### IN SATURDAY'S ELECTIONS

## School bond issue passes; one alderman is unseated

Voters handily approved passage of the school's proposed \$5.2-million bond issue Saturday.

And in the city's election, one incumbent alderman was unseated but the other two incumbents were returned for another term of office.

School district voters approved the bond issue by 482-222.

Former mayor Wayne House successfully unseated incumbent alderman Bob Hamilton by a margin of 287-196. Hamilton was seeking his fifth term in office in Place Three.

Place One incumbent Tracy Fears was returned by a large margin, 303-176, over challenger Johnny Crawford.

Also returned was Bud Mercer, who was challenged in his bid for Place Five by newcomer Floyd Williams. Mercer received 286 votes to Williams' 192.

The council is to meet at 7:00 this evening to canvass the election results. The meeting will be held in council chambers.

Because only two candidates had filed for the two positions on the school board this year, that election was cancelled.

Incumbent trustee Keith Fisher is retained, and because Randy Catlin chose not to seek another term in office, Randy Brown, the only other

Cotton producers in Wichita county joined others last week in establishing the Northern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone.

Final results announced by the Texas Department of Agriculture were 785 voting "for" and 325 voting "against" establishing an eradication program.

In addition, producers in the zone voted to set a maximum annual assessment for the program not to exceed \$15 per planted row acre for irrigated cotton and \$10 per planted row acre for dryland cotton.

To officially establish a boll weevil eradication program and set an assessment, the propositions had to be approved by a two-thirds vote, or those voting in favor needed to farm more than 50 percent of the zone's acreage.

"Producers in the Northern Rolling Plains have shown they want an eradication program," said Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs. "We look forward to working with them and the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation in eliminating this costly pest in Texas."

The TDA issued 1,975 ballots to producers in the zone who were eligible to vote in the referendum. Some 1,121 valid ballots were postmarked by the April 22 deadline and counted.

Producers also elected John Inman of Childress County to represent the zone on the state-wide board of directors. The producer has been serving as the commissioner-appointed director for the zone.

The zone consists of approximately 340,000 acres in 14 counties, including Gray, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, Hall, Childress, Cottle, King, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Wichita, Clay, Foard and portions of

Concerning security, Supt. Mike Caplinger has issued the following statement for parents of students who may have questions.

"Over the past few weeks many, if not most, schools have been affected by the Littleton, Colorado tragedy. Local communities throughout the nation have looked inward at safety issues related to their local schools. Some of what we may hear is rumor, some is true, but all must be taken seriously.

"At the May 13 Board of Trustees meeting, Trustees will address an agenda item concerning school safety issues. Trustees invite citizens to share suggestions in written form before, during, or after the Board Meeting. Also, a time will be set aside for those wishing to address the Board.

"Over the past year video cameras have been placed in the high school, back doors have been locked on many campuses, centralized entry and exits have been arranged, and vehicles have been prevented from parking near school buildings. The Iowa Park Police Department has provided a great service in on-campus involvement and the use of the detection dog has been greatly increased. We continue to seriously

address safety issues.

"Please drop off your suggestions to any campus principal or the school administration office, or give to any member of the Board prior to noon on May 13. Again, we invite your suggestions," Supt. Caplinger

She is a member of Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society and was named to the National Dean's List and President's List at VRJC.







The reports I read and heard about all those people drowning in Lake Hamilton near Hot Springs, Ark. Saturday started my memory bell ringing.

The reason was that they were drowned when an amphibious ve-

Reports this week indicate that authorities are trying to determine why the vehicle sank, and did it in about a minute.

Upon learning of the incident, my thoughts immediately recalled an incident in which I was involved, back in July of 1952.

No, I wasn't on a tour or anything like that. I was in the U.S. Air Force. and the scene was an island in the middle of the Bering Sea.

As a supply specialist, I was assigned to a team from 7th Weather Headquarters out of Elmendorf, Anchorage, Alaska, and our task was to establish what I was told was the world's first automatic weather sta-


St. Matthew Island was a long way from any mainland areas where weather was reported, and that information was deemed extremely important, especially with the Korean War underway.

There were 16 of us in the party. We were to be there two weeks, and that was about all the provisions we had with us.

Midway into the second week, our food was about to run out. We made radio contact, and it was discussed that a sea plane could fly in additional provisions.

There was a small lake on the island, and it was about the length used to handle all the heavy supplies we needed in order to construct the weather station and its radio tower.

Before a plane could be called on to land on the lake, however, we were instructed to determine the depth.





### **GARDENING HINTS**

#### By MAPK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. I live in Iowa Park and have several peach trees in my yard. The leaves are blistered with some type of strange growth. Please advise.

A. This is a common problem that occurs each spring with peach trees. We call this Peach Leaf Curl.

It is a bacterial disease of peaches. Nothing can be done now to stop or eliminate the unsightly foliage.

The leaves which are affected will eventually fall off. In the fall, when leaves normally begin to drop, you should remember to apply a copper based fungicide for control of Peach Leaf Curl.

For your information, this bacterial disease is not terminal for your peach trees.

Q. I have three large Live Oaks in my Wichita Falls landscape. Two of the trees are constantly sending up suckers all over the yard. Is there anything I can do to eliminate this maintenance problem?

A. Live Oaks have a tendency to send sprouts up from the root system in turf and landscape areas. This is a common problem with Live Oaks, Yaupon Hollies and a few other plants.

