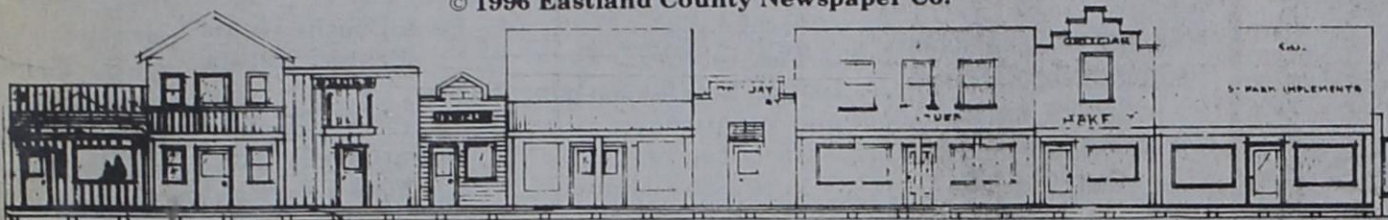

Cowboy Gathering Pumper Race Results

BAIRD-Baird and Cisco Fire Departments battled Saturday afternoon, showing their fire hose handling skills during the Baird Cowboy Gathering Pumper Races.

Pumper races are designed to show fire fighters' skills of laying a fire hose out and getting water from the fire hydrant, through the truck and hose, and then out of the nozzle as quickly as possible. Six people make up the "Pumper Race Team" and spend many hours practicing to work at their best as a unified team. If one connection is missed the team draws a no time".

Cisco Fire Department answered the challenge of the Baird Fire Department and came to town with a Ladies and Men's team for the competition. The crowd gathered around to watch the action scattered when the Baird Ladies Team "busted" (missed a connection) on the Pumper Race spraying the sidewalk area with water.

The Cisco Ladies took the 3 Man Hose Race beating Baird by about 1 1/2 seconds. In the Two Man Hose Race Baird's number 1 Ladies team took first with Cisco's "A" team coming in second. Baird number two team placed third and Cisco "B" team busted.

The Baird Men's Teams took the lead in all events, Pumper Race, Six Man Hose Race, Three Man Hose Race, and Two Man Hose Race. The Two and Three Man Hose

Race's had multiple teams and were ranked in these positions: 3 Man, Baird 1st, Cisco "A" 2nd, and Cisco "B" 3rd. 2 Man, Baird "No.1" 1st, Baird "No.2" 2nd, Cisco "A" 3rd, Cisco "C" 4th, and Cisco "B" 5th.

After the competition ended some of Baird's school age residents tried their hand at two and three man hose races. All had fun and learned that threading hose's together is not so easy when the pressure of the competition is on.

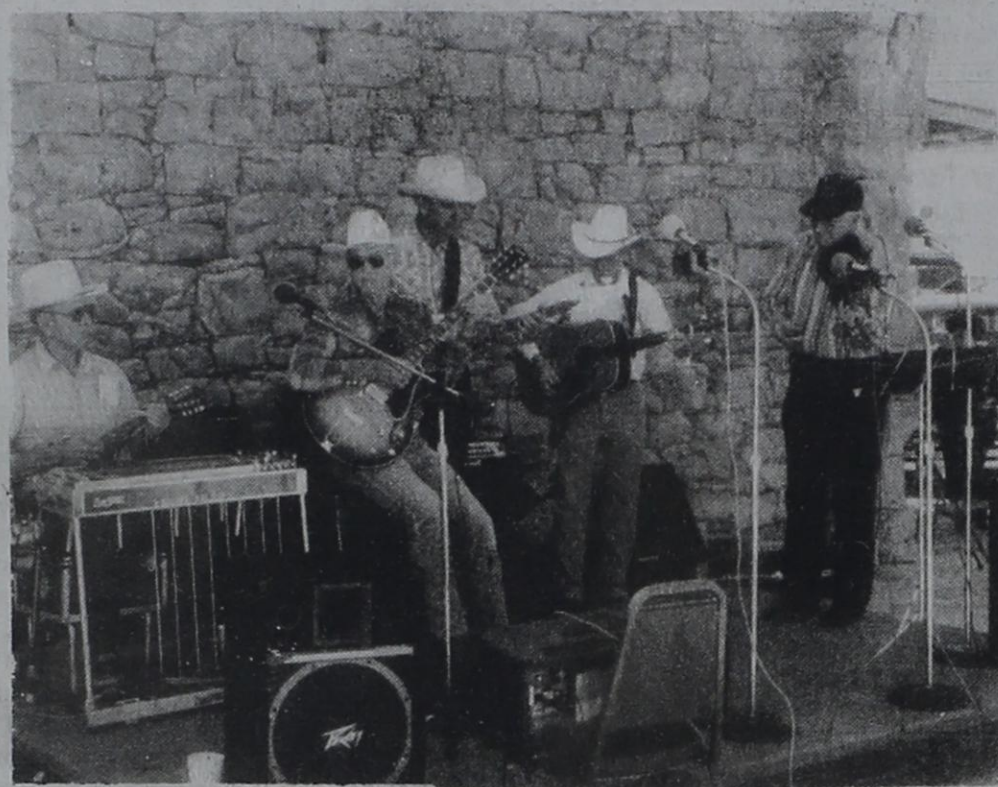
Trophies are awarded to all fire department participants and the Baird Fire Department along with the Baird Chamber would like to thank all that participated in the competition and helped with judging.

