Youngblood new Cryovac manager

Raymond R. Youngblood has been promoted to the position of plant manager of the Iowa Park facility of Cryovac, a division of W.R. Grace & Co.

He will succeed Sam Laird, who has been named vice president of

manufacturing for Cryovac at its North American headquarters at Duncan, S.C.

Youngblood, effective July 1, will become the fourth manager of the Cryovac plant since it was opened in 1975.

The new manager joined Cryovac

in 1962 at its Simpsonville, S.C. plant and was transferred to Iowa Park when the plant was opened, as manufacturing superintendent.

Youngblood began the training program at Iowa Park after playing a key role in upgrading Cryovac's in-house

training program at the Simpsonville plant.

In his most recent assignment, Youngblood was manager of films production, plant laboratory, plant warehouse, shipping and receiving functions and chairman of the plant steering committee on quality.

A native of Clemson, S.C., he is the son of Mrs. Christine Youngblood of that city, and the late Robert Youngblood.

He and his wife, the former Pat Howerton of Albuquerque, N.M. have three children: a daughter, Teresa Terry; and sons Bryan, and Danny Clarke.

Youngblood is a graduate of Midwestern State Univ. and is completing work on an MBA degree from the University of North Texas.

The Youngbloods attend the First Christian Church of Wichita Falls.

Laird has served as plant manager here since 1987, and will replace R.P. Prevost, who is retiring the end of this month. He is reporting directly to Cryovac President W.B. Sturgis.

Laird joined Cryovac in 1964 and has worked in both manufacturing and research, development and engineering areas. He has worked as technical manager at the Simpsonville plant, a position he had previously at the Iowa Park plant.

Laird and his wife, the former Elaine Claxton of Johnston, S.C., have two sons and five grandchildren. They are members of Faith Baptist Church of Iowa Park.

Laird has been an active member on the board of directors of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

"Iowa Park is an excellent community. My family and I have enjoyed

Health insurance on council agenda

During Monday night's meeting of the city council, aldermen will consider a resolution to enter into an agreement with Wichita Falls for providing medical and dental insurance for employees.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Details of the program were explained during a recent meeting, but no action was taken while councilmen considered details they had received.

Under the program, savings have been experienced by the city of Wichita Falls which would not have been realized under a commercial health care insurance program, the council was told.

A one-time fee of \$10,000 would be assessed Iowa Park, plus an administrative charge, should the agreement be finalized.

Two ordinances also will be considered Monday.

One ordinance would change the zoning of a block from general residential to general commercial. The tract is bordered by Wall, Yosemite, Daisy and Poe.

The second ordinance, if approved, would "grant to city employees additional rights and credits in the Texas Municipal Retirement System."

Trustees to study salaries

Salaries will be the only subject considered at a called meeting of the school board this evening.

The meeting is to begin at 8 in the administration building.

Supt. Glen Mitchell said before the board goes into executive session, which is closed to the public, he will make recommendations to increase salaries for all personnel in the system, except himself, who have reached the top of

their pay scales.

Teachers not at the top of their pay scales are mandated a salary increase under House Bill 72, adopted by the legislature in 1974.

A policy of pay steps is established for non-professional staff.

Action is called for on the posted agenda, when the board re-opens its meeting following the executive session.

Trip to Geneva, Switzerland knowledge, orientation quest

Dr. Phil McLarty's recent trip to Geneva, Switzerland served to add yet another dimension to his quest for knowledge and orientation into the latest facet of his diversified background.

Dr. McLarty assumed the pastorate of First Presbyterian Church in Iowa Park about the first of December 1991, after 20 years serving as a Methodist minister, primarily in North Texas.

In October 1991, he transferred his credentials to the Presbyterian Church, and was recognized at a meeting of the Palo Duro Presbytery. He also serves as pastor of Trinity Presbyterian Church in Wichita Falls.

A number of factors were instrumental in McLarty transferring his credentials. The change also prompted his recent trip to Switzerland.

The affable minister, who spent most of his life affiliated with the Methodist Church, was born in Hope, Ark. Incidentally, he was a childhood playmate of presidential hopeful candidate, Bill Clinton, whose grandparents lived near McLarty's parents.

McLarty received a bachelor's degree in Music Education from Louisiana State University. He spent his first three years out of college as a high school band director in Winnie, and played trombone professionally in Houston with a society dance band.

He returned to the classroom and received a Master of Theology degree from Perkins School of Theology at SMU, and later the Doctorate of Ministry, also from Perkins School.

