Junior high students to have Saxon Math

In their regular monthly meeting Thursday of last week, school trustees approved adoption of the Saxon Math Program for all three junior high grades starting next year, and agreed to cooperate with the Band Boosters to purchase a new equipment trailer.

Saxon Math was strongly recommended by junior high principal Randy Lovelady, despite the fact that seventh and eighth grade students have never had it.

The math program has been adopted over previous years in grades first through sixth, and apparently is highly recommended not only by all elementary teachers, but encouraged by the junior high faculty.

When discussed during the March meeting, concern was expressed by some trustees that changing could be difficult for seventh and eighth graders who had never had it.

Another problem is the fact that Saxon textbooks have not been approved by the state, and therefore are not funded.

"The cost could be as much as \$18,000," Supt. Glen Mitchell told the board. However, he also recommended

adoption.

Trustees agreed to a proposal to "loan" the Band Boosters \$3,900 toward the purchase of a new equipment trailer, which is to cost \$7,046 after the logo is painted.

The board had budgeted \$2,500 to repair the trailer the school has used the past few years, and that money will offset the organization's part of the acquisition.

The Boosters are to repay the district \$1,850 by May of 1996, and the final \$1,850 a year later, according to the agreement.

Installation of shelving to hold instruments and racks for uniforms will be done by the district, it was pointed out.

The trailer, which is considerably larger than the one now in use, features a drop-down tailgate so heavy equipment can be wheeled into it, as well as side doors.

The old trailer will be offered for sale.

In other business, the board approved contracts for auxiliary person-

Chamber adopts plans to improve appearance

Solutions to the appearance of the Chamber of Commerce building grounds and two welcoming signs were approved during Monday's monthly meeting of the board of directors.

Maintenance of the grounds will be contracted, Pres. Dale Cox announced. The mowing and edging will be done by children of Chamber secretary Susan Dillard, for \$40 per month.

In addition, X-Pert Weed Control will perform periodical chemical applications to control the weeds, and the cost will be deducted from the firm's annual dues.

Cox had approached the city council last month, requesting city employees maintain the grounds, as

was done last summer. However, he was told by the mayor it was not the city's obligation, and the administrator estimated the city's cost had been \$120 per month.

The two welcoming signs at Bell and Johnson were erected some 10 years ago. Over the years, the metal structures have become in need of painting, and recently a strong wind storm destroyed the Chamber's portion of the sign at Johnson.

Robert Palmer said he had contacted specialists who would replace the Johnson site sign and also repaint the two standards, for \$187.

Additionally, directors approved a proposal that the civic organizations

with signs on the two standards will either replace them with new signs, or pay a \$25 painting maintenance fee.

A proposal on the maximum size of organization signs is to be voted on at the May meeting.

H.M. Nipper told the board money will be taken from a special savings account, established several years ago by Texas Electric and State National Bank, to put on a fish fry at one of the city's lakes for some 40 Sheppard AFB students on Saturday, May 6.

Nipper also said the Chamber's Industrial Development Corporation will host some 30 Cryovac dignitaries with a barbecue meal May 19.

The Cryovac officials are to be here for a multi-day celebration of the firm's 20th anniversary in Iowa Park.

The following Saturday and Sunday, festivities for Cryovac employees will be held at Hawk Stadium.

Cox reported the success of the

Business good in Iowa Park

If business continues in Iowa Park as is indicated by sales tax collections the first two months, 1995 will be a banner year.

Records of the state comptroller's office indicate Iowa Park is running 15.76 percent ahead of 1994.

The city this month received a sales tax rebate check for \$16,057.66, which is a 21.04-percent increase over the March check last year.

This month's check includes local sales taxes collected in February and

reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

For the year, \$81,123.61 in rebates have been mailed to the city caufers, a 15.76-percent increase over 1994.

Wichita Falls is showing a 3.59-percent increase and Electra 2.58, but Burkburnett is 8.29-percent behind this same time last year, according to the comptroller's office.

Holliday has received \$19,956.74 thus far for a 5.40-percent increase over 1994.

City council meeting Monday

According to the tentative agenda for Monday night's meeting of the city council, there are almost as many proclamations to be read as other topics to be considered.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Mayor Wayne House is to make the following special event proclamations: National Day of Prayer, May 4; Water Utilities Awareness Week, May 7-13, and Field Training/Mobileer Week, May 22-28.

