Council amends payment in Jones' termination case

After hearing his grievance statement during Monday night's regular city council meeting, aldermen voted to comply with former city administrator Gary Jones' request that he be compensated for the period he had specified in his letter of resignation.

Jones explained he had complied with city code by giving a two-weeks notice that he was leaving his post here to take a similar position at Seymour.

In his letter, which was submitted Feb. 24, he explained he would take two days of vacation the 26th and Mar. 1, because Mar. 2 was a city holiday.

The council met in a called session Mar. 1, and not only accepted his resignation, but made it effective Mar. 3.

"If I had known that I was going to be terminated early, I would have extended my vacation. Instead I hurried back to fulfill my obligation," Jones told the council.

The same meeting the council accepted the resignation, aldermen voted to replace Jones with Mike Price, who has been public works director.

Mayor Wayne House responded to Jones' comments that he did not feel delaying the termination date was necessary, because a replacement was immediately available.

However, Alderman Bob Hamilton, who had voted last week against the early termination date, read from the city code book a sentence concerning what he said was applicable to the situation.

"Two weeks' notice is expected from an employee planning to terminate employment," Hamilton read.

He then told the mayor that for the city to not observe a two-week period before termination would mean a "one-way policy."

"If we expect it from the employees, why can't they expect it from the city," Hamilton asked.

Following a lengthy discussion, three aldermen, Hamilton, Virgil Woodfin and Mark Raby, voted to pay Jones through Mar. 12. Bud Mercer and Johnny Crawford voted against the motion.

During his appearance before the council, Jones flatly stated that the reason Mayor Wayne House

In his statement, Jones said, in part, "The mayor asked that I write the agenda for Monday evening, March 1. This I did and it was posted Feb. 25. I was at work all day and nothing was said about my being terminated early.

"Friday, Feb. 26, I left for vacation and the mayor was aware I would not be

Other actions taken by the council during the meeting were:

- * approve an ordinance making it illegal for an improperly-marked vehicle to park in a handicap parking area, whether public or private property;

- * approved advertising for concrete work (curb and guttering) in the 400 block of West Park;

- * recognized Calvin Fowler as the city's Employee of the Month;

- * and took no action on changing permit and inspection fees.

"The mayor immediately started working on having my last day moved from March 12 to March 3. Believe me, I would have never believed his personal animosity would have caused him to persuade you not to take advantage of the time until March 12 (for Mike if he was going to be my replacement) to work together," Jones said.

Jones' termination pay was said to be \$8,309.99, but raised to \$9,745.94 when the Mar. 12 date was made effective.

In other business, the council accepted a bid of \$20,001 from A.C. Miser to purchase a 1.85-acre tract of property at West Highway and Fourth Street, from the city.

Miser has been leasing the land.

Another lease was discussed. That being a part of South Park to Billy James. Aldermen were told James had been allowed to extend his storage fence area into South Park, through a lease agreement approved in 1980.

However, that lease was for a five-year period, and had been overlooked when a renewal was due. James was to pay the city \$50 annually

The subject is to be on the agenda for a lengthy discussion was held on ways the city might lower the water level at Lake Buffalo, which has been overflowing more than two weeks.

One method which will be studied and presented for consideration was proposed by Administrator Price, who suggested city equipment might be used to lower the emergency spillway.

Permit total jumps ahead of last year

Two major projects have helped boost the year's building permit total to over a quarter of a million dollars. And more are on their way.

February's building permit total was \$235,105, which raised the two months of the calendar year to \$262,743.

That figure was only \$94,590 for the same period in 1992.

The major projects were the remodeling of the TU Electric building, owned by Johnny Crawford, which will soon house Parker Square Bank, and a new home on Bentwood.

Permits for construction of the X-Pert Weed Control office and facility in the 100 block of West Park, and the new county annex building at Bank and Wall were not issued at city hall until March, and are not included in February's report.

Projects aplenty around town

If you've said to yourself, "There's a lot of things changing in Iowa Park," you were correct.

Probably the most visible is the work underway on the medians along West Park Boulevard, where the electric street lights in the 100, 200 and 300 blocks are being replaced by gas lights.

Total cost of that project will exceed \$17,000.

