## ★ Soil Conservation

3050 feet of diversion terraces were run this week on the A. E. Bailey farm southwest of Iowa Park, these diversion terraces will direct pasture water from the cultivated field. Mr. Bailey is now in process of eradicating mesquite by applying kerosene. His pastures will be cross fenced and a rotation grazing program followed.

Terrace lines have been run on the E. E. Clack, Gale Lowrance and Van Lesley farms this week. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assigned to the Wabarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District ran the lines.

Irrigation laterals are now in the process of being constructed on the Mike Hartman-gruber farm southwest of Iowa Park. These are constructed or elevated mostly above natural ground to insure good heads of water.

Elevated irrigation laterals are now being constructed on the Hardin college farm. Most of the land that is now being leveled, bordered and prepared for irrigation will be planted to alfalfa or legumes and grass mix this fall. Legumes are the best crop that can be grown on land to increase the permeability or water intake of the soil. Most of the land has formed a hardpan from plowing approximately the same depth year after year. Legumes with their large taproots help break this hardpan. Some farmers are using a large pan breaker to break this hardpan before planting legumes, and then planning on legumes from then on to keep soil in a more loose friable condition.

Some farmers have burned off wheat stubble after wheat harvest. From results of tests this is not a recommended conservation practice. A mulch of wheat straw on or near surface of soil retards wind erosion in fall or early spring, the straw also helps hold moisture. Straw on surface of soil helps control water erosion. The more organic material a soil has the more capable it is of holding water, and organic material can only be added to the soil by decayed vegetation or animal matter.

## Farmers Union Camps Discussed at Meeting

June 6 the Wichita Valley Farmers Union met at the community. The uncompromising plan of the Farmers Union for full parity for family-type farmers and the needs and plans of co-ops were topics of discussion.

The secretary gave reports on the Junior Camp and Junior Reserve plans for their camp. The Junior Camp is at Red Rocks, Colo., from June 12 through June 18. A camp for youngsters aged 10 through 15 will be held July 22 to 24 at Ceta Glenn. The cost will be very nominal and a large number from Iowa Park area are expected to attend.

Lyn Lovell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Lovell, is the Junior to attend camp from Wichita Valley Farmers Union local.

Correspondence from our senators and representatives was read and discussed. These men representing us in Washington promise their support and consideration for the Poage bill, which will enable all rural residents to have telephone service. Also their support of the agriculture and forestry bill.

Plans were completed for an ice cream supper July 5 and a watermelon feast August 2. The farmers and their families are urged to attend. There will be entertainment, recreation and interesting information for all. Remember the dates!

## Six Iowa Park Women Attend Wichita Rally

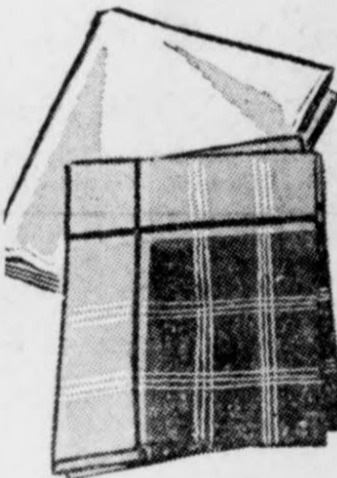