Other agenda items include a public hearing on annexation, a resolution, one ordinance and bid action. The annexation hearing includes

three lots and a 16-foot alley of Block 17 of the McCluskey Addition.

Aldermen will consider a resolution authorizing the mayor to enter into a lease agreement with Iowa Park Ready Mix Concrete, for land where the plant is located near the waste water treatment plant.

If approved, the ordinance calls for abandoning 25 feet of right of way on the north side of the 1000 block of West Magnolia, between Bell Road and Saratoga Street.

Aldermen will consider authorizing Administrator Mike Price to purchase a brush hog type mowing tractor, as result of bids received.

Storms bring benefitting rains

Storm systems that prompted the Weather Bureau to issue tornado watches Sunday and Monday failed to cause any major damage in the area, and deposited a total of .85 of an inch in beneficial precipitation.

About the only damage reported was in the Kamay area following Sunday's storm, but that apparently was limited to roof damage caused by high winds.

A funnel cloud was observed Monday afternoon southwest of Electra,

but caused no damage there or at Punkin Center, before passing on across the Red River into Oklahoma.

There actually were two waves of rain Monday afternoon. The second wave, which produced pea to quarter size hail stones, caught a lot of attention from residents because it was accompanied by an unusually lengthy sustained thunder rumble.

Virgil Woodfin said he measured .27 of an inch rainfall after Sunday's storm and .58 Monday.

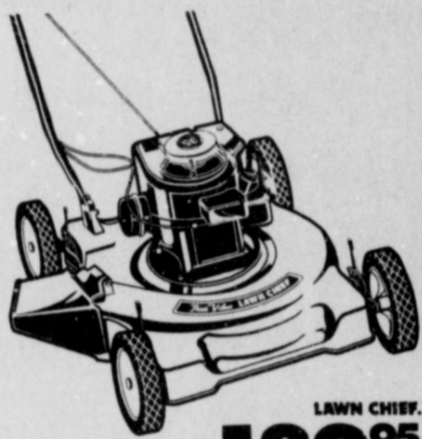
The bride is a graduate of Holliday High School and Miss Wade's Fashion Merchandising College. She is employed by Howmet Corp. Wichita Falls.

ding included David, Audrey and Allison Schooling of Austin and Marc and Milete Klinkerman of Houston.

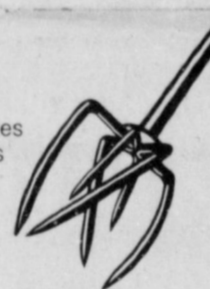

TEXAS TRIVIA

As I See It . . .

While I admire most teachers for their enthusiasm toward their aim of educating our children, there are times when I feel they kinda allow their enthusiasm to exceed common sense.

Such is the case of a group of teachers down at Decatur.

This group is wrapped up in the theory that their students would learn more, if the district had block scheduling. That type of scheduling results in the same number of classroom hours per week, but length of classes are extended.

In other words, block scheduling is basically the same thing as colleges and universities have.

Several districts in this part of the

country have adopted block scheduling, but frankly, I haven't seen any results of it, pro or con.

Anyway, Decatur teachers' proposal was considered at the Mar. 30 meeting of their school board. It was rejected by a 4-3 vote, with the explanation, "We are not opposed to backing this at a future date, once some changes are made at the high school that need to be made."

The very next morning, the teacher group issued a statement that they would proceed with block scheduling despite the board's vote, according to a report in the *Wise County Messenger*.

It seems the teacher group spoke for the Site-Based Management Committee, which declared, "We would not be the professional educators that we are if we were to shirk our duties; that is, if we did not take upon ourselves the responsibility of determining instructional delivery."

Now, that all sounds great. But, folks, things just don't work that way. Somebody's gotta be the boss and somebody the employee.

Last week, at the direction of the board, Supt. Jimmie Malone provided the teachers with information on why they couldn't just proceed as they wished.

I'm pretty sure those educators can understand the five statutes the board believes contradict the teachers' theory of who's running the show:

* DISD policy of June 16, 1994, which states that application for an "innovative program . . . be approved by the board.

* Texas Education Code 21.930, which gives local trustees "the power . . . to manage and govern the public

free schools of this state.

* Texas Education Code 21.931, which assures "the power of the board of trustees of the school district to govern and manage the district."

