## Missionary Family Moves to Iowa Park

"We are affiliated with the Assemblies of God, Wichita Falls section, Texas district, and have been laboring in the capacity of pastor and evangelist, first in Saint John then Wichita Falls and vicinity.

I am an ordained minister and we are making preparations to go out as missionaries (call to Chinese) presumably with the Latin American field.

We have just returned from a trip into the state of Sonora, Mex., and were privileged to visit the capital city, Hermosilla and also the harbor city of Ganymas. We planned on going to Mexico City and Acapulco, but were detained because of the rainy season.

If the Lord will, we will be going back into Mexico sometime this winter.

We would be happy to speak to any size group concerning the missionary work in that country, regardless of denomination, and can be contacted through Bro. Dale, pastor of the Assembly of God church in Iowa Park.

**INDUSTRIAL CONFERENCE REPORT**

President Pastusek gave in his comprehensive report on the industrial conference recently attended at A & M, the following points:

For successful industrial development the area must be surrounded by good farm land. Resources should include adequate utilities, housing, good schools and churches, transportation, both air and land, raw materials and land for building and expanding.

Mr. Pastusek said new industry or expanding industry looks for a town of good appearance clean, with paved streets, up to date places of business. New industry is also influenced by the attitude of both the business and professional men toward new business.

It is estimated that 85 per cent of industrial increase is gained by creating from raw materials on hand. Only about 15 per cent is brought in from outside.

To live better, to be individualistic in that living, and to create jobs to keep our young people at home are considered reasons for developing industry.

An election of officers to serve the Iowa Park Council of Church Women during 1952-53 was held in connection with an executive board meeting at the Presbyterian church Wednesday morning. Mrs. C. E. Birk, president, was hostess to the group at a "brunch" preceding the meeting.

Officers elected included Mrs. Rollins Woodall, president; Mrs. D. O. James, vice-president; Mrs. Milton Taylor, secretary; Mrs. Fred Widmoyer, treasurer.

To open the session Mrs. Birk presented a devotional on the subject "One in Christ," using I Cor. 12:12-31 for a scriptural background in which she emphasized unity in diversity rather than unity in uniformity. She supplemented her meditation with excerpts from an address "Enlightened by Him Let Us Go Forth," from the Christian Observer.

Reports were given by Mrs. Woodall, secretary, and Mrs. Widmoyer, treasurer.

Mrs. Homer Blalock, UN chairman, reminded those present of the observance of UN Day Oct. 24. Tentative plans call for an outstanding speaker at the Iowa Park High School on that date to address students and citizens of the community, according to the chairman.

Mrs. S. T. Euzzard discussed the "Packets for Peace" project which is claiming the immediate attention of council members. Designed to alleviate the needs of children in less fortunate lands, the packets which will be dedicated at the World Community Day meeting on November 7 are to consist of layettes for children under six years of age. Mrs. Euzzard stressed that all garments must be used articles; nothing new will be accepted.

Among the most needed items are underwear, sweaters, dresses, pants, kimono, mattress sheets, towels and wash cloths.

To cover cost of sorting and shipping 8 cents per pound must be sent with the packages. Interested persons who do not have articles of clothing to contribute can still have the same opportunity to share in the project by giving money to help pay costs of shipping. This money will be over and above the regular offering received on World Community Day.

Mrs. Gordon G. Clark, district president of the Texas Council of Church Women, announced the district meeting to be held at Stamford, Monday, Oct. 13. Those planning to attend are Meses. Clark, Euzzard Woodall and Birk.

Mrs. Fenton Dale, Christian world relations chairman, will be in charge of the World Community Day observance, which will be given at the Christian church Friday afternoon, Nov. 7 at 2:30. Theme of the meeting will be "Building Lasting Peace." Mrs. O. R. Owens will serve as program leader.

During the session the group voted a love gift for Ted Averitt in appreciation of his indefatigable efforts as director of the summer recreation program sponsored by the council.

## Farmers Union speaks

Prices farmers pay went up one-third of one per cent in August, while the prices received averaged the same as in July and have fallen considerably since. This is no news to the farmer, but the general public, or most of it, seems to feel with price supports and parity the farmers are all getting rich.

An article in one of our leading magazines recently stated with the higher prices paid for farm produce, over 25 per cent of farmers were now financially able to send their sons and daughters to college. Why shouldn't farm children go to college? It seems a tragic situation that only 25 per cent are able to go and over 80 per cent of those are working at all types of jobs to supplement their meager farm bankrolls to crowd four years of college into an already over-worked schedule.

