

### Busy session for council

Every issue taken up by the city council Monday night was approved, but two of them drew split was Lake Iowa Park, while the other related to contracting with a collection agency.

The proposal for the fireworks stand was approved, but by a mere 2-

Bids were sought for a supplier who would provide the merchandise to be sold, with stipulations that insurance would be provided to protect the city as well as the percentage of gross sales going to the Iowa Park Police Officer's Association.

Only one bid was received, that from Fireworks Unlimited, which promised to pay the city \$600 for the lease and 23 percent of the gross to the Association.

The fireworks stand will be allowed to open June 24 and remain open through July 4.

Alderman Wayne House, who argued at an earlier meeting against the proposal, stated, "I wish you wouldn't do this. I don't think we should allow only one group to sell. Maybe we should limit it to only Iowa Park people."

Responding, Mayor Tim Hunter said, "Other people sought me out. No one objected. Nothing has been rigged. I would hope it (the program) would evolve and have more organizations (participating in the future)."

"We've gone this far with it. We need to follow through and get it done," commented Alderman Tracy

Fears and Ward voted to approve the resolution, House voted against it, and Alderman Bud Mercer abstained. Alderman Joe Singer was absent.

The issue of contracting with the firm of American Municipal Services Corp. to collect delinquent fines and warrant and court fees was approved by a 3-1 vote, with Ward casting the negative sign.

Ward explained he objected because "I have heard collection agencies using underhanded methods. It bothers me."

City Administrator Mike Price explained that the agency would be involved only with "offenders who promise to pay, but don't."

When asked what was involved, Police Chief Lynn Collins reported the amount was approximately \$100,000, "and about 80 percent of them out-of-towners."

Only state funding would be used in the two projects, Price explained, and both businesses are expected to increase current employment significantly.

Not only was I impressed with all that fine and very expensive equipment, but what was traveling with them. . . the moter homes and

There likely would be few, if any, workers join a crew if they had the accommodations our crew had.

Only 15 years old, I jumped at the offer to work in a crew that was headed by a man and his two sons, when offered the job.

Man, \$20 a week, with all meals provided!

We had three combines with 24foot headers. My job was to drive a tractor that pulled one of the combines. The owners were the combine operators, and all the others in the crew were adult men.

Our sleeping accomodations? We provided our own cots and covers. We slept in the open, unless it was raining. In that case, we pulled the cots under a truck bed for whatever protection that afforded.

We'd eat breakfast and dinner at a cafe, and pick up a sack lunch to eat in the field.

Both years, the crew began cutting at the Pitchfork Ranch near Paducah. From there, we'd go back to Hereford, where we all lived, and cut

From Hereford, we went directly to Hardin, Montana. That's where, at the time, the world's largest wheat operation existed. There was 44,000 acres, all together, and crews from numerous states went there.

It wasn't until my second year, 1947, that I saw my first self-propelled combine. It was in a crew that worked at Hardin, having traveled all the way from California.

I couldn't believe that one man could drive and operate a combine, all in one operation by himself.

Also, at Hardin, we made a side trip to see the site of Custer's Last Stand. I was the only kid in school at Hereford who had ever viewed that well-known site.

### Cryovac's early years in Iowa Park are details in recently-printed book

The 8300 Machine

(The following article is an excerpt from a book, "The CRYOVAC Story, North America, by John R. Ross, Ph.D., copyright 1997, and is reproduced with permis-

In processed meats and cheeses, laminates still made inroads in Cryovac markets. They ran on automatic machines, an application which wasn't possible with Cryovac's dip method of sealing. Again Cryovac met the challenge.

Baird on one of his trips to Japan returned with a catalog of equipment which he gave to Perdue. Perdue looking through the catalog saw a rotary chamber vacuumizing machine which used heat sealing to package rice cakes. Perdue ordered one of the machines from Furukawa Manufacturing and modified it to produce a

rotary vacuum machine that heat sealed. Cryovac initially used the machine to package smoked and processed meats. As the machine was technically improved, it was possible to enlarge it to the sizes which the packers needed for fresh red meat. A significant need was met with the delivery of 26 twentyfour inch 8300 machines to Cryovac's largest customers. Cryovac was in the forefront of the packaging

Growth of the boxed beef business and demand for the barrier bag prompted Cryovac to build a new plant in Iowa Park, Texas in 1974. The location was close to the major beef packing plants, especially the new plants locating in the region. The new plant provided rapid delivery and technical support to its customers. Camarillo and Simpsonville were poor locations in respect to the changed fresh red meat market, and Cedar Rapids had limited room for expansion.

The Iowa Park plant also contained two additional film lines to meet the growing demands of the market. Films and barrier bags accounted for seventy-six percent of sales growth between 1968 and 1973. Without the new plant, Cryovac expected to be short on production capacity for both products by 1975.

Grace questioned the new plant since Cryovac had built Camarillo just three years earlier. Miller prevailed, and the new plant took shape.

Charlie Lee, plant manager at Cedar Rapids, moved to Iowa Park to manage the new plant. Initially he didn't want to make the move. But it turned out to be an enjoyable experience. Cryovac's plant was the first manufacturing plant in the area, and residents were

more than receptive. The mayor and president of the bank kept entertaining Lee, even after the plant was

Finally, Lee told them, "Consider us part of the community." When Lee retired from Cryovac, he remained in Iowa Park and served as mayor for two years.