* Texas Education Code 21.7532, which states that each school principal, with the input of parents, residents and staff, may establish objectives, which "must be approved by the district's board of trustees."

* A Texas Education Agency Resource Guide dated June 1, 1992, which states that "the board has ultimate authority under the law" in "final decision making authority and responsibility."

Doggone, I guess old Ross Perot overlooked all that when he oversaw the development of House Bill 72, back in 1984, otherwise all that would have been wiped out and there would be no such thing as local authority in our public school system.

I got another impression, when I began looking into block scheduling. Because it is so much like scheduling at college, it reminded me of how we started having a holiday called "spring break."

There's no telling how much spring break costs the school taxpayers of Texas. Why? Because it helps extend the school year further into the summer season, when all that air conditioning is needed!

Worth Quoting

For a quarter of a century, local contractors Duane Fitts and Chief Long have been kidding us about the day the Indians will regain control of this land.

Wal, kidding or not, that day may be just around the corner.

According to a story this week in the *Houston Chronicle*, if Texas Indians have their way, all that will be left of Texas will be the Rio Grande Valley and the Panhandle plains -- Indians will control the rest.

The Tigua Indians in El Paso have laid claim to much of West Texas, the Alabama-Coushattas near Livingston are claiming a sizable chunk of East Texas, and the Tonkawas of Oklahoma have filed suit in federal court over a choice corridor of Central Texas stretching from San Antonio north along Interstate 35.

The tribes' claims are twofold -- based, first, on the territories where they ancestors hunted, fished, and gathered for food, and second, on the titles and land grants the Indians once held.

In studying the maps of what the Indians are claiming, we think it's a great idea.

We can't think of a better fate for Austin and our state capitol than for it to wind up in the hands of the Tonkawas. The tribe just might do a better job of governing than the present bunch.

And if Houston and east Texas winds up under the control of the Doushattas, the Tiguas take over everything west of us, the Permian Basin and the Panhandle might just put together a government that operates under the founding principle that the best government is that which governs the least.

Huh-yuh, huh-yuh for the Tonkawa!



