Couple found shot to death

The discovery early Tuesday morning of the bodies of a Wichita Falls policeman and his wife has rocked the Iowa Park community as well as the department he worked for.

Wichita Falls Police Officer Allen Kuykendall, 31, and his wife, Mary Bulgier Kuykendall, 37, were found dead in their home on Smith Road, both victims of gunshot wounds.

Iowa Park Police Chief Lynn Collins said that although the deaths are initially being investigated as a double homicide, "initial investigation indicated there is a probability of murder-suicide." That probability will not be confirmed until the completion of the investigation and autopsy results are obtained.

The crime scene investigation was completed Wednesday, Chief Collins said, and witnesses are still being interviewed. "New information has been received that could lead to a greater determination of the case being a murder-suicide," Collins said Wednesday.

Wichita Falls Police Sergeant Mike Yonts said that Kuykendall, an officer on third shift patrol, failed to come to work or call when his shift began at 10 p.m. Monday. The department attempted to contact Kuykendall and got no response.

Supervisors then contacted the Iowa Park Police Department at 11:45 p.m. and asked them to do a "welfare check" at Kuykendall's home.

Activity logs showed that officers responded to the home at 11:47 p.m., and were unable to get a response at the door. Shortly thereafter, according to Sgt. Yonts, one of Kuykendall's supervisors arrived at the home and family members were contacted to unlock the house.

At 12:24 a.m., officers gained entry into the house and found both bodies in the bedroom, according to Chief Collins.

Collins confirmed that both victims had sustained gunshot wounds, and that a handgun was found in the room. Collins also said the gun did not appear to be Kuykendall's service revolver.

Both were sent to the Southwest Institute of Forensic Science in Dallas for autopsies. Collins said preliminary results should be ready in about two weeks, and full reports including toxicology and ballistics results usually take six to eight weeks.

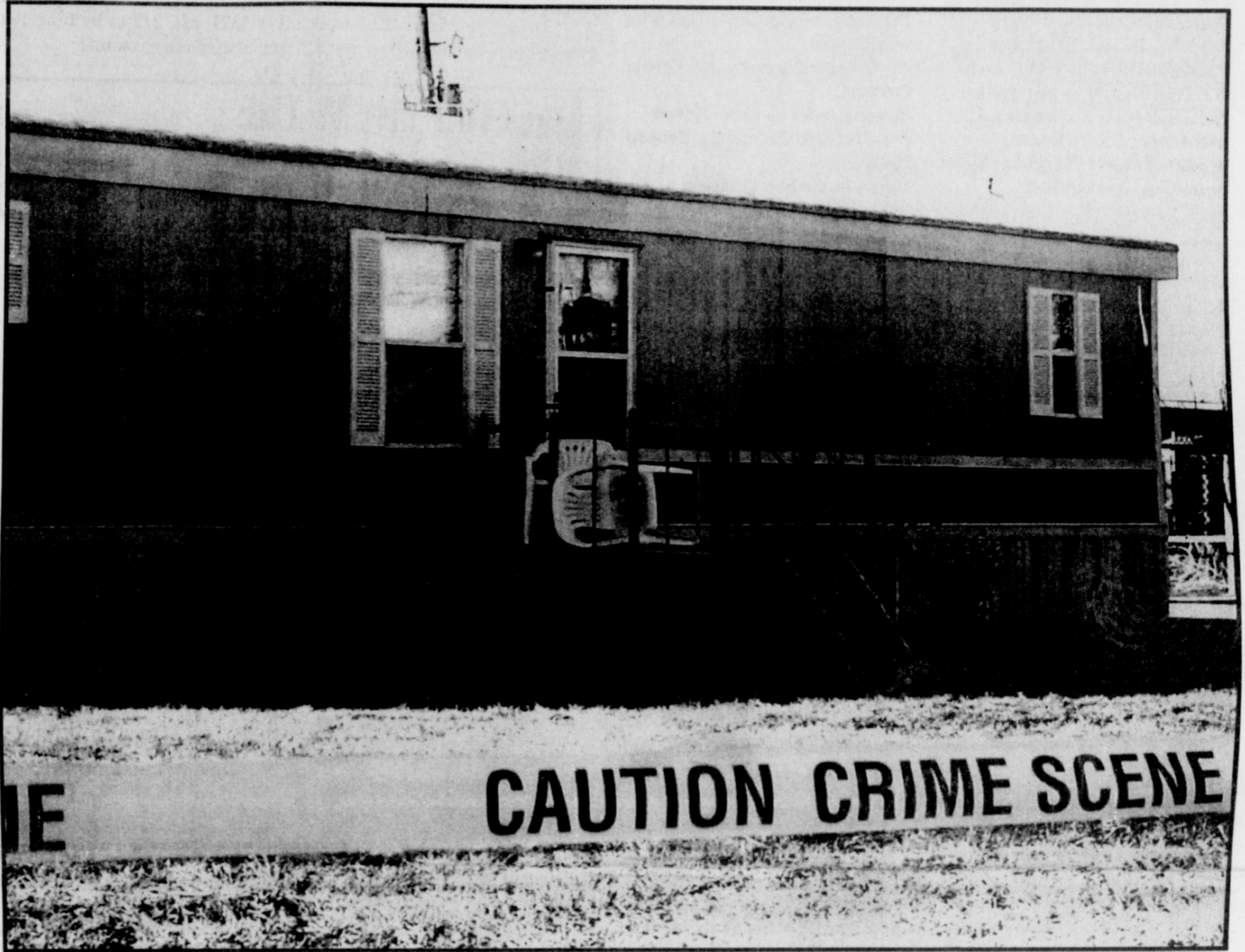
Collins said that because of law enforcement ties, Texas Ranger Richard Johnson was called for assistance, which is standard practice. In addition to the Iowa Park officers and Johnson, Wichita County District Attorney Barry Macha was also called to the scene.

