Annual Chamber banquet features awards, speaker

Who will be recognized for their contributions to the community and their fellow citizens during 1993, when the announcements are made Saturday

Those recognitions are always the highlight of the annual Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce banquet, which is to get underway at 7 p.m. in the high school cafeteria.

Under the policy of the Chamber, it is possible that as many as four individuals and one business could be recognized. It is up to the anonymouslyappointed committee members to decide who, if any, qualify for the honor.

Besides the award recipients' announcements, the evening will also include a dinner prepared by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners, an entertaining speaker, and the installation of new Chamber officers.

Tickets for the banquet are \$10 per person, and are available at the Chamber office, Parkway TrueValue,

The usual steak dinner, cooked over mesquite coals right outside the potato, mixed vegetables, tossed salad, hot rolls, desert, coffee and tea.

One of the more popular speakers in the county, Justice of the Peace Janice Sons, is to be a feature of the evening.

Month's permit total is down, but year's up

After several months of uncommonly high building permit figures, December fell into a more common area, as no new home permits were issued by city hall.

However, the year's total still exceeded \$2 million.

The most common permits issued were for roofing and storage buildings, which accounts for the month's total of \$76,582.

Though low, by comparison, it still raised the year's total to \$2,025,480.

Golf course back on council agenda

A new and different possibility for a golf course at Lake Iowa Park will be discussed during Monday night's meeting of the city council.

Iowa Parkan Mike Negri has requested a three-month extension on his lease of the property where the course is proposed.

Negri was originally granted a lease on the land last year, when he was attempting to coordinate development of a golf course there.

However, that course proposal was scuttled last fall, when the council voted to not spend money on a feasibility study that the proposed developers had requested.

The council is back to "square one" on annexing a 9.7-acre tract on the north side of town, for a housing development, known as Park Place

Two hearings were previously held, and the annexation proposal approved by the council. But then it was determined that additional paperwork was necessary, and a change in state law now requires three such public

So the annexation process is starting over again.

City Administrator Mike Price is to discuss with the council another subdivision proposal, which would be located north of US 287 and west of FM 368.

A discussion of using public resources for private purposes also is on the meeting agenda under the heading of "administrator's report."

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m., in council chambers.

Meeting set in Kamay on phone rate change

The posibility of extended area telephone service for residents in the southwest part of Wichita County will be discussed at a meeting later this

Residents are encouraged to attend and discuss a plan that could result in the significant lowering of telephone costs for subscribers being served by the GTE exchange in Kamay.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 25, at the Kamay Volunteer Fire Department, located west of the post office and next to Kamay Electric.

If accepted by the residents, the telephone exchanges and the Public Utilities Commission, calls to Wichita Falls and Iowa Park would be local, instead of long distance, at a "reasonable standard increase" to the basic rate now charged.

In addition, Precinct One Commissioner Woody Gossom will discuss some road design changes for the intersections of Hodges and FM 1206, Hodges and Love, and Hoge Road and FM 1206 as well as the arena at that intersection.

- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. poultry seasoning
- 1/4 cup cracker crumbs
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 Tbsp. grease 1 medium onion
- 4 potatoes
- 4 carrots

1 can consomme soup

Spread meat on paper; sprinkle with salt, pepper and poultry seasoning. Add cracker crumbs and mix

- 1 1/2 lb. ground round
- 1 chopped onion 1 tsp. salt
- Pepper to taste
- 1 Tbsp. mustard
- 1 can tomato soup

Brown meat. Add remaining ingredients. Place in casserole dish and top with pie crust. Bake in 350° oven one hour or until brown.

Enchilada Squares

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/4 cup chopped onion 4 eggs
- 2/3 cup milk 1-8 oz. can tomato sauce
- 1 envelope enchilada sauce mix
- 2 cups corn chips 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded cheese

Preheat oven to 350°. Cook meat

and onions in skillet. Drain fat. Spread beef in bottom of 10X6X1 1/2-inch baking dish. Beat together eggs, milk, tomato sauce and enchilada sauce mix. Pour over meat layer. Top with chips. til firm in the center. Sprinkle with cheese and return to oven for five minutes. Serves 6.

Peanut Butter Cups

2 cups peanut butter 1/2 cup plus 1 Tbsp. melted oleo 2 3/4 cups powdered sugar 1 pkg. chocolate chips

Stir together the peanut butter, 1/2 cup oleo and sugar. Press mixture in the bottom of a 9-inch square pan. Melt chocolate chips and stir in remaining oleo. Spread over peanut butter mixture. Store at room temperature. Cut in squares.

- 1 1/2 sticks oleo
- 1 1/3 cups brown sugar, packed
- 1 tsp. nutmeg 2 tsp. vanilla
- 3 tsp. cinnamon

1 cups chopped pecans

Melt oleo over low heat with brown sugar. Add nutmeg, vanilla and cinnamon and chopped pecans. In bundt pan, put 1/3 of the biscuits. Pour 1/3 of the butter mixture over biscuits (or roll biscuits in butter mixture). continued until all is used.

Bake 35 minutes at 350 degrees.





Each member brought her favorite Christmas goodie for a buffet, and participated in a Chinese gift exchange.




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
Worth Quoting
