

Christmas lights go on tonight

The city's Christmas lights will be officially turned on tonight.

A brief ceremony will begin at 7:00 at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, and the switch will be thrown.

As the ceremony winds down, Santa Claus is to make his appearance. He will go into the library and visit with each of the youngsters wishing to tell him what they want for Christmas.

Entertainment during the ceremony will be provided by members of the Iowa Park High Mean Green Band, and the Rockin' Hawkettes.

City crews began putting the lights and decorations up this week, and all is expected to be ready for tonight.

Residents will notice the addition of several new fixtures around town. Five additional blocks of decorations have completed West Highway, all the way to US 287; one block on Pacific, near the expressway; two blocks on South Wall, and three more poles lit in the Post Office area.

The new lights, as well as all those that have been on display the past few years are purchased by voluntary do-

nations of Iowa Park residents.

Those donations are in the form of at least 10 cents added to each month's city utility bill. Many residents, however, have increased their monthly amounts.

Besides purchasing of additional decorations each year, there is a major expense necessitated for the replacement of bulbs.

The purchases and decisions of where decorations will be located are made by a citizen committee headed by Mrs. Phil Welch.

Harold Smith, TU Electric manager, explained a fuse blew out, leaving the northeast and southeast portions without service "about 10 minutes."

"blink" in service, which caused problems for computer operators.

"Luckily, we had a service man who was pretty close, and he was able to get it (fuse) replaced quickly," Smith said.

No cause for the fuse to blow has been found, and Smith said it apparently was the result of a worn-out fuse.

Jackson, 26, is a 1983 graduate of Iowa Park High School. Patterson, according to a school spokesman, dropped out of the school as a freshman.

The incident took place in the parking lot of Fast Eddie's, at 1621 Enterprise, in Wichita Falls.

About 12:30 a.m. Saturday, Patterson's Monte Carlo reportedly struck Jackson, severely injuring his head.

Patterson reportedly left the scene, and a pursuit ensued with city, county and state officers joining in the chase that ended in Clay County after two tires were shot out.

Patterson was released Saturday after posting a \$15,000 bond.

Icy road blamed for wreck

A mild winter storm struck Sunday, preceded on Friday by high winds.

Freezing rain began falling just before sunrise on Dec. 1, and turned into light sleet.

The only accident attributed to the freezing wet conditions, according to local law authorities, was early Monday morning.

A four-wheel vehicle driven by Andy Cravens, with Jolene Hodges, began to spin as it crossed the FM 368 bridge over the Wichita River, and crashed into a tree.

Miss Hodges sustained minor head injuries when she struck the windshield. She reportedly required a few stitches in her chin.

Both live in the Valley View area and are students at Iowa Park High School. The incident was reported at 8 a.m.

Shortly after the accident, a high-

way department sanding truck arrived on the scene. The driver explained he had not been able to reach that particular crossing earlier.

While most of the frozen precipitation on the ground thawed Sunday, the ice on trees, fences and roofs wasn't melted until Monday.

Virgil Woodfin reported he measured .25 of an inch of moisture from the precipitation.

Winds gusting higher than 50 mph Friday uprooted at least two large trees in the city. They were in yards on Pacific and Dosa.

Neither fallen tree caused major damage.

Landfill stickers may rise

The ever-increasing cost of throwing away garbage will be one of the topics on the city council's agenda Monday night.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Aldermen will consider an ordinance increasing the fee for a landfill permit sticker for residents to \$12. The fee has for several years only been \$2.

Bids to purchase two vehicles will be considered. One vehicle will be for the Public Works director, while the other will be for the water meter reader.

The third and final public hearing required for annexation of a nine-acre tract of land in the south part of town will be held, followed by action on an ordinance finalizing the process.

Aldermen will consider extension of Park Avenue through the 400 block,

now part of Park West Shopping Center's parking lot.

Also to be considered is a proposal to spend up to \$5,000 for park equipment.

Since the next regular council meeting would fall two days before Christmas, aldermen indicated at their last meeting an interest to cancel it. Action is called for on this meeting's agenda.

Administrator Gary Jones will discuss at least seven issues before the council, including an updating of landfill regulations, sewer plant, a request for de-annexation, committee formation for Americans with Disabilities Act self evaluation, grant application for sewer upgrading, centralized collection for city taxes, and telephone service improvements.

