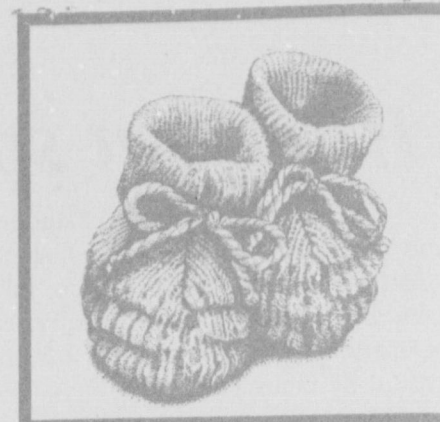

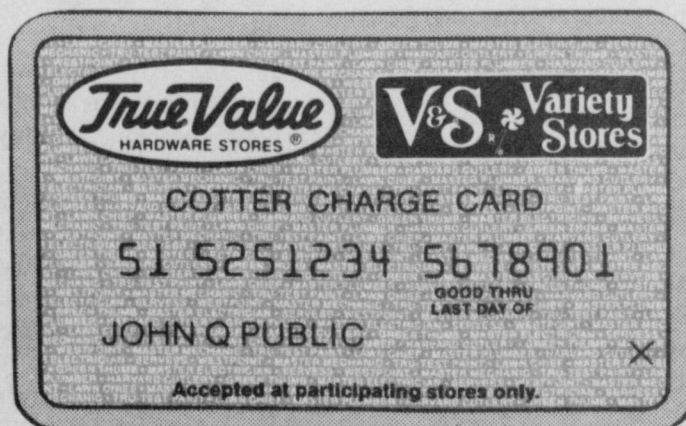

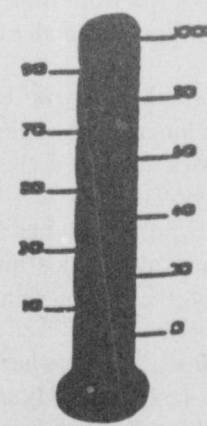

I feel like a teenager who's had a love affair gone sour. I'm frustrated and confused. And it's all because of the Wise County seat of Decatur. That community just a few miles down the road has almost the same population as Iowa Park. Yet, they've got three -- count 'em -- three new car dealerships, and we don't have a single one. Not anymore, anyway. I'm not confused as to what happened to our's. I think I know. But my confusion is, at the exact time the nation's three major automobile manufacturers are crying the blues

about how bad sales are nationally, Decatur's dealers are going great guns! Those three dealers in Decatur, all of whom deal primarily in American-made automobiles, report their sales just the opposite as the manufacturers. Decatur's dealers, according to the Sunday, Jan. 5 issue of the *Wise County Messenger*, had a 51-percent increase in sales over 1991. They sold a total -- at least those sold and registered in that county -- of 7,508 new vehicles in 1991! Obviously, not everyone in that city of some 5,900 didn't purchase more than one vehicle apiece. No, those dealers went out and got the sales, many of which were to major

rental companies. They didn't sit on their behinds, like so many others I can name, and cry about how bad the economy is. Decatur has aggressive dealers. I've commented in this space long before now that the *Messenger* has more automobile advertising than any other weekly in Texas. I stand by that statement. My hat's off to those three Decatur businesses. Maybe they should package their business operations and sell it to others, not just vehicle sales places. The lesson that can be learned from them is that we can do better. We just have to work harder at it.

Worth Quoting

If it wasn't so deadly serious, it would be comical. The light went on in Washington this week and our duly elected representatives acted just like the cockroaches in your garage -- they went scurrying hither and yon, helter-skelter in all directions. The politicians woke up to the fact that the national economy is dead in the water. It's going nowhere. Normally, that's not a subject that bothers many people in the nation's capital, insulated as they are from the normal worries of us people in the boonies. But next year is election year and that's a full time subject in Washington. A recession in the middle of an election year is about as welcome as sunshine at hog-killing time. So suddenly, our leaders in Washington are scurrying around, dreaming up tax cuts for the middle-income segment of the population. It's a segment that is as forgotten, as ignored as the endangered species of white, male, protestant. And the august body, the board of governors of the Federal Reserve, are thinking seriously about cutting the interest rate again. Big deal! We've got news from the boonies for the folks in Washington. A \$300 cut in income taxes for the average worker is not gonna jump-start the economy. Another cut in the interest rate is not gonna send consumers out en masse on another buying spree. The consumer is worried sick about his job. Read the headlines. Every day, major blue-ribbon companies are announcing additional layoffs. They read like the who's who of American business: Halliburton, Exxon, Wal-Mart, Ford, General Motors, Chrysler, Amoco, Oryx, Sears, banks, oil companies, retailers, real estate firms, manufacturers, investment houses -- all announce layoffs daily. The only segment of our population that isn't laying off people and trimming down are our tax-supported institutions at the local, state and national level. The private sector is laying 'em off and the public sector is hirin' 'em! And we're gonna jump-start the