Lee staffed the plant with volunteers from Cedar Rapids and Simpsonville. He selected twenty-two people, about half from each location. A few he asked specifically, including Fran Harney. Harney wasn't interested either, initially. But he took his family to visit the town, and after the first day he was ready to move.

Harney became production manager with responsibility for bags. Ray Youngblood managed the films operations. Other members of Lee's immediate staff were Jeff Crabbe in personnel, Bud Robinson in finance and administration, and Dick Kinard in technical.

In 1982, Frank Gossett followed Lee as plant manager and served until 1987 when he returned to South Carolina to manage the Simpsonville complex. Gossett brought to Texas an effective management style, developed at Simpsonville and Duncan, and continued the improvements in quality and safety begun by Lee. Gossett had begun as an electronic technician at Simpsonville in 1955 and rose through the ranks, working in printing, bagmaking, laminates, accounting, and manufacturing planning.

Along the way he learned from his superiors: Con Scovel taught him how to treat each employee as an individual and to spend money carefully; Ray Mattson, whose door was always open, led him to take time to listen and help his people; and Bob Prevost, through his supervision, displayed the value of persistence and the importance of making points without offending anyone's feel-

Sam Laird followed Frank Gossett as plant manager at Iowa Park. Laird, a graduate of Clemson University, joined Cryovac in July 1964, after having worked for Allied Chemical and Du Pont. Laird first worked in films under Al Engelmann; in 1968, he transferred to manufacturing as manager. Between 1971 and 1977 he was manager of the South plant. During the next six and a half years he was engineering manager at Iowa Park. After a brief stint as technical manager at Simpsonville, he returned to Iowa Park as plant manager.

Like Lee, Laird found Iowa Park a pleasant experience. The employees worked together, were dedicated, and wanted to succeed. Upon the retirement of Bob Prevost in 1992, Sam was named VP of manufacturing.

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





### State looking for acreage to lease for dove hunting

Got a weedy field not in production or being rested this fall?

The Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) is once again looking for just that type of land to lease for public dove hunting this fall.

Last year, the department leased 113 special dove units comprising over 40,000 acres. Entering its sixth year, the public lease dove hunting program is aiming to significantly increase the number of units.

"It's a program that's been well received by landowners and hunters because everybody wins," said Herb Kothmann, TPW public hunting di-

"We use money from the sale of Annual Public Hunting permits to purchase dove hunting rights from landowners and only those individuals who purchase a permit may hunt on these dove leases."

TPW representatives want to lock dove leases by July 1, said Kothmann, in order that lease maps may be prepared and distributed to hunters in time for dove season.

"We started the program in 1994 as a way to provide quality dove hunting to urban hunters," he explained. "While continuing leasing efforts along the Interstate 35/37 corridor from Dallas-Fort Worth area through San Antonio to Corpus Christi, this year we will be looking for suitable public dove hunting lands anywhere in the state."

"We are also looking to lease lands for hunting legal game other than just dove," Kothmann said. "Property offering good hunting for waterfowl, pheasant, or rabbits is also

of interest to us. If it is located near an urban area, we may be able to pay a little more for rights."

Generally, lands acceptable for the program should have a food source for dove, such as sunflower or grain, as well as water and roosting or rest-

Additionally, each tract must have a public access point where hunters can park their vehicles, from which they will walk to the hunting

Temporary signs will clearly identify property boundaries. Game wardens and other departmental staff will monitor the units to ensure compliance with all regulations.

Kothmann said most entrance points are designated for parking to protect the private property and reserve the maximum acreage for actual hunting activities.

"We expect our public hunters to respect the land and the landowners who have been so generous. We want to maintain a good relationship for the future," he said.

Tracts of 100 to 400 acres are the most desirable, however, Kothmann said tracts as small as 75 acres or as large as 1,100 acres have been included in the program.

Lands in the Conservation Reserve Program can be leased with no effect on US Department of Agriculture payments.

Landowners or operators with leasing rights who are interested in the TPW Public Dove Hunting Lease program should contact the local Texas Parks and Wildlife biologist. For the name and number of the wildlife biologist near you, call (512) 389-4505.

### GARDENING HINTS

BY MARK TERNIG

Q. What is destroying the leaves on my Cannas in my Wichita Falls landscape?

A. The cause of the damage on your Cannas is a common insect known as a Leaf Roller.

These insects feed on the leaf tissue (both young and old growth) and are protected by the rolled foliage on Cannas.

You will have to treat the Cannas with a systemic insecticide like Orthene. You may have to treat again at a 14-day interval.

### TXU customers are due refund

TXU Electric customers will receive a \$115 million refund on their June electric bills.

The public Utility Commission (PUC) approved the company's request to refund the fuel over-collection beginning with June bills.

The refund to customers is possible because of milder than normal fall and winter weather in the TXU Electric service area and declining natural gas prices from June 1997 through February 1999.

Under the company's refund plan approved by the PUC, a residential customer who uses an average 1,000 kilowatt-hours would receive a refund of about \$12.50. The amount of the actual refund will depend on the quantity of electricity used and will appear as a credit on June bills.

An electric utility under PUC jurisdiction recovers its fuel costs from customers through a fixed perkilowatt-hour charge approved projection, the utility files a request to either refund or charge the difference to the customer.

Since 1986, TXU Electric has made thirteen refunds to its customers totaling more than \$929 million and two fuel surcharges totaling more than \$240 million.
