BAIRD-An eight vehicle pile-up caused east bound traffic to be detoured off of I-20 at Baird for about two hours late Sunday afternoon.





BAIRD-Baird finally received some relief from the hot, dry weather Saturday when we had a very welcome 2.5 inches of rain, most from an afternoon downpour that momentarily knocked electricity out three or four times. It was beginning to seem like we were jinxed as areas all around town had experienced measurable precipitation during last week. Sunday brought seven-tenths of an inch of slow rain that contributed to two accidents west of town on I-20. Monday was

cloudy most of the day with 1-tenth inch of rain.

Grass fires had started up again before the showers. Baird assisted Eula and Oplin on a fire that started on Highway 36 and other Baird firemen responded to a fire near Belle Plain on July 9th. Hopefully the pastures will green up enough to stop the fire danger for a while.

BAIRD-Light rain possibly contributed to a truck driver losing control of his eighteen-wheeler just west of Baird about 8:00 a.m. Sunday morning, July 14.

Baljit Sahota, 35, of Los Angeles, California said he was just topping the hill west of Baird when his 1994 Kenworth slid to the right side of the Interstate onto the guard rail. The van trailer he was pulling

then pushed the jack knifed tractor along taking out about 125 foot of guard rail and posts.

D.P.S. trooper Stan Waters said it was lucky the truck hit the guard rail, as it kept the wreck from being worse. Surinder Sahota, the 26 year old wife of the diver, was in the sleeper when the accident occurred. The couple would not say what their conversation was immediately following the accident.

Neither of the Sahotas were injured, although as owners of the Kenworth they were shaken at the temporary loss of their livelihood. Baljit has been driving trucks since 1983 and Surinder started driving about two years ago. The couple had just celebrated their 5th wedding anniversary Saturday. Baljit said their truck is leased to Dark International and they were hauling clothes to Los Angeles from New Jersey for Sears and Roebuck. The trailer and load was not seriously damaged in the accident.

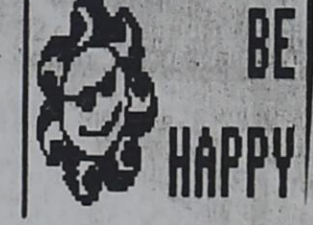

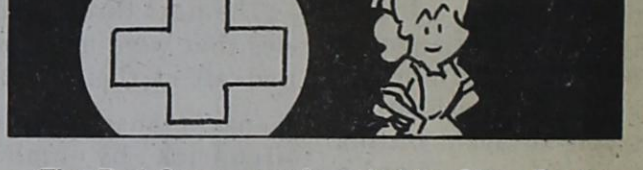

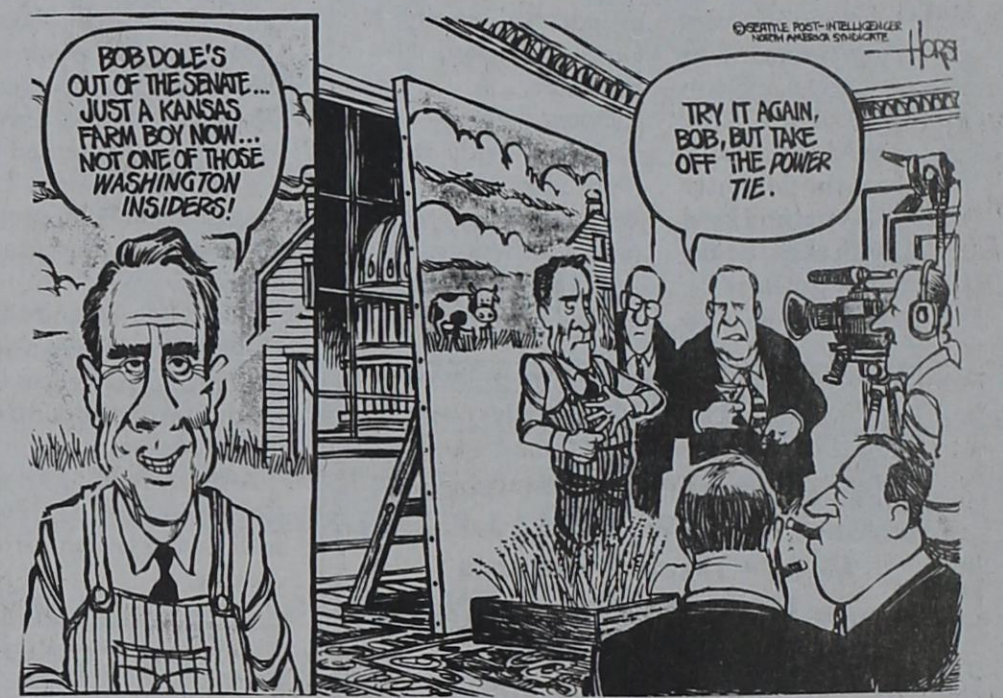

House Passes Defense of Marriage Act

On Friday, July 12, the House of Representatives considered H.R. 3396, the Defense of Marriage Act. This legislation was introduced earlier this year in order to protect the institution of marriage.