economy with a \$300 tax cut? We had a good friend last week that gave up the ghost. He was an aggressive, experienced, businessman with a pocketbook sufficient to expand, to enter new markets, and hire more people. But he quit! He quit because he simply no longer could cope with the ever-increasing rules and regulations of EPA, OSHA, EEOC, and the overwhelming costs of worker's comp, health insurance, and business taxes. He sold out to a firm that will probably follow the normal pattern after a merger, sale, or buyout. Outlets will be closed, jobs will be eliminated, and the business will be restructured in order to service the enormous debt. If Congress really wants to get the economy moving again, we have the solution. Simply put a five-year freeze on regulators. The growing army of regulators seeking to enforce hair-brained, unproven, untested, unwarranted, unscientific safeguards dreamed up by anti-establishment pointy-headed liberals sporting rubber-banded pigtails is slowly strangling the country and its economy. A good case in point is the oil industry. By the end of this decade, the major oil companies of this nation will not be operating in the United States. They're moving out! They're moving out of Andrews, out of Texas, out of the country. And good reason!

Why should they continue to operate here with costs approaching \$12 per barrel when they can move overseas and produce crude oil at roughly \$2 per barrel. Locally, we know from experience that major oil companies have operated responsibly as far as development and the environment and have been good corporate citizens. Little wonder that they're leaving - and taking needed jobs with them. Congress ought to realize that it's hard to worry about saving the earth when the belly's empty, the rent's due, the baby's sick, and last year's taxes are unpaid. Year's permit total reported

Construction of any kind was almost at a standstill here during the final month of 1991, according to building permits issued by city hall. Of the \$40,416 total for the month, almost half that amount was included in one permit, for a business renovation. Thanks to the \$182,050 permit total in November, the year's total came to \$795,375. Permits issued during December included: Howard Smith, 807 Vogel, alteration, \$1,100; M.C. 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A QUESTION OF SAVING LIVES

At this time of the year especially, the Red Cross is in need for people to give blood that others may live. I am also mindful of some religious sects who teach to receive a blood transfusion is sinful and in the place of blood seek to substitute okra juice. What does the Bible teach about blood anyway?

God clearly forbid the eating of blood, both in the Old Testament (Lev. 17:10) and in the New Testament (Acts 15:29). One reason given is that found in Genesis 9:4, "flesh with the life thereof, which is the blood thereof shall you not eat." Moses later told Israel, "only be sure that you eat not the blood: for the blood is the life; and you may not eat the life with the flesh." (Deut. 12:23). Because the life is in the blood to eat the blood is to show contempt for the giver of the life. This is the point about eating blood, it shows contempt for God, our Creator and Giver of life. Many of those who worshiped idols drank blood, or ate food with blood in it, as part of their pagan worship.

In Mark 3 the people seek to trap Jesus desiring to see if He would heal a man on the Sabbath day. Their reasoning was if Jesus did, He would violate the Sabbath. Jesus knew their thoughts and asked a thought provoking question, "is it lawful on the Sabbath day to do good, or to do harm? to save a life, or to kill?" (Mark 3:4). In the following verse Jesus healed the man because the laws of God were never designed to prohibit the doing of good. Why not ask that same question regarding a blood transfusion? A blood transfusion does not show disrespect for life or for the Giver of life! If a blood transfusion will save a life and many times it will, then the thoughts of Jesus in Mark 3:4 will authorize it.

The eating of blood is surely not the same as blood transfusion. One dishonors God; the other seeks to show respect for life and seek to sustain life. Jesus knew those who are sick need a physician. (Luke 5:31). The doctor may prescribe a diet, or medicine, or a blood transfusion. All have the same purpose: to aid in the healing process and preserve life.

A combination of apparent fatigue and loss of one of their tallest players, Jon Hankins, via the foul route, made all the difference in Tuesday's game here against Burkburnett.

The Hawks had trailed 19-15 and 36-28 at the first two rest periods, but they rallied with a 15-8 run in the third

to go into the final time frame trailing by only one, 44-43.

Iowa Park had led for a brief period, 42-41.

Most of Burk's fourth-quarter scoring came in the final three minutes.

Carroll had the hottest hand for the Hawks, racking up 21 points. Mark Childs was close behind with 15.

