

Trustees have lengthy session

Third time proved to be a charm Monday night when school trustees finally met after having to reschedule their meeting twice due to the Hawk baseball team being in the state

Board members faced a mountain of decisions as they tackled the lengthly agenda.

They approved an interlocal agreement with City View, Electra and Holliday ISD's to purchase and operate an off-campus Alternative Education Program facility in Iowa

The other three school districts had already voted affirmatively to participate in the project.

The plan calls for the cooperative to purchase the C&S Service Center building in Iowa Park. It will be staffed with a director and two teachers. Each district will furnish one aide. Students will be bused from their home school districts to the Iowa Park location each school day.

Cost of the building and property is \$100,000, and will be divided equally between the four districts. It is estimated that renovation materi-

als will cost \$25,000. Cost of operation for a year is estimated at \$130,000, or \$32,500 per district plus the cost of a local aide.

April good for business

The month of April was apparenty a good month for business in Iowa Park, according to the sales tax rebate reported by the state comptroller's office.

The City of Iowa Park received a sales tax rebate of \$21,535.11 which was based on local sales taxes collected in April and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in

That was a 20.87-percent increase over the \$17,816.37 the city

received this same month in 1997. The check brought to a total of \$142,213.57 in tax rebates this far this year. That's up 4.64 percent, according to the report.

Superintendents in the coop will meet today to look at criteria for the director and set up guidelines. The principals will be setting up proce-

dures for administration. In other action taken Monday night, board members approved an after-school child care program at the Kidwell and Bradford Elementary

Jo Lynn Cockrum, executive director of the Recreational Activities Center (RAC), told the board that there had been a favorable response to a survey, sent home with students, to determine a need for the program.

At the May board meeting, Leroy Threet, president of the RAC board, said that parents of 75 students at Kidwell and 40 students at Bradford had expressed interest in the service.

A committee composed of Pat Cravens, Steve Moody, LaRae Collins, Michellie Byrnes, Threet and Cockrum was formed to work out details of the program.

Cockrum said there would be about 40 kids in the program on each campus, and their parents would sign a contract with the RAC.

The students will stay in either the gym or cafeteria, possibly both, and the facility would be open until 6

Board President Keith Fisher told Collins that the board was interested, and asked him to get cost figures of dog and officer training and bring them back to the next meeting.

Collins recommended that if the school goes with this plan, they should put up signs in the buildings and parking lots saying that cars are subject to search.

He also said that in the future there would be a greater police presence at the schools, with officers visiting the campuses and possibly having lunch in the cafeterias.

In another move to improve security at the high school, the board approved the purchase of four security cameras. If this works well, more cameras can be added in the future.

A five-year vending machine agreement with Southwest Coca Cola Bottling Company was approved.

Total funding by Coca Cola for the five year period will be \$245,000. Up-front funding of \$110,000 will be divided among the four campuses; \$10,000 will go for a new scoreboard at Hawk Stadium; and 5-year guarantecd commissions total \$125,000.

Armed standoff ends successfully

A tense stand-off situation Saturday just southwest of Iowa Park ended with "definitely the best outcome," said Sgt. David Duke of the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept.

"No officers were hurt, he (the suspect) wasn't harmed," he added.

It easily could have gone the other way in light of the events that transpired during the afternoon.

According to Duke, the Sheriff's Dept. received a 911 call around 2 p.m. from Cathy Arledge reporting that her son, Trinity Lee West, 18, was threatening her and other family members at their home on FM 368

West resides with his grandparents, Bob and Pat Frazier, in a home next door to his mother's.

Duke said West had been outside the home, between that house and the home of his grandparents, firing more than 75 shotgun blasts into his personal vehicle. He then broke into his mother's home, kicking at the door and using the butt of the 12gauge Savage automatic shotgun he was carrying.