As a co-sponsor of this legislation, I am pleased to report that this bill was passed by a vote of 342 to 67.

The Defense of Marriage Act will protect the institution of marriage by establishing a federal definition of "marriage" only as a legal union between one man and one woman as husband and wife. The definition of "spouse" would be defined only as a person of the opposite sex who is a husband or wife.

The passage of this legislation will give states the right to reject the validity of gay marriages recognized by other states. In addition, "married" gay couples would also remain ineligible for federal benefits.

I have consistently opposed legislation which would grant special status to a lifestyle which I believe is morally wrong and which goes against our society's Biblical and ethical values.

The Senate is expected to consider this bill shortly. The President supports this measure and has indicated he will sign it.

Many, many folks in the 17th District wrote and called to express their strong support for this bill and I very much appreciated their taking the time to do so.

FCIC Approves Crop Revenue Coverage (CRC) For 1997 Wheat Crop

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) has approved the sale of Crop Revenue Coverage (CRC) to Texas wheat farmers. Texas is one of seven states in which CRC will be available for wheat farmers on a pilot project basis.

Earlier this year, I urged Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman and Deputy Administrator for Risk Management Ken Ackerman to approve CRC for 1997 wheat. I am delighted that Texas farmers will have an opportunity to test this innovative risk management tool.

CRC was developed by American Agrisurance in conjunction with farmers, commodity groups and the federal government and provides producers with a guarantee for a specific amount of revenue, thus protecting them against price changes as well as yield losses.

As farmers learn to take more of their profit from the marketplace, they need the security other businesses have long enjoyed with revenue insurance. CRC has the potential to provide such security.

CRC offers farmers a safety net as well as the economic security to obtain agricultural loans and the ability to use progressive marketing strategies such as forward

contracting to increase their income.

Because the 1996 farm bill moves domestic producers toward a greater market orientation and reduced federal support, CRC could play a critical role in helping farmers remain profitable under these new circumstances.

Stenholm Votes Against Camouflaged Spending Bill

Washington, D.C.—Congressman Charles Stenholm voted against the 1997 legislative branch appropriations bill for its failure to achieve savings through reductions in the operating expenses of Congressional offices. The bill passed the House on July 10 by a vote of 360-58.

"Supporters of this legislation claim that, at \$1.68 billion, this is a 2

percent reduction over last year's spending," said Stenholm. "In fact, the reduction was achieved by downsizing legislative agencies like the General Accounting Office and the Government Printing Office, and not from Members' office accounts where the reductions also should have been made."

It is estimated that total spending on House accounts will actually increase by 2 percent in 1997.

Stenholm did support a bipartisan amendment to the bill which would require that Members' unspent office allowances be returned to the Treasury to be used for deficit reduction.

"This reform has been a long time coming," Stenholm said. "Right now I have the option of spending the allowance on my

own office operations or handling the money over to Speaker Gingrich. Under those circumstances, I've chosen to keep the money in the services of the 17th District of Texas."

Having passed the House of Representatives, the legislative branch appropriations bill now must be taken up by the Senate. Following Senate passage, a conference committee will resolve differences between the

two versions in order to send a final compromise bill to the President for signature. During that process, the bill could undergo numerous changes.

Stenholm has committed to promoting additional cuts in spending for Congressional operations during that continuing process.

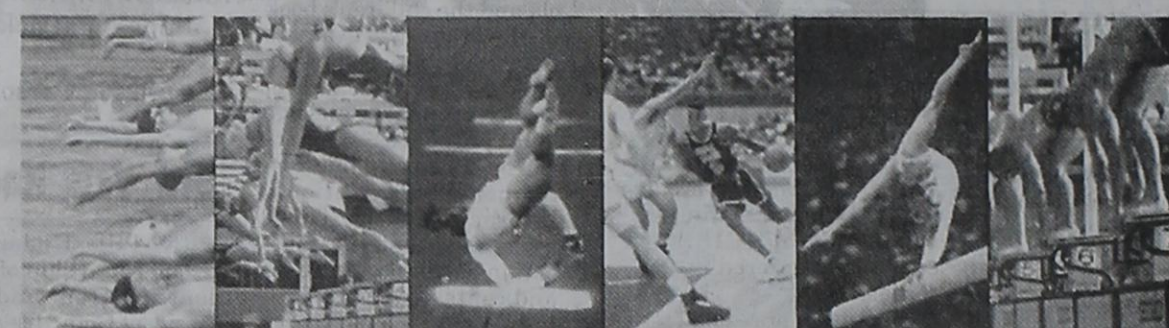
"Members of Congress should lead by example, but so far the pain of these cuts will not be felt by offices on Capitol Hill," added Stenholm.