This marks the first murder in Iowa Park in some 20 years. The last known murder victim in Iowa Park was James Harrington who was shot to death in 1980. His murder remains unsolved.

Kuykendall began his employment with the Wichita Falls Police Department on January 5, 1998. During his tenure there he was cited for saving an elderly woman from her burning home. Kuykendall has been characterized by fellow Wichita Falls Police Officers as a kind man and a good officer.

Prior to coming to Wichita Falls, Kuykendall served as a police officer in Olney six and a half years.

The Kuykendalls were married July 25, 1992. Information regarding Allen

As of presstime, information on

the funeral services for Mary Kuykendall were not available.

Flags at the Wichita Falls Po-

lice Department are being flown at half-mast this week, and officers from Wichita Falls and Iowa Park wear a

black band across their badge, a sign of respect and of grieving the death of a fellow officer.

Council to meet Monday

For the first time in a month, the city council is scheduled to meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Aldermen normally meet the second and fourth Mondays each month, but cancelled one meeting in December that conflicted with the Christmas holidays.

A public hearing will be held to consider whether a structure located at 414 West Pecan should be classified as substandard or dangerous.

According to the tentative agenda, action can be taken on that subject, depending on the council's decision.

Three resolutions to be considered include:

* authorizing the mayor to execute a contract with I.E.S.I. for solid

waste collection and disposal services.

* continuing for the 11th year membership and participation with the North Texas Regional Drug Enforcement Task Force.

* authorizing the city administrator to join in a contract with Wichita County, Burk Burnett and Wichita Falls for a three-year extension of ambulance service with Laidlaw Medical Transportation.

Administrator Mike Price is to propose hiring a consultant to evaluate the city's computer needs.

A session closed to the public is called for on the agenda, with reference to considering purchase of property for possible park improvement purposes.

December slow building month

If it hadn't been for storage buildings, carports and siding projects, there wouldn't have been any building permits issued by city hall during the entire month of December.

The total of all the permits was \$14,656, which was not unusual. The total for December 1998 was only \$42,722.

For the year of 1999, the permit total amounted to \$1,757,645, down slightly from the \$2,515,138 for 1998.

Quiet week for local police

Besides the tragic double death situation on West Smith, Iowa Park police experienced an unusually quiet week, even though the period included New Year's.