In the home were West's mother, 22-year-old sister, her 4-year-old and 3-week-old infant, and a 14-year-old

Police reports said that when he entered the home, he was carrying the shotgun in a threatening manner, making threats toward his mother. His mother then produced a 9 millimeter handgun, placed the other family members in another room and or-

dered West to leave the house. West left the house and went to his grandparent's home next door where, deputies were later told, a large number of firearms and ammu-

nition and a police scanner were kept. The Frazier's were out of town

at the time of the incident. Sgt. Duke said that as Deputies Greg Dooley and Robert Baker were getting out of their vehicle in the Frazier's driveway, they heard three to five gunshots from the back of the home. Duke said it was unknown if West was firing at the officers, or firing to gain the officers' attention.

Deputies quickly set up a perimeter which encompassed the section of FM 368 South from the intersection of FM 1206 to FM 367. The county Special Response Unit (SWAT team) was also called into

Sgt. Duke, the negotiator for the SRU, said the initial contact with West by phone took over an hour to achieve, and when West finally did answer the phone he showed obvious signs of defiance.

Duke said West told him he wanted to die and that he wanted the officers to kill him, something Duke said is called "suicide by cop."

During negotiations West told another officer that he wanted an hour to decide whether he would surrender or "if the police would have to kill him." Contact with West was then lost for 45 minutes.

During that time, electricity to the home was cut off.

West then called back and talked to Duke, telling him he wanted to "go outside and just start shooting." Duke said that during the final conversation, which lasted about 45 minutes, West was full of rage and his mental demeanor was up and down to the point he was depressed.

He told Duke he was angry because of the police presence, and ex-

pressed again that he wanted to die. Negotiations progressed to the point where West agreed to surren der and the terms of surrender were

Sgt. Duke said that even then the situation was very tense because the possibility was high that there would be an armed confrontation.

When deputies entered the Frazier home to "clear it," several loaded assault rifles, handguns and many more rounds of ammunition were found laid out.

Sgt. Duke said family members told him that they suspect substance abuse and depression may have played a role in the incident.

West is in Wichita County Jail charged with two counts of aggravated assault-family violence, bond set at \$25,000 each count; and two counts of endangering a child, \$5,000 bond each count.

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. We just planted a Red Oak in Iowa Park. How can we get this tree to grow faster? We need shade as soon as possible.

A. Most homeowners don't realize that given proper care in terms of watering, fertilization and mulching that you can get even a slowergrowing tree to exhibit decent growth rates.

Use a quality slow-release nitrogen lawn food such as 21-7-14 or similar ratio every six to eight weeks on your lawn making an additional pass around your new tree. This regular application of nitrogen will generate new growth.

Use several inches of mulch or compost around the base of the tree extending out several feet. The mulch will help eliminate weeds and keep you from getting too close to the tree with a string trimmer as well as moderating soil temperatures.

Water the new tree regularly and check the soil temperature level making sure that the soil is not overwatered or excessively dry at any

During the hottest periods of our summer (July to September), make sure you carefully check watering needs of the new tree and adjust as needed. Given proper care the growth rate of your Red Oak will be greatly increased.

Q. My wife and I planted about 20 tomato plants this spring in our Iowa Park garden. We have carefully watered and fertilized and caged the plants. Our problem now is that the fruit that is on some of the plants is turning brown on the bottom. Over the past week, we have noticed that

none of the plants are holding their

blooms. What can we do to get qual-

ity tomatoes? A. Even the best cared for tomato plants are having a difficult time retaining blooms and setting fruit. This is directly related to excessively temperature exceeds 90 degrees with blooms and fail to properly set fruit. Hopefully, more moderate temperatures will allow the plants to produce

You might want to try one of the hormone type sprays like BloomSet which can help plants set fruit when temperatures are not cooperative.

The brown areas on the bottom of some of your tomato fruit is called blossom end rot. Blossom end rot is caused by soil moisture fluctuations (going from wet to dry). It is also related to calcium deficiencies. Your best bet for reducing the problem is to use several inches of mulch around each tomato plant and keep the soil evenly moist.

Avoid letting the plants get extremely dry prior to watering. Conhot conditions. Any time the daytime tainer grown tomatoes are very susceptible to blossom end rot because the nighttime temperature above 70 containers have the tendency to dry degrees, tomato plants will abort out so rapidly between waterings.