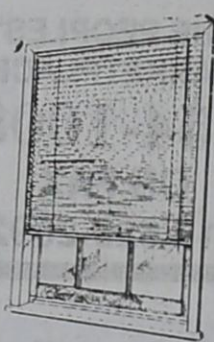

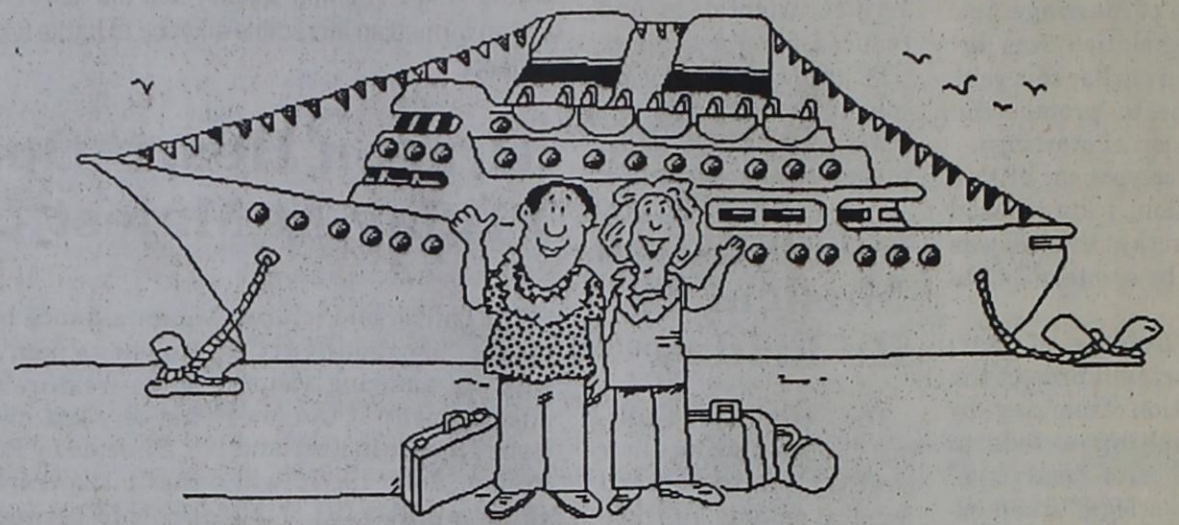

 Classroom courses taught by Texas Parks & Wildlife (TPWD) game wardens and volunteer instructors, the U.S. Power Squadrons and the Coast Guard Auxiliary and a video-based course provided by BOATCLUB Inc. are currently certified by TPWD. Those that pass are eligible to receive a Texas Safe Boating certificate which can mean a savings on many boat insurance policies in Texas. Several key safety laws contained in the TPWD water safety code which boaters should be especially conscious of before taking to the inland waters include the following:

- * At the discretion of law enforcement officers, any vessel may be cited for excessive speed and reckless or negligent operation, including creation of a hazardous wake.
- * Personal watercraft must not get closer than 50' to another vessel or person, except at headway speed, and are expressly forbidden to jump the wake of another vessel in a reckless manner at any speed.
- * No vessel moving at more than minimum headway speed may get within 150' of a diver down flag, nor can it block a narrow waterway.

Views On Dental Health

CANKER SORES

The canker sore (or aphous ulcer) is one of the best known and most persistently annoying dental lesions. It is small and whitish and may occur on the gums, cheeks or tongue. It appears singly and in clusters. A blister usually forms first, without notice, then breaks to form an open sore or canker. Then the acute pain begins. The open canker sore is especially sensitive to touch and to hot or spicy foods. Fortunately, the lifetime of the canker sore normally runs its course in about a week or ten days. No good treatment is known for its cure at present. There's not much you can do except to make sure you avoid

irritating foods. Some people are especially prone to canker sores. They seem to run in families and there may be a connection between canker attacks and emotional stress, though there is still no definite information on the cause of this puzzling disorder.

A dentist can treat canker sores to relieve the pain. However, certain kinds of cankers tend to persist or come back in spite of any treatment now known.

Household Help by John Amantea

Q. Realizing that living in a 65-year-old house presents problems along the way, I would like to explain my situation to you. We moved here 21 years ago and noticed a few minor cracks in this totally-tiled (floor) house. Never did we realize that these cracks would get so bad.

The worst area where the tiles are 9"x9" in size is badly cracked. The cracks extend through 12 tiles (108 inches). The others are bad and seem to grow just as rapidly.

My main concern is, are we in any danger of a sinking floor? We are situated on a slight incline with part of the house virtually sitting on the ground. Can you give me any thoughts?

A. I also take a 65-year-old house into consideration because of its age. A building this old is apt to have structural problems of one sort or another.

You didn't mention any water or seepage problems from beneath your floor, so we'll rule that out. I can also guess that a good majority of your home is situated on a poured concrete wall or foundation blocks. Even though a portion of your house is sitting on the ground, this shouldn't have an adverse effect as far as those cracks are concerned.

The biggest dilemma you have is structural settlement. Although I haven't inspected your home personally, the extent of the cracks you have described proves so. This kind of problem is often common, but I suspect a more serious concern in your case. You have also made mention that the cracks grow as rapidly as the others, which could be significant.

