By Mike Cox Bill redials proposal to ban cell phones while driving

AUSTIN - An effort during the last regular session to ban behind-the-wheel cell phone use did not connect, but one pre-filed bill for the coming session is redialing the issue. House Bill 237 by Rep. Jose Menendez (D-San Antonio) would prohibit use of traditional cell phones while driving, but allow hands-free usage with headsets or voiceactivated speakers. Sen. Rodney Ellis (D-Houston) is carrying the Senate version of the bill.

The fine for violating the ban would range from \$25 to \$100, with the range increasing to \$125 to \$200 if the violation occurs in a school crossing zone.

The most-recent Department of Public Safety statistics are some three years old, but they show that from 2000 to 2001, traffic crashes

from cell phone use grew from 716 to 1,032 - a 44 percent increase.

Livestock IDs high-tech...

Texans have been notching ears or burning brands on the hides of their livestock for years, but the Texas Animal Health Commission is looking at a new, high tech way of identifying cattle, swine and poultry.

DSHS initiated the program in 1995 to create zones of vaccinated coyotes and gray foxes to stop the spread of the rabies virus and then eliminate canine and gray fox rabies in the area. Canine rabies in coyotes and domestic dogs had reached epidemic proportions in South Texas and threatened San Antonio and other major population areas. The next year, an airdrop began in West-Central Texas where an epidemic of gray fox rabies had been occurring since cine bait, he said.

The number of canine rabies cases in South Texas has declined from a high of 142 cases when the program began in 1995 to none in 2002 and 2003 and I reported in 2004 through November. Gray fox cases are down as well from an all-time high of 265 cases in 1994 to 22 in 2004 through November.

The specialized baits offer a dinner of fish meal to coyotes and dog food containing molasses and vanilla flavoring to gray foxes. But the important ingredient is the 2 milliliters of oral rabies vaccine encased in each bait.

"The vaccine inside the bait cannot cause rabies in people or animals," Sidwa

Because baits contain a biological agent and are less likely to be eaten by wildlife if people touch them, they should not be handled. Each brown bait, which measures 1 1/4 by 1 1/4 by 3/4 inches, is marked with a DSHS toll free number, 1-877-722-6725, that people may call for information.

"People still need to get their pets vaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian as required by law," Sidwa said. A domestic animal's rabies vaccination can be safely given even if the animal recently ate an oral rabies vac-

NWS Lists Top West Central Texas 2004 Weather Events

West Central Texas received rainfall that far exceeded what is considered normal for this region. Most of the 24 county area received above normal rainfall for te first time since 1997.

and for the excelleent network of nearly seventy NWS Cooperative Observers who report rainfall amounts along with high and low temperatures to the National Weather Service on a daily basis.

ful for the nearly 70 NWS Rainfall Observers that report rainfall to su after each and every rainfall event.

As far as records are concerned, this will be the 4th wettest year for the city of Abilene, and the 15th wettest year for the city of San Angelo. Our Cooperative Observer in Woodson reported the most rainfall with 51.48 inches.

Heavy rain during the second week of June was concentrated over Mason, San Saba and Eastern Brown Counties. Isolated areas in these counties received as much as 10 inches of rain in less than 24hours.

The town of San Saba received 1-inch to 2-inches per hour rainfall rates over several hours on the morning of June 9th.

This heavy rain caused flooding throughout the community. Several homes and businesses received water damage and numerous city streets were scoured.

Nearby, the San Saba River at San Saba flowed out of its banks to cause minor flood-

Minor flooding also occurred nearby on the Colorado River near San Saba. Most of We are thankful for the rain, the damage caused by river flooding was to ranch land and farm land. Many bales of hay were lost to the swollen river and fences were down due to debris.

For a period of time on the 9th, the community was In addition, we are also grate-stranded as water covered all the main roads (Hwy 16 and Hwy 190) to the town.

> On March 4th, an intense low pressure system moved rapidly across West Central Texas during the middle of the day producing significant damage. It spawned 9 tornadoes along with straight line winds of 60 to 80 mph across much of the area.

Several manufactured homes were damaged or destroyed. Roofs of permanent homes also received damage. Jim Ned High School of Tuscola received damage from the strongest tornado of the year which was rated an F2 on the Fujita Scale.

There were significant hail storms that did extensive damage during the year to many cities, towns, and communities in West Central

Albany, Sweetwater, Glen Cove and Vallinger were hard hit by golfball to softball size hail breaking windows, windshields, stripping paint, and causing extensive

damage to automobiles and homes.

The largest hailstone, measuring 4.25 inches, or up to softball size, occurred 2 miles southeast of Glen Cove in Coleman County and dmaged vehicles and dwellings near Hoards Creek Lake on April 30th.

The first tornade that occurred in the U.S. in 2004, touched down in Novice in Coleman County of January

One of the last tornadoes of the year struck Santa Anna in Coleman County and another one touched down on the north end of Lake Brownwood in Brown County in early December causing damage.

About 18 tornadoes were reported for the year which is about normal. Thankfully most of the tornadoes were weak at F1 or below.

Abilene only had two 100 degree-plus days with the highest temperature of 103 on June 1st, and the lowest temperature of 15 of January

San Angelo had 6 days of 100 degree-plus days with the higest temperature of 106 on June 1st and the lowest temperature of 17 on Christmas morning.

Junction had 7 days of 100 degree-plus days with the highest temperature of 104 on June 1st and the lowest temperature of 18, also on Christmas morning.

Although property damage ran into the millions, and a few injuries were reported, we are grateful there was no loss of life.
