





Texas Public Schools To Celebrate Century Of Great Progress

A century of phenomenal progress will be celebrated by the Texas public schools during 1954 ,their centennial birthday year.

The 100th birthday of the public school system falls on January 31, but the observance is scheduled to last all year because there is so much to celebrate.

Today's Texas public schools are a far cry from their humble beginings back in 1854, when the per capita payment was 62 cents and est interest locally. the permanent school fund was started with an initial endowment of \$2,000,000. In the same state where youngsters used to be considered lucky if they were given three or four months of schooling a year, a minimum foundation program now guarantees every child a minimum of nine months of school each year.

Despite these vast improvements, Texans have not yet acheived the goal outlined by their forefathers. The Texas Education Agency, the Texas State Teachers Association, the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers and other participating groups hope the centennial celebration will renew the interest of the general public in its schools and lead to additional improve-