At this point, I cannot give you any methods of repair due to the possibly serious nature of the problem. I also could not give you a conclusive answer whether your floor is in any danger of actually sinking.

In my opinion, it would be a wise investment to have a home inspection engineer come in and assess your problem. I can give you no easy answers from my end.

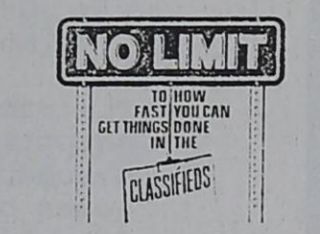

Household Help by John Amantea

Q. Realizing that living in a 65-year-old house presents problems along the way, I would like to explain my situation to you. We moved here 21 years ago and noticed a few minor cracks in this totally-tiled (floor) house. Never did we realize that these cracks would get so bad.

The worst area where the tiles are 9"x9" in size is badly cracked. The cracks extend through 12 tiles (108 inches). The others are bad and seem to grow just as rapidly.

My main concern is, are we in any danger of a sinking floor? We are situated on a slight incline with part of the house virtually sitting on the ground. Can you give me any thoughts?

A. I also take a 65-year-old house into consideration because of its age. A building this old is apt to have structural problems of one sort or another.

You didn't mention any water or seepage problems from beneath your floor, so we'll rule that out. I can also guess that a good majority of your home is situated on a poured concrete wall or foundation blocks. Even though a portion of your house is sitting on the ground, this shouldn't have an adverse effect as far as those cracks are concerned.

The biggest dilemma you have is structural settlement. Although I haven't inspected your home personally, the extent of the cracks you have described proves so. This kind of problem is often common, but I suspect a more serious concern in your case. You have also made mention that the cracks grow as rapidly as the others, which could be significant.

At this point, I cannot give you any methods of repair due to the possibly serious nature of the problem. I also could not give you a conclusive answer whether your floor is in any danger of actually sinking.

In my opinion, it would be a wise investment to have a home inspection engineer come in and assess your problem. I can give you no easy answers from my end.

AUSTIN — A Education passed by the state Senate Education Com- mittee would eliminate tenure — the lifetime guarantee of employ- ment for some college professors and a "carrot" often used to attract the best faculty.

The proposal, which is only a proposal, could strip tenure from professors at public colleges and universities or fire them if they are rated poorly for two consecutive years by peers and students, the *Austin American- Statesman* reported.

Mary Birgan, general secretary of the Washington, D.C.-based American Association of Univer- sity Professors, said that eliminat- ing tenure would have "a chilling effect on Texas' faculty and a chill- ing effect on the state's ability to recruit."

An education committee mem- ber, Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, disputed claims by educators' groups that killing tenure would hurt fac- ulty recruitment.

"What this is saying is, if you're a bad professor, don't come to Texas," Sibley told the *American-Statesman*, adding that the proposal is not a response to abuses of the tenure system, but addresses a growing belief that tenure has outlived its purpose.

David Merkwitz, spokesman for the American Council on Education, said an "extreme interven- tion" like eliminating tenure "can do extraordinary damage to Texas universities."

Presently, the Texas A&M Uni-

versity System is under a reg- ents' directive to revise policies so tenured professors could be re- moved for poor performance. Uni- versity of Texas President Robert Berdahl said he favors a post-tenure review that would help professors identify their strengths and improve on their weaknesses.

Reform Party Ballots Mailed

The Reform Party sent out a million presidential nominating questionnaires last week naming Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot and former Colorado Gov. Richard Lamm as "the potential candidates most frequently mentioned," but Reform Party members can write in any name they wish. Lamm formally announced his candidacy on July 9.

The questionnaires were mailed to people who signed petitions to get the Reform Party on the general election ballot. Party members will have until July 20 to mail in a response.

Candidates who qualify for nomination will be allowed to speak to a Reform Party convention Aug. 11 in Long Beach, Calif.

The name of the nominee will be announced Aug. 18 at a Reform Party meeting in Valley Forge, Pa.

Ruling: Adultery Not Protected

Adultery is not protected by the constitutional right to privacy, the Texas Supreme Court declared last week.

The ruling was against a Sher- man police officer who was denied a promotion because of an affair with another man's wife.

The majority opinion, written by Justice Greg Abbott, concludes that the right to privacy "does not include the right to maintain a sexual relationship with the spouse of someone else" but stipulated that the court's decision does not mean that the government is free "to engage in intrusive investigation methods to determine the sexual practices of individuals."

Uribe Vows to Dissolve RRC

Texas Railroad Commission candi- date Hector Uribe of Brownsville says he intends to work on dissolv- ing the three-member panel if he is

elected Nov. 5. He said the offices of the three commissioners are "histori- cal anachronisms" that need jus- tification.

Uribe, who is running against Republican commission chairman Carole Kecton Rylander, acknowl- edged the passage of a constitu- tional amendment would be neces- sary to close the agency, but he said the commissioners' jobs could go unfunded in the meantime.

