"If the pecans are on the ground, they are free to anyone who wants to pick them up," Jones said, "but flailing is not allowed."

The administrator said he hopes those who gather the nuts are residents, for their personal use, and not being harvested for sale as a profit.

Dr. Yoshi Fukasawa, economics professor at Midwestern State Univ., said, "I'm seeing recovery signs," referring to the national ecchomy.

In the immediate area, he said construction and future military transfers at Sheppard Air Force Base will help the economy, as will anticipated government spending on highway construction.

He also predicted the "oil picture to improve, but not as much as the 1980s," and prices to farmers also are expected to improve for their products.

In the short term, Dr. Fukasawa said "I am more optimistic than most" other economists. He said the government must continue to "jump start" the economy either by allowing business investment interest or by government spending.

Long term, according to the economist, improvement will depend on increased productivity of American workers.

"The United States must remain a leader in free trade, and European and





Carey responded to the call and chose to go to India, and on June 13, 1793, he and his wife, their four children, his wite's sister, and John Thomas boarded a Danish ship and sailed toward that country.

A high point of interest in the review was a skit "Speak Not of Dr. Carey" reenacted by Mrs. O.S. McLemore, wno represented Carey and Mrs. Patterson who represented Alexander Duff, a Scotish missionary. The setting was in the bedroom of the Carey home in Serampore in 1834 when Carey was on his death bed. The conversation between the two men revealed the triumphs and tragedies of

Carey's 40 years in India. It also described his work as a gardener, horticulturist, writer of scientific papers, translator of the entire Bible into three major languages, his help in founding Seramore College and being a real asset to the government.

Mrs. Bell gave highlights of chapter three of the book, "Make Haste to Heal the Hearts of Pain," which described the current work of the Bangalore Baptist Hospital. She said that it was built in 1973 and is still owned by Southern Baptists, but is managed by the Christian Medical College.

Concluding, she said that there had been a celebration in 1992 of the founding of the Mission Society in England in 1792, and a celebration of Carey's arrival in India.

During the social hour, she served Indian tea as a special treat in the refreshments.





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

Arrington told the council he has already reached an agreement from the Lakeview Church of God, which received half the land dedicated for the closed street, to sell him the same amount as the city is offering.


The city is required by law to put the land up for sealed bids, because it is valued at \$5,000 or more.

learn to make proper choices. Throughout biblical history, one person or a group of persons was able to make a difference in correcting societal ills.







traditions of the fathers are equally authoritative with the inspired Word of God. At that point we part company. The true church today is governed by the Bible alone. (1 Timothy 6:3, 4).

The traditions of the fathers down through the centuries have developed a rather elaborate system of church government. The pope stands at the top, with the cardinals, archbishops, bishops, and parish priests beneath. Since we as members of the church of Christ are pledged to stand with the Bible and only the Bible, we cannot accept that system of church organization. The church of Christ acknowledges Jesus as its head. (Eph. 1:22, 23). The Roman Catholic church recognizes the pope as the head of the church.

The Catholic Church has an elaborate system of worship, involving the use of incense, the lighting of candles, and the use of images. Since we as members of the church of Christ do not follow the traditions of the fathers, we must leave these alone also. The church of Christ does not fit into the label called Catholic.

Is the church of Christ Protestant? We believe in the same God, the same Savior, the same apostles, and in the same worthies of the Old and New Testaments. We believe in the same basic moral principles. We believe in the same Bible. We believe in the same Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. We also join in protesting against the un-Scriptural practices and doctrines of the Roman Catholic church. We agree that the Roman church is an apostate church.

Here comes the parting of the ways. God has not approved modification and change in His original New Testament church. (2 John 9). We as members of the church of Christ do not believe in the decrees of religious councils, nor in the creeds which man has written. (1 Cor. 3:4). Rather we believe that the only authoritative and dependable guide to heaven is the Bible. Next week we will examine the topic "NEITHER CATHOLIC, PROTESTANT, NOR JEW" #3.

Duerson delights South American guests with down-home cooking

By DWIGHT E. SHEAD ON BOARD USS CUSHING (DD 985) - He might not be an internationally-known chef, but Navy Petty Officer First Class Ronald G. Duerson is more than capable of holding his own with a saucepan.

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Duerson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Lee Duerson and husband of the former Dori Lynn Burton, all of Iowa Park, has been working in food service for nearly a decade.

"Even before I decided to join the navy, I was already associated with the food industry," explains the 1980 Iowa Park High School graduate, now a mess management specialist assigned to the Commander, South Atlantic Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet (USCOMSOLANT).

"I've worked for several fast food operations and I was also the produce manager for a large super market in my hometown."

On July 14, 1992, when U.S. COMSOLANT embarked on the destroyer USS Cushing to begin the annual Unitas 33-92 cruise, Duerson knew that his services would be called upon to uphold America's reputation for good food and gracious hospitality.

