## District Meet Details Are Announced By Iowa Park Officials

Important dates to watch and plan for are April 13, 14 and 15. Those are the dates announced by W. R. Bradford, school superintendent, as District 9-A track meet time. The events will be held in Iowa Park this spring and should offer a lively time for the whole district. Mr. Bradford will serve as director general of the meet.

Towns included in District 9-A are Crowell, Chillicothe, Seymour, Olney, Archer City, Holliday, Burkburnett and Iowa Park.

The opening event in the district meet will be in the one-act play division in which all eight schools are to participate. No play is to be longer than 30 minutes and there will be three judges. These plays will be presented in the W. F. George high school auditorium, beginning at 2 p.m. There will be a small admission charged for these plays, but this is the only charge to be made at any of the district meet contests.

The literary events will take place Friday morning, beginning at 9:00 in the auditorium. All schools will participate in the following events: debate, with boys' and girls' divisions; extemporaneous speaking, also for boys and girls; declamations; spelling and plain writing; ready writers contest; a numbers sense contest; and the one-act play division.

In both extemporaneous speaking and ready writing the entrant will be given a choice of five subjects and will have a 30 minute preparation period, at the end of which he will give his talk or write his composition. The five subjects are set up by the state authorities. It will require some 15 to 20 judges to conduct these literary events.

Friday afternoon, the contests in shorthand and in typing will be held. The afternoon of the 14th will also find tennis competition in full swing on the school and church courts. The same schools with the exception of Crowell, will compete in this sport. Both boys and girls doubles and singles will be played.

Track and field events are scheduled for Saturday, April 15, with all the schools entering. All preliminaries in track will be run in the morning, and three of the finals of the field events will also be finished before noon. That afternoon, finals will start at 2 p.m., with the field events winding up activities.

Numbers sense: Elbert Little and Glenn Gwinn.

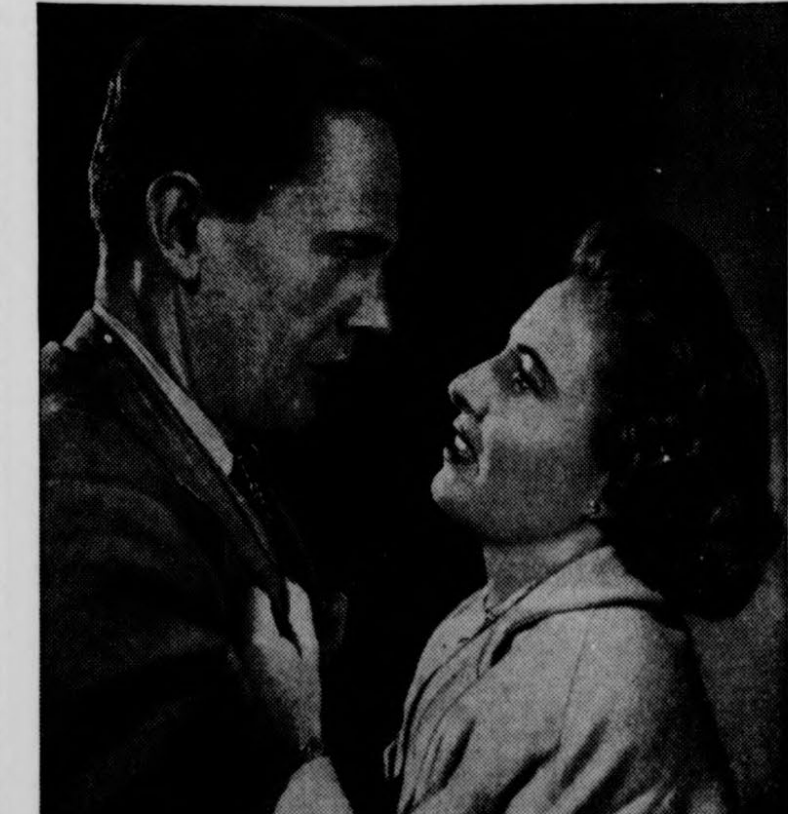
Shorthand: Virginia Partney and Patsy Steed.