He also said, if elected, he would accept a fraction of the \$79,000 annual salary while trying to transfer the agency's duties to the Department of Public Safety, the Transportation Department and the Public Utility Commission.

Uribe, a Democrat, served in the Texas Senate from 1981 to 1990 and in the Texas House from 1978 to 1981.

Other Capital Highlights

■ A report released last week by the state Senate Economic De- velopment Committee says school property tax abatements granted to businesses are hurting both poor and wealthy school districts. The committee adopted a recommenda- tion that will encourage the 1977 Legislature to find alternatives to the abatements as a way to at- tract business to Texas. Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who presides over the Senate, has never been a fan of tax abatements.

■ Literacy projects in Hous- ton, Bryan, Beaumont, Bastrop, Decatur, Mount Pleasant, Devine, Midland, Marble Falls and Paris will share \$150,000 in grant money from the Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy. Gov. George W. Bush and first lady Laura Bush said the grants were part of their campaign to improve literacy in Texas.

■ An Austin state district judge has granted a temporary injunction to prevent the "Republic of Texas" group from filing bogus liens. Attorney General Dan Morales has said bogus liens filed by the group are clogging the state's property record system. One lien, filed in February, was filed against all state property, the Associated Press reported.

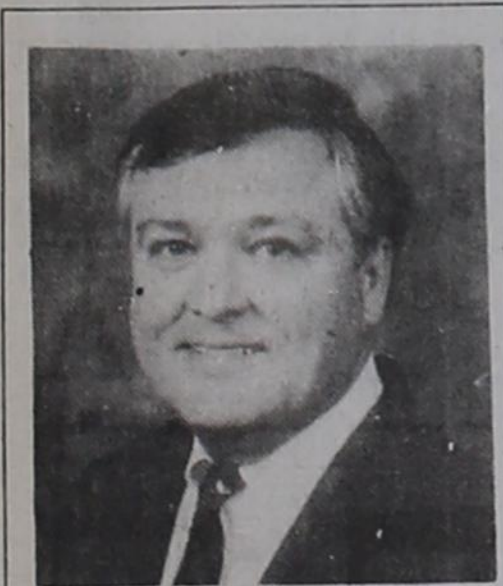

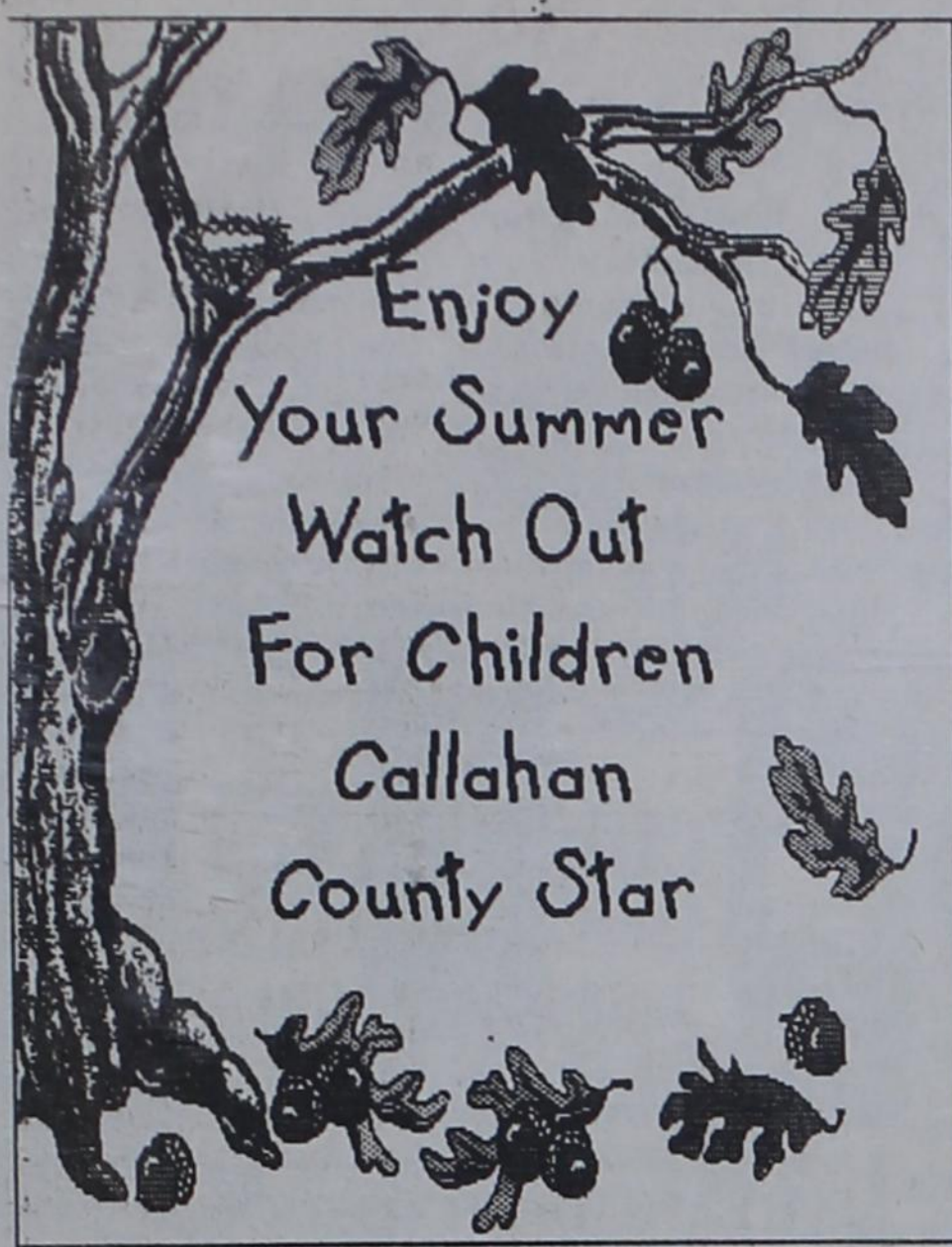

Confederate Air Force HQ News

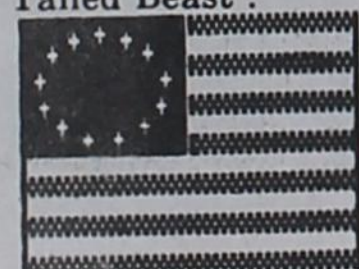
From the humble beginnings of two Curtiss biplanes in 1911, to the rich legacy of naval aviation in World War II, the Confederate Air Force is proud to launch AIRSHO 96 with "Reflections in Blue - Naval Aviation Comes of Age", a salute to naval aviation.

The Confederate Air Force (CAF) and the American Airpower Heritage Museum (AAHM), located at the Midland International Airport, Midland, Texas, are proud to present this naval theme for its annual homecoming airshow to be held September 28-29, 1996.

On May 8, 1911, Capt. W.I. Chambers prepared requisitions for the U.S. Navy's first aircraft -- two Curtiss biplanes given the designation A-1. That same year the first funds for naval aviation were appropriated and the first naval aviator reported for flight training. Thirty years later, and only 19 years after the Navy acquired its first aircraft carrier, naval aviation was put to the ultimate test - World War II, from which a code of honor and tradition would be born. Naval aviation had come of age.