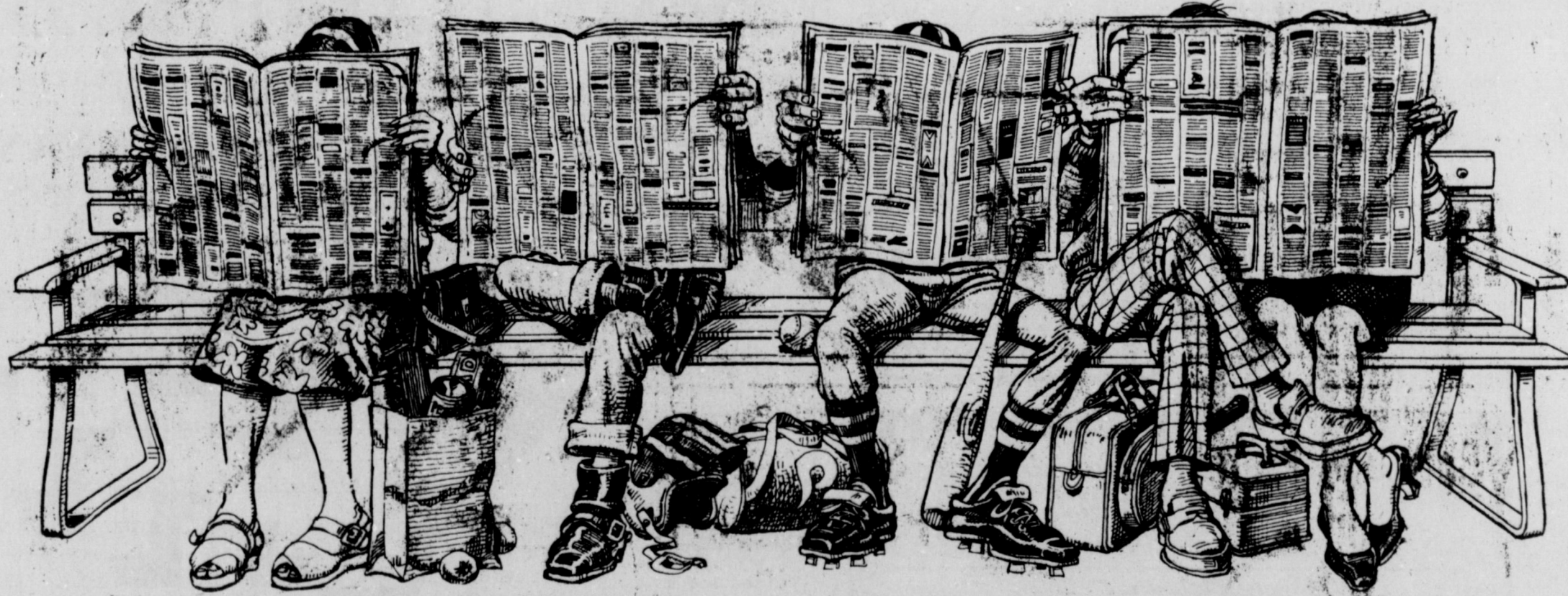

COOK OF THE WEEK

Creeping Crust Cobbler

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup flour
1 cup sugar
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 cup milk
2 cups fruit (peaches, blackberries, apricots, raspberries, etc.)
1 cup sugar (or less)

Melt butter in 10-inch baking dish. Mix flour, sugar, and baking powder; add milk and mix. Spoon over melted butter. Heat fresh or canned fruit with sugar, adjusting less sugar if fruit is canned. Pour over dough. Bake at 350 degrees about 30 minutes until crust is golden brown. Crust will rise to the top. Serve warm or cold, if any lasts that long.

Caramel Pie

1 1/2 cup whole milk
1 1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/3 cup flour
3 eggs
1 Tbsp. butter
1 tsp. vanilla extract

Heat 1 1/2 cups milk. Brown 3/4 cup sugar over low heat and add to heated milk. Combine 3/4 cup sugar and 1/3 cup flour. Add mixture to milk. Beat 3 egg yolks and add to milk. Cook, stirring frequently, until thick. After thickened, remove from heat and add 1 tablespoon butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour in baked pie shell and top with meringue.

Death by Chocolate

1 pkg. brownie mix
1 box chocolate pudding
1 large ctn. Cool Whip
1 bag of crushed Heath bars or 4 Heath bars

Make the brownies and the chocolate pudding. Crumble the brownies in bottom of large bowl. Spread half of the pudding on top of the

brownies. Spread half of the Cool Whip on top of the pudding. Sprinkle the crushed Heath bars on top. Repeat this. Refrigerate overnight.

Layered Mexican Casserole

1 lb. ground beef
1 can ranch style beans
1 can Ro-tel tomatoes
1 can cream of mushroom or chicken soup
1 can chili (or hot sauce and chili powder)
Com or flour tortillas
Grated Cheddar or Velveta cheese
Salt and pepper to taste

Brown ground beef and drain. Layer tortillas on bottom of pan. Put layer of ground beef on top. Mix all other ingredients except cheese, and pour over beef. Sprinkle grated cheese over top and bake at 350 degrees one hour in foil-covered pan.

I leave out chili so it is not so spicy.

Chicken Enchilada Casserole

1 bag nacho-flavored Doritos
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can cream of celery or cream of mushroom soup
1 small can chicken broth
1 can white chicken
1 small can green chiles (4.5 oz.)
2 cups grated Cheddar or Velveta cheese

Crush Doritos in bottom of baking dish. Mix soups, peppers, and chicken in bowl. Pour over Doritos. Top with cheese and bake until bubbly (about 20 minutes).

I use extra chicken and both Velveta and Cheddar cheese.

Lyme Disease

- Lyme disease results from bacteria transmitted to humans from a deer tick.
- In its early stages, the disease is characterized by a circular rash and flu-like symptoms. If left untreated, Lyme disease can become severe, involving heart palpitations and arthritis.
- More than 1,500 cases of Lyme disease are reported annually, and the number is rising.
- The bacteria-infected tick is commonly found in wooded and grassy areas along both coasts, beginning in May and continuing through September.
- To lessen your chances of contracting Lyme disease, avoid tick-infested areas if possible.
- When hiking in the woods, protect extremities with clothing. Pull socks over the bottoms of pants so ticks don't have an entry onto the legs.
- Walk in the middle of paths.
- Check for ticks after every walk.
- To remove a tick, put some gasoline or kerosene on a cotton ball and tape it loosely over the tick for 15-20 minutes. If the tick does not back itself out, use a fine pair of tweezers and grasp the tick and pull it slowly straight out. Use a magnifying glass and make sure you've got the tick's head.
- Contact your doctor immediately if you are unable to remove the tick, or if you see symptoms of the disease.