The posts and mantels will cost \$10,013. However, Lone Star Gas has agreed to do the installation at no cost to the city, and the city's payment for the fixtures will be carried until the next fiscal year's budget.

Concrete pedestals for the posts, as well as additional curb installation in the 100 block, is costing the city \$4,800.

An additional charge on the project is a \$2,811 levy by TU Electric, for the removal of the nine existing polls.

No figures are yet available on the cost of extending electric service to the

12 gas light polls, to be used each year to serve the Christmas lighting fixtures.

Preliminary work is planned to get underway next week to construct a street through the 400 block of West Park. City Administrator Mike Price said the work will include cutting of the existing parking lot pavement for installation of a curb and gutter the length of the block.

Traffic will be closed in that area while crews are working, but opened in the afternoons, Price said.

Entries to the business parking areas will be built along the street, as well as from the east, off Colorado, according to city plans.

A narrow median is planned in the middle of the block, where a tall, four-light standard will be erected.

City and utility crews have been busy preparing for two major street projects, other than on West Park, for several weeks.

Washington is to be re-built, all the way from West Highway to Bell Road, under a program that financed the re-surfacing of South Wall a few years ago.

The project is funded under the Urban Aide Program, and is coordinated by the state highway department.

Work to relocate utilities along the route has been hampered all winter,

because of weather.

FOR TEACHERS

Trustees extend contracts

Following an executive session that lasted more than four hours, Iowa Park school trustees voted to approve contracts of teachers during a regular meeting Monday night.

When the meeting reopened, motion carried to approved the contracts as well as to retain the above base salary and residential bonus for the 1993-94 school year. Trustees Wendall House and Randy Catlin asked for the records to show they approved all but one name on the list, but did not specify which name.

Board members accepted the resignation of Todd Ward, junior high history teacher, physical education and athletics coach, and approved the hiring of Jerry O. Williams to fill the position.

Williams has a bachelor of science degree from Midwestern State

Univ.

Trustees reviewed a proposal by Ken Smith to refinance school bonds. Smith's information indicated that if the bonds were refinanced, the average yearly savings for the school district would be \$6,600, or \$123,905.89 over the life of the bonds.

Since Smith was unable to attend the meeting, trustees will meet with Smith at 7:30 p.m. March 23 for further review and discussion.

Board members voted to adopt a revision to the school board policy concerning public participation in board meetings. The section of the policy titled "Agenda Presentation," was changed to read,

"A request to place an item on the agenda in order to address the Board shall be made in writing to the Superintendent's office at least three days before the agenda is prepared. ...The request shall be made by completing a Citizen's Request for a Hearing With the School Board form, which is available through the superintendent's office."

Trustees voted unanimously to send a letter to State Senator Steve Carriker to voice opposition to Senate Bill 20. The sex education bill calls for each school district to offer an objec-

tive program of education for self-development and life skills in kindergarten through grade 12.

Superintendent Glen Mitchell reported that total enrollment is up 74 students from March of last year. 2,017 students are currently enrolled in Iowa Park Schools, compared to 1,943 last March. The junior high shows the bulk of the increase, with enrollment up by 51.

In other business trustees:
* approved a May 17 field trip to Fort Worth for the fifth grade class to go to the Casa Manana and Omni Theaters.

- * accepted the donation of 23 black and green golf bags for the golf team from Second Hand Sports in Wichita Falls. Robert Palmer reported the value of the bags at \$874.

- * approved the use of both high school gymnasiums for a girls summer basketball camp in May and June.

- * adopted "Shared Vision Statements" for the school district.

- * adopted the local textbook committee report for 1993.