Dance at the American Legion Saturday

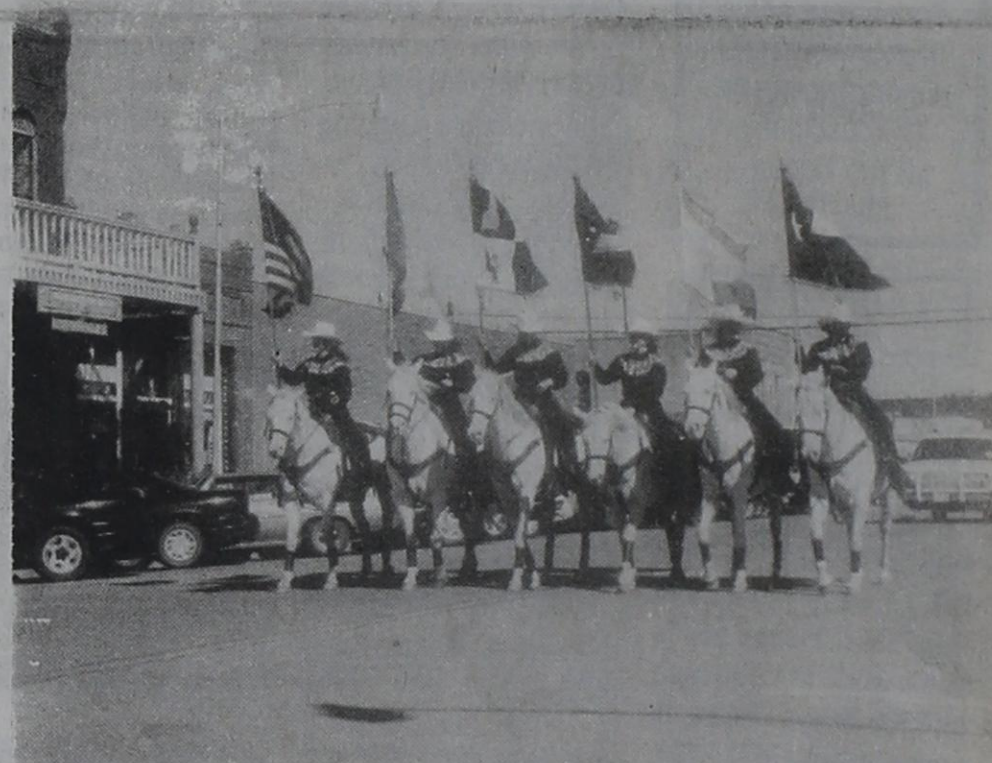

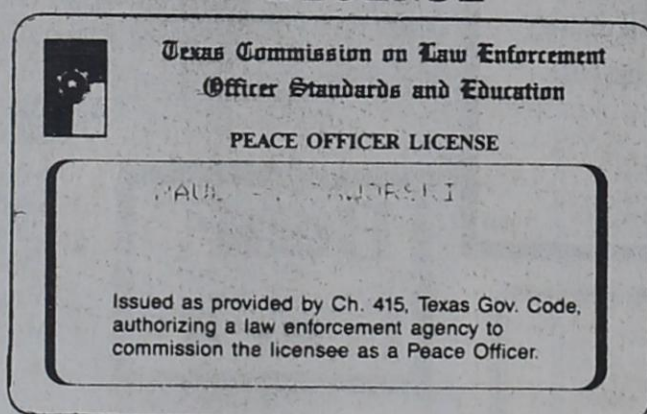
SUBCHAPTER C. LICENSE AND APPOINTMENT

§ 415.053. Licensing of Certain Law Enforcement Officers Elected Under Texas Constitution or Statute

Text of § 415.053 effective upon approval by the voters of constitutional amendment proposed by Acts 1995, 73rd Leg., S.J.R., No. 18

An officer, including a sheriff, elected under the Texas Constitution or a statute or appointed to fill a vacancy in an elective office must be licensed by the commission not later than two years after the date that the officer takes office. The commission shall establish requirements for licensing and for revocation, suspension, cancellation, or denial of a license of such an officer.

Baird School Board Meets

BAIRD-Baird School Board met in regular session Monday night at the School Library. President Kenneth Brock called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. with board members Gerry McDowell, Roger Corn, Butch Barron, and Miller Scott present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved on a motion by Corn and seconded by McDowell.

