Forgeries cause concern to Iowa Park businesses

Two different local businesses last week reported having received checks that had been forged.

And prompt action was taken by police, as one suspect has already been served a warrant, and police felt they would be able to serve another this week in the other case.

A Wal-Mart representative filed a complaint Thursday with Investigator Lynn Collins, and Friday, he received another complaint from K&K Foods.

Collins had no problem in serving a warrant on the K&K complaint, because the suspect, Bennett Brookshire, 20, was in the Wichita County jail, on other charges.

Bond on the forgery warrant against Brookshire was set at \$3,500.

Collins said he believes the forged checks reported by Wal-Mart was part of the activities of a ring of suspects who live in Wichita Falls.

He has been contacting police departments in area cities, including

Graham, Breckenridge, Vernon and Bowie, where other Wal-Mart stores are located.

And those contacts have possibly paid off. Collins said three of the Wichita Falls suspects had been apprehended by Graham police, and he was going to follow up on that lead by the weekend.

Police are investigating a reported business burglary that was discovered Saturday morning.

A report was filed that morning that someone had forced open the back door of Amanda's, and someone had taken several cartons of cigarettes, as well as some other tobacco products.

Seven arrests were made during the past week, on various charges.

Officers were called to Colonial Heights Apartments at 1:56 a.m. Saturday, where a reported disturbance was underway.

Two persons, Steven Don Allen, 25, and Lisa Hollis Allen, 24, were issued citations for assault to prevent family violence. They were released after signing a pledge to appear in municipal court.

Floyd Van Yarbrough, 66, was taken into custody at 6:35 p.m. Saturday in the 200 block of West Highway, on a charge of public intoxication. He was later released on a personal recognizance bond.

Approximately three hours later, the driver of a vehicle was stopped in the 1400 block of West Highway on a traffic check.

The officer determined by a computer check the driver, Larry Wayne Fortner, 40, was operating the vehicle while his license was suspended. He was transported to county jail, accord-

Illegal dumping problem to sewer

Someone is doing something that could cost Iowa Park taxpayers a lot of money, if the practice is not stopped.

Workers at the city's sewer treatment plant have recently noticed large

amounts of grease, and possibly some toxic materials, infiltrating the plant.

City Administrator Mike Price said the dumping must be stopped, and has asked the public's cooperation and

support.

The problem began in November, and it's been getting worse as time progresses, the administrator said.

The grease noticed in the sewage could be off motorized equipment, but much of it also could be cooking grease.

As for the possible toxic materials, no expensive analysis has been made, so workers have no idea where that might have come from.

Once the grease was noticed, Public Works Director Belvin Lytle immediately began visiting all businesses that are supposed to have grease traps, to see if any were full and needed cleaning.

There is a possibility that some vacuum trucks have been dumping into the sewer lines, without permission, Price said. Those service businesses clean out septic tanks and similar facilities.

Two such businesses, Monty's and Park Tank, have in the past been allowed to dump into the lines, on a limited basis, and for a fee.

However, that practice was curtailed after the treatment plant problem was detected.

Some vacuum truckers in past years were known to have dumped their loads into sewer manholes. And that practice is believed by city personnel to be what is creating the problem.

An excessive amount of grease and toxic materials can render Iowa Park's type of sewer treatment plant completely useless, until expensive remedies are exercised.

Price is requesting the public's assistance in locating any unauthorized dumping into the sewer lines, especially that of commercial trucks.

He asked that anyone observing, or suspecting, such an activity to immediately call city hall or the police department.

New housing addition tops Monday's agenda

Two different items appear on the tentative agenda for Monday night's regular meeting of the city council, concerning a new housing addition.

The second of three required public hearings on the proposed annexation of land north of Country Hills Estates, identified as Park Place Addition, will be held.

Also concerning that addition,

aldermen will be asked to consider authorizing advertising for bids to construct streets in a portion of the addition's first phase.

The council has agreed to pave the portion's first streets, as well as installing utility lines in the area, and then be reimbursed as tracts are sold.

Work is already underway in the area by heavy equipment, to prepare the land for construction.

Mayor Wayne House is to discuss with the council a proposal of joining the cities of Burkburnett and Electra, to pursue an increase in subsidy paid by Wichita County for rural firefighting service.

House also is to update the council on plans for construction of a golf course at Lake Iowa Park, according to the agenda listing.