A first prize of \$50 in script will be awarded to the winners of two categories: religious and non-religious. The script can only be redeemed with Iowa Park merchants.

Beginning in January, a new word will be used to help teach an ancient concept - mathematics.

The new word is "Kumon." It was developed in Japan by Toru Kumon, a math teacher, and presently 1.8 million students in 19 countries do Kumon every day.

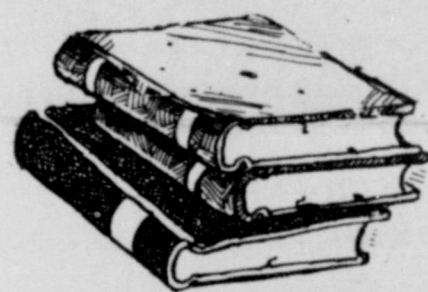

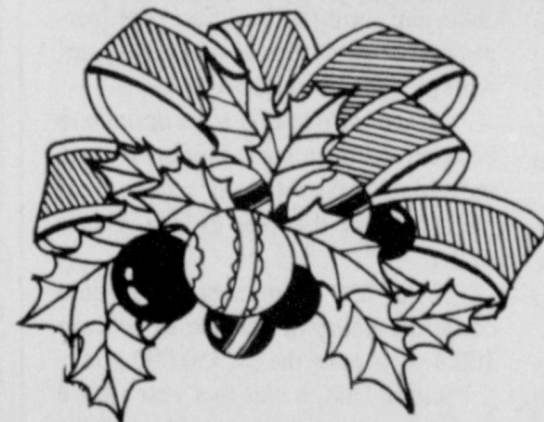

New business boosts permits

Eventhough only seven building permits were issued during November by city hall, the month's total still vaulted the year's total to above three-quarters of a million dollars.

The major contributor was the permit issued for construction of Pizza Hut, the first commercial structure construction here in some two years.

November's total of \$182,050 raised the year's sum to \$754,959.

The amazing thing about that price was that I own that particular knife. I bought it last summer at a local retailer and thought at the time that the \$11.50 price was a little high.

Looking a little closer at the order form, it became clear that \$24.95 was just the starting price. To that I would have to add a \$5 handling charge and a \$3.50 shipping charge. Those added extras pushed the price up to \$33.45!

I can buy the best electric knife on the market for that price. Who says you can get it cheaper through the mail?

But, those catalogs are fun to browse through. One featured a bamboo stick filled with sea shells. When it was turned upside down, according to the promotional copy, a sound similar to rain was produced. For \$29.95 (plus \$4.50 shipping and \$2.50 handling) I think I will just turn on the shower for rainfall effects.

Another item was a stuffed Toucan bird, when fitted with the proper batteries, that repeats everything that you say to the bird. If the price, \$99.95 (plus \$6.50 shipping and \$8.50 handling) did not put you off the produce, one feature sure did. The switch to turn the bird on and off is located at the base of its tail feathers. Now that would draw some strange looks.

Maybe we can start a drive to fill the hole in the ozone layer with all the Christmas catalogs, or even burn them to prevent a new ice age. Thanks for thinking of me this Christmas, mail

order companies, but I would rather see, touch and try something before I put it under my tree. (With no shipping or handling charges.)