Arrest solves burglary case

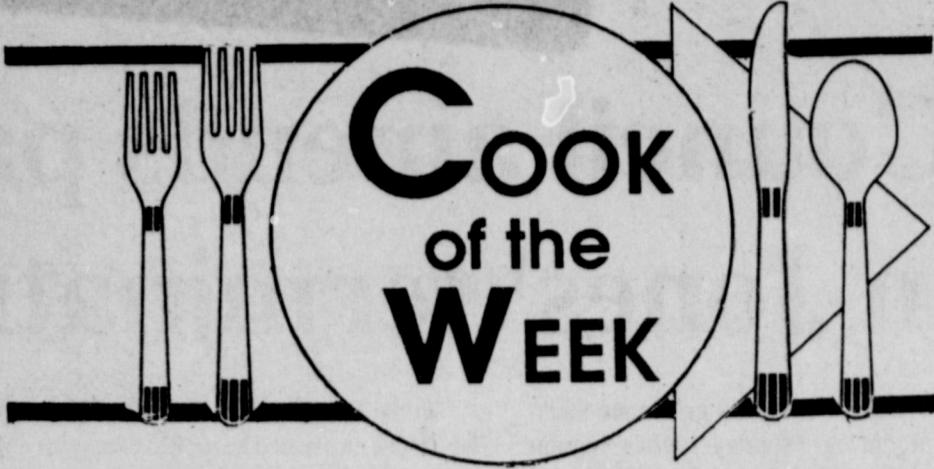
Kim planned originally to become a veterinarian, but she changed her mind and graduated with a degree in Biomedical Science.

Kim's grandparents are from England and she has gotten a lot of recipes from her grandmother. The recipe for "English Plum Pudding" is one that she uses every year at Christmas time. She said that Dale likes to hunt deer, and the recipe, "Shopper's Special" is a good way to prepare venison.

Shopper's Special

3 lbs. venison or stew meat, cut up
1 pkg. dry onion soup mix
1 can cream of mushroom soup
2/3 cup cooking sherry
Combine ingredients in casserole dish. Cover and bake 3 hours at 300 degrees.

This may be mixed a day ahead and refrigerated. For longer cooking time (so you can shop more!) set oven at 250 degrees and cook 4-5 hours. Serve with rice or noodles.

Crunchy Top Sweet Potato Souffle

3 cups mashed sweet potatoes
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/3 stick margarine
Mix together all ingredients and beat with mixer until fluffy and potato strings are removed. Pour into greased baking dish and top with topping. Bake at 350 degrees until heated, about 30 minutes.

Topping

1/3 stick margarine
1 cup brown sugar
1/3 cup flour
1 cup chopped pecans.
Mix and pour over top of sweet potato mixture.
Serves 8-10.

English Plum Pudding

3 cups all purpose flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tps. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. allspice
1/2 tsp. cloves
2 cups seedless raisins
1 cup peeled, chopped apple
1 cup currents
1 cup light molasses
1 cup cold water
2 cups chopped suet
Combine flour, soda, salt and spices in mixing bowl; mix well. Stir in raisins, apple and currents. In another bowl mix molasses, suet and water. Mix well and add to dry mix and mix well. Spoon mixture into a well-buttered 10-cup pudding mold. Cover tightly and place mold on a shallow rack in a large deep kettle (or stock pot) with enough boiling water to come halfway up mold. Cover kettle and steam pudding 4 - 4 1/2 hours. Replace water as needed.

Hard Sauce

1/2 cup margarine
1 cup powdered sugar
2 Tbsps. rum or brandy
Mix ingredients until fluffy and chill. Put 1 tablespoon hard sauce on each piece of cake.

Sausage Appetizer

5 cups Bisquick
2 lbs. Jimmy Dean Sausage
2 - 10 oz. pkgs. Cheddar cheese, shredded
Mix thoroughly and roll into 1-inch balls. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Can be frozen and re-heated in oven or microwave.

Yorkshire Pudding

2 eggs
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 cup milk
2 Tbsps. bacon drippings
Mix in a blender - eggs, salt, flour and milk until well blended, about one minute. Refrigerate at least 1 hour. Pre-heat oven to 400 degrees. Heat muffin pans with bacon drippings until drippings melt. Pour mixture into pans and bake 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake 15 minutes longer.

Yorkshire Pudding is served with roast beef, or it can be used to make Toad-in-the-Hole. Serves 6.

Broccoli Casserole

1 or 2 stalks fresh broccoli
1 small onion, chopped
7 medium mushrooms, chopped
1 roll Kraft Garlic Cheese
1 can cream of mushroom soup
Dash Tabasco
Saute onions and mushrooms in butter. Add garlic cheese, then soup and dash of Tabasco. Steam broccoli. Chop broccoli and pour sauce over it. Serves 6-8.