Wichita Valley Farmers Union met at the Community Center, Monday, Oct. 6. C. C. Morgan read N.F.U. President Patton's message to the local, urging all members to vote. Patton said, "In the voting all Americans are complete equals. A dirt farmer and the President of the United States have only one vote each. Who will guide the nation during the next few important years will be determined by the farmer and the President and by millions of Americans like them, each with a single vote and each with the determination to use it according to the dictates of his conscience. We often hear 'What's the use? Politicians are all bums anyway.' Politicians, of course are no better than the people who elect them. And too often the people who elect our worst politicians are those who stay home on election day."

Oilmen most of us know best are those who run service stations. There are more than 200,000, most of whom are independent business men. They are active citizens of their home towns.

Service stations have grown into a typically American institution. The proprietor or manager or attendant runs a sort of branch office of the local Chamber of Commerce. It is impossible to keep track of the number of times he is asked to recommend hotels, motels, stores and cafes—sometimes where there is good fishing or hunting.

Also, he conducts a sort of travel bureau. He provides road maps and transient customers depend on him for information about highway construction, detours, washouts and shortcuts. And your service station man is usually right up to date with the facts.

It's true that the oil industry works in many ways its wonders to perform, and certainly one of its most pleasant contributions to the American scene is the service station and the men who attend it.

The Electra Community Farm Bureau met at the Community Hall at Pumpkin Center, Tuesday night. Terrell Graham, service agent, introduced the speaker H. T. Cardwell Jr., service agent for Wilbarger county, who explained the Farm Bureau insurance costs. After a general discussion, cakes and coffee were served to the 30 persons present.

The Wichita County Farm Bureau is planning a county wide membership drive this month. Before you say anything, let me point out some plain facts to you. Today only the voice of the organized is heard. The groups you buy from are organized. The groups to which you sell are organized. Legislation is influenced by those who are organized. The nation is run by those who are organized. Take a good look at the legislation that has been passed. Little of it has not been influenced by organization.

Farmers are proud of their individual independence; justly so. This independence has been the backbone of this nation. Yet, working alone can you be in Austin and Washington each day the state and national legislatures are in session? Can you maintain a national farm program including parity prices, research, marketing, soil conservation, farm credit rural electrification, etc? Can you secure adequate rural road program that will get the farmers of Texas out of the mud? Can you attend hearings in which agriculture has a stake? Can you meet in conference with leaders of labor, industry and government? Can you uphold your interests as an individual farmer alone against the organized interests of other groups?

You can't, but Farm Bureau can. A membership will cost you \$10 a year. This money will buy you five cartons of cigarettes, or 20 show tickets, or thousands of other things, none of which will provide you with the means to keep your individual freedom, yet belong to an organization which respects this individuality. A Farm Bureau membership will do just this. When your neighbor comes over to talk to you, listen to what he has to say. He is trying to help you, a farmer to compete in this world of organization.

## Post Office Report Shows Gains Here

Increases in business throughout the first nine months of 1952 are reflected in a report made public this week by Postmaster Pete May. He says the increase is due to more pieces of mail as well as the increased postage rate.

During the first three quarters of 1952 income of the post office was \$14,902.30, compared with \$11,813.51 during the same period of 1951—an increase of \$3,088.79.

The third quarter showed an income of \$5,602.37 as compared with \$4,140.55 during 1951.

The month of September had \$2,143.09 in business receipts, when in 1951 the month had only \$1,743.41.



### ★ Soil Conservation

Farm ponds continue to be the most desired conservation practice. During the past week applications for site selection and layout were received in the Soil Conservation office from Ward Parker and Jeff D. Thwait, owning farms near Bacon Switch, A. R. Douglas of Electra, Kenneth Bryan of Friberg, Jasper Hicks of Burk Burnett, Henry T. Wolf, F. A. Marten and Albert May of Iowa Park.

Two embankments of farm ponds were staked on the Roller Estate near Bacon Switch.

V. G. Barnhart of Iowa Park is seeding a pasture mixture to Kentucky 31 rescue grass, perennial ryegrass, orchard grass and alfalfa. Barnhart is using the new combination Fertilizer Drill owned by the District.

J. H. Allison of Wichita is busy leveling about 35 acres. Soil Conservation Service is providing the design, layout and checking of the system. Allison is also installing an 18 inch concrete pipeline instead of open ditches to supply water. The risers in the line will be installed at ground level to which portable hydrants will be attached. By using a canvas hose 2 or 4 borders may be walked from each set, ditch maintenance will be eliminated. Labor in water application will be reduced, loss of water through ditch seepage will be eliminated, and harvesting of crops will be easier.

This irrigation system will be cropped to sudan grass one year, reforested and seeded to alfalfa in 1953.