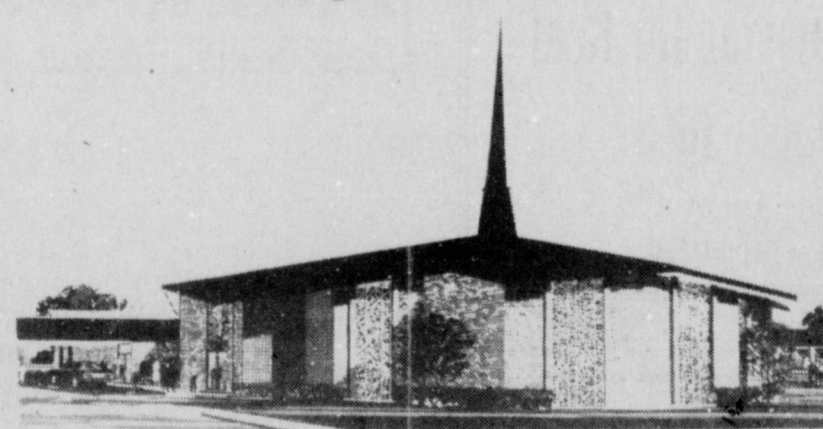

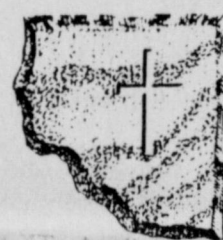

Along with the contests, we will have a Family Fun Night of games, movies and great fellowship.

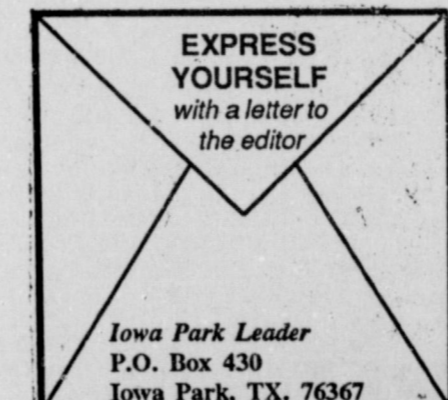
Roundup contests include method demonstrations, illustrated talks, public speaking and share-the-fun.



GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Property owners who desire a lush, green, healthy lawn should pay attention to these warm-season turf care guidelines.

There is no single factor or product or magic cure which will develop a beautiful lawn. A combination of proper watering, fertility, mowing, and weed control will work together to produce a lawn you can be proud of.

Warm-season grasses such as Bermuda and St. Augustine should be fertilized with 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio fertilizer, unless a soil test dictates the use of another type of plant food.

The three number on a bag of fertilizer refer to nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

You should purchase and apply fertilizers such as 12-4-8, 15-5-10, 21-7-14 or 16-4-8 for the best results.

These three numbers will appear on the front of the fertilizer bag. You will also find slow-release nitrogen fertilizers at your local garden center or fertilizer distributor. These products are designed to produce slow, even growth of lawn grasses.

Slow-release fertilizers are available in 3-1-2 and 4-1-2 ratios, however, a portion of the nitrogen in the bag is slow release. These slow-release products are ideal for those of you who mulch your grass clippings.

These products are always labeled as slow-release nitrogen.

As important as using the right kind of fertilizer is applying it at the proper time.

Common Bermuda should be fertilized on April 15, June 1, July 15 and September 1. St. Augustine should be fertilized on April 15, June 1 and September 1.

Cool-season grasses such as fescue should not be fertilized until September 15.

Fertilizers are easily applied with a broadcast spreader which can often be borrowed from a nursery or garden center.

Always follow recommended label rates and directions for fertilizer applications. Most people tend to apply more fertilizer than necessary.

During the driest period of summer, our lawns usually require about one inch of water every five to six days. Deep, infrequent watering encourages stronger root-systems which produce healthier lawns.

Remember that fescue may require an inch of water every three or four days when the heat of summer is on.

Water in the morning so that less moisture is lost to evaporation. Morning watering also allows the grass to

dry out during the day, reducing disease occurrence.