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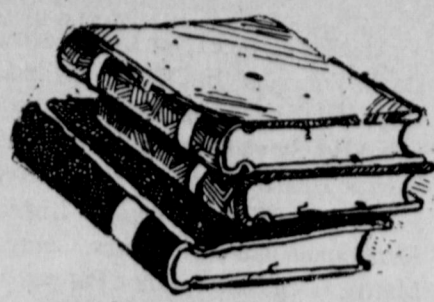

Ergonomics topic of Evening Lions meeting

A program on Ergonomics was presented for the Evening Lions Tuesday by co-owners of HumanFit Inc., a new company in the area. Harvey Troutman, program chairman, introduced Lynda Enos, a registered nurse for over 12 years, board certified in Occupational Health Nursing, and Dawn Mitchell, whose education and experience is in Mechanical and Human Factors Engineering Education.

Through separate talks and joint discussions, they defined ergonomics as an applied science which involves studying the relationship between people and their working environment. They also explained how HumanFit specializes in custom designed programs to meet the companies needs in prevention and management of ergonomics related illness and injury. They also stressed that it provides a unique approach to ergonomics through engineering and occupational health expertise.

In giving the need for ergonomics in businesses and industries, the speakers said that it would result in less back injuries and repetitive trauma, disorders that cost 20 to 30 billion dollars annually in medical treatment and lost work days. 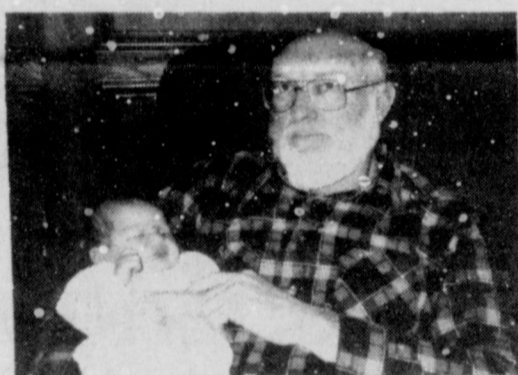

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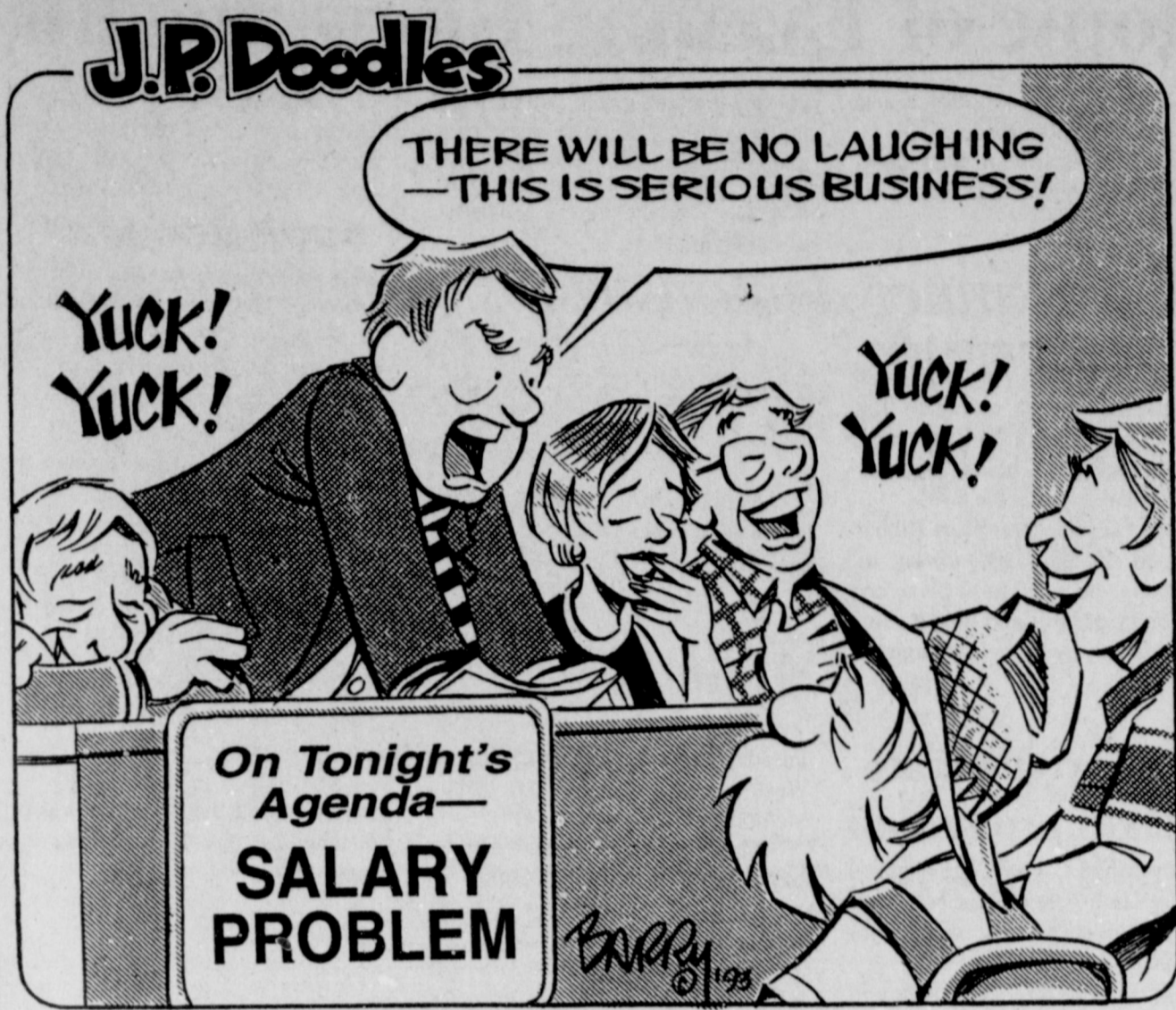