Administrator Mike Price has listed three topics as his portion on the agenda.

He will ask aldermen to approve an amendment to the contract for ambulance service, which has been proposed not only for service here, but Burkburnett, Wichita Falls and Wichita County.

A proposal for brush chipping services also will be discussed.

A discussion will be held on a proposal to adopt an ordinance restricting the location of any sexually-oriented business that might desire to locate in the city.

Calling all Kamay area residents

A meeting next Tuesday in Kamay could possibly lead to lower telephone bills for residents in that part of the county.

Topic of the meeting is a way by which extended area telephone service can be put into place, thus saving a lot of people long distance call costs.

Fire destroys Kamay home

The Kamay Volunteer Fire Dept., assisted by other county volunteer fire departments, fought a fire late Monday that virtually destroyed a home on McFall Rd. in Kamay.

Firefighters from Iowa Park and Wichita West assisted in the effort, which began about 11:40 p.m. Monday and lasted until 2:40 the next morning.

According to Barry Tyler, a member of the Kamay department, Stephen Robinson was awakened by a neighbor, who first saw the fire and alerted the fire department. Robinson, the sole resident of the home, was not injured.

Students take own holiday

A hand full of junior high school students, apparently upset because they had to attend classes Monday while students in other area schools were not, walked off the campus without permission.

Monday was observed nationwide as a holiday, honoring Martin Luther King, but it was not designated as a holiday for Iowa Park schools.

Fourteen students reportedly left the building during the afternoon, and all were marked absent without excuses.

The school policy for such absences is for students to be subjected to "in-school suspension" three days.

News Briefs

Chamber directors to meet

Members of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors will hold their monthly luncheon meeting Monday, at the Chamber office.

Directors normally schedule their luncheon meeting on the third Monday

of each month. However, because last Monday was a declared holiday, it was postponed.

The meeting is to begin at 11:45 a.m., according to newly-elected president Cathy Riggins.

Bloodmobile to stop at IPHS

The Red River Red Cross Bloodmobile will be at Iowa Park High School tomorrow.

A goal of 45 pints of blood has been set for the visit, which will be held from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m.

School trustees to meet today

A called meeting of the school board is to be held at 4:45 this afternoon, in the administration office.

The only item on the agenda is for action on bids on food and non-food items, and frozen food storage.

Leader sets early printing

The Leader will print next week's issue one day earlier than usual, in order for staff members to attend the midwinter convention of the Texas Press Association.

Because of that, all advertising and news deadlines will be moved up one day, according to Bob Hamilton, publisher.

Though the issue will carry the Jan. 27 dateline, it will be printed on Tuesday evening, rather than the usual Wednesday evening.

The deadline for all display advertising will be 4 p.m. Monday, and classified advertising deadline will be 12-noon Tuesday.

"People are always very cooperative, whenever we have an early printing like this," Hamilton said. "We know it brings about a certain amount of confusion, but, for the most part, everyone is very understanding when we do have an early printing need."

Sales tax rebate up

Christmas shopping in November apparently was the reason for the sales tax increase in 1993, as compared with the same month in 1992, according to the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park had a 9.55-percent gain in sales taxes collected by businesses in November.

The city this week received a check for \$14,564.30 on taxes collected in November. The same month the previous year produced \$13,294.32.

However, Iowa Park had the lowest gain of the cities in Wichita County: Electra, 20.43; Wichita Falls, 23.65, and Burkburnett, 34.07.

Holiday businesses also showed a big gain, 98.83 percent, in fact. That brought about a check for \$7,191.51 this week, as compared to \$3,616.79 last year.

The rebates reflect taxes collected on sales during November and reported to the comptroller in December.

Following the program, time was allotted for members to look through the craft magazine library.

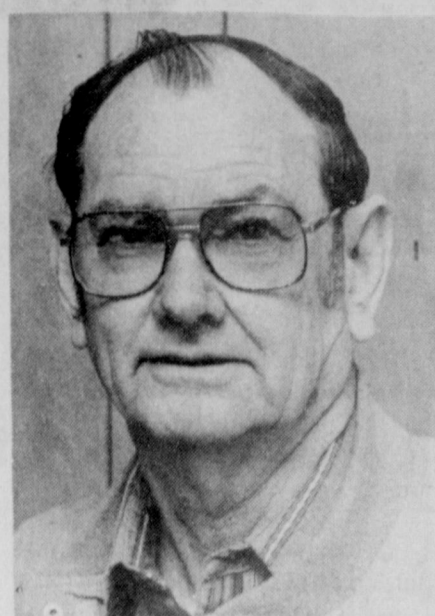
Meetings are held the second Tuesday of the month at the RAC. Potential new members and guests are always welcome to attend the meetings.