Live Oaks have a connected root system which joins with other Live Oaks in the vicinity. They are all connected by a root system network.

There is nothing that you can do to eliminate the suckers minus trimming or mowing them down with your weekly lawn cutting. Chemical treatments could be detrimental to the mother tree.

O. I have numerous rose bushes in my landscape. They are beautiful, but many of the rose petals are brown around the edges. What is causing this? It ruins the flowers. I know I have applied enough water and we have had rain.

A. The primary reason for the petal scorching or browning as you described this is an insect problem. Thrips, a common insect of roses. cause the petal edges to scorch.

This is not a moisture stress problem. I would recommend using a combination product such as Orthenex which contains an insecticide and a fungicide. This control product will keep black spot, powdery mildew and insect problems in check. Apply this at two-week intervals for adequate control. You will have picture perfect roses in a short time.

Q. Our Magnolias in Burkburnett are dropping a large number of yellowed leaves. Is there something wrong with the trees I need to know about? I was gone out of town and came back to find my lawn covered with Magnolia leaves the trees look thin.

A. Magnolias are a evergreen tree which perform amazingly well here in Texoma. As with any evergreen, leaf drop is almost constantly occurring. The heaviest leaf drop time frame is usually in spring as newer growth initiates.

Look closely and you will see the newest growth emerging. It is often a shock to be gone a few days and come home to see the foliage all over your lawn. Yes, nature is changing on a second by second ba-

The Magnolias should be fine. If you have not done so, apply a quality 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio lawn food around your drip line area of the trees when you feed the turf.

This supplement will help. Always be alert during hot, dry midsummer months and water as needed to avoid extreme drought stress.

### AG AGENT'S REPORT

#### By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

#### Screwworms

Most of the county received around inch of rain last weekend and Monday (as of writing Apr. 27). This sure has helped out after the high winds we got last week.

I heard one farmer the other day mention that he received over an inch of rain, but lost two inches in the wind storm.

I have not seen a lot of wind damage to the wheat. With these high winds I thought that we may have knocked down some, but it looks good so far.

This last rain sure has helped the outlook for the cotton planting, which is starting this month. In addition to the cotton, the haygrazer and milo planting are also looking more promising.

This week I hope to have our milo and havgrazer test plots planted. We will be looking at several varieties over 70 acres.

The old saying "April showers bring May flowers" is true but, there's also the possibility the warm weather could mean screwworm infestations. Yes, we did destroy the screwworm population years ago, but we did have a case crop up in central Texas.

After this confirmed case, the Texas Animal Health Commission and U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's Vet-

erinary Service distributed more than 2,500 screwworm submission kids to veterinarians and feed stores.

You can also get your own kit by calling the TAHC headquarters at 1-800-550-8242 or the USDA at 1-800-916-5555

Kits consist of a cardboard tube containing a test tube filled with a holding solution and small plastic bags for maggot collection. If a collection kit is not available, the maggots, or larvae, can be placed in alcohol in a glass jar, medicine bottle or film canister.

On Oct. 31, 1998, a rancher in Edwards County, in southwest Texas, submitted nine larvae he removed

from a wound on an Angora goat. One of the larvae was identified as that of a screwworm by the National Veterinary Service Laboratory.

Despite checking more than 40,000 head of livestock and dogs, and getting the word out to ranchers, hunters and anyone handling livestock, no other larvae were found

### Housing loan program for rural applicants

velopment Agency has several Housing Loan Programs available to assist qualified very low, low and moderate income applicants in the construction or purchase of a home in communities with less than 10,000 population. Under certain conditions, loans can be made in towns and cities between 10,000 and 25,000 population.

These loans require no down payment nor mortgage insurance and can be made for up to 100% of the market value of the property, which in some cases allows for financing of the closing costs. Loan terms are from 30 to 33 years, with fixed interest rates. Payment assistance is available, based on family size and income, which may reduce the interest rate on the loan to as low as one percent.

The agency also administers Home Repair Loans and Grants for qualified very low income owneroccupants.

Grant funds are available for homeowners 62 years of age and over who cannot repay a loan and must be used to remove health and safety hazards such as repairing roofs, heating, electrical and plumbing systems, water and waste disposal, installing screens, windows, insulation and other items to make the home safe. Grant assistance may not exceed \$7,500.

Home Repair Loans may include similar purpose as the grant, but may also be used to modernize and bring a home up to standards, make changes for convenience, add a

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room, remodel and make overall improvements to the home. The loan term can be of up to 20 years, with a fixed one percent interest rate. The loan amount cannot exceed \$20,000.

Land ownership, protected by legal title is one of the main reasons many of our ancestors immigrated to this country.

NEWS OF THE

What we take for granted today was a driving force for early settlers. Land ownership lifted people up from servitude and instilled pride and gave then purpose.

Since land records are a most valuable resource for the family genealogists, it's important to review a little of the Federal involvement.

In 1785 the Continental Congress enacted a land disposal ordinance that established a Public Land Survey System based on a rectangular grid, and authorized the treasury to sell public land for revenue.

In 1812 the General Land office was established within the Treasury Department to take care of all survey and land title records. Then in 1849 the General Land Office became the Department of the Interior and was merged with the US Grazing Service in 1946 to form the Bureau of Land Management.

The Bureau of Land Management is the custodian of land records and now an almost impossible job of research is being made easier as more and more of these records are being put on CD's.

A great deal of work is being done by volunteers and as each state is automated the disks are becoming increasingly available to all interested researchers.