An international volunteer organization dedicated to the preservation of airworthy World War II military aircraft, the CAF revels in presenting the annual Airpower Demonstration -- a series of recreations of several of the famous battles of the Second World War including the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor and the aerial battles over Britain and Europe.

The skies over Midland, Texas will be filled with vintage World War II aircraft paying tribute to those who flew by land and sea. AIRSHO 96 will feature the aircraft that championed the efforts of a young Navy and Marine Corps. Aircraft with haunting names like Vought's "Whistling Death", better known as the Corsair; or the Curtiss SB2C, nicknamed by its crewmen the "Big-Tailed Beast".



Also featured in the CAF's Airpower Demonstration will be aircraft such as the CAF's B-29 Superfortress, A6M2 Japanese Zero, He-111 German bomber and FG-1D Corsair displaying their awesome power. Scheduled to return to the airways are rare CAF aircraft such as the Junkers JU-52, the F6F Hellcat and the A-26 Invader. Modern military from all four branches of the service will also be on display at AIRSHO helping to baring to life the evolution of aviation.

Celebrating 50 years of precision flying, the U.S. Navy Blue Angels jet team will astonish AIRSHO 96 attendees. Their presentation includes four-plane, graceful, acrobatic maneuvers referred to as "diamond" maneuvers and fast-paced high performance maneuvers performed by the solo pilots in the number five and six jets. All six jets perform maneuvers together in the well-known delta formation.

Flying the Fina Special Extra 300, Navy-trained pilot Jan Collmer's series of sweeping acrobatics will make for a heart-stopping, hand-clapping performance. The CAF grounds will be alive with activities for the entire family. Tradeshow vendors with an array of items will be set up in the hangar. Also, for those who are not faint at heart, a portable simulation theater will be available featuring "Fly With the Blue Angels". The simulator puts you in the cockpit of the Blue Angels F/A-18 Hornet as it is put through airshow maneuvers. If a ride on a World War I-era

aircraft is more to your taste, then ride on "A Wing and A Prayer" in the CAF simulator located in the museum gift shop.

The American Airpower Heritage Museum (AAHM) will be once again adding a new segment to their ever-growing collection of interactive, interpretive exhibits. During AIRSHO 96, the AAHM will be unveiling the Low Frequency 4-Course Range Exhibit, which will include a fully operational low frequency range, displayed to demonstrate the ground-based navigational device that was used in the earliest days of aviation.