Weed problems can be broken down into two major groups. There are grassy weeds such as dallisgrass and crabgrass and broadleaf weeds such as dandelion and clover.

On Bermuda lawns you can control broadleaf weeds with herbicides such as Weed-B-Gone or Wipeout, according to all label directions.

Grassy weeds in Bermuda lawns can be controlled with a product called MSMA. MSMA will yellow Bermuda lawns for a short period; however, the turf recovers if you use the correct rates. Again you should follow all label directions.

St. Augustine on the other hand is extremely sensitive to many chemicals, therefore you are limited as to what you can use. You cannot use MSMA on St. Augustine.

There are some broadleaf herbicides registered for use on St. Augustine. Check all chemical labels carefully to make sure the one you are using is labeled for St. Augustine turf.





Fishing with electricity

If you have ever wanted to see how Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) surveys area lakes with electricity, your chance is coming up on Saturday, April 22.

At 10 a.m., at Lake Arrowhead State Park, the Wichita Falls district fisheries crew will put their state of the art electrofishing boat on the water for a demonstration open to the public.

The demonstration will take place near the public boat ramp at the state park. TPWD surveys public lakes in the spring and fall, primarily to sample largemouth bass, shad and sunfish.

The TPWD fisheries biologist will be on the shoreline to describe the electrofishing procedure and answer questions during the demonstration.

Afterwards, spectators will have the opportunity to view the fish and get a close-up look at the boat.

Additional fisheries sampling gear used to conduct netting surveys will also be on display at this 2nd annual Earth Day event. There will be no extra charge to attend other than the standard state park entry fee.

Coming up on June 3 is the annual Free Public Fishing Day in Texas.

On this day, and this day only, anglers are not required to have a fishing license when fishing in Texas public waters. June 3rd marks the start of "National Fishing Week."

A number of special fishing events are planned for this day at Lake Arrowhead State Park. They include a special youth fishing contest for children under the age of 17, and a 1st annual rough fish fishing contest and cookoff which will be open to anyone.

Rough fish (nongame fish) include carp, buffalo, gar, and other species. These fish are fun to catch and are good to eat when prepared correctly.

These fish represent a greatly under-utilized resource in our area lakes.

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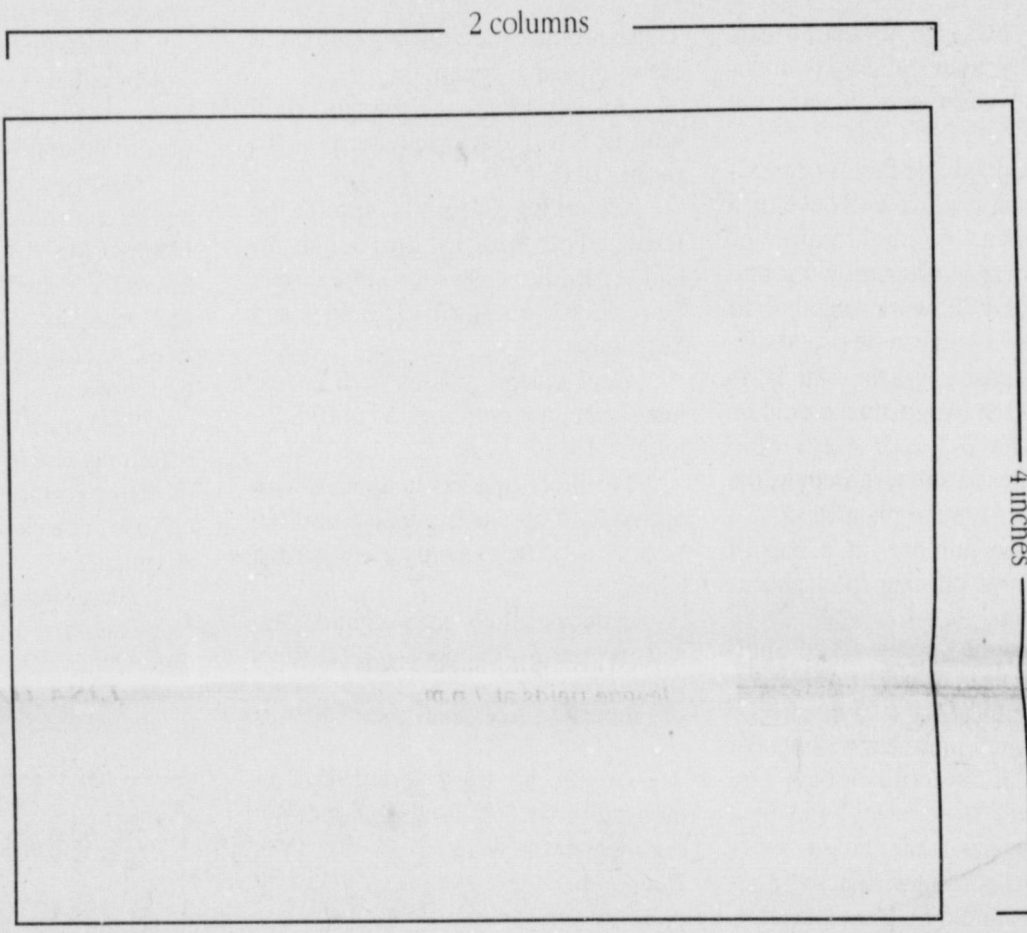

