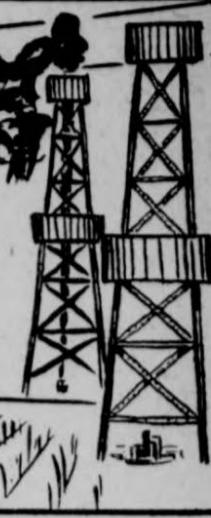

## C. C. Wilkes Gives Report on Opening Of Valley View School

Miss Juanita Smith will teach girls' physical education and coach volleyball. Miss Smith is a P.E. major from North Texas State college at Denton and she has taught three years at Sudan. She has played and coached both volleyball and basketball, and is well equipped to direct a full program in girls' physical education.

Miss Etta Kay Budd, who taught four years in the elementary schools at Lampasas, has been employed for the third grade. Miss Budd has a degree in elementary education from East Texas State college and is doing graduate work at NTSC.

Coach Sutherland began workouts on August 15 with 30 men in attendance. Since that time 19 more have joined the squad.

School will soon be in progress for the 1949-50 session. Many little improvements have been made and are being made to the school plant this summer. A soundproof partition has been installed between the principal's office. Also a more secure room has been provided for the state owned text books.

All of the floors have been treated and the floors in the cafeteria have had a coat of floor seal administered to them. The color is gray. Also a \$393 new dish washer has been installed, replacing the one which has served since the origin of the cafeteria. A new potato peeler has arrived. It has a capacity of 15 lbs. every 15 minutes. A new 10 burner stove has been installed. Also many little articles have been added to the cafeteria equipment.

Mon., Sept. 5, at 2 p.m. all teachers, cafeteria workers and bus drivers will meet in room 15 for the first faculty meeting.

The board is requiring that the personnel of the Iowa Park schools have an x-ray picture of the chest this year in addition to the regular health certificate which has been required for several years. This x-ray picture will be made at the Health Center in Wichita Falls any day during the week except Friday. No charges will be made for the x-ray picture but your doctor is at liberty to make his regular charge for the health certificate. Please attend to this before school starts if at all possible.

**Smallpox, Diphtheria and Whooping Cough**

Children 12 years of age by Sept. 1 this year need not have vaccination for whooping cough or diphtheria, however, if you have not been vaccinated in the last seven years for smallpox, it will be necessary for you to be vaccinated again before entering school this fall. The children from beginners through 12 years of age will have to be vaccinated for whooping cough, diphtheria and smallpox before we can accept you as a student of the Iowa Park schools.

**House Joint Resolution No. 22** proposing an amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**  
 Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:  
 "Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided

by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms of sessions of

each Court as it may deem necessary.  
 "The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding."  
 "The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."  
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:  
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and  
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."  
 Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.  
 Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

 Notice is hereby given, to whom concerned, that the Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, postoffice address of which is Iowa Park, Texas, on the 3rd day of August, A.D. 1949, filed its application in the office of the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in which it applies for a permit to appropriate of the unappropriated waters of the State of Texas, from the Stevens Creek, a tributary of the Wichita River, in Wichita County, Texas, as not to exceed 50 acre-feet of water per annum for municipal water supply purposes, said water to be impounded in a reservoir created by the construction of a dam, said dam to be located at a point which is North 13 degrees 4 minutes West, 2,864 feet from the Southeast corner of Section 8, Tarrant County School Land Survey No. 281, on the East bank of the Stevens Creek, in Wichita County, Texas, and is distant in a northwesterly direction from Iowa Park, Texas, three miles.  
 The said Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 proposed to construct a dam having a storage capacity of 2,965 acre-feet, and to impound therein and divert therefrom, by means of a pumping plant, not to exceed 500 acre-feet of water per annum for the purposes herein stated.  
 A hearing on the application of the said Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 will be held by the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in the office of the Board at Austin, Texas, on Monday, September 12th, A.D. 1949, beginning at ten o'clock A.M. at which time and place all parties interested may appear and be heard. Such hearing will be continued from time to time, and from place to place, if necessary until final determination has been made relative to said application as the said Board of Water Engineers may deem right, equitable and proper.

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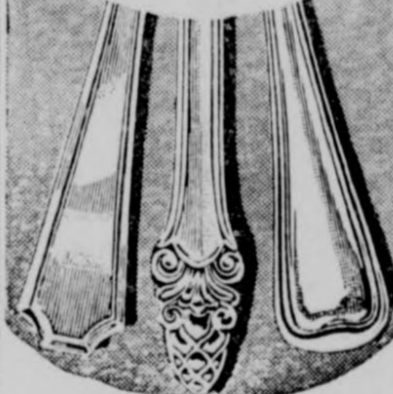

### Soil Conservation

Approximately 3/4 mile of terrace has been run on the H. C. Oenhaus farm west of Clara. The terrace will empty on well vegetated buffalo pasture. George Streit is the tenant on this farm. The Soil Conservation Service is assisting the Wilbarger Wichita Soil Conservation District ran the lines.