If the majority of our buying was done in Iowa Park, there's no question in my mind that the additional sales taxes generated, as well as the increase in ad valorem taxes those businesses would be paying, could lower our city taxes on homes 20 to 30 percent. Maybe even more.

Just something to think about, the next time you are going to buy something.

"Tubby" Flower lived with the Oscar Killians, two Andrews teachers. Mrs. Killian and "Tubby" were sisters.

And "Tubby" was of athletic build, talent, and mind-set. She could punt a football 50 yards or more, pass with pinpoint accuracy, tackle with crushing humiliation, and when given the ball, would simply run over or through the opposition.

She must have been Andrews' first woman libber because she had a habit of strolling onto the field toward the close of practice sessions, grab a ball, and proceed to outshine, outdo, outmaneuver and humble players and coaches alike.

It was hard to gain self-confidence and poise when a girl kept your face buried in the sod most of the time. She not only dominated the playing field but the halls, classrooms, and gyms as well. She flaunted her superior physical ability and had the muscle and toughness to back it up.

The Mustangs could have used her.

Dolls used in classroom

Cabbage Patch Kids, plastic dolls and teddy bears lying on high school students' desks did not signal a regression to pre-school days. Instead, it signaled the beginning of an experiment in Parenting and Child Development class.

The experiment, which began February 23 and ended March 4, was designed "to teach commitment, responsibility, and awareness of the ever-abiding presence of children," according to Margaret Batson, parenting and child development teacher.

According to Batson, the students must either carry a doll with some weight or a five pound sugar bag. Those who choose not to carry a doll have the option of writing a ten page report on parenting. Out of the forty five students in the class, only three have opted for the paper, Batson said.

The students name the babies and produce a mock birth certificate. If the "parent" does not have the baby with him, a babysitter must be provided. Batson said she charges four dollars an hour to watch the babies, but other people set their own rates. The students then must fill out a report daily on the baby's actions, who kept it and for how much. The "parents" must provide a warm, safe, secure environment and are not to leave the baby alone, stuffed in a locker or locked in a car.

"We usually do this project when we are studying young babies, newborn to one year old. The students are usually very eager to do the project," Batson said.

The class is currently studying one year old babies and will also learn about child abuse, babysitting and careers with children.