Except for serving in the military from 1953-55, Bill was employed by the Water District 41 years and four months when he retired on Jan. 1, 1992.

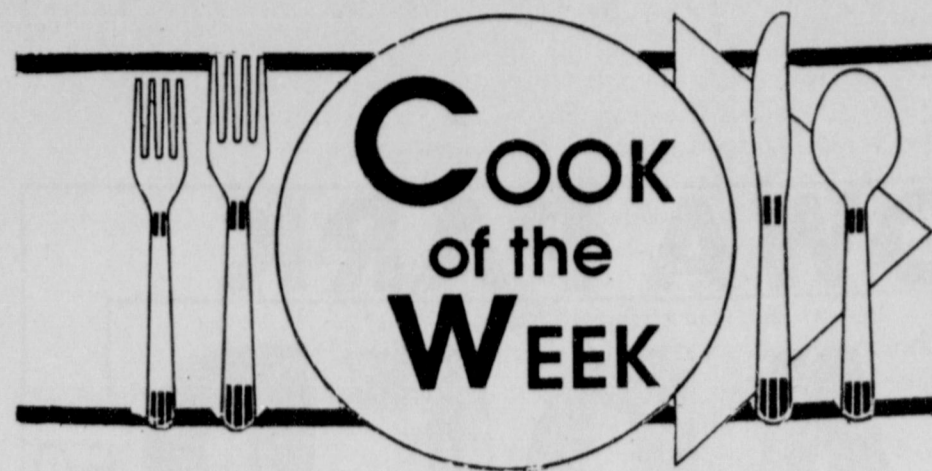

Bill's four children are Billy Joe Jr. of Oklahoma City, Eddy Ray of Blair, Okla., Rebecca Kinnamon of Iowa Park, and Jeanna Hefter of Watauga.

In his leisure time, Bill said that he use to play baseball and liked to hunt and fish, but "it's getting to be too much of a hassle." Now, he enjoys doing carpentry work, welding, and working on old cars. He also likes to garden and is thinking about building a small greenhouse.

Bill became interested in cooking several years ago, and likes to share his recipes. When he was going to welding school, his instructor gave him a recipe for "Christmas Candy." Bill says the candy is easy to make and is delicious. The recipe is one he has shared with many friends.

"Lemon-Herb Chicken" and "Broccoli Amandine" are recipes that Bill likes to prepare and serve together, but his favorite meal is beef barbecued on the outside cooker.



Lemon-Herb Chicken

Combine in small bowl:
2/3 cup lemon juice
1/3 cup olive oil
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. sugar
1 1/2 tsp. crumbled leaf tarragon
Stir well and pour over 1 1/2 lbs. chicken pieces. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Drain chicken, reserving marinade. Place in baking dish and bake 1 hour at 350 degrees. Baste chicken every 20 minutes with reserved marinade. Serve with rice. Serves 4.

Broccoli Amandine

Prepare 1 - 10 oz. package frozen broccoli according to package directions; drain.
Melt 1/4 cup butter, stir in 1/4 cup slivered blanched almonds, and cook until lightly browned.
Toss with hot broccoli. Serves 4.

Bill's Spaghetti Casserole

1 - 2 lbs. cooked lean hamburger meat
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 Tbsp. Rosemary
1/4 cup white wine
1 can cut-up tomatoes
1 small can tomato sauce
1 can cream of mushroom soup
Cooked spaghetti
Lite Velveeta cheese, sliced thinly
Black olives, sliced (optional)
Cook meat and onion in small amount of water in bottom of skillet; drain. Add Rosemary, wine, tomato sauce and cut-up tomatoes with juice to meat. Cook together, uncovered, over low heat.
Cook spaghetti. When spaghetti is ready, spread 1/2 of meat mixture in 9x13 baking dish and layer with all of spaghetti. Spread can of cream of mushroom soup over spaghetti. Layer again with remaining sauce and top with cheese and olives if desired. Cook 20 minutes in 320 degree oven until warmed throughout and cheese is melted. Serve with French bread and a green salad. Serves up to 6.