A stock pond is now in process of construction on the Harvey Ramm farm east of Clara. The pond will have over 15 feet depth which will provide everlasting water supply. The annual evaporation for this part of the state is usually about 6 feet, therefore, it is essential that ponds be deep.

An elevated irrigation lateral has been constructed on the Carl Greene farm east of Wichita Falls. Elevated irrigation ditches give a much better opportunity for farmers to receive a bigger head of water, and too, most of the water is above land to be watered. When ditches of this kind are constructed, with check and the turn outs installed into borders most farmers report irrigation time is cut in half.

Dewey Steed who owns an irrigated farm south of Iowa Park reports he can tell to the row on his cotton where he had clover and grass last year. He states the cotton has much greener color and is several inches taller than on land where no clover was grown. He also states there is great difference in ability of soil to absorb water on clover and grass land over the non clover land. On the first watering this year he thought water was running in holes since it traveled so slowly down the row. Clover with its large tap root penetrates subsoil areas and is an excellent soil conditioner. Mr. Steed is definitely of the opinion that clover and grasses have a place in the irrigated valley as a money crop by grazing and soil conditioning.

The district supervisors met in their monthly meeting in the Chamber of Commerce office, Electra, this week with Supervisors H. J. Flusche, C. H. Price, A. W. Ramm, T. J. Pace, and Phip Speers. Jack Lynch, representative of the State Soil Conservation Board, Vocational Agriculture teacher of the Five-in-One school, Frank Wendt, county agent of Wilbarger county, and Max Carpenter, county agent, and L. W. Harvel, district conservationist of the WWSCD, were present for the meeting.

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### Peak Scaling Birks Enjoy Summer Sport On Wyoming Ranch

Ernest Birks, with his daughter Bettye and son Bobby, has recently returned from a mountain climbing vacation in the Rockies. The adventure was written up for the Herald by Miss Bettye Birks, as follows:

#### TEXANS' BLACK TOOTH ADVENTURE

The Texans, as we were referred to most of our vacation time, met the Chicago Mountaineers at Paradise Ranch near Buffalo, Wyo. Soon after arrival, we were informed that we would be awakened at 4:30 Mountain daylight saving time.

About 11:30 the dancers decided they were ready to quit (we slept on the dance floor at the main lodge), so the future citizens of Black Tooth, Wyo., began blowing up their air mattresses and crawling into their sleeping bags. At 4:30 our dreams of packing and repacking our duffle bags so that they met the 40 pound limit were interrupted by the rising call. After a late breakfast and a later start we rode merrily on our way.

Several members of the Buffalo C of C took the mountaineers in their cars to a point where trucks were supposed to convey us the rest of the way. However, the Buffalo C of C misunderstood their directions and left the majority of the group at Spear Wigwam Lodge about 3 miles from the place where they should have been, Tepee Lodge.

I was lucky, however, for I chose to ride in the truck on top of the duffle. Eleven of us started on the trail ready and willing after trying to keep away from the eggs, the precious saw and a few miscellaneous ice axes, also in the truck with the duffle.

We had our first view of our future home as we reached the top of the pass at Highland Park. The rugged peaks around Blacktooth in the Cloud Peak Wilderness Area were a breathtaking sight as the evening sun fell on their sheer faces. Everyone breathed a sigh of relief as our leader told us the rest was downhill.

When we finally reached camp about 2:30, all of us dropped by the fire at the welcome sight of food. All of us were soon snug in our sleeping bags, but we awoke at 1:30 to welcome the rest of the weary mountaineers with a sleepy "ugh!"

Our first day in camp we set up tents, gathered pine boughs for beds and gave the camp all the conveniences of home. Every night at campfire we sang many songs and planned the next day's climbs and hikes. Paul Stettner, who with his brother was the first to use the famous Stettner's ledges route up the East Face of Long's Peak, was in charge of climbing parties. We went out with him the first day and learned a little about using ice axes on a snow field, climbing cracks up rock faces, and also climbing chimneys.

A very interesting unnamed little mountain behind our camp was christened "It." It was a nice climb and later proved that it too could offer some stiff climbing.

Anyone in the Five Fingers Valley could hear parties coming down the CMC Scree Blvd., which was good practice for descending a longer scree slope on Blacktooth. Every day parties went out either to climb on the Five Fingers, It, Buffalo Back, Black Tooth, Hallelujah, or to fish in some of the many beautiful lakes or take pictures and generally enjoy the beauties of a wilderness area.

Every night Charlie the Cook had a delicious hot supper ready. He surprised us once or twice with huge steaks which hung over the sides of our plates. Frank our camp wrangler, always had an amusing or hair-raising story to entertain us. He proved himself not only a first-class cowboy, but a capable climber by scaling Black Tooth, which is by no means a walk up.