I think we live in a marvelous period in the history of mankind. In this century alone, we began the 1900s basically still dependent on horses for our everyday transportation. 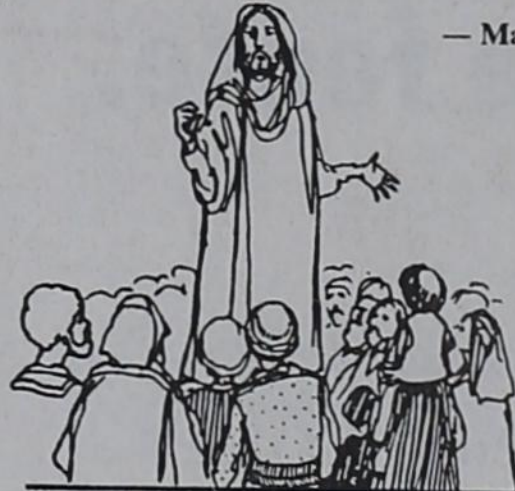

The Parables of Jesus

"That same day Jesus went out and sat by the lakeside, many people gathered...he spoke to them in parables, at some length."

— Matthew 13



Many people have some difficulties understanding the parables of Jesus. They even confused some of His disciples. But these short, allegorical stories have a message that is really quite simple. The parable was a method of speaking that Jesus always used when addressing large crowds. One of the best known is the parable of the sower who planted his fields with corn only to have an enemy come along in the night and plant the weed called darnel among it in an attempt to ruin the crop. At the time, Jesus was speaking to great crowds of farmers who must have readily understood the analogy, which Jesus explained this way: "The sower of the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world; the good seed stands for the children of the Kingdom, the darnel for the children of the evil one."

Despite the mounting controversies and growing evidence of the Clintons' arrogant abuse of power, if not criminal activity, the Democrats are now between the proverbial rock and a hard place. After all, Bill Clinton is the only horse they have to ride back to power. There is the remote possibility that depending on what happens between now and their convention, they'll nominate someone else. 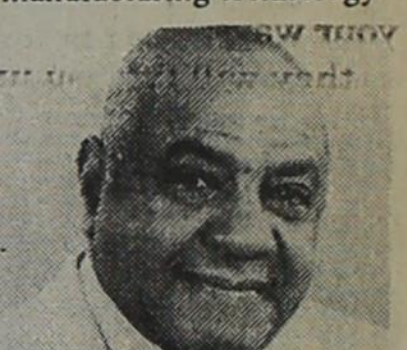
But a debate that's being waged in Congress over cuts in U.S. foreign aid can critically affect the health and well-being of Maria's family, and of millions more desperate families in developing countries.

Maria and her husband practice birth control with condoms they receive free, along with instructions for their use, from MEXFAM, whose work is financed in part by U.S. assistance.

"Cuts in the foreign aid bill would eliminate funding for some of the largest and most influential family planning organizations and jeopardize the survival of a 30-year-success story in international family planning," warns Victoria Markell, vice president for political affairs at Population Action International (PAI), a private nonpartisan organization based in Washington.

The bill, which was passed by the House and is scheduled for Senate debate, slashes family planning funds and says that a foreign organization can't receive aid unless it agrees to an abortion litmus test that allows Washington to dictate how it spends not just U.S. assistance, but non-U.S. funds as well.

Tens of millions of couples around the world benefit directly from contraceptive supplies and family planning services funded by the U.S. government, says PAI. Tens of millions more rely on programs that have benefited from U.S. technical assistance — everything from training personnel to contraceptive manufacturing technology.



Experts estimate that 85 percent of the women who lose access to modern contraceptive services will become pregnant within one year; of these, at least one-third will resort to an abortion. Among those women giving birth, one in 10 of their infants and young children will die. For every 250 live births, one woman will die.

The United States has been a leader in the international population field for three decades. It has helped build a partnership in which developing countries themselves now provide family planning services and supply more than two-thirds of the funds spent.

With help from USAID, contraceptive use in developing countries has increased more than twelvefold since the early 1960s, and world population growth has slowed. That means a better life for the people of those countries; it gives them more time to develop their economies, ultimately reducing their reliance on foreign aid.

And it has a positive impact on the rest of the world by cutting the number of immigrants and refugees, relieving pressure on the environment, defusing the potential for civil strife, building up new trading partners.

Working together, countries of the world have made a start toward helping people like Maria and her family — and all of this planet's inhabitants. It would be tragic and stupid to stop now.

Come Aside

Rich Weiss was a remarkable man. By the time of his death he was famous around the world.

Never heard of him, huh?

May be this will help. He was born of Hungarian-Jewish parentage at Appleton, Wisconsin, in 1874. He became the highest-paid entertainer of his day.

That still doesn't help much, does it? This will.

When he finally got his act together, Weiss adopted a stage name: Harry Houdini...the master showman, a distinguished flyer, a mystifying magician, and-most of all-an unsurpassed escapologist.

On March 10, 1904, the London Daily Illustrated Mirror challenged Houdini to escape from a special pair of handcuffs they

had prepared. Are you ready? There were six locks on each cuff and nine tumblers on each lock. Seven days later, 4,000 spectators gathered in the London Hippodrome to witness the outcome of the audacious challenge which Houdini had accepted.

