Approximately 100 guests enjoyed the meeting.

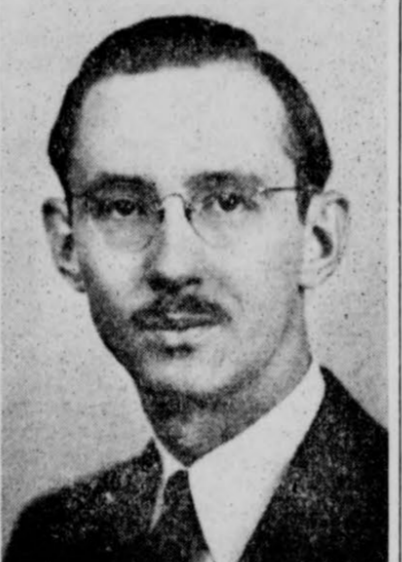

## Kentucky Furnishes Preacher and Singer For Baptist Revival

Revival services are scheduled to begin at the Baptist church Sunday morning, April 9, and they will continue for two weeks, according to Rev. James N. Easterwood, local pastor. Services will be conducted daily at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Rev. Eldred Taylor, who will do the preaching, is a native of Kentucky. He attended William Jewell college at Liberty, Mo., and Eastern Kentucky State Teachers college, Richmond, where he received the B.S. degree. He received a theological degree from Southern Seminary at Louisville, Ky., in 1947 and was in the pastorate through 1948. For the past two years he has been field secretary for the Daviess-McLean Baptist association in Kentucky. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor were mission volunteers for Africa but because of her health they were not permitted to go to the foreign mission field.

Rev. John Hammatt, who will direct the singing, is both preacher and singer. He is pastor of the Baptist church in Calhoun, Ky. He received his musical education at Georgetown college in Kentucky, and has had experience as director of music. His theological degree is from Southern Seminary, Louisville.

The Booster Band for those up to Intermediate age will be led each evening by Mr. Hammatt. Prayer services for other age groups will be held each evening at 7:30. A nursery will be open for children up to three years of age.

## Pat Asks Caution In Use of Kites

An appeal to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires was issued this week by W. R. Pastusek, Texas Electric Service company manager at Iowa Park. He warned that few youngsters realize the dangers the innocent pastime of kite flying can entail.

"Over the nation, many accidents occur each year because children get their kites tangled in power lines," Mr. Pastusek said. "The chief hazard is the use of kites with wire or other metal in the frame, or with using wire to fly the kite instead of cotton string. Such kites or wire act as conductors of electricity when contact is made with a power line. Even plain cotton string can be dangerous if it is wet, as it also will carry an electric current. The best idea, regardless of how the kite is built or what kind of string is used, is to fly it in open spaces where there are no wires."

"If a kite gets tangled in wires, don't try to get it down by climbing a pole or using a long stick. Call the electric company and a lineman will come and rescue the kite if it can be saved. Our linemen are glad to co-operate with the young kite flyers."

## Hughes, Kight, Dale, Smiths, Steele, Berry Win Iowa Park Posts

Iowa Park was the scene of two elections the past six days which had decidedly different trends.

On Saturday, April 1, the annual election of trustees for the independent school district had six candidates and only two places to be filled. Most voters were stumped as to whom they should select and many stayed away from the polls to avoid having to make a choice.

Candidates were Arch Hughes, Lavere Thompson, Fred Parkey, George Lewis, Mrs. Ruben Parish and Herman Kight. No one made an active campaign, and when the voting was tabulated Mr. Hughes and Mr. Kight were found to be winners. They are to be certified as new members and take their places on the board at a meeting this week.

The city election held Tuesday, April 4, took a different slant. The only incumbent, Miss Dosis Smith, was renamed as city secretary without opposition. From a field of four, the voters selected three to serve as aldermen. These were W. G. Steele, M. L. Smith, Alan Berry and Richard Hill. The first three named were elected.

Unopposed on the ballot, Albert L. Reed, candidate for mayor, made no campaign and was beaten on election day when voters wrote in Fenton Dale for the office. Mr. Dale has been serving as alderman and did not file for re-election.

His statement to the Herald is as follows:

"Through no aspirations or effort on my part, I have been elected your mayor. I believe many better selections could have been made.

"Naturally, I feel honored that you have chosen me and appreciate the concrete expressions of your faith in me. I also have a feeling of humility.

"I'm sure that everyone that accepts such an office or offers himself as a candidate does so only with the thought of being of service to his fellowmen and to do the best he can, realizing he is only a small part of the whole community.

"Through the interest and efforts of its citizens, Iowa Park is now launched upon a very ambitious and necessary program, and I am certain no one wants any obstacles placed in the way of its ultimate and final successful completion. The water board has certainly done a good job with its part and I see no reason why the City cannot do as well.