The class is not the only group benefiting from the project. Students also have pledge cards where ten people pledge money for the eight days the dolls are being cared for. The money raised will go to a charity in Iowa Park.

The students are checked each day on the care of their children. On the last day of the experiment, child care costs will be determined, which also teaches financial planning. Two grades are given, which will count as a big part of the six weeks grade.

"Another big lesson of the project is the awareness of always having the baby. After the project's over, people will be sitting there and all of a sudden ask, 'Where's my baby?'" said Batson.

"It's (the project) a nice thing, but not if people aren't serious about it," said senior Monica Wainscott.

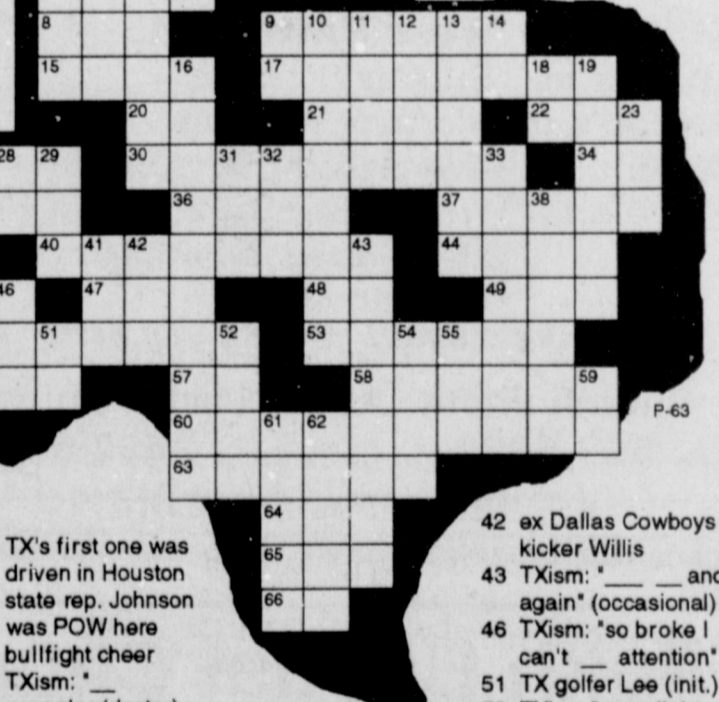



AUSTIN - President Clinton won some nods from sage heads in Texas last week when he announced, with Texas Comptroller John Sharp at this side, a top-to-bottom audit of federal government modeled after Texas'.

Sharp won praises here in '91 with his waste-finding audits of state agencies; now, fittingly, he's hit the big time.

Those '91 audits, make no mistake, are perhaps the prime reason why the Texas legislative leadership feels comfortable it can adopt a budget this session with no new taxes.

That, and the unmistakable public roar for reduced waste in government.

Sharp, standing at the president's side, is a man who is where he ought to be; if he can do for the feds what he did for Texans, he should get the U.S.A.'s highest civilian medal.

In the Senate

Senators approved and sent to the House a \$70 billion state budget with an 8.3 percent spending hike, no new taxes. Big ticket items are the 22.5 percent increase in health and human services spending, and 38 percent increase for new prisons and facilities.

Of the total amount, \$38.9 billion comes from state-generated funds, the remainder from mostly federal funds.

Touted as a "frugal budget," only two senators, Republicans John Leedom and Jane Nelson, voted against it.

House Appropriations Committee members, meanwhile, worked until midnight last week to draft their budget.