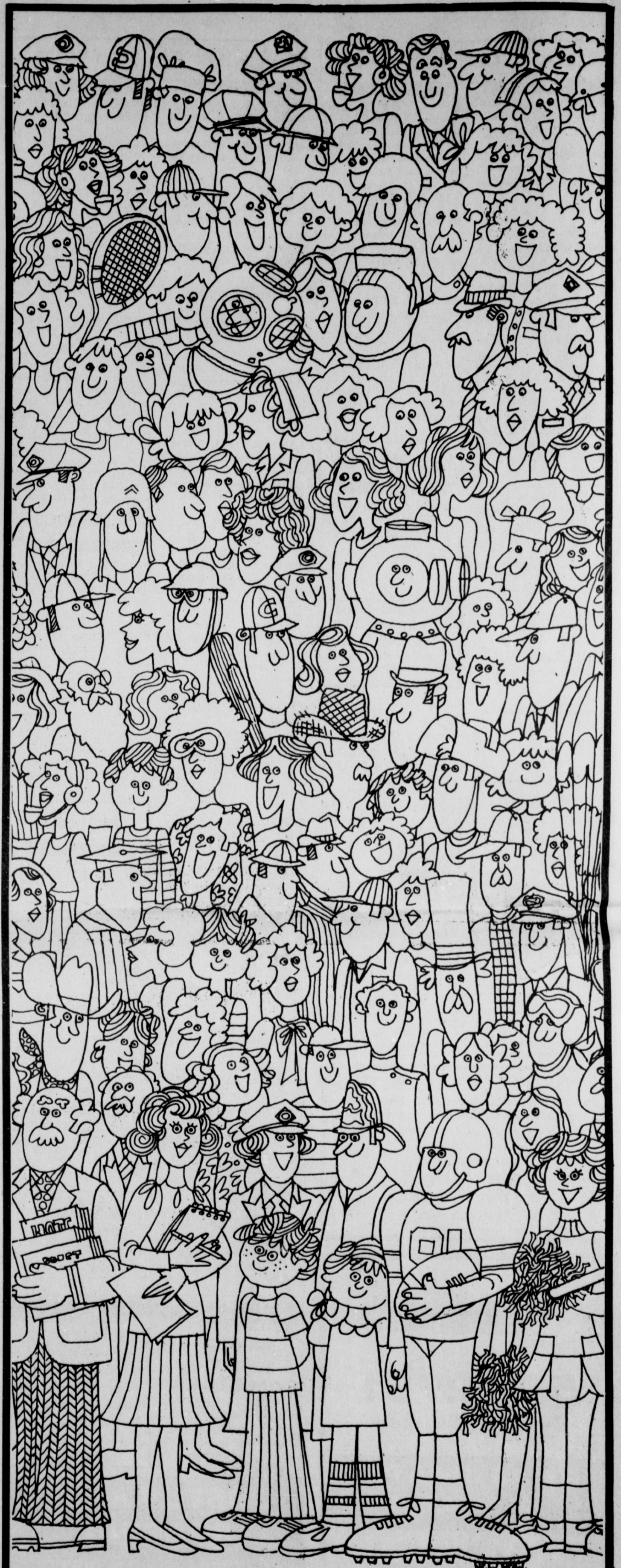