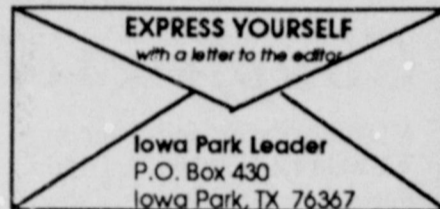

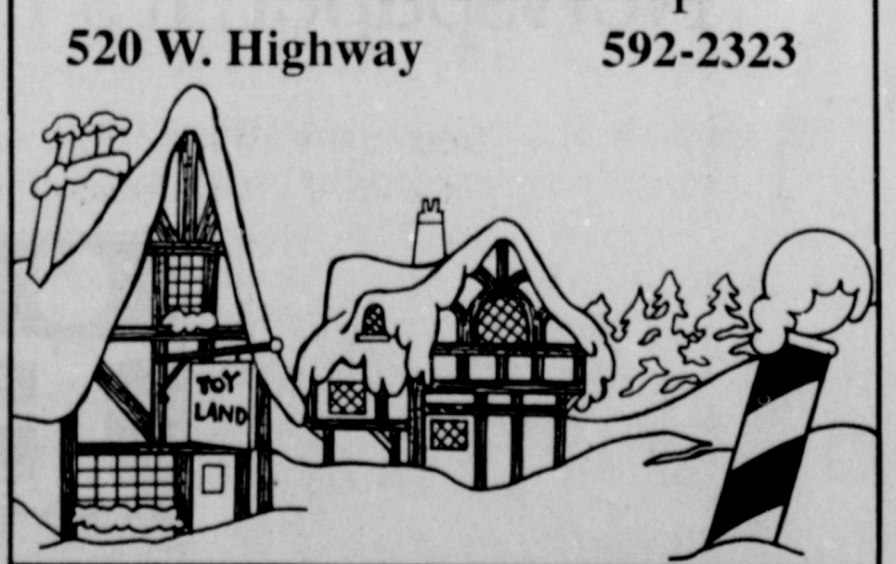

Playing at perennial basketball power Archer City, they lost 53-52.

Denton scored 13, Childs 11 and Todd Pulley 10, against the Wildcats.

Without another game scheduled Tuesday, the Hawks' next competition after Friday will again be at Seymour, where they are entered in a three-day tournament that begins on Dec. 12.