According to the police blotter, only two persons were taken into custody, and one theft was reported.

Arlo John Gage Brown, 25, was taken into custody Thursday evening in the 300 block of South Yosemite, when it was determined a warrant for his arrest had been issued by the county sheriff's department.

The warrant was for theft of telecommunications service, under \$50. He was later transported to the

county jail.

George Arthur Harrison, 25, was taken into custody Sunday night in the 200 block of West Crystal, on two locally-issued warrants.

The warrants were for driving with an expired motor vehicle inspection sticker, and failure to maintain financial responsibility.

Harrison was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court on the charges, according to the police blotter.

Also on Sunday, police received a report that a boy's bicycle, valued at \$80, had been stolen from a residence in the 800 block of Van Horn.

Hefner was the winner of Murray State College's 1999 Cross Timbers Small Works juried exhibition. His work will be on display through Jan. 28, in the College Center's reception area. A reception for Hefner, from 1-3 p.m. in the College Center on Jan. 28 will close the exhibit.

Hefner received a \$300 cash prize and this month's solo exhibit for his mixed media work entitled "Needy Greedy Punch," during the third annual Cross Timbers exhibition in April, 1999.

"The subject matter in my work expresses my opinions about moral-

ity, violence, and other issues that relate to the diseases of society," Hefner said. "My purpose is to unveil the violence we overlook and have become immune to."

"My paintings are acrylic; other pieces consist of silk screen, prismatic, and wood sculpture," Hefner said. "The acrylic paintings at times become three-dimensional by using foam core, Styrofoam and other materials to enhance the surface."

Texas Forest Service seedlings for windbreaks and wildlife plantings will be available through Feb. 18, at the Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District in Iowa Park. Conifer (Evergreen) seedlings and bare-root hardwoods are available to producers in Archer, Clay and Wichita county.

The program offers an opportunity to establish low-cost wildlife habitats and farmland protection from the elements.

Conifers available include: Afghanistan pine, Austrian pine, Pinon pine, and Redcedar. Hardwoods include: Aromatic Sumac, Catalpa, Fourwing Saltbush, Green Ash, Honeylocust, Lacebark Elm, Nanking Cherry, Osage Orange, Russian Olive, Sandcherry, Sand Plum and Shumard (Red) Oak.

Well, the camera's screen reverted back to 1986 -- apparently the year the camera was manufactured. Otherwise, it was a happy new year for everyone.

And, yeah, I stayed up to watch all the New Year's events on television. Well, almost all of it.

I saw the New Year come in on the east coast. And even though it was only 11 p.m. here, that was enough to fulfill my pledge.

That was way past my regular bed time.

It seems we're a long way from settling this MPEC thing, as far as all

of us who don't live in Wichita Falls are concerned.

You likely noticed that Jim Berzina, Wichita Falls city manager, appeared before the county commissioners recently, and threatened an action if the county doesn't come up with money to help build that coliseum.

If the county doesn't do what is being asked, Berzina said his city might cut back on funds generated by the hotel-motel tax fees which are used to underwrite the MPEC's cost of operations.

Commissioners generally feel that they cannot pledge any more construction money without a vote of support from county tax payers.

The original plan for that facility was for the city and county to each pay \$9-million for all the construction, and the other \$7-million would come from private donations -- that's what Kay Yeager said.

Well, the cost of that city's "urban renewal" program was more than the city and county put up, and those private donations fell way short.

I don't remember any agreement

about the county continuing to pay for the cost of operations. It was to be self-supporting.

And, there's a legal problem with such an agreement, if it actually was made.

My very limited knowledge of Texas law tells me that a governmental agency cannot commit to future expenditures beyond the terms of office of the seated office holders.

Even if I'm not correct, this whole MPEC situation is heading for big, big problems.

Yeah, I can criticize it all I want. I voted against it in the first place.