Merv Warrick, Mayor of the City of Clyde, spoke to the board concerning the proposed resolution to change the County Appraisal Board from a five member board to a seven member board. Warrick said the City of Clyde just wanted a voice on the taxing board and the seven member board would give each taxing entity a voice. Scott asked

Warrick if this would be the last change or if when someone else was unhappy other changes would be asked for. Warrick replied that he could not say, but this change would depend on the approval of all seven entities involved and if any objected the resolution could not pass. Warrick thanked the board for their consideration and left the meeting.

After some discussion over the phone bill and some other Hems the bills were paid on a motion by McDowell and seconded by Com. Barron abstained from voting on two bills.

There was much discussion over the changing of the Appraisal Board membership. The board took no action. By taking no action the board voiced approval for the resolution to change the ap-

praisal board to a seven member board from a five member board.

The Board tabled Board Policy Update 52 on a motion by Scott and seconded by Com.

McDowell made a motion that was seconded by Corn and the board approved Take Your Daughter, or Son, to Work Day. The exact date will be set at a later time, but will be one day during the week of April 21st through the 24th. Scott abstained from voting on the motion.

Mikels then discussed school district concerns, such as, the board was looking at another state mandated teacher pay raise next year amounting to \$70,000.

The Board approved rules covering use of the Internet by students

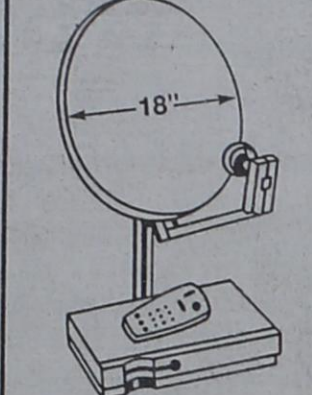

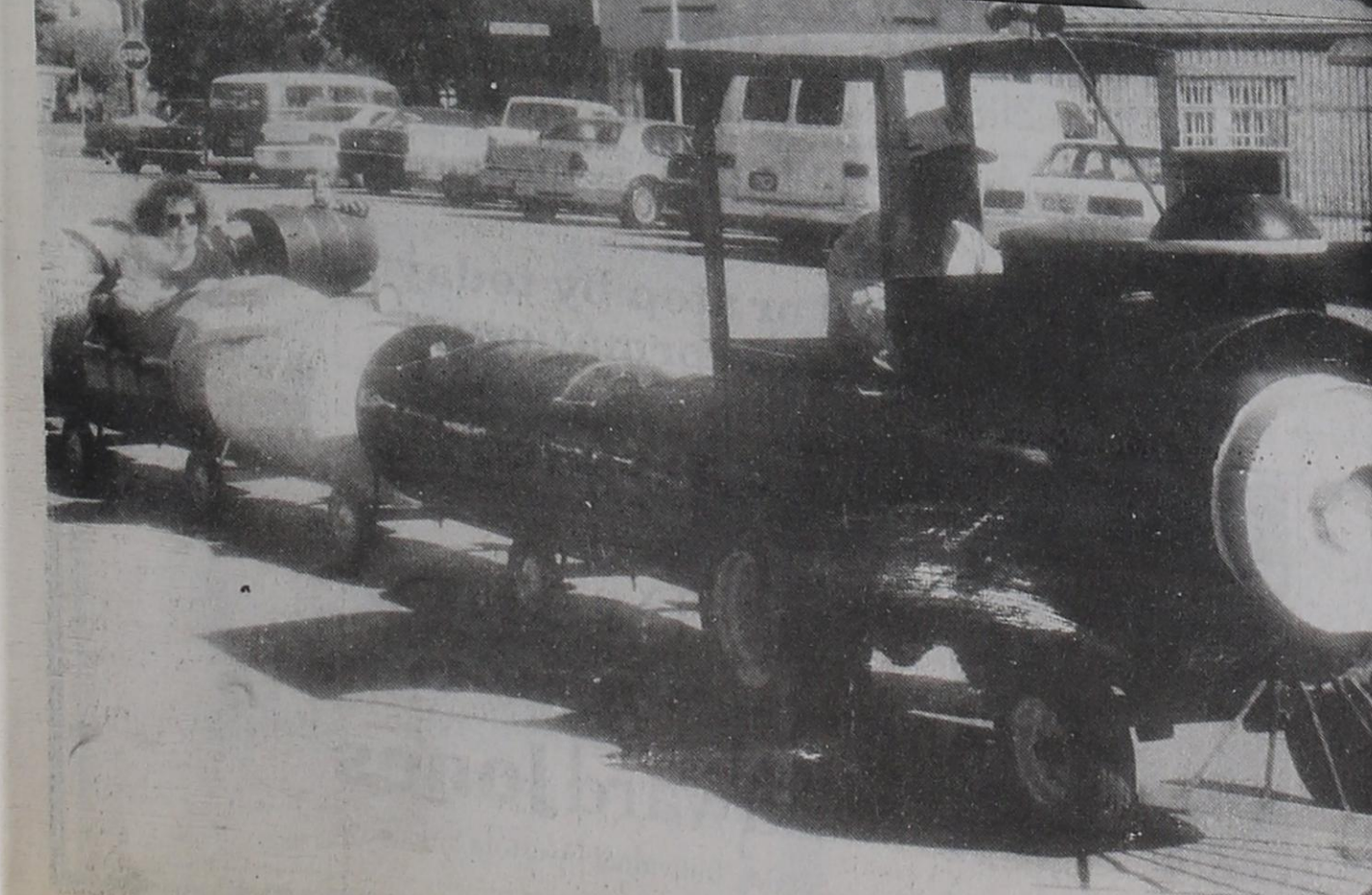

"The Medicine Man" At CJC November 4-8

The CJC Drama Department will open its 1996-97 season with a rollicking "wild west" comedy inspired by a classic French farce. David G. Grote's "The Medicine Man" is freely adapted from Moliere's comic masterpiece, "The Doctor in Spite of Himself." Moliere would undoubtedly be delighted to see his play transferred to the American wild west, because it fits as comfortably as a pair of faded blue jeans.