His first church as a Methodist minister was at Prosper in 1971. Other pastorates included Paris, Quinlan, five years at Sherman, Nashville, Tenn., and was associate pastor of First United Methodist Church in Wichita Falls.

McLarty served two years as manager of the Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra and pastored the Methodist Church at Scotland. He played principal trombone with the orchestra, resigning when he took his present pastorate here. He hopes at sometime to again play with the Sym-

phony.

The minister had done a lot of previous study on the history of the Protestant Reformation, and he decided it was important for him to gain an even broader background of and a grounding in the Presbyterian church.

He could not think of a better way to augment his study than to go back to the place where history was made in the reformation church, where he could experience the "feel" of the area in which Protestant Reformation history was made.

"The trip was really important to me in order to get a sort of prospective that I could not get otherwise," McLarty said.

With scholarly demeanor, he explained that his trip to Geneva was a self-guided study course that came out of his intense study since October when he made the change from Methodism to the Presbyterian Church. He had made notes of places in reformation history that he especially wanted to visit.

Dr. McLarty first went to Geneva. He felt that was essential since it was the home of John Calvin, who made the most significant impact on the Reformation church.

"To see the geographical features, and the proximity of places that figured prominently in the reformation in their own historical setting, that I had been studying about, was

especially important to me," Dr. McLarty said.

He commented, "To be in a place and see all of the things that are changeless where so many physical features have changed, and to stand in St. Peter's Cathedral where John Calvin preached, gives one a sense of orientation that makes history come alive."

Dr. McLarty marveled at the stark beauty of the Cathedral, its architecture and the simplicity of the nave that at earlier times had been stripped of the artwork, statues, images and icons by leaders of the reformed church, who did not believe it was right to adorn the church building.

From Geneva the minister went to Basel where Calvin, the French Protestant reformer first came into Switzerland when he was exiled from France. This was where he wrote his first draft of "The Institute of Christian Religion."

The next leg of his self-designed trip took him to Zurich, which was the center of the work of an earlier reformer, Zwingli, a forerunner of Calvin who greatly influenced the Reformation and had already laid the groundwork.

Dr. McLarty said, "One of the highlights of my trip was to worship in the church in Zurich where Zwingli preached. I also visited his apartment where the current pastor of the church and his wife live today. The church is practically the same as it was in 1520 when Zwingli preached there."

The next place on his itinerary was Bern, where he checked out particular historical sites, before returning to Geneva.

With his ready smile, McLarty said, "You know one of the riches of travel is to enter into conversation with the native people. That is another way you can gain insight of their rich history."

That comment reminded him of a gentleman he met in Bern who was very cordial, enthusiastic and helpful. In fact, he was almost too helpful. He would even take a week off work to show McLarty all of the historical places and verbalize the history of the area. But, McLarty just didn't have time to accept his offer.

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



12 oz. can frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed and undiluted
12 oz. can frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed and undiluted
46 oz. can unsweetened pineapple juice
1 quart apricot nectar
2 cups unsweetened grapefruit juice
2/3 cup sugar
1 bottle ginger ale, chilled

COOK of the WEEK

Peanut Blossoms

- 1 3/4 cup flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1 egg
- 2 Tbsps. milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 48 chocolate kisses

Combine all ingredients except candy in large bowl. Mix until it forms a dough. Shape into 1-inch balls. Roll balls in sugar. Place on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 10-20 minutes at 375 degrees. Top each cookie immediately with a candy kiss.

Cherry Delight

- 1 1/2 sticks soft oleo
- 2 Tbsps. sugar
- 1 1/2 cup flour
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Press into 10x13 pan and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees.

- 8 oz. Cool Whip
- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 2 cups powdered sugar

Mix well and pour into cooled crust. Add 1 can cherry pie filling over the top. (May use any flavor of pie filling.) Chill.

Pineapple Cheese Ball

- 2 - 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese
- 1 flat can crushed pineapple, drained well
- 1/4 cup bell pepper, chopped fine
- 2 Tbsps. onion, chopped fine
- Dash of garlic salt
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Mix together by hand. Roll in another cup of pecans. Chill.

Shrimp Salad

- 1 - 12 oz. pkg. spiral noodles
- 1/2 bell pepper, chopped fine
- 1/4 - 1/2 onion, chopped fine
- 2-3 sticks celery, chopped fine
- 1 1/2 cup Miracle Whip
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 cans shrimp
- Salt and pepper

Mix Miracle Whip and milk until it becomes saucelike. Mix all ingredients together and season to taste. Chill overnight.