Bob and I made the climb and in spite of the exposed traverses we made, and ridges about 3 to 10 feet in width with thousands of feet below on each side of us, we enjoyed the climb very much. From the top you can see innumerable lakes in all directions and many glaciated valleys and sharp ridges and pinnacles.

On the way up we crossed a snow field which had melted down to the ice below and experienced getting cold feet while the leader chopped steps with his ice axe.

Almost every day one could hear parties calling to each other on two or three ridges and often in the valleys between came the answer a "yodel a dee hoo."

Hallelujah was quite a challenge to the mountaineers. Two parties tried unsuccessfully to climb the sheer wall to its summit. Finally on the last day two parties made the top by first ascents on the routes they took. The mountain had been climbed only one time previously.

The cascades which rushed down from the snow fields above, the deer which visited our camp once or twice, and the alpine glow which we saw once—all added to the interesting people and spectacular mountains—made our vacation a delightful one.

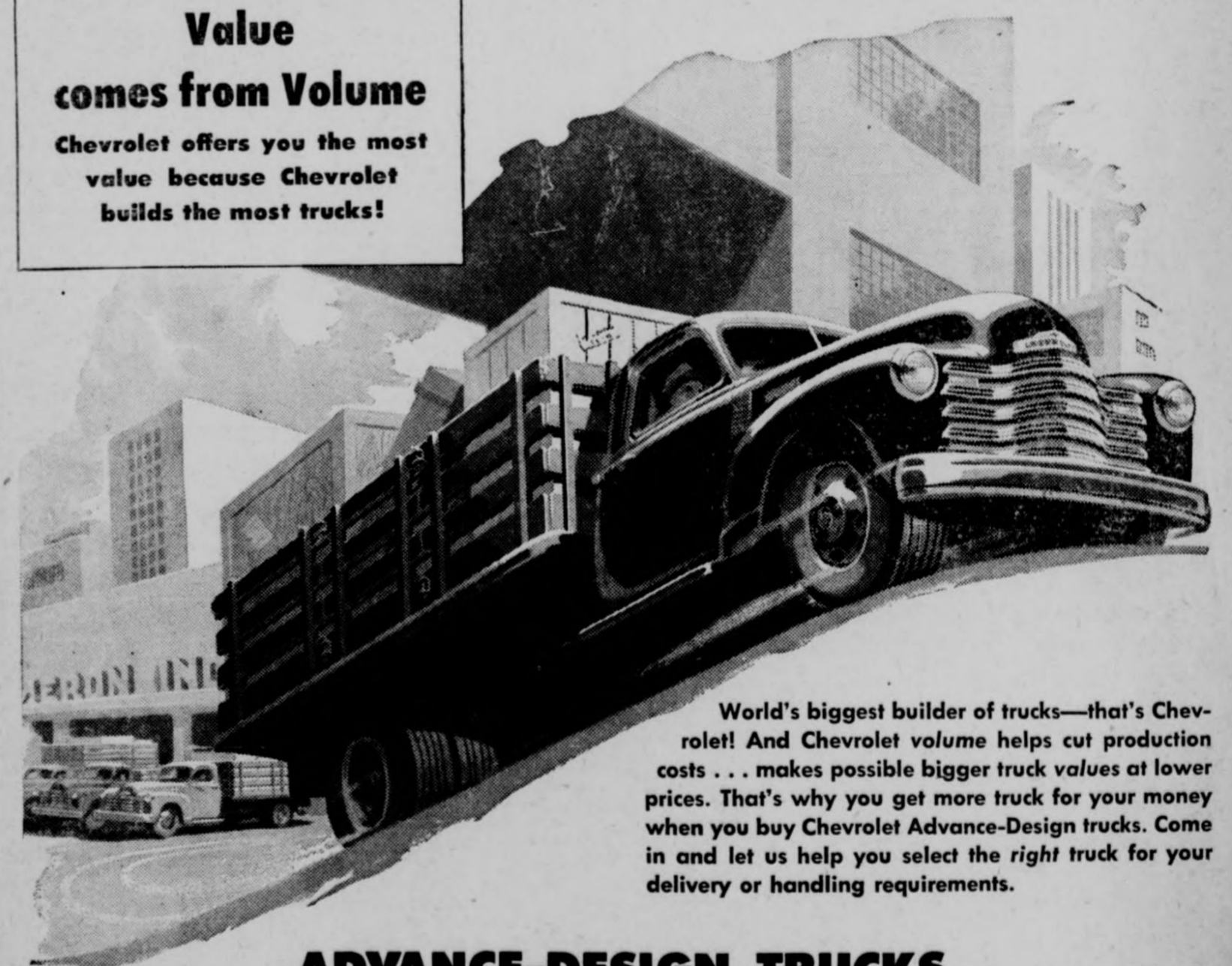
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