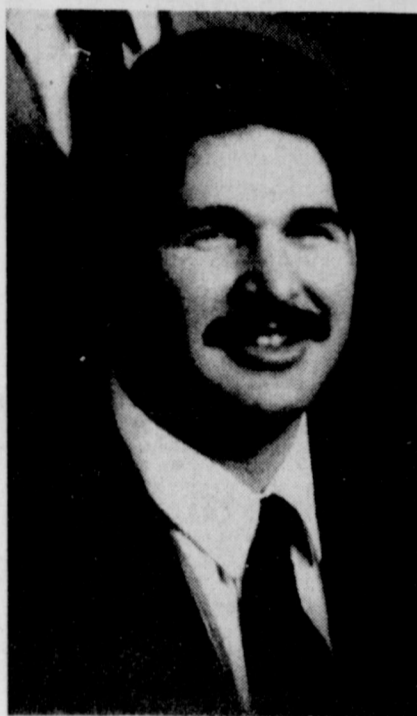

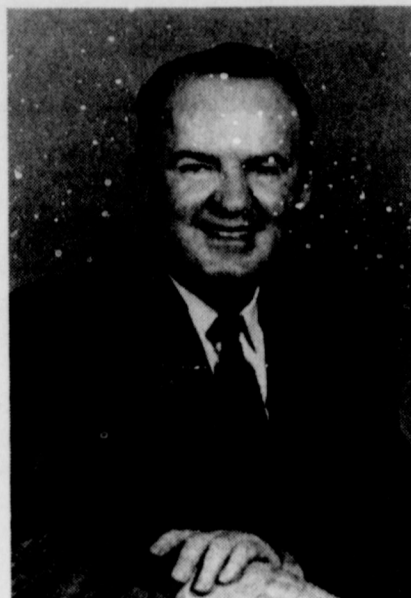

AUSTIN — Congress Avenue and portions of bisecting streets were blocked off last week as crews set up the capital city New Year's Eve party for an anticipated 200,000 revelers.

Meanwhile, Readiness 2000, a coalition of 31 state agencies, prepared to watch and wait in the De-

partment of Public Safety's emergency management center in Austin.

Over the last two years, state officials found nearly all computers "Y2K ready" at 199 state agencies, including 30 agencies identified as critical to health, safety or the economy.

Don Rogers, a spokesman for Readiness 2000, told *The Dallas Morning News* his group encourages Texas residents to have enough water and other supplies on hand to last three days.

Notification Law Starts Jan. 1

The new parental-notification abortion law, sponsored in the 1999 state legislative session by Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, goes into effect Jan. 1.

The law requires an unmarried woman 17 or younger to notify a parent that she intends to have an abortion. Also, she will be asked to produce proof of her age.

If a parent has not signed an affidavit, a physician must send a registered letter to a parent's address, then wait 48 hours before performing the abortion.

Under the law, parents need not approve. They only must be told an abortion is to occur.

The Texas Department of Health reported in 1997 that 5,523 minors had abortions.

Lawmakers estimate that 200 young women a year, even in light of the law, will refuse to tell a parent, *The Dallas Morning News* reported last week.

SW Bell Settles Lawsuit
Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. said it would pay \$10 million to settle a class-action lawsuit filed

on behalf of all its customers in 400 Texas cities, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported Dec. 30.

In the preliminary settlement, the plaintiffs, who sued over the way the telephone company collects franchise fees, will receive no payment, and the Dallas lawyers representing them could collect \$2 million.

Instead, \$3 million in cash and \$7 million in service credits would go to the state's Telecommunications and Infrastructure Fund, the *American-Statesman* reported.

Customers wishing to exercise their right to sue individually have until April 1 to "opt out" of the settlement, in writing.

WHAT DOES GOD SAY? By Ross Saunders

About the church? The word "church" is used in two senses in the New Testament, referring to the saved in the aggregate (Matthew 16:18) or to the saved in a given locality (Acts 8:1). Study with me what God says about His church.

"Church" is not a physical building. It is also never used in the denominational sense in the New Testament. The Bible never speaks of Christ's church as a part of anything, but the whole of those who share a common salvation (Jude 1:3), upon common terms (Mark 16:15-16; Act 17:30; Act 2:38), authorized by a Savior with whom there is no respect of persons (Act 10:34-35) and who will judge every person according to His word (John 12:48).