The Junior Varsity defeated Electra 41-31, but fell victim, 44-29, to the Bulldogs.

The Hawks, JV and Frosh will host impressive clubs from Seymour Friday, with the first game starting at 4:30 p.m.

A feature of the evening will be the introduction of junior high players.

Monday, the three teams are to travel to Childress as their final non-conference games before taking on Bridgeport.

The girls' teams swept all four of their contests, and the boys' won one.

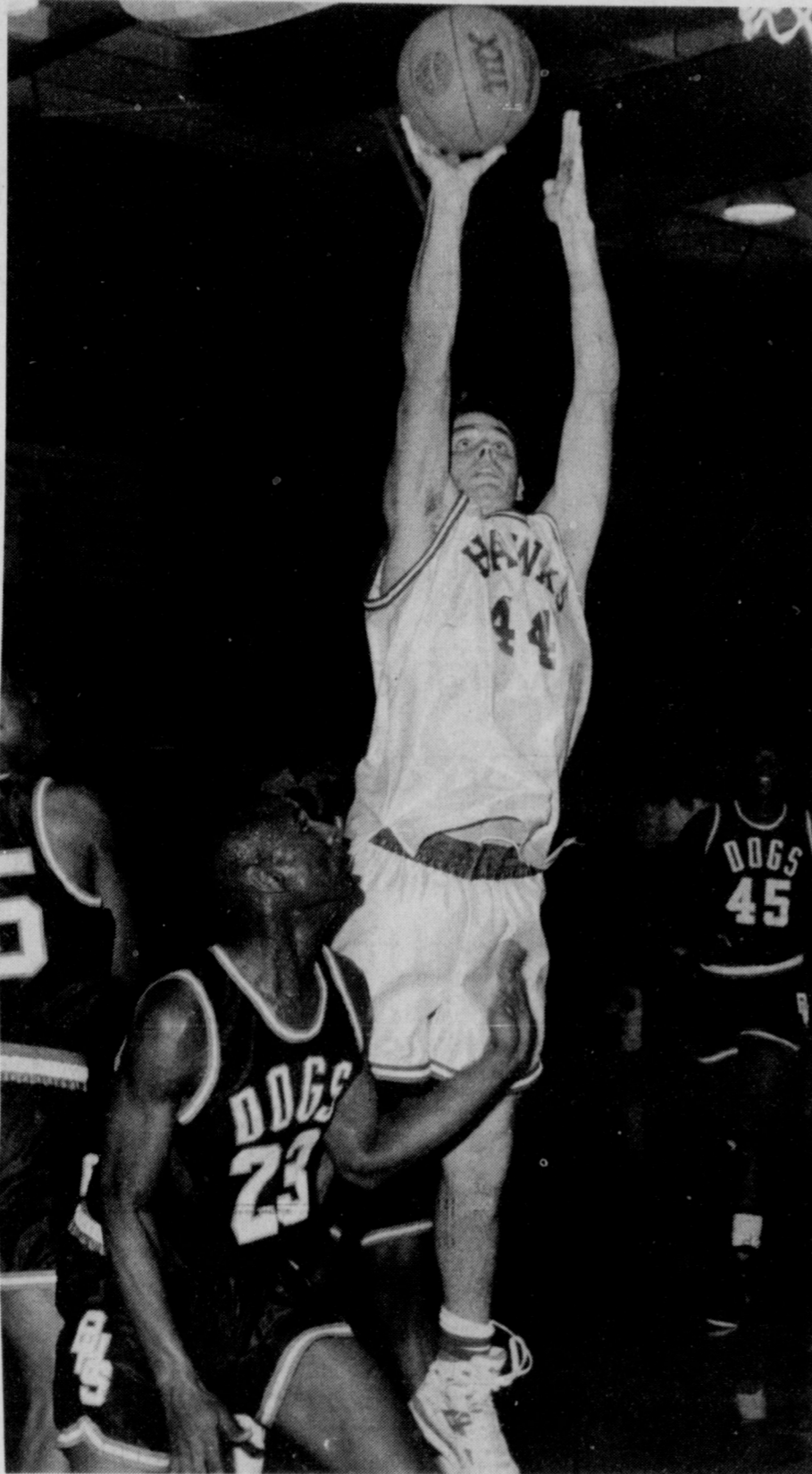

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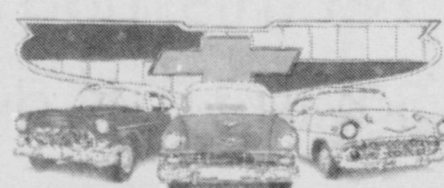