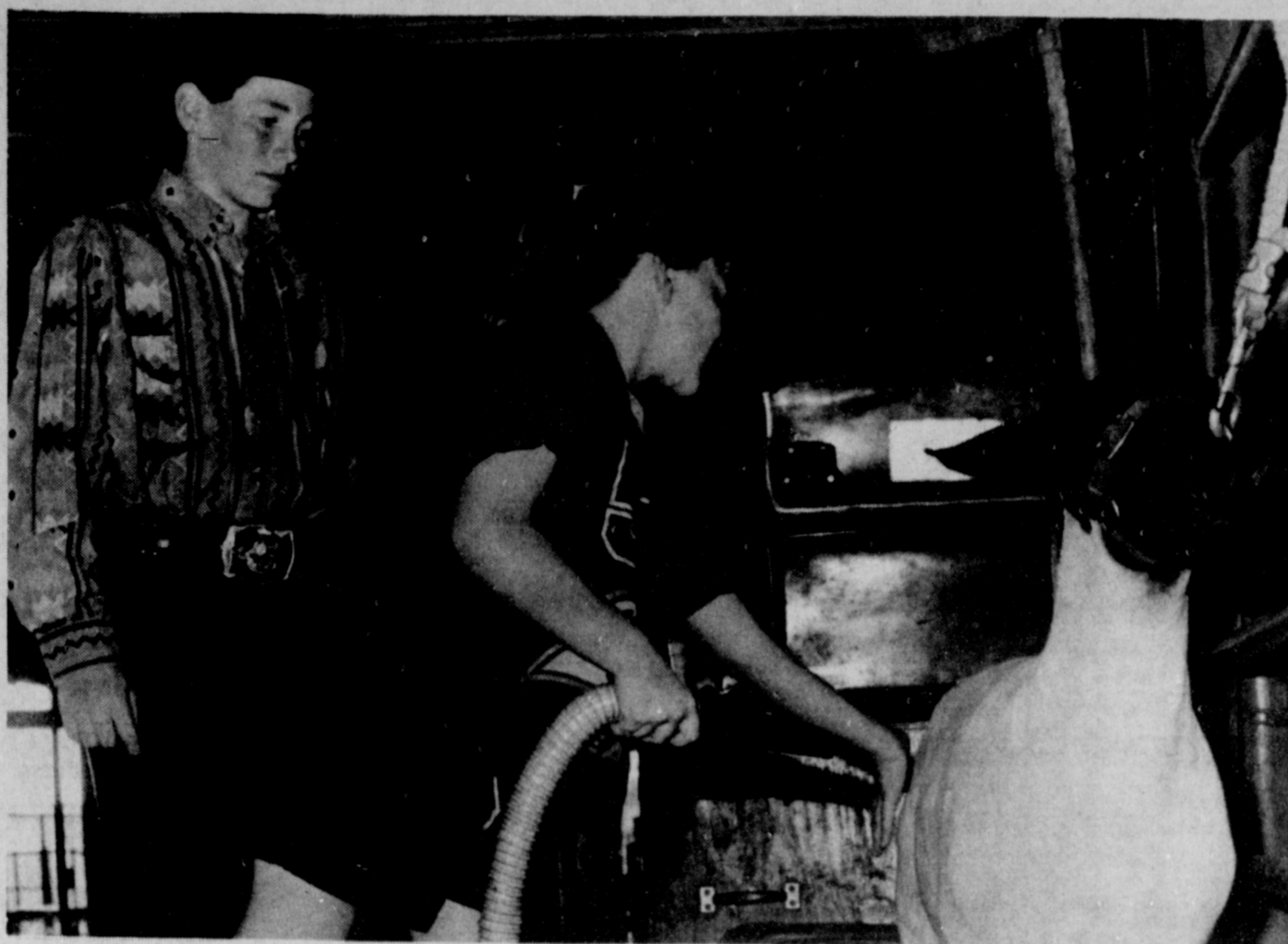
Both chambers are ahead of tradition in this regard; many House members attribute progress there to the smooth leadership under Speaker Pete Laney and Speaker Pro Tem Tom Uher.

Clinton Boosts Krueger

Clinton also pumped hard for interim Sen. Bob Krueger, facing a May 1 special election; that same day, reports surfaced that Krueger's '84 Senate campaign suffered an IRS lien for unpaid unemployment insurance taxes, now paid.

Meanwhile, former Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox said he might drop out of that race if he is convinced a bloody fight with fellow Democrat Krueger would hurt the party.

Sources in gay-lesbian activist groups said Mattox will back away, possibly for an as-yet undesignated post with the Clinton administration, but also because of inadequate campaign funds.

On the GOP side, Tom Luce supports State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison and won't enter the fray himself; former Gov. John Connally endorsed Congressman Jack Fields, who started TV ads with money raised by the help of Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole.

State Republicans have formed a coalition to work against passage of the Robin Hood School finance reform amendment.

