The projects included drainage improvement on Second Street, Texowa Street, and Douglas Street.


Prior to making a detailed study of correcting the three areas of problems, Maroney estimated the total would be \$1,582,125.

But, after making a detailed study of the areas, his corrected estimate increased to \$3,166,875.

One of the major reasons for the increased cost, Maroney explained, was the skyrocketing price of concrete that has developed in the area, due to so much construction in the Wichita Falls area.

"We ain't got a million and a half for projects," exclaimed Alderman Wayne House. "Maybe we can just dig an open ditch, instead of using a culvert, along Texowa."

Local man injured in wreck

A one-vehicle accident early Sunday morning critically injured Patrick Sargent, 31, of Iowa Park.

Sargent was travelling east on US 287 about seven miles east of Vernon when his vehicle left the road, missing a guard rail, and went up a steep embankment at the overpass of FM 433.

The Jaws of Life were used to extract Sargent from the pickup.

Sargent to Wilbarger General Hospital in Vernon, then transferred him to the intensive care unit at United Regional Health Care Center 11th Street Campus in Wichita Falls.

Sargent underwent several hours of surgery Sunday to repair numerous facial injuries. Plans were being made Wednesday to transfer him to Fort Worth for surgery to repair an eye and a broken sternum.

Pour into prepared crusts. Makes two pies.


Los Mochis' Sopa de Tortilla (Tortilla Soup)

Add chicken broth and chopped chicken. Add salt and seasonings. Bring to boil about five mintues. Divide tortilla strips, chopped tomatoes, avocados and cheese among six bowls and pour boiling soup over them. Top with sour cream.

The First Assembly of God will be holding their annual bazaar and bake sale Saturday from 8-1 at 200 S. Yosemite.


Homemade baked goods and garage sale items, from church members, will be sold and lunch will be offered.

But these are only the foundation points of Moody Gardens.


There are two pyramid structures on the grounds, constructed of metal frames with glass. Both are some 130 feet in height. One is an aquarium, and the other holds a rain forest.