Over the course of a four-month long voyage, as the flag mess supervisor and head mess specialist for the cruise, Duerson has catered and helped to host numerous luncheons and receptions for South American guests and dignitaries.

Duerson, and the other members of the USCOMSOLANT staff, are part of a multinational task force operating in South American coastal waters alongside the navies of South American countries. The task force of U.S. and South American ships take part each year in the naval exercise known as "Unitas," which is the Latin word for unity. This is not Duerson's first visit to the other America.

"The first time I participated in Unitas was in 1990. Then I was a petty officer second class augmenting the flag mess staff," explains the 31-year-old Navy man. "I came aboard with two goals in mind -- first to get my enlisted surface warfare pin, and second to become a permanent staff member. By the time the cruise ended, I had accomplished both of my goals.

"Since my first cruise, I've been meritoriously advanced to petty officer first class, and I'm currently making my third Unitas cruise," he said.

Duerson joined the Navy in June 1982 for what he said was a "much needed change of pace. "Although I was born and raised in an Air Force town, I always had a great passion for the sea," he says. "At first, I thought about attending college, but I admitted to myself that I didn't have the discipline right then to complete it."

Instead Duerson looked for a place where discipline was built in. He liked what he found so well, that he is now a 10-year veteran of the naval service.

Duerson says that being a Navy mess management specialist is a challenging and rewarding career.

"So far I've worked with the marine Corps, helped to manage a hotel when I operated a bachelor officers quarters, and served as a front line supervisor at a major Navy commissary store," he says.

Duerson says that he can't see himself doing anything but what he's currently doing.

"There aren't many jobs that can be challenging yet rewarding, arduous yet entertaining," he said. "Every day, I'm faced with something new and I love it,

"The only drawback to navy life is the family separation," he added, "but I'm one of the lucky ones. My wife, Dori, supports me and my career one hundred percent. When I'm down, she's the one who motivates me because she feels that she's just as much a part of the Navy as I am -- and she's right."

Duerson says that he definitely plans to make the Navy a 20-year career. "My future plans are to get orders to the state of Texas. I want to buy a home and start to set myself up for retirement," he said. "I want my children raised in Texas and become as proud of Texas as I am.

"Before I call the Navy quits, I plan to have a degree in culinary science," he concluded. "Eventually I will pursue my dream of becoming a dietician for a major hospital."

AUSTIN — On opening day of the special session last week, Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, claimed he has enough votes to be elected speaker in January's regular session.

Meanwhile, across the rotunda, senators quickly adopted a proposed constitutional amendment to shift money from property-rich to property-poor school districts, then prepared to confirm some 300 of Gov. Ann Richards new appointments.

But in the session's opening days, Laney's announcement completely overshadowed the called purpose of the session: to remedy the state's system of funding public schools.

Sources close to lame-duck Speaker Gib Lewis said one scenario has him stepping down this session when all other business is finished — to let House members elect Laney immediately.

Lewis, D-Fort Worth, did not seek re-election, and the House must elect a new speaker at the beginning of each regular session.

Organize, Save Time

By installing a new speaker now, the House could make the January election a formality, avoiding the traditional two-week slow period while the new speaker hires his staff and makes committee appointments.

By week's end, all other major speaker candidates had conceded to Laney, fueling the early House organization theory.

Ironically, Laney's victory claim came one day before former House Speaker Gus Mutscher pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit mail fraud in a land development scam that bilked investors out of nearly \$1.5 million in Washington and Fayette counties.

Mutscher, 59, pleaded guilty minutes before he was to stand trial before a federal jury in Galveston on 14 felony charges including mail fraud and money laundering. Sentencing is set for Jan. 8.

Senate Passes Amendment

Senators approved, 29-2, a proposed constitutional amendment labeled the "Fair Share Plan," drafted by Gov. Richards, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and Lewis.

It makes no provision for a tax increase, but opponents — mostly Republicans — say it will necessitate a state personal income tax in the near future.

The Senate plan would write minimum school funding standards into law and allow property tax dollars to be shifted from rich to poor school districts.

Crazy Enough to Do It

State District Judge Scott Mc-Cown has threatened to cut off state revenue to schools — shutting them down — unless the Legislature equalizes funding by June 1. Last week, Lewis warned House members, "the judge is crazy enough to do it. I've had him checked out and he's crazier than a stone-dead possum."

Culberson told members Judge McCown "is determined to control the entire school finance system in

Texas from his courtroom."

McCown has been often quoted for saying: "If there's no education in Texas for six months, who cares?"





HEADACHES

Headaches are the most frequent reason people seek medical care. Pain from headaches ranges from mild to severe to the daily activities of many patients. Causes of headaches are genetics psychological, neurological, vascular, biomechanical, environmental, etc...One of the most commonly over-looked causes of headache is cervicogenic headache or headache related to the neck.
