George Wilson Huckaby, 81, of Hobart, Okla., and former resident of Iowa Park, died in a hospital in Oklahoma City, Friday,

In 1898 he went to western Oklahoma (territory), where he remained until 1944, most of the time

In 1944 Mr. and Mrs. Huckaby went to Natalia, Texas, where they stayed until 1948. That year they came to Iowa Park and remained Patrons Invited to until 1952, returning from here to Hobart.





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

It was Texas Centennial Public School Week. A hundred years ago the free public school system was set up through an act of the fifth legislature of the State of Texas.

Iowa Park's first public school was built around the year 1890. The building served as school and community church. Many citizens of Iowa Park today received elementary and secondary instruction in our local system.

The events honoring Public School Week here were well planned by committees of interested patrons, with Miles Thompson as general chairman.

The parade on Monday morning will long be remembered by the school children, the early '90's students, early teachers, civic clubs and spectators. It was a four-block long parade with the board of education in the lead. The fast-stepping Hawk band was as always a color-

Students of the elementary grades in costumes and carrying placards were led by the 1st graders carrying "Seniors of 1966" ban-

The junior high and representatives of all high school classes rode in decorated cars.

Next came the first president of Iowa Park PTA, Mrs. C. Birk and the current president Mrs. John Early day teachers in the parade

Our school system has come a long way from the two room building in the south part of town, which is now serving as a barn on the Spruiell farm. We now have two modern buildings plus a new band and vocational agriculture building and stadium.

In 1900 a new three-story building was erected in the east part of town on the space now part of the school playground. In 1916 another three-story building was put up where the present elementary school is located. The old building was razed because it had been con-

In 1924 a new two-story high school building, auditorium and gymnasium was built and named W. F. George high school.

In 1940 the grade school was torn down and a new building and cafeteria was erected. Classes met in the town churches while this new structure was being completed.

The school has a large lighted football and track field, four buses. 32 teachers including the superintendent and two principals, four bus drivers, five cafeteria workers, a custodian and a secretary. It also has a homemaking practice house, residences for the superintendent and high school principal and custodian.

May we say again, if you didn't visit last week, go any time and visit the place where your children spend 7 to 8 hours, 5 days a week, 9 months of the year. Go meet the teachers who help your children grow and develop knowledge and character.