The story revolves around one Samuel P. Sagamore, described by his wife Agnes as "a snake-oil salesman, card sharp, pickpocket, claim jumper, medicine show man, con man, and A-number-one-coward." Agnes doesn't think very highly of her husband, and you can't much blame her. 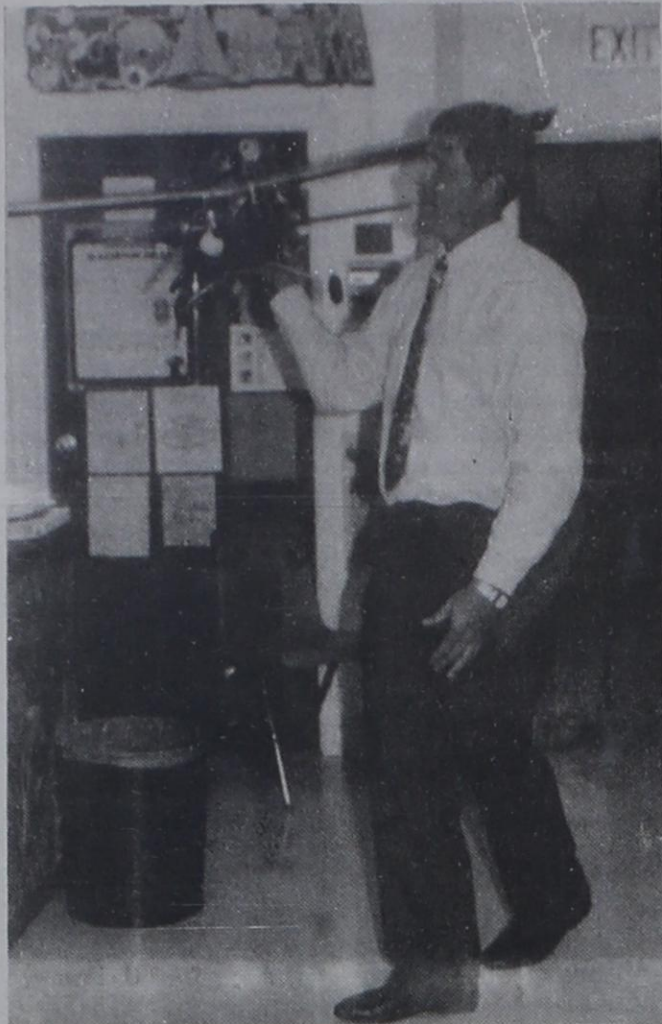

Chicken Pox Vaccine Available In Public Health Clinics

A vaccine for chickenpox (varicella) is now available at most public

health clinics and from providers who receive publicly purchased vaccines, according to the

Texas Department of Health (TDH). People who want their children inoculated should check to see when the vaccine will be available in their area.

"The chickenpox vaccine is highly effective," said Dr. David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health. "In one chickenpox vaccine trial, 97 percent of the 7,000 children inoculated were protected against the disease," he said.

Initially, TDH recommends use of the chickenpox vaccine for children in these categories who have not had the disease: *Children ages 12 months 23 years

*11-year-olds
*Youngsters 18 years old and younger who live with people at high risk from serious complications from chickenpox.

For the past decade, Texas has reported about 20,000 cases of chickenpox annually. Although highly contagious, illness from chickenpox is generally mild and usually not life-threatening. But about 9,300 hospitalizations and 50 to 100 deaths are related to chickenpox annually, mostly in young children. From 1985 to 1994, Texas recorded 69 deaths associated with chickenpox.

The illness is transmitted by coughing and sneezing and through fluid from broken blisters. A person is contagious with chickenpox from one to two days before blisters or bumps appear until all lesions have dried, which usually takes four to five days.