God says several things about His church. First, He says it is a kingdom (Matthew 16:18-19; Colossians 1:13-14, Luke 22:30). Second, it is the body of Christ (Ephesians 1:22, 23; Colossians 1:18, 24). Third, it is God's family (1 Timothy 3:15; Ephesians 3:15). Having read these Scriptures, one can readily see that in relationship to the world, the church is the "called out." In relationship to government, God sees His church as a kingdom. With regard to organization, He sees the church as a body. And in relationship to each other, we are a family.

Local churches are autonomous, with elders as "overseers" according to God's qualifications for appointment (1 Timothy 3 and Titus 1). God did not tie congregations together by any kind of universal organization for any purpose.

God also instructed His church to worship according to His truth (John 4:24). He has taught His people to assemble with purpose (Hebrews 10:24-25). He taught His church to meet on the first day of the week to observe the Lord's Supper (Acts 20:7), to praise Him (Hebrews 13:15), teaching and admonishing each other in song (Ephesians 5:19; Colossians 3:16), to pray 1 Corinthians 14:15), to give as we have been prospered (1 Corinthians 16:2), and to teach the doctrine of Christ (Act 2:42).

His commission to the church is to "preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15), or "teach all nations, baptizing them..." (Matthew 28:19-20). We are to edify each other (1 Thessalonians 5:11) and relieve one another (Acts 11:29; 1 Corinthians 16: 1-2).

These Scriptures point directly to the spiritual objectives of God. Churches have become play houses, entertainment organizations and social clubs and "the people love to have it so" (Jeremiah 5:31). When human desire is exalted above God's will, people are robbed of truth which builds strength and moral rectitude in their lives. Jesus said, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32).

Let us respect the will of God.

Fourth quarter slump downs Lady Hawks

For three quarters, Iowa Park gave Vernon all they wanted in the District 5-3A opener. The Lady Hawks trailed by only three points heading into the final eight minutes of play on the road Tuesday night, and were looking to steal a road win to start district play.

All of that changed in the fourth quarter, as Iowa Park went ice cold from the field and lost their defensive intensity, allowing the Lady Lions to outscore Iowa Park 23-2 in the final period, giving Vernon the 61-37 win.

Iowa Park fell to 2-14 overall and 0-1 in district play while Vernon improved to 8-9 overall and 1-0 in league play.

"We played three solid quarters of basketball," said head coach Kim Padgett. "Then we played our worst defensive quarter of the season, and on top of that we didn't finish on the offensive end when we had the opportunities."

"We let the crowd get into our heads, we let the fouls not being called get into our heads and we just shut down mentally," Padgett said. "The officials were letting them play and we didn't take advantage of it. We threw up our hands when we didn't get the calls we thought we should have, instead of doing the same thing

on the other end of the floor. Vernon did a good job defensively of shutting down our post players with a 1-3-1 zone."

Leann Duran led Iowa Park in scoring with 13 points followed by Melissa Threet with eight and Lacy Wells with seven.

The Lady Hawks also played in the Archer City Tournament over the holidays, finishing with a 1-2 mark. Iowa Park fell 57-37 to Wichita Falls High School in the opener, with Robyn Dillard leading the Lady Hawks in scoring with 11 points followed by Kelley Billington with eight and Duran with six.

In game two, Iowa Park lost to Albany 53-44. Three players scored in double figures for the Lady Hawks including Duran with 13, Robyn Dillard with 11 and Wells with 10.

In the final game of the tournament on Saturday, Iowa Park defeated Archer City 58-17. The Lady Hawks were led in scoring by Robyn Dillard with 13, Wells with 10, Duran with nine and Billington with eight.

The Lady Hawks will continue district play Friday night when they play host to Graham, then back on the road on Tuesday against Henrietta.

The JV Lady Hawks traveled to Vernon on Tuesday night to open

District 5-3A play, coming up on the wrong end of a 46-28 score.

Vernon jumped out to a 19-4 first quarter lead and never allowed Iowa Park to get back into the game.

