STATE ADOPT NEW SECRET BALLOT; **FISHING LICENSE**

One of the bills passed by the Texas legislature and signed by the governor is the secret ballot bill. This piece of legislation was brought about by the fact that there has not been much secrecy about how people voted. It is thought that this condition ought to be remedied, that better government would result if people could vote their convictions without that vote being made public information.

The new law provides that each bearing the same number as the the repair and repainting of both ballot itself. When the voter enters the polls the ballots are to be spread face down on a table so that no one can see the numbers. The voter selects one, votes his choice, tears off the numbered stub, writes his name on the stub, and puts it in a separate sealed box from the ballot. This sealed box containing the stubs is the only source of identification as to who voted the ballot with that particular number. In case of an election contest the judge may order the stub box opened and a recount made after checking the stubs and the actual ballots. Otherwise, the stub box is not to be opened, and at the end of 60 days the district clerk will burn the stubs in the presence of the county judge.

Mc-Cormick, Commanding General, reported today. The contracts are either currently effective or will become effective by July 1, 1949. Of the total amount, \$229.611.76

went to Wichita Falls contractors. Largest contract went to a milk concern for \$177,600.00 worth of milk in addition to another \$27,000 to the same company for ice cream. Out - of - town suppliers received \$58,339.09 in awards. Bids were awarded to companies located as far away as Milwaukee, Wis. Low bidder on any contract receives the award in any case. Items covered ranged from cereal and milk to sheet iron and roofing.

Another round of invitations for bids was sent out this week, Gen. McCormick said. Three of the invitations were for parts and materials for a jet fuel system which will be installed in the engine test block used by the airplane and engine mechanics school. 

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

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

3050 feet of diversion terraces were run this week on the A. E. Bailey farm southwest of Iowa Park, these diversion terraces will direct pasture water from the cultivated field. Mr. Bailey is now in process of eradicating mesquite by applying kerosene. His pastures will be cross fenced and a rotation grazing program followed.

Terrace lines have been run on the E. E. Clack, Gale Lowrance and Van Lesley farms this week. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assigned to the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District ran the

Irrigation laterals are now in the process of being constructed on the Mike Hartmangruber farm southwest of Iowa Park. These are con-structed or elevated mostly above natural ground to insure good heads of water.

Elevated irrigation lateral ditches are now being constructed on the Hardin college farm. Most of the land that is now being leveled, bordered and prepared for irrigation will be planted to alfalfa or legumes and grass mix this fall. Legumes are the best crop that can be grown Wallace, Kans.; Mr. and Mrs. Jack on land to increase the permeability Spruiell and family and Mr. and or water intake of the soil. Most of the land has formed a hardpan from plowing approximately the same depth year after year. Legumes with their large taproots help break this hardpan. Some farmers are using a large pan breaker to break this hardpan before planting legumes, and then planning on legumes from then on to keep soil in

a more loose friable condition. Some farmers have burned off wheat stubble after wheat harvest. From results of tests this is not a recommended conservation practice. A mulch of wheat straw on or near surface of soil retards wind erosion in fall or early spring, the the straw also helps hold moisture. Straw on surface of soil helps control water erosion. The more organic material a soil has the more capable it is of holding water, and organic material can only be added to the soil by decayed vegetation or animal mat-