Children 12 months to 12 years receive one inoculation; people age 13 and older receive two inoculations at least four weeks apart. Those who have had chickenpox do not need the vaccine.

"Most children will have few if any problems with the vaccine," said Smith. "For those who do, the injection site may be somewhat swollen and red. A child may be slightly sick at the stomach and tired and uncomfortable."

A routine chickenpox vaccination program in the United States would save \$384 million annually or \$5.40 for every dollar invested in the program, according to an article in the February 1994 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

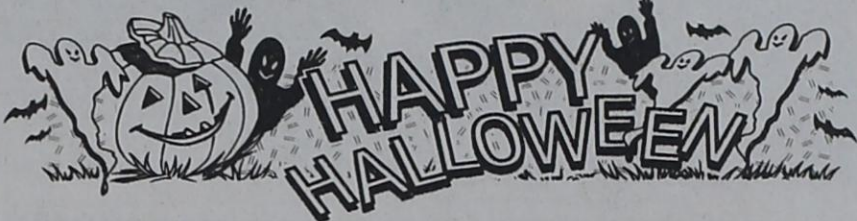

Happy Birthday, Mr. President

THEODORE ROOSEVELT

Theodore Roosevelt was born on October 27, 1858. He became the 26th president of the United States on September 14, 1901, after President William McKinley was shot to death. He was the youngest president ever, ascending to office shortly before his 43rd birthday.

Roosevelt was born in New York City, the son of a prosperous glass importer. He attended Harvard University, graduating in 1880. Roosevelt was a politician and a writer in his early adulthood. He served in New York City's municipal (city) government. He also spent some time as a rancher in the Dakota territory, but returned to New York City in 1886.

Roosevelt continued to combine politics and writing until the outbreak of the Spanish-American War. Then he organized a cavalry regiment, the Rough Riders, which fought in Cuba. Roosevelt was very famous after the war, and was elected governor of New York in 1898.

He was nominated to be William McKinley's running mate for the 1900 presidential election. After McKinley was assassinated, Roosevelt became president. He was reelected in 1904. During his presidencies, he advocated things like environmental conservation, expanding the national forest reserve and accurate labeling of foods and drugs.

Roosevelt was a very popular president. He died in 1919 at his home in Oyster Bay, New York.

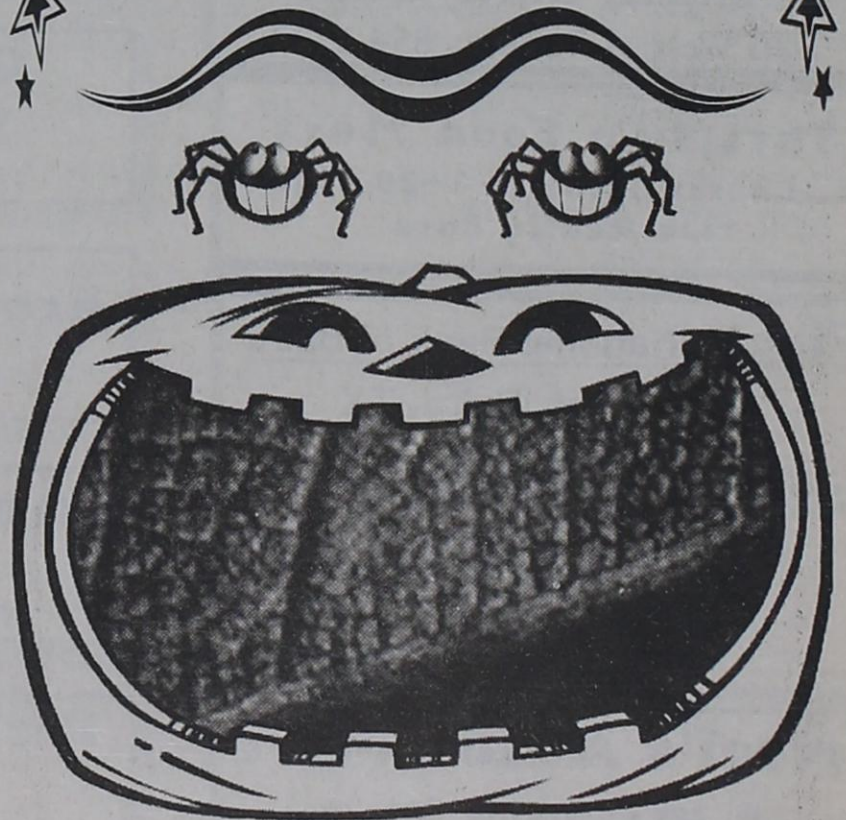
JOHN ADAMS

John Adams was one of the United States' Founding Fathers. He was born on October 30, 1735, in Braintree, Massachusetts. Adams entered Harvard at the age of 15, studied law, and went to work as a lawyer in Boston.

