We don't pay attention to the speed limits, we don't pay attention to traffic control signs, we don't use our turning signals, and just a lot of other things.

I'll stand behind what all I've said.

But I found over the weekend that there are other communities where their driving is even worse.

I felt I should have done some preparatory training some Saturday night on Kemp Street in Wichita Falls.

But even that wouldn't have put me in the frame of mind to drive in the suburbs along I-20 between Fort

Worth and Dallas.

We attended a regional press convention in Duncanville. Not all the meeting events took place in the motel, so I had to do quite a bit of driving. (They didn't have a golf course at the convention site, you understand.)

It was my decision that those folks are all former operators of military tanks and troop carriers. You know, the heavily-fortified types.

It's not that they just take dead aim and run into you. They seem to play a game of pulling right up to your rear bumper, determining how fast you are traveling, then whip around and in front, with just enough space between fenders that only a

feeling gauge can be used to find how closely they passed.

I could hear wreckers and ambulances passing the motel at all hours of the day and night. At one point Friday night, I wasn't sure they weren't having a parade of emergency vehicles passing by.

Everyone's in a hurry, and the speed limit is non-existant. Actually, they appear to be making the speed limit a mockery.

The same for safety.

Nope, even as poorly as we drive here in Iowa Park, I still feel much safer. And I appreciate the fact that I could make it back -- without having been hospitalized or buried.

# Local men among members

A movement has been making waves across the nation with the hope that Promise Keepers--Men of Integrity--becomes a catalyst to bring revival and a spiritual awakening to the land.

A group of 30 men from Faith Baptist Church, with Rev. Dennis Neal, associate pastor as leader, recently took Sunday nights for three months to study the book, "The Seven Promises of Promise Keepers." The men plan to meet on a regular basis later.

Bo Watson soon will be enlisting men from First United Methodist Church who recognize a need in their own life for encouragement to keep their committment to the principles set forth in Promise Keepers.

Watson and Neal were among the 59,000 men who attended the Men's Conference for Promise Keepers held the latter part of October in Texas Stadium, with repeat promisers making up a portion of the crowd.

Promise Keepers is a Christcentered ministry dedicated to uniting men through vital relationships to become godly influences in their communities.

The concept of Promise Keepers was planted in the heart of Colorado University head football coach, Bill McCartney, as he and a friend, Dave Wardell, drove from Denver to Pueblo, Colo., in March 1990.

Men are encouraged in small groups to be committed promise keepers to their families, churches, brothers in Christ .... and to the

The nonprofit, evangelical movement encourages men to be godly and help raise the spiritual standard in these times, and to be men of integrity, men who will not compromise the truth, men who are true to their word, and men who are trustworthy.

They are encouraged to support their families, pastors and churches and seek racial reconciliation.

Rallies across the country drew

more than 700,000 men last year. A national clergy meeting held in February this year in Atlanta, Ga., drew 45,000 men.

The first men's conference in July 1991 drew 4,200 men to Boulder, in 1992, 22,000 men attended and in 1993 the Boulder conference drew 50,000. By the summer of 1994 conferences were expanded to seven cities around the nation and attracted 280,000 and the summer of 1995, 13 men's conferences were held nationwide, attracting more than 500,000.

Promise Keepers are planning a million-man march on Washington, D.C. in 1997. This will be a march centered on Jesus and will include men of all races.

Promises Keepers believe they have a God-given mission to unite men who are separated by race, geography, culture, denominations, and economics.





The permit is good for 12 full months. Days and hours the center is open include: 12-6 p.m. Fridays; 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturdays; 1-5 p.m. Sundays, and 12-6 p.m. Mondays. The center is closed Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

NEWS OF THE

Iowa Park

The Society of Friends was founded in England in the early 1600s and soon after the Quakers, as they were called, imigrated to the colonies.

The earliest American Friends settled in New England, and were mostly wandering evangelists and missionaries. For the most part, they were distrusted and punished quite cruelly by Puritan and Anglican colonials.

They tried to move to more tolerant colonies but they were persecuted. They were not to come into Virginia through a law enacted in 1660. Meetings were broken up, property seized, both men and women were whipped and many thrown into prison and kept there until they could pay a fine and leave the colony. This continued until an Act of Toleration in 1688.

In the meantime in 1675 a large scale of migration of Friends began. The first boat load of Quakers arrived in West Jersey and disembarked at a place called Salem.

In 1682, 23 ships sailed into Delaware Bay with more than 2,000 emigrants who founded the colony "Welcome" carried William Penn and 100 other Quakers. Thus, by 1750 the Society of Friends, the religious denomination in the colo-

If your ancestors were among these early settlers, you will find

several resources available for researching. William Wade Hinshaw compiled several volumes entitled "Encyclopedia of American Quaker Genealogy".

This work mostly pertains to Quakers in North Carolina, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York and Virginia. Many libraries will have these references.

There are books that will acquaint you with the records generally kept and where they are available, also migratory patterns and general history of the Quakers. A check with our library, Kemp Library and the LDS Family Research Library will be of help in your search for Quaker ancestors.