Bill Dickerson's Christmas Candy

3 cups pecans, chopped
Large pkg. coconut
Large jar cherries (approx. 8 oz.), chopped
1 can Eagle Brand milk
1 1/2 lbs. powdered sugar
12 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate chips
1/4 lb. paraffin
1 stick butter, melted
Mix pecans, coconut, cherries, Eagle Brand milk, powdered sugar, and butter. (Use your hands to ensure they are blended thoroughly.) Freeze.
Roll mixture into small balls. Place on waxed paper-lined cookie sheets, placing a toothpick in the center of each. Freeze. Melt chocolate chips and paraffin together in a double boiler. Dip each candy in chocolate mixture and place back on waxed paper until set. Enjoy!!

Fat-Free 1000 Island Dressing

1 cup mayonnaise, fat-free
1/4 cup ketchup
1 Tbsp. minced onion
1 Tbsp. green pepper
2 Tbsp. chopped parsley
Blend well with small whisk and serve over lettuce wedges.

Potato Nachos

2 medium baking potatoes
1 - 9 oz. can nacho cheese dip
1 - 4 oz. can diced green chili pepper drained
1/2 cup salsa
Sour cream

Scrub potatoes and cut into 3/8 inch slices. Place slices in single layer on greased cookie sheet. Cover with foil and bake 15 minutes at 425 degrees. Spoon cheese dip over potatoes and sprinkle with chili peppers. Bake uncovered 3 to 5 minutes or until cheese melts. Top with salsa and serve with sour cream. Serves 4.

Roast Beef Dinner

4 lb. boneless sirloin roast beef
4 large potatoes, peeled and cubed
4 large carrots, pared and sliced
4 stalks celery, washed and sliced
2 small onions, quartered
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 bay leaf
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
Place in crock pot in order given. Cook 6 hours on medium, or 8 hours on low. Remove bay leaf before serving.

Banana Bread - Sugarless

1 3/4 cup flour
2 1/4 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
Blend:
1/3 cup shortening
2/3 cup artificial sugar (NutraSweet)
3/4 tsp. lemon juice
Beat in:
2 beaten eggs
1 1/4 cup (3 large) bananas, mashed
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
Mix dry ingredients with moist mixture. Spray 8 1/2x4 1/2 inch pan with Pam. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

New pastor had unlikely start in life

In 1960 a Czechoslovakian refugee widow with a five-year-old son and a child on the way was experiencing deep poverty in Karlshue, Germany. She had also been diagnosed with tuberculosis and given only a short time to live.

In April that year a baby boy was born to the mother and she christened him Jurgin Leisner.

That's how life began for Jeff Ratliff. Ratliff and his family moved here the latter part of December for him to take over duties as the new minister of the Iowa Park Church of Christ.

Ratliff has experienced a number of changes in his short lifetime, other than a name change and living an ocean away from his birthplace. But, he believes God has had a hand in each change that has come to him.

In fact, the Providence of God is the overriding factor in his life, from his adoption to the present time, he says.

Dr. Glen Boyd, a missionary in Germany supported by the Littlefield Church of Christ, learned of the widow's plight. He found out that because of her illness the widow had to give up her boys for adoption and that she wanted her sons to be raised in America.

She told him that she wanted her sons to have a better home and life, and a chance for a future and she believed that would be in the United States.

Dr. Boyd knew that J.D. and Sue Ratliff, members of the Littlefield Church that supported him, had lost two sons shortly after birth, and a five-year-old daughter with a brain tumor. He also knew the couple wanted to adopt children.

The minister contacted the Ratliffs and they were anxious to adopt the boys, but the German quota for adoptees had been exceeded.

But, with the help of Dr. Boyd and a letter written by former U.S. Congressman George Mahon, for reasons unknown, the Ratliffs could adopt the baby, but not his brother. His brother was sent to an orphanage in Germany.

Jeff's adoptive parents met the plane in Dallas that brought him to America and he was given the name Jeff Ratliff. He became a naturalized citizen in Lubbock when he was five years old.

Ratliff was reared on a cotton farm near Littlefield and when he was old enough he began helping farm the land. After graduating Littlefield High School in 1978 he farmed two years.

By 1980 Jeff began to realize he did not want to make a career of farming and was ready to make a change. He was finally ready to go

to college. He entered Texas Tech, graduating in 1984 with a BBA degree in Finance.