Adams noticed that the British laws were unfair to the colonies. In 1761, he began to write pamphlets and articles about these laws and became well-known as a courageous thinker and a good writer. Adams was fair, however, and his belief in fairness led him to speak out against mobs and riots.

In 1776, Adams helped Thomas Jefferson draft the Declaration of Independence. The signing of this important document was the beginning of the United States.

After the Revolutionary War, Adams became a diplomat. His efforts to be friendly with other countries helped earn recognition for the United States and fair treatment by other countries. Then in 1801, Adams began a term as president. His presidency was dedicated to maintaining order and building pride in America. After serving as president, Adams retired to his home in Massachusetts. He died at his home on July 4, 1826, the 50th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Baird Bears Devour the Forsan Buffaloes

On Friday night, October 11, the Baird Bears decided to roam way out west into unfamiliar territory. They traveled as far as Forsan, Texas where they were challenged by a herd of Buffalo. Being on enemy ground, the Bears had to "bristle up," and play tough.

Baird's vivacious and persistent cheerleaders, Jennifer Benton, Krystal Pruet, Kelly Hatchett, Kayla Hatchett, Adrian Kerbow, and Jordan Menzies had all the Bear fans out of their seat and on their feet to support the opening kick off.

Buffalo, T. J. Lipham, upon returning Britt Johnson's stout kick, was quickly stopped in his tracks by Baird's own Stephen Koch. Koch takes his job very seriously on the field, especially on the "Special Teams." Thanks to tackles by Chris Mendez, Todd Rodriguez, Lee Reyna,

Steve Crow, Eric Wall, Chad Barron, and Ryan Ward, the Bears were able to take possession of the ball for the first time Friday night.

Advances down the field were made by Jim Scott, Travis Kerbow, and Shannon Campbell. When the time was right, Scott sailed the football to Shane Devenport for an 11 yard completed pass. But, Baird was unable to march on at this time, so the ball went over to the Buffaloes.

Forsan only held the ball for four downs, then punted to the Bears. On Baird's third down, Scott completed a pass and scored on a 25 yard touchdown. Britt Johnson kicked a valid P A T and Baird led the game 7-0.

Mendez, Wall, and Barron were key figures in holding the Buffaloes, but even after Baird gained possession of the football, they were not able to

make much progress. Chad Barron punted for the Bears, and Reyna stopped the Buffalo's return.

When the Bears retained possession of the ball again, they advanced deeper into Buffalo country until Kerbow broke loose and crossed the goal line. Johnson's P A T was good. Baird's score stood 13 to Forsan's naught.

This time Forsan's kick-off return was halted by Robert Gunn. Important defensive moves by Devenport, Barron, Gunn, and Wall kept the Buffaloes corralled and the first half closed with the score remaining 13-0.

To get the clock rolling for the second half of the football game, Baird sophomore, Dusty Barron returned the Buffaloes

kick-off and carried it 7 yards for the Bears. The Buffaloes started their stampede down field and did not stop until Lipham crossed the goal line. This gave Forsan their first mark for the night and the score changed to 14-6.

The Bears Scott, Kerbow, and Campbell, with the help of good blocking from the line, moved the ball into scoring position. Kerbow took the ball through the middle and down the field to score Baird's third touchdown of the night.

Forsan headed down the field on another determined drive to score. The Bears were able to hold the Buffaloes for the remainder of the third quarter, but early in the last period, Brian Fielder scored on a touchdown pass for

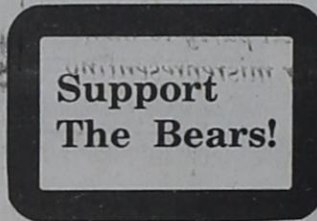
Forsan. The game tally became 21-14.

For the remainder of the game, Baird fans watched the ball change possession several times as Crow, Kerbow, Barron, Johnson, Wall, Mendez, Devenport, Rodriguez, DaPron watchfully guarded the Bear's goal.

Kerbow, Scott, and Campbell advanced the ball for the Bears which enabled Jim Scott to score twice in the latter part of the game. One touchdown was a 7 yard keeper by Scott. This brought the score to Baird 27, Forsan 14. Scott's second score occurred with only 13 seconds left in the ball game. Scott ran 36 yards to bring the Baird Bears to a final score of 33-14 over the Forsan Buffaloes. Johnson's last two P A T's were off the mark. The

Bears returned to their den satisfied with a large helping of Buffalo.

The "Top Five Bears" leading the team with the most tackles of the game were Eric Wall, Chad Barron, Chris Mendez, Todd Rodriguez, and Travis Kerbow. Baird had 311 total yards for the game. The 273 yards of rushing were chalked up by Kerbow 108, Scott 99, and Campbell 66. Scott completed 3 out of 5 passes for 38 yards.