Squash Bake

- 2 1/2 lbs. yellow squash, cut up
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 pkg. Pepperidge Farm cornbread stuffing mix

- 1 can cream of chicken soup

- Salt & pepper

- 5 eggs, beaten
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 10-oz. pkg. frozen chopped broccoli, thawed and drained
- 1 1/2 sticks melted oleo
- 2 cups cottage cheese
- 2 pkgs. Jiffy cornbread mix
- 2 Tbsps. sugar

Mix all ingredients and pour into greased 9x12 pyrex dish. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

Iowa Park High School has been named District 4-AAA champion for outstanding performance in the 1992 American High School Mathematics Examination, according to Jean Johnson, instructor.

Estimated cost to RTC, that ignoble branch of the government that handles repossessed property for the FDIC and FSLIC, was approximately \$20 million. Instead of Resolution Trust Corporation, many depositors and taxpayers believe that RTC stands for "Resolved To Consolidate."

The pattern was repeated here in

Andrews last Friday when they closed Andrews Savings & Loan. The institution was about \$2 million shy of the needed capital to keep operating. Another arm of the RTC has been making loans to similar institutions in order to keep them open and save the RTC money.

But not here. They shuttered the door and the cost to the RTC of closing the outfit is probably in the neighborhood of \$10 million.

Mrs. North was presented a large print Bible and a card shower, followed by a luncheon in fellowship hall.


Mrs. North celebrated her 87th birthday May 4. She moved to Iowa Park around 1920 and was a charter member of the church.



There was something different about Morris Siegel. On the surface he seemed like an average street person in the city of Los Angeles. He died the way one expects a street person to die - found in an alley, dead of natural causes. Morris Siegel had three bank accounts containing a total of \$207,421.00.

Ten years before Morris died, his father passed away and left the money to him. When Morris did not claim it, the Division of Unclaimed Property tracked him down, and his family forced him to accept it. He did not show up at the ceremony when the cash was handed over. He took enough of the money to buy an old car, where he slept in bad weather. Relatives rented him an apartment; he never lived there. Morris died December 14, 1989 with three dollars in his pocket and an untouched fortune in the bank.

Does this sound crazy? Figure this one out!
Almost 2,000 years ago, our Heavenly Father ratified His will, and left all of His children eternal wealth: life, peace, victory. To this day, many have not claimed the windfall and some have refused to spend any of it. Lost people shuffle down blind alleys of an empty existence, facing hell for eternity, and ignore the promise of salvation in Christ.

Morris Siegel lived a wasted life and died a futile death, but we can't be too quick to point the finger at him. Morris was dealing with the temporary, and many are playing the same losing game with the eternal.

"People in the south and southwest of Switzerland speak primarily French, and in the north they speak Swiss-German. Fortunately for me I managed to find several English speaking people," Dr. McLarty said.

In addition to his direct study involving the history of the Protestant Reformation, the minister also visited the office of the World Council of Churches that is located in Geneva.

He also was privileged to have a conversation with members of the World Health Organization that was located near where he was staying in Geneva.

"It was a very interesting side-light to the trip to be in the center of such a cosmopolitan group of people. You knew some of the people you were speaking with would be on their way back to their own far-away homelands in a day or two," he said.

Dr. McLarty said, "It is important for me at this point to utilize some of the discoveries I have made pertaining to the Protestant Reformation that can be applied to the church today."

He continued, "For instance, what does it mean for the church to be in a process of being reformed by the Spirit of God or how can the church today move more effectively to reform the society it is called to serve?"

"It is interesting to me that some of the breakdown in society that characterized the Reformation seems so similar to our society today. And, if that is true, do we have the courage to be as bold speaking out the truth of the Gospel as did the reformers in the 16th Century?"

"I guess I have always had a feeling my roots were in the Church of Scotland," said McLarty, whose Scotch-Irish ancestors first came to the colonies from Kintyre Peninsula in the southern most part of Scotland that

is only 12 miles from Ireland.

"As a result of my Geneva trip I have a more concrete appreciation for the people and the historic sites of the Protestant Reformation. I have a better understanding of how people lived in that period in history, of the church and what undergirds the beliefs of the Presbyterian Church," Dr. McLarty said.

One of the programs currently being initiated in First Presbyterian Church is Operation Outreach. Dr. McLarty hopes to identify individuals and families in the community who are not presently active in a congregation to become a part of "our church family".

Another new program started is a Children and Youth Program, with Susan Simmons as coordinator. It is hoped a Christian education program for children and youth can be a positive alternative to watching television or being "bored".

The church is also looking into a mission program, Dr. McLarty said.

He added, "I am very concerned about the AIDS and AIDS patients. I believe those patients should be allowed the same dignity and compassion that we give anyone else who has a terminal illness."