Upon graduation Jeff attended Republic Bank Credit Training Program six months. When he completed that course he went to Midland where he served as loan review officer for Republic Bank three years.

For several years Jeff had had thoughts of becoming a minister, but would dismiss them. The thought would always return.

During his years at the Midland bank he met his future wife, Donna Sue Davis, daughter of the associate minister at North A Church of Christ in Midland.

She was attending Abilene Christian University, working toward a degree in Communications. They were married in June 1986. Jeff said, "I could see more and more how the Providence of God kept working in my life, from my adoption until I met my wife".

Donna's father, Clinton Davis, was a missionary in Denmark when she was born in Copenhagen. "Donna had more or less been raised and trained to be a minister's wife, and she encouraged me to listen to 'my heart'", Jeff commented.

He added, "I believe it takes a special kind of person to be a preacher's wife. I became even more convinced that God had a purpose for me, even to helping me find a wife who would complement my life".

By mid-1988, Ratliff had made up his mind to make another change. He quit the bank and entered Sunset School of Preaching in Lubbock.

"I believe God interceded in my behalf again while I was a student there," Jeff said. He was referring to a time when a visiting German Church of Christ minister visited the school.

When Jeff met the minister and told him how he came to be in America, the minister remembered Jeff's name in Germany. He had been the one who had helped Dr. Boyd prepare the papers for Jeff's adoption more than 30 years before.