Children Younger Than 12 At Risk For Injuries

According to state and national health officials, children younger than 12 are at risk for serious and fatal injuries if they ride in the front seat of a motor vehicle equipped with passenger air bags. Safe Riders, the Texas

Department of Health's (TDH) traffic safety program for children, recommends that all children ride buckled up in the back seat when traveling in a motor vehicle. While it has been widely publicized that air bags can injure in-

fants and unrestrained riders, new government studies also show that air bags have seriously injured and killed children restrained by safety belts in the front seat. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) urges that children younger than 12 ride buckled in the back seat to avoid passenger air bag injuries.

According to NHTSA, passenger air bags have killed 22 people, 21 of them children, since 1993. Air bags were designed as a supplemental restraint to cushion adults in motor-vehicle crashes. Children's more fragile physiques put them at a higher risk for air-bag injuries. Studies conducted by Children's Medical Center in Washington

have found that several children 6 and younger suffered serious head injuries from passenger air bags, even though they were buckled up or in child safety seats. The National Transportation Safety Board reports that a 3-year-old child was seriously injured by a passenger air bag even though the child was restrained in a booster seat.

"Last spring, Safe Riders provided life-saving information about air bags and safety seats to more than 1,200 automobile dealers throughout Texas," said Steve Anderson, director of traffic safety programs for the TDH Statewide SAFE KIDS Program. "It is vital that we communicate the new findings about air-bag dangers. Motor-vehicle crashes

are the leading cause of injury and death to children. It is urgent that we reduce the risks, including air-bag injury risks, when transporting children," he said. Statistics show that air bags have saved more than 1,500 lives since their introduction into motor vehicles in the late 1980s. But air bags are dangerous for small children. NHTSA plans to release detailed information about how to make

air-bag use safer by September. However, current recommendations include: * Everyone, drivers and passengers, should always use their vehicle safety belts, as required by law. * Infants and children should ride in the back seat, properly restrained in a safety belt or child safety seat. The back seat is safer than the front, regardless of whether the vehicle is equipped with air bags.

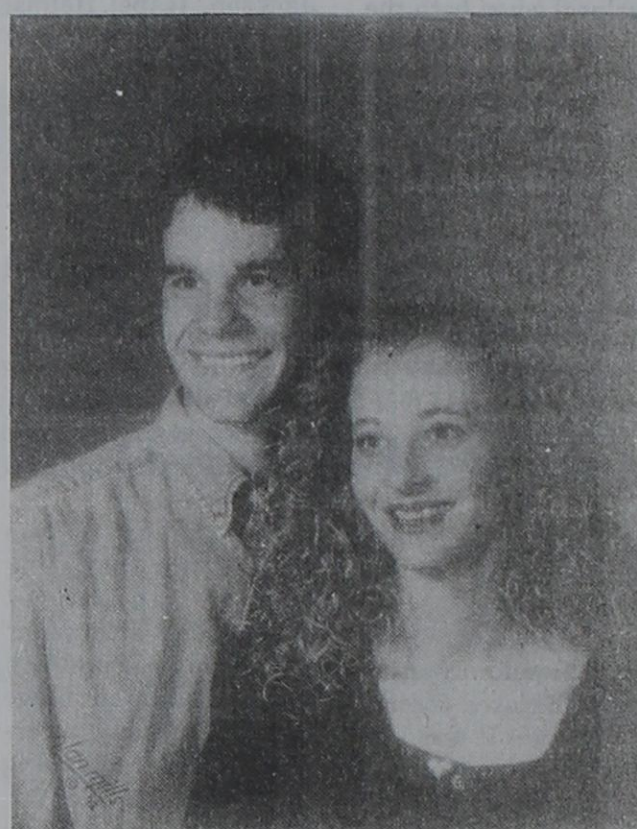

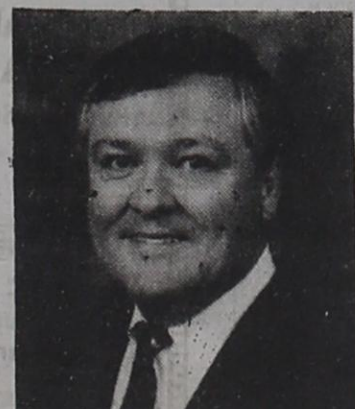

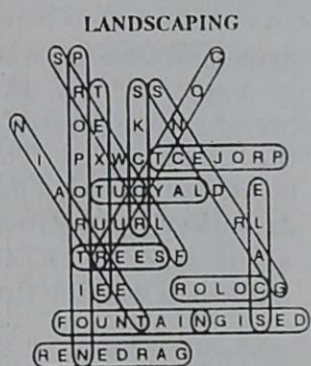

Baird Economic Development Board Meets

BAIRD-The Baird Economic Development Board met in regular session Monday night at Baird City Hall. The meeting was called to order by President Felix Manion at 6:30 p.m. with board members Kim Vestal, Larry Newton, and Steve Bowen present.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved on a motion by Bowen and seconded by Newton.