They claim Gov. Richards and other Democrats are trying to blackmail voters into approving the amendment on the May 1 ballot with a threat that a Democrat state district judge will close all public schools if they don't.

State Rep. John Culberson, R-Houston, urged Houston voters to dump the amendment, saying there still will be plenty of time for the Legislature to resolve funding in a less expensive way.

Republicans are warning that if the amendment is approved before a spending plan is outlined, then voters will have less control over the eventual price tag of school reform.

Dropout Bill Passes Senate

The Senate last week passed a bill by Rep. Gonzalo Barrientos, D-Austin, drafted to help reduce the school dropout rate. The bill would:

- Give school districts funds to help students who are at risk of dropping out because they are pregnant or are school-age parents.

- Provide money for districts to administer high school equivalency examination programs targeting students who are 16 or older and are not expected to graduate.

- Require the Texas Department of Health to notify the state education commissioner of births to school-age mothers.

Other Highlights

- Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry repaid the state for a private flight he took in his state airplane, after his hand was called by State Rep. Dan Kubiak.

- Perry had billed the state for the Austin-to-Dallas trip, saying he took it in his private airplane.

- Congressman Joe Barton, a GOP Senate candidate, urged Veterans of Foreign War members to join the fight to retain the ban on gays and lesbians in the U.S. military.

- Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, has filed legislation that would wrest control of the Alamo from the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, who have cared for the Alamo since 1905. Wilson's bill would give the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department custody of the shrine.

- A proposal by Rep. Charles Finnell, D-Holliday, would make it illegal for state workers to convert to personal-use "frequent flyer" miles they accumulate while on state business.


- Gov. Richards has signed into law a bill providing \$250 million in emergency spending to build and operate prisons. The measure provides for building and operating facilities to house more than 10,000 prison inmates and pay counties \$72 million for the cost of holding state prisoners.

- The Senate confirmed the appointment of three new members of the University of Texas System Board of Regents: Lowell Lebermann, 53, president of a beer distributorship in Austin; Martha Smiley, 45, an Austin attorney; and Peter Coneway, 48, a Houston investor.

- The Senate passed and sent to the House a bill allowing the state to buy General Motors Caprice automobiles, which are assembled in Arlington. The bill changes the maximum wheelbase and horsepower specifications for vehicles that may be purchased or leased by state agencies.

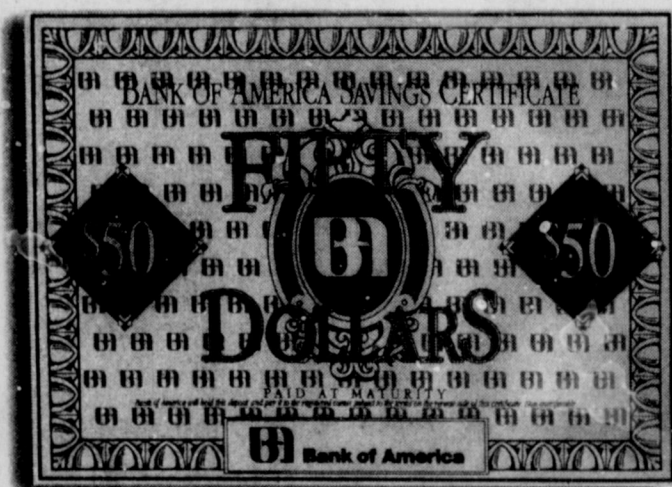

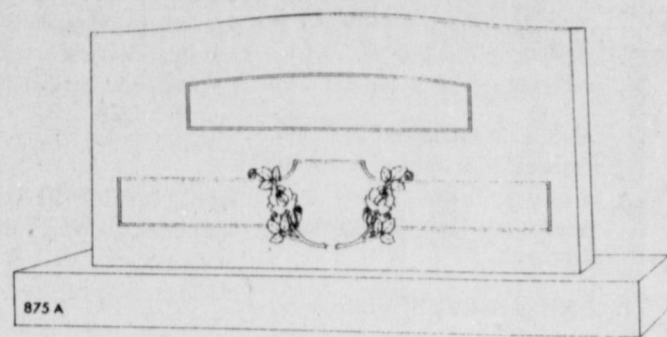
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