"The council and city secretary you have elected, I'm sure, will leave nothing undone in their positions, and if the citizenship continues to show the interest and devote their time and work as they have been, we will soon be very proud of Iowa Park and the things we have accomplished."

To: G. W. Ashton and his unknown heirs, devisees or legatees, Defendants, Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas at or before 10 o'clock A.M. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 1st day of May, A.D. 1950, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 17th day of March, A.D. 1950, in this cause, numbered 46985-A on the docket of said court and styled D. O. Smith, Plaintiff, vs. G. W. Ashton and his unknown heirs, devisees or legatees, Defendants.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:

This is a trespass to try title suit wherein Plaintiff alleges that on February 15, 1950, he was and still is, the owner in fee simple of Lots 5 and 6, Block No. 12, Original Town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, and that on said day the defendants herein unlawfully entered upon and dispossessed him of such premises and withheld from him the possession thereof to his damage in the sum of \$100.00.

**SECOND COUNT:**

And Plaintiff further claims above described property by mesne conveyances, and that he and those whose title he holds have had peaceable and adverse possession of said lands and premises for more than ten years, and have cultivated, used and enjoyed, and had same enclosed during said period; And Plaintiff further claims said property under deeds purporting to convey same to Plaintiff and his predecessors in title, which deeds have been duly recorded in Wichita County, Texas, and that Plaintiff and his predecessors in title had had peaceable and adverse possession under claim of right and in good faith under said deeds for more than 25 years prior to the commencement of this suit; and plaintiff further claims that he and his predecessors in title have had apparent record title to said property and they have paid taxes on same as they became due each year for 25 years next preceding the filing of this suit; and have openly exercised dominion, control and ownership of said property for said period of time, and during said period no one of defendants have paid any taxes due on said land; and plaintiff claims title to said property under the ten and twenty five year statutes of limitation.

Wherefore Plaintiff prays that defendants be cited to appear and answer his petition and that on final hearing he have judgment for title and possession of above described property and premises, for damages, cost of suit, and for such other and further relief to which he may be entitled to, either in law or in equity.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

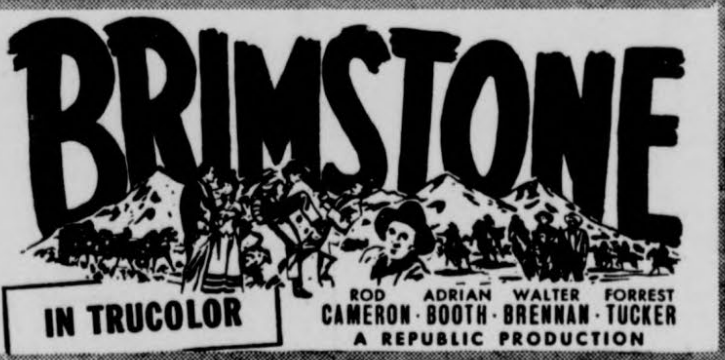

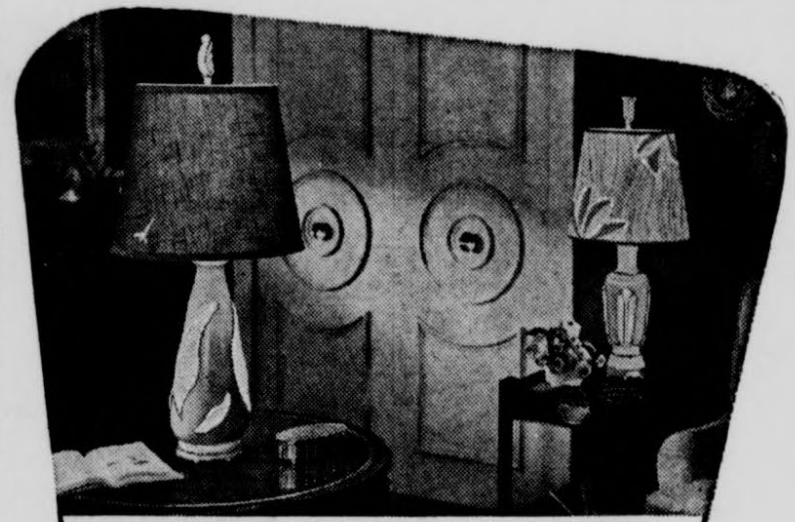

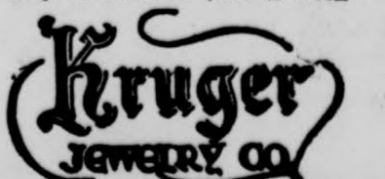