Nicki Harle and Manion gave reports concerning the purchase of the rail road property south of the tracks. These reports included the feasibility of a loan to purchase the land, results of the environmental study, and the land appraisal. No action was taken on a loan. The environmental study resulted in no surface contamination found on the she. And the land was

appraised, by an independent appraiser, at \$58,000 dollars. Which is far less than the owners had valued it. The board approved a motion by Vestal and seconded by Bowen to make an offer to the rail road for the appraised value of the land.

Next item on the agenda was an amendment to the by-laws of the Economic Development Board, specifically number 4.06 concerning the appointment of new board members. This was changed to read; Any vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the City Council. New members were formally appointed by the Mayor then approved by the City Council. The board had amended the Articles of Corporation during their last meeting which was the first

step to the changing of the by-laws. The matter will now go before the City Council for review and approval or disapproval. The unanimous decision came on a motion by Vestal and seconded by Newton.

Harle requested that some later action be taken concerning a "City Wide Strategic Plan". She said for most all grants or other assistance one the first questions asked is "What is the Cities Plan for the Future". She suggested that all public organizations be called together to develop a community strategy for Baird's future development. This can be done, with the help of a facilitator, in a three stage plan, Harle said. The board was in agreement that the City needs to develop such a plan but took no action on the matter.

It was agreed that Manion would attend the Texas Midwest Community Network meeting in Abilene Wednesday.

GULF WAR ILLNESS An article in the October 7, 1996 DALLAS MORNING NEWS states that a California scientist says that he has discovered genetic material common to Persian Gulf War era Veterans that could provide a clue as to why so many became sick after serving in the 1991 war. Microbiologist Howard Urnovitz in a study being presented Monday to a conference of Gulf War Veterans in Tampa, Florida, said the genetic marker could point to the existence of a virus.

The virus, in turn, could make Veterans exposed to chemical agents or other toxins more susceptible to illness, Dr. Urnovitz said. Further, Dr. Urnovitz said symptoms found among Gulf War Veterans-- fatigue, memory loss, aching joints and respiratory problems-- were similar to those in "epidemic fatigue syndromes", health problems that have afflicted large populations in industrial areas after viral infections.

The Pentagon says it has been unable to find any single cause, or syndrome, to explain the illnesses that have hit tens of thousands of Gulf War Veterans.

Navy Seaman Recruit Michael V. Tollett, son of Ava J. Tollett of Baird, recently completed U.S. Navy basic training at Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes, IL.

During the eight week program, Tollett completed a variety of training which included classroom study, practical hands-on instruction, and an emphasis on physical fitness. In particular, Tollett learned naval customs, first aid, fire fighting, water safety and survival, and a variety of safety skills required for working around ships and aircraft.

Seaman Tollett is a 1995 graduate of Cross Plains High School.

Marine Cpl. Johnny Herridge, son of Danna Herridge of Cross Plains, is currently halfway through a six-month overseas deployment to Bosnia-Herzegovina with Marine Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Squadron One. Herridge's unit is the first full Marine Corps

The Department of the Army still administers two national cemeteries, including Arlington National Cemetery, and the Department of the Interior administers 14, for a total of 130 National Cemeteries. Work will soon begin on a new location overlooking Mountain Creek Lake in southwest Dallas.

Q-A--I am a Service-Connected Veteran with 40% disability. Is it possible for me to receive compensation for my dependents? Answer-- Veterans rated 30% or more because of Service-Connected disease or injury are entitled to additional compensation for dependents. Dependency allowances are payable in an amount bearing

the same ratio as the Veteran's disability rating. A 100% rated S-C Veteran would receive \$109 for a spouse, or \$186 for a spouse and one child with \$57 added for each additional child. These amounts are multiplied by the Veteran's percentage rating to determine the amount paid. Thus our 40% S-C Veteran would receive \$43 for a spouse, \$74 for a spouse and one child, \$97 for a spouse and two children, etc. These amounts are payable in addition to the \$380 received by the Veteran.

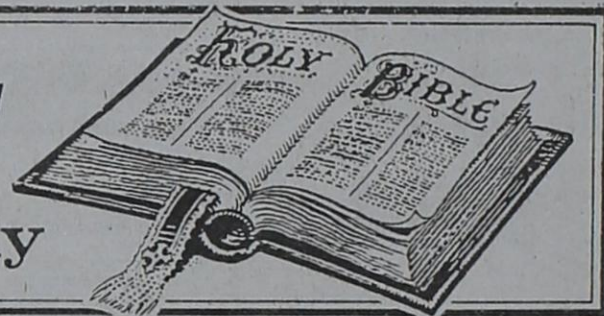

So if you live in Baird but work in Clyde you may stop by the Justice of the Peace's office in Clyde and cast your early vote.

In the race for the District 24 State Senate seat Rick Rhodes and Troy Fraser share many of the same views. They both are conservatives, they both are businessmen and both favor property tax reform.