At precisely 3:15 p.m., the manacled showman stepped into an empty cabinet which came up to his waist. Kneeling down, he was out of sight for a full twenty minutes. He stood up smiling as the crowd applauded, thinking he was free. But he was not. He asked for more light. They came on brighter as he knelt down out of sight. Fifteen minutes later he stood to his feet. Applause broke out again, premature. He was still handcuffed. Said he just needed to flex his knees.

Down into the cabi-

net again went the magician. Twenty minutes passed slowly for the murmuring crowd before Houdini stood to his feet with a broad smile. Loud applause quickly stopped as the audience saw he was not yet free. Because the bright light made the heat so intense, he leaped from the cabinet and twisted his manacled hands in front of him until he could reach a pocket knife in his vest. Opening the knife with his teeth, he held its hand in his mouth and bent forward to such a degree that the tail of his coat fell over his head. He grasped the coat, pulled it over his head, then proceeded to slash it to ribbons with the knife between his teeth. Throwing aside the strips of his heavy coat, he jumped back into the box as the audience roared its approval and cheered him on.

Down went Houdini, but this time for only ten minutes. With a dramatic flourish, he jumped from the box-

wrists free-waving the bulky handcuffs over his head in triumph. Pandemonium exploded in London. Once again the showman had achieved the incredible-almost the impossible.

Afterward, Houdini was interviewed. Everyone wanted to know why he had to interrupt the process of his escape as often as he did. With a twinkle in his eyes, the magician freely admitted that he really didn't have to interrupt the process. He repeatedly explained that his ability escape was based on knowl-

edge. "My brain is the key that sets me free!" he often declared. Then why did he keep standing up before he was loose? He confessed it was because he wanted the audience's applause to keep up his enthusiasm!

own enthusiasm. What an essential role enthusiasm plays in our lives! In many ways, it is the key ingredient that frees us from the cramping, dark, overheated confinement of a task. When the odds are against us, the hours are long, and the end is not yet in view, enthusiasm rescues us from the temptation to quit-or run away-or complain. It takes the grit and grind out of boredom. It calls in fresh troops when the battle gets long and the body gets weary.

the reasons God gives us so many personal promises in His Word is to stir up our enthusiasm-to build a bonfire in the steamroom of our souls.

Houdini had it right: Knowledge is essential-but knowledge without enthusiasm is like a tire without air-like a pool without water-like a bed without sheets-like a "thank you" without a smile. Remove enthusiasm from a church service on Sunday and you have the makings of a memorial service at a mortuary on a Monday. Remove enthusiasm from the daily whirl of family activities and you've made a grinding mill out of a merry-go-round. Enthusiasm acts as the oil on Saturdays in our home when it's clean-up day and the family machine needs a boost.

The difference? Enthusiasm.

The state's largest and most active boating industry organization has issued a call for its customers--Texas' 5 million boaters--to stay shipshape this summer or risk spending time studying rather than water skiing.

In a formal statement of its position on key water safety issues, the Boating Trades Association of Texas (BTAT) has called for a crackdown on offenders through increased law enforcement efforts at the local, regional and state level, combined with an increased emphasis on boater education. The group supports efforts to require court-ordered mandatory boater education training for all those who violate the law.

"The overwhelming majority of Texas boaters know and obey the law, but some still have not accepted the responsibilities that go along with the pleasures of recreational boating," said Jim Colborn, BTAT president. "We encourage everyone to take a boating course, but Texas needs a tough new law passed so that anyone who violates the water safety code would be fined and required by a judge to pass a state-approved boater education course."

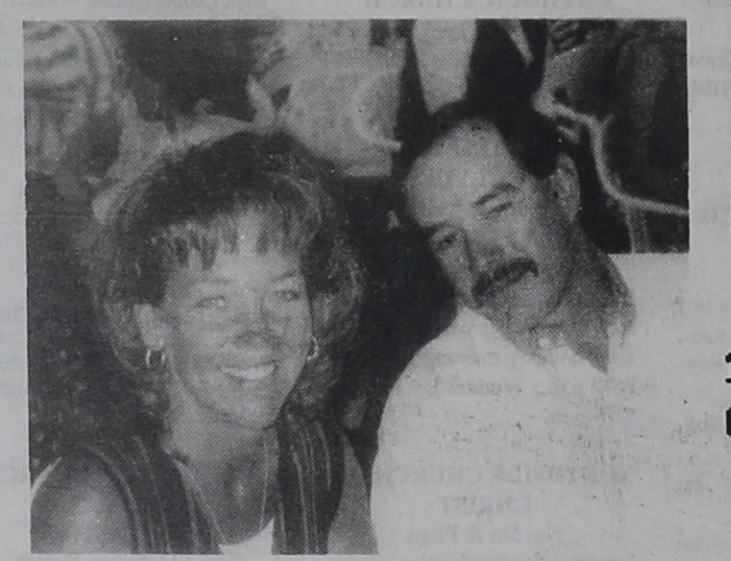