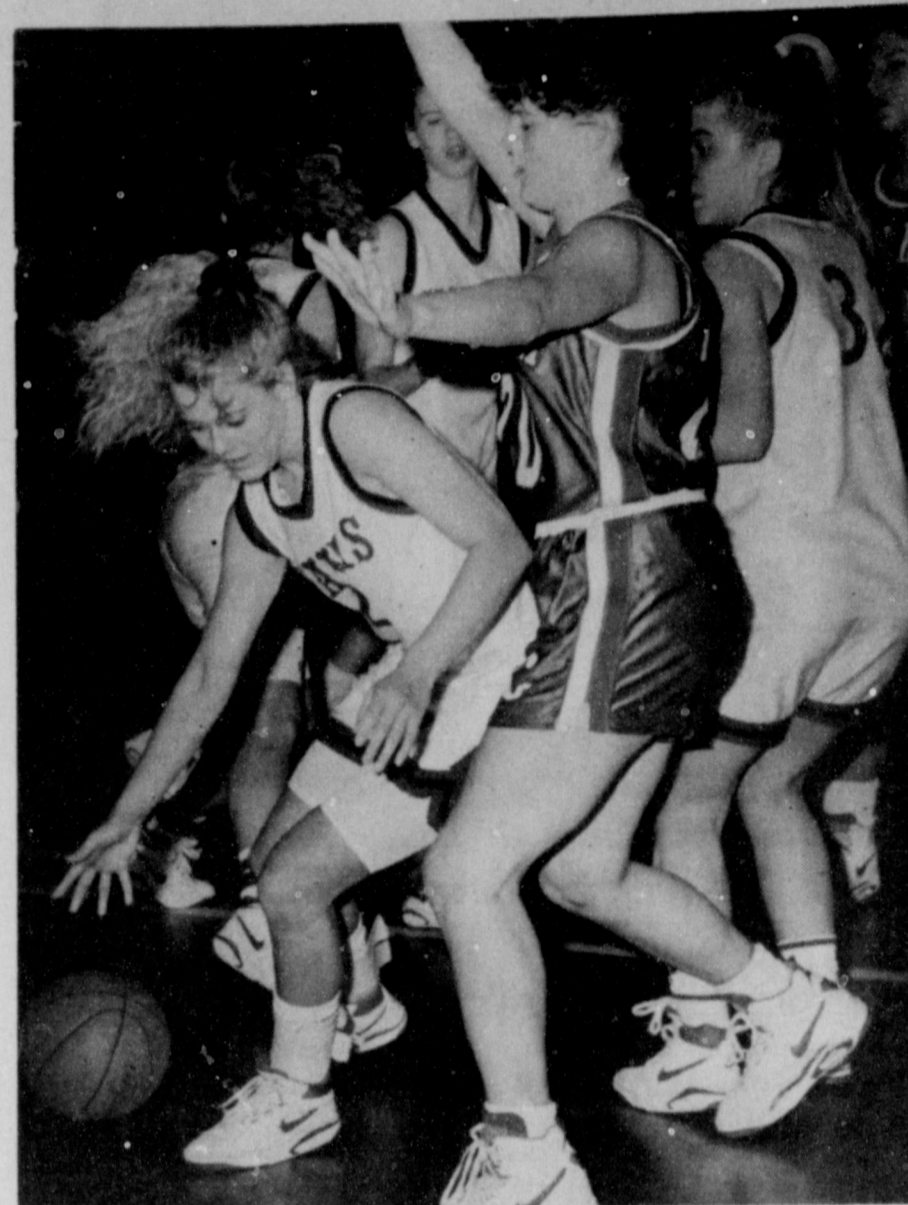

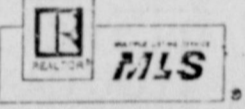

Board initiates detailed resource study

Wichita County is among the North Central Plains counties the Texas Water Development Board has initiated a detailed study of ground-water resources, focusing on Alluviums and Paleozoic formations.

The study is in response to the 1985 passage of H.B. 2 by the 69th Texas Legislature, which called for the identification of critical ground-water areas in the state.

A critical ground-water area is one that is either currently experiencing critical problems or that is expected to experience them within the next 20 years.

Along with Wichita are the counties of Archer, Armstrong, Baylor, Briscoe, Callahan, Childress, Clay, Collingsworth, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Donley, Eastland, Erath, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Garza, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Jack, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Montague, Motley, Nolan, Palo Pinto, Parker, Randall, Scorry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Swisher, Taylor, Throckmorton, Wheeler, Wilbarger, Wise and Young.

Major topics to be addressed in the study include the occurrence and avail-

ability of ground water, identification of present and potential water resource problems, and estimation of future demands that will be placed on those resources.

Of special interest will be the determination of the occurrence of water-quality deterioration, its extent, and the natural or man-induced cause of the change.

At the conclusion of the study, a report of the findings will be submitted to the Texas Water Commission.

The report will be used by the Commission in its consideration of the creation of an underground water conservation district for the area.

Such districts provide locally-controlled management of the ground-water resources of the area.

Erosion and moisture loss through a lack of conservation measures on cultivated land and invading brush and poor grasses on rangeland and pastureland still rob producers of millions of dollars of potential income each year.

The SCS office in Iowa Park can help identify problems and treatment needs.

The recommended treatment alternatives are based on the producer's objectives and the resources available.

Resource inventory data will be developed based on the producer's needs and objectives.

Inventories needed to plan will then be analyzed and evaluated with the producer and final conservation treatment planned will be based on the alternatives selected.

Once the treatment alternatives are determined, conservation is then applied to the land in proper sequence and according to the producer's ability to apply the planned practices.

STIFF NECK!

A stiff, painful neck is a common problem, but one that puzzles most people as to what caused it. Most people just wake up with it. The search for the injury that causes it usually reveals no answers, as it is a "slow injury" that occurs during sleep.

A large study at the Pain Clinic, Alexandria Hospital in Australia in 1986 brought several points to light concerning this type of neck pain. Stiff neck is commonly caused by pinching of facet joints, small pain sensitive spinal joints that can trigger pain in the neck, back of the shoulder, muscle spasm and headache. These researchers found that 71% of the patients evaluated at their clinic proved to have a pinching facet joint in the neck.

In a related study, these researchers found that the simplest and most effective way to diagnose this disorder is by palpation of the joints of the neck. This is the procedure used by chiropractors to detect joint tenderness and movement restriction by feeling the spine with the hands. As stiff neck from facet syndrome is caused by pinching of these small joints, chiropractic manipulation can be very effective in freeing the problem, relieving neck pain, resulting muscle spasm and headache. Exercises are often then used in addition to treatment to improve neck joint flexibility and to improve muscle tone. This treatment program is often effective for both acute and chronic stiff neck.

While position of the head and neck during sleep can allow these facet joints to pinch and cause stiff neck, chiropractic treatment can effectively resolve the pain. Prompt treatment can prevent prolonged suffering.