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

Horton and the former Lydia Mae Saucier, both natives of Biloxi, Miss., were married June 6, 1948 in their hometown.







Police after drinkers

Apparently the summer heat was getting to a lot of people around Iowa Park during this past week, and they are using alcohol for relief.

Iowa Park police made five alcohol-related arrests during that period, four for public intoxication and one for driving while intoxicated.

The first was Wednesday afternoon of last week, when an officer picked up Harry Lee Skinner, Jr., 33, in the 100 block of West Garden, and charged him with public intoxication. He was released about four hours later, after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

mation from the past in genealogy. As we gather data about our families and ancestors, we look at all the evidence. There are times we draw the incorrect conclusions, because we don't know how to weigh evidence or how to resolve the frequent occurrence of conflicting evidence.

Just because we get the same information from several family members, it may be and probably is material copied from the same source which may be correct but often there are errors in dates and relationships.

Genealogists generally use the following guidance. (1) Source - the means by which information comes to a researcher. (2) Evidence - the physical form in which information is presented. (3) Proof- refers to documents used as evidence for many lineage society applications, but actually is the name for a process that takes place in the mind, not for the

evidence on which it is based.

After the information is gathered go over it carefully and sort into two groups. (1) Primary evidence or sources. Usually written records; the earliest or first documents that were recorded or created at or near the time of the event. (2) Secondary evidence or source can be thought of as being second hand information that has come from some other person or record.

Get as close to the primary records and original documents as you can. Keep in mind that they may contain errors. Birth and death cer-

tificates are only as accurate as the person giving or taking the information is in knowledge and care. Don't blindly accept information you may find in a book, CD, or on the internet.

Thomas W. Jones, a noted genealogist suggests the following guidelines; test each item of evidence with the following four "Cs", Closeness (in place and time). Credibility (of the person who made the record). Causality (why record was made). Corroboration (with other evidence).

You will not be able to evaluate information unless you carefully record and cite your sources.



AUSTIN - Gov. George W. Bush doesn't have a knee-jerk attitude when it comes to wildfires threatening Texas: He has a prevention plan.

Last week, Bush asked President Clinton for aid to prepare the state to fight wildfires and issued an emergency proclamation for 207 of Texas' 254 counties. The governor is seeking federal aid to put firefighters and equipment in high-risk areas before fires break out.

"Texas is already dry and we face a long, hot summer," Bush said. "Already in early June we are seeing August-like conditions with the bulk of the summer still ahead.

"It is threatening crops and could pose major fire and water problems unless we act now."

Bush called on county officials to consider implementing outdoor burning bans, fireworks restrictions and water conservation measures.

Bush stopped short, however, of recommending a ban on fireworks as the July 4 holiday approaches. "My

advice would be to be cautious," he said. "I would urge county commissioners to take extreme caution because we're dry and the winds are high."

Other Capital Highlights

■ Black and Hispanic civil rights groups filed a motion last week with the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to intervene in the Hopwood case when it goes up for appeal. The motion argues that the interests of minorities won't be represented well enough by lawyers for the University of Texas. UT System regents voted last month to appeal the 1996 ruling that ended race as a factor in higher education admissions.

At its state convention this month, the League of United Latin American Citizens adopted a resolution denouncing the use of taxpayer funds for private school vouchers. Officials from the Texas Federation of Teachers and the Coalition for Public Schools applauded the resolution.



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


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Iowa Park dominates All-District

As part of the agreement, all wholesale products to be sold through the school district or affiliated groups must be purchased from Southwest Coca-Cola. Powerade is to be the "official sports drink" of Iowa Park schools, with Powerade cups and coolers on the sidelines.

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
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Hawks edged out in state semifinal

When you get to Austin, any of the four teams down there are capable of winning it all. What separates one team from another is sometimes talent and other times it's the team that has the ball bounce the right way that comes out on top.

"That was a tough way to lose a