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas at or before 10 o'clock A.M. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 1st day of May, A.D. 1950, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 17th day of March, A.D. 1950, in this cause, numbered 46085-A on the docket of said court and styled D. O. Smith, Plaintiff, vs. G. W. Ashton and his unknown heirs, devisees or legatees, Defendants.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: This is a trespass to try title

suit wherein Plaintiff alleges that on February 15, 1950, he was and still is, the owner in fee simple of Lots 5 and 6, Block No. 12. Original Town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, and that on said day the defendants herein unlawfully entered upon and dispossessed him of such premises and withhold from him the possession thereof to his damage in the sum of \$100.00.

SECOND COUNT: And Plaintiff further claims above described property by mesne conveyances, and that he and those whose title he holds had peaceable and adverse possession of said lands and premises for more than ten years, and have cultivated, used and enjoyed, and had same enclosed during said period; And Plaintiff further claims said property under deeds purporting to convey same to Plaintiff and his predecessors in title, which deeds have been duly recorded in Wichita County, Texas, and that Plaintiff and his predecessors in title had had peaceable and adverse possession under claim of right and in good faith under said deeds for more than 25 years prior to the commencement of this suit; and plaintiff further claims that he and his predecessors in title have had apparent record title to said property and they have paid taxes on same as they became due

each year for 25 years next preceding the filing of this suit; and have openly exercised dominion, control and ownership of said property for said period of time, and during said period no one of defendants have paid any taxes due on said land; and plaintiff claims title to said property under the ten and twenty five year statutes of limitation.

Wherefore Plaintiff prays that defendants be cited to appear and answer his petition and that on final hearing he have judgment for title and possession of above described property and premises, for damages, cost of suit, and for such other and further relief to which he may be entitled to, either in law or in equity.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

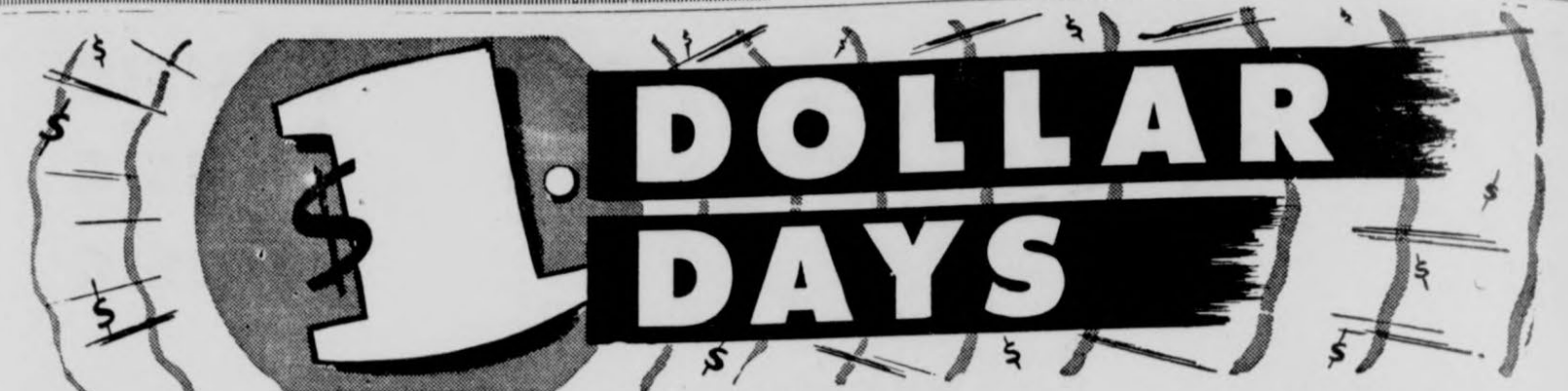

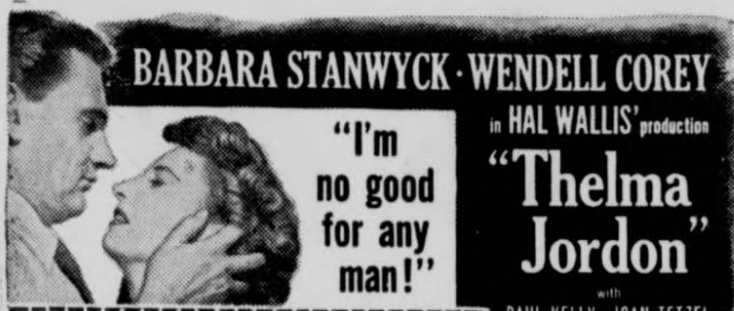