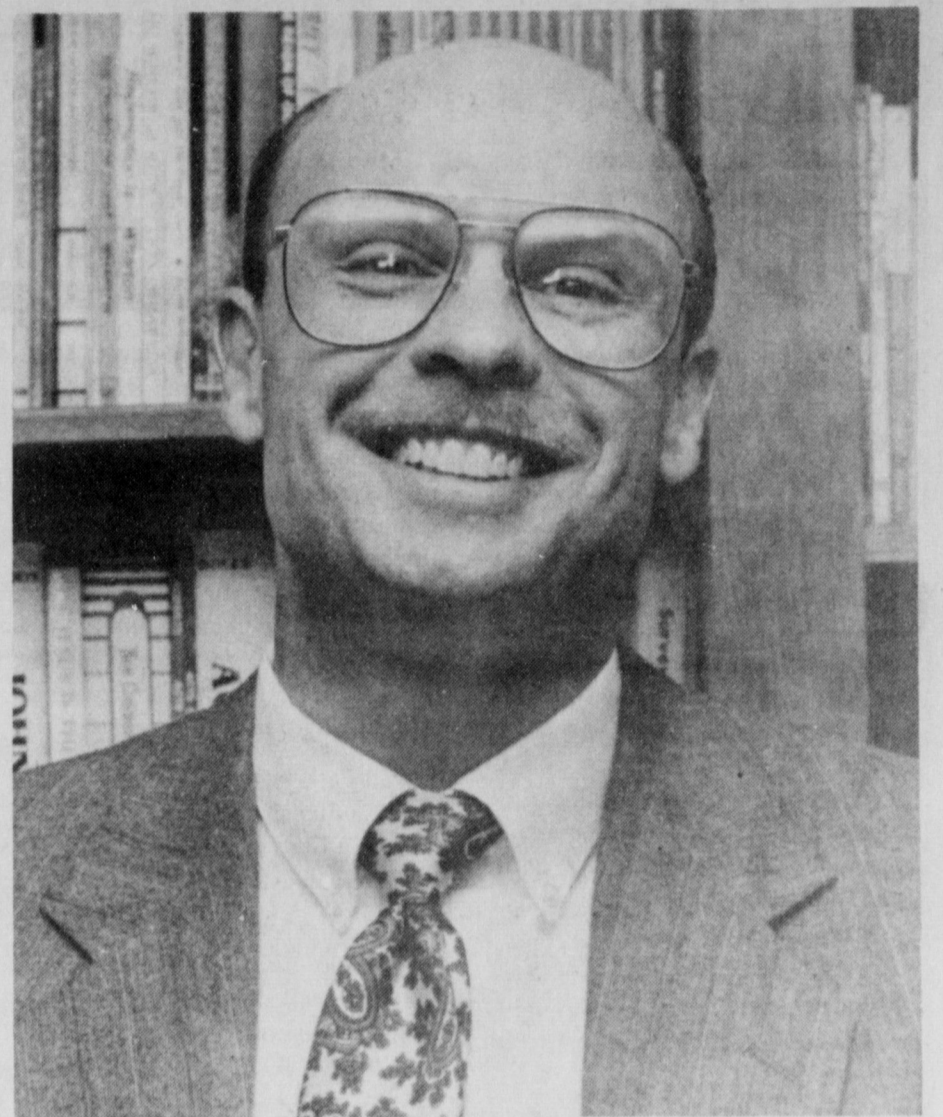
Jeff told the minister he had no idea what had happened to his brother, except that he was sent to an orphanage. He promised Jeff he would try to find out about his brother. 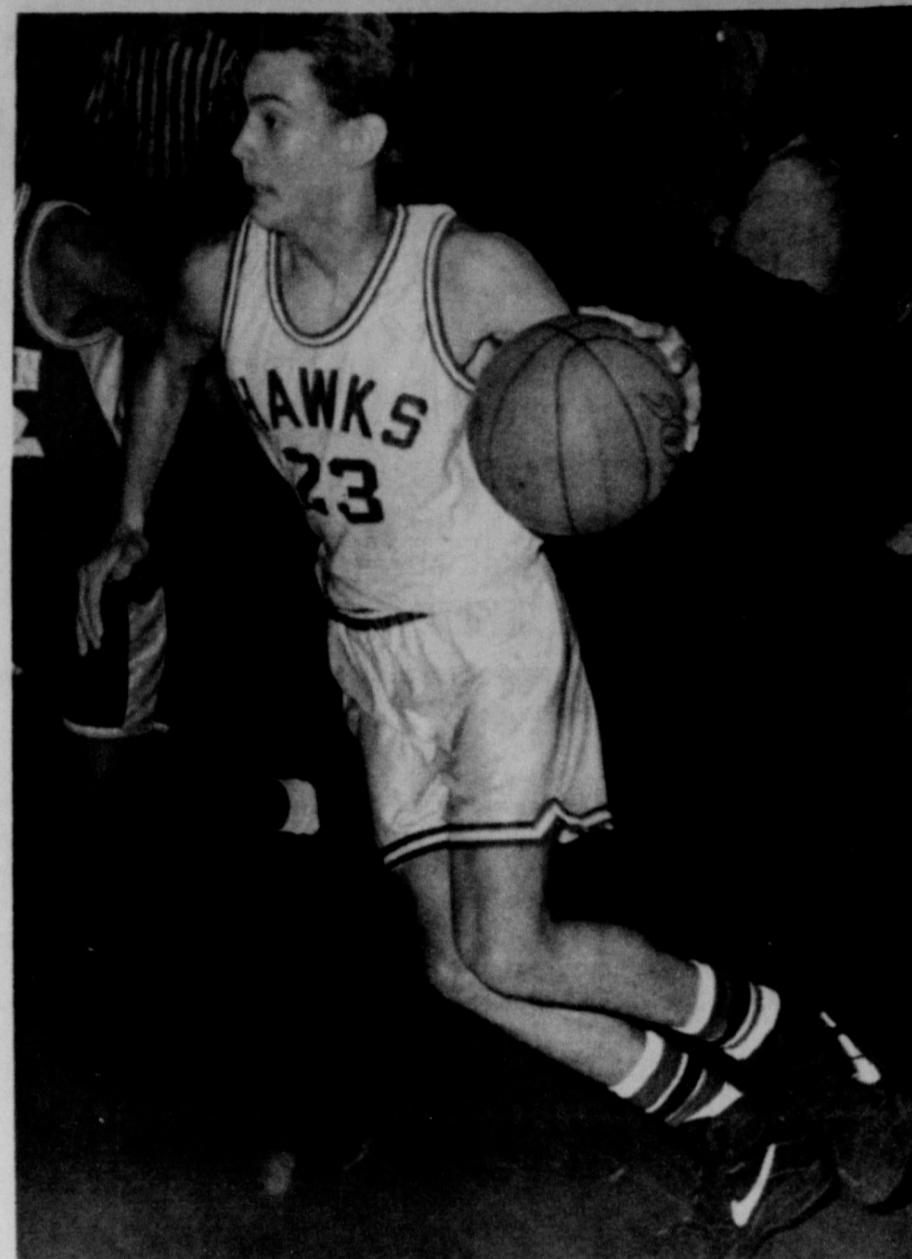