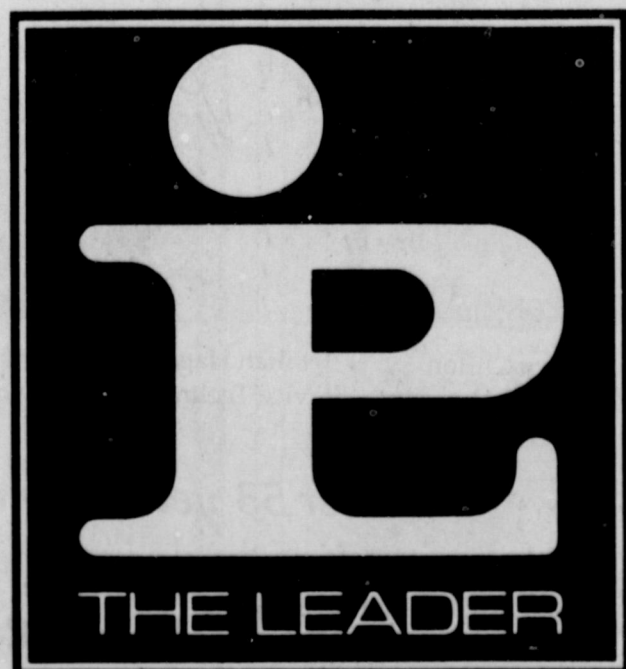

Finally, when his unadvertised business goes under, he will advertise it for sale.

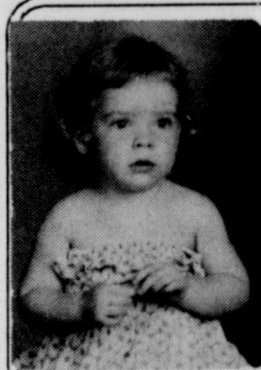

Kenedy was named Fireman of the Year and Jones received the Special Service Award.

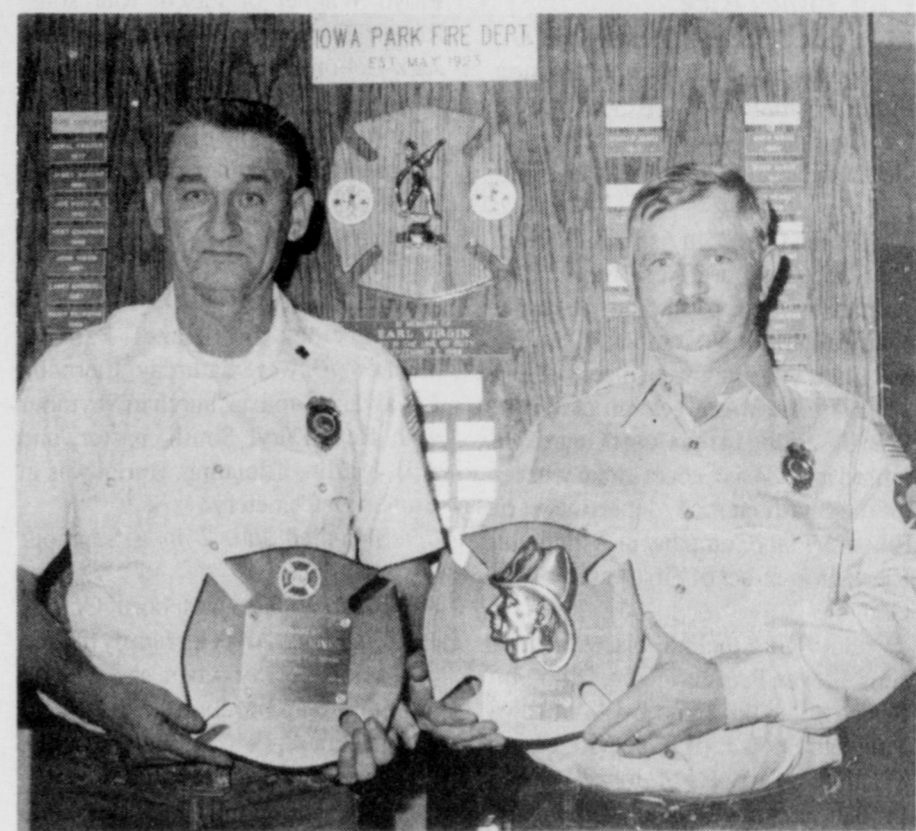

Thank you for considering me for the position of County Commissioner Precinct 3 on the ballot on March 10th.

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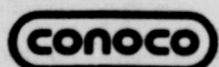
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