"I also believe more education about HIV is very necessary, because I believe when it comes to the care of an AIDS patient that a lot of people do not understand how difficult it is to contract the disease while caring for a patient."

McLarty has been to Ecuador twice, one time on a work project and one time for a vacation Bible school. He also has been to the Holy Land and there are photographs on his study wall that attest to his excellence in his former hobby of photography.

It is Dr. McLarty's personal hope to take a group of people from Iowa Park to the Holy Land and show them first hand where Jesus walked and carried out His ministry.



AUSTIN - Texas Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero, along with Texas oil and gas producers, vented anger against Congress for voting last week to restrict the TRC's role in regulating that industry.

The new law passed by predominantly non-oil state lawmakers to protect cheap natural gas prices "would create chaos in the natural gas system," Guerrero said.

It created some confusion about Guerrero, who days earlier scolded rumors she was siding with a "Bubba cartel" to fix higher gas prices.

Her remarks seemed to put Guerrero, who has postured as the consumers' commissioner, out front favoring higher prices to benefit the state's gas industry.

Perot on More Ballots

Texas Secretary of State John Hannah said Dallas billionaire Ross Perot had more than enough valid petition signatures and would be on the Texas presidential ballot.

Perot also qualified for the Florida ballot last week, but ruled gay and lesbian groups nationwide with his vow to exclude them from top jobs in his administration.

Perot also included "adulterers" in the types of people he would avoid hiring, if he knew about their activity.

Lane Denton Indicted

Former Waco lawmaker Lane Denton, whose Austin-based telemarketing firm has been under investigation for more than a year,

was indicted by a Travis County grand jury on two felony charges.

The indictment alleged that Denton misapplied more than \$67,000 in 1988 and 1989 while he was executive director of the Texas Department of Public Safety Officers Association, a statewide troopers' group.

Denton was charged with theft and misapplication of fiduciary property. Each count carries up to two years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Denton, 50, a longtime Democratic Party figure, whose wife is state Rep. Betty Denton, denied wrongdoing and predicted he will be cleared.

Bullock Wants Mail-Order Tax
Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock urged Congress to pass a new law allowing states to tax in-state mail order sales by out-of-state companies.

The U.S. Supreme Court said states could pass laws to force such taxes, now voluntary, if Congress permits.

Comptroller John Sharp, who also wants the new tax, said such a tax could raise \$150 million for Texas government.

Runoff Election Voided

State District Judge John Delaney voided the result of a runoff election and ordered a new one for the new congressional seat created for Hispanics.

State Sen. Gene Green, D-Houston, who narrowly defeated former state representative Ben Reyes, said he will appeal Delaney's ruling.

Reyes had sued for a new election on the grounds that several illegal crossover votes for Green provided the basis for his narrow margin of victory.

Mattox And Crazy Horse

Former Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox, now in private practice, is defending the new Crazy Horse malt liquor against irate American Indian groups.

Their leaders claim the New York-based brew, which will reach Texas stores this month, evokes racism and debases one of their great leaders.

Mattox contends the label is protected as commercial free speech.

Lewis Eyes Comp Rates

Lame duck Texas House Speaker Gib Lewis asked a Senate committee to investigate why workers' compensation insurance companies are raising rates if their losses are going down.

An industry spokesman said insurance officials are not confident the trend will hold, and they have years of over-regulation to make up.

Other Highlights

■ Texas Jail Standards Commissioner Jack Crump said counties might be able to house prisoners in tents as early as July.

■ The University of Texas is ranked eighth in the nation's top 107 research libraries; Texas A&M was 47th; University of Houston, 106th; and Rice University, 107th.

■ The GOP National Convention to be held in Houston this summer

will cost the city almost half a million dollars for providing police protection.

■ The Texas chapter of the NAACP voted to ask its national leaders to file a lawsuit blocking the use of the Texas skills exit exam required for high school graduation.

■ The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals told Attorney General Dan Morales it does not have jurisdiction to hear his appeal of a ruling that the sodomy law is illegal. Instead, the appeal will be heard solely by the Texas Supreme Court.

■ The 14th Court of Appeals acquitted the first woman prosecuted in Texas for passing cocaine to her unborn baby. Apparently the court was fearful of setting a precedent allowing law officers to subpoena hospital records and arrest pregnant women who test drug-positive.

■ Despite strong opposition from rural Texans and anti-nuclear groups, the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority voted 4-1 to build a waste dump on a 16,000 acre ranch near Sierra Blanca, about 90 miles southeast of El Paso.