Iowa Park was led in scoring by Jana Stevens with 11 followed by Joni Love and Jessica Conklin with five points each.

The Lady Hawks will play host to Graham Friday night, then travel to Henrietta on Tuesday.

The freshman Lady Hawks lost their District 5-3A opener to Vernon Tuesday night falling 43-21.

The game was close at the half with Iowa Park leading 17-16, but the second half was all Vernon as the Lady Lions outscored Iowa Park 15-2 in the third quarter and 12-2 in the fourth.

Laura Davis led Iowa Park in scoring with four points followed by Meagan Miller with three. Six different players scored two points each for Iowa Park.

The Lady Hawks will play host to Graham on Friday night then travel to Henrietta on Tuesday.

HUNGRY FOR MEXICAN FOOD?

Taco Twists

1 lb. ground beef, very lean
Brown meat in a large skillet and drain well.
1 - 15 1/2 oz. can kidney beans, drained
Mash beans and add:
2 Tbsps. onion flakes
1 tsp. garlic salt
2 tsps. chili powder
Add to meat mixture.
In a medium bowl, mix together:
1 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup crushed corn chips
On a piece of waxed paper or dough board, sprinkle 1/4 cup cornmeal. Place 2 rows of 5 canned biscuits together. Press to form an 8x16-inch rectangle. Spread meat mixture over dough. Roll up like a jelly roll. Cut into 10 slices and place in a greased 13x9x2-inch baking dish. Sprinkle with the cheese and corn chips. Bake at 350 degrees 35 minutes.

NOTE: 2 tablespoons chopped jalapeno peppers can be added to meat and bean mixture.

Lasagne Rio Grande

8 flour tortillas
1 lb. ground meat
1 onion, chopped
1 Tbsp. chili powder
Salt and pepper

1 - 15 oz. can Ranch Style beans, drained
1 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 - 10 oz. can tomatoes with green chilies

Grease 2-quart lasagne dish and line with tortillas which have been cut in half. Cook meat with onion until brown. Add seasonings. Add beans and mix well. Pour this mixture over layer of tortillas. Add half of the grated cheese. Mix undiluted soup and 3/4 of the can of tomatoes with green chilies in blender or processor, then pour over top of casserole. Top with remaining cheese. Bake at 350 degrees 45 to 60 minutes. Better if prepared the day before, covered and refrigerated. Remove from refrigerator and let it reach room temperature before cooking.

Flour Tortillas

2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
5 heaping tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup hot water
Blend flour, salt and baking powder with a fork. Cut in shortening; add hot water. Complete mixing the dough by hand and shape into a large ball. Let rest 5-10 minutes. Divide

dough into 10 portions and shape into balls. Lightly flour surface if dough is sticky. Roll each ball into a thin circle. Cook on a griddle over medium heat, approximately 1 minute; then turn and cook about 30 seconds on other side. Do not overcook as the tortillas will get too hard.

This recipe requires a coarse flour. Pillsbury flour is recommended.

Mexican Pork Chops

6 thick pork chops
Salt and pepper to taste
3/4 cup long grain rice
1 - 13 1/2 oz. can tomato sauce
1 3/4 cups water
2 Tbsps. taco seasoning mix
1 1/2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
In large skillet, brown pork chops; season with salt and pepper. Place in single layer in 13x9-inch baking pan. Pour rice over the chops. Mix tomato sauce, water, and taco seasoning. Carefully pour over chops and rice. Cover with foil; bake 1 hour. Uncover; cover with cheese and bake 15 minutes longer.

Oven Chicken Ole'

3 chicken breasts, boned and halved
3 ozs. cream cheese
1 cup mild picante sauce
1 tsp. ground cumin
1/2 cup sliced green onions
Crushed tortilla chips (not Fritos)
Pound chicken breasts to flatten. Mix together cream cheese, picante sauce, ground cumin, and sliced green onions. Place a spoonful of mixture on each piece of chicken breast and fold over. Place in 13x9 baking pan and pour remaining sauce over top of chicken rolls. Spread crushed tortilla chips over sauce. Bake 45 minutes, uncovered.

4 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
2 Tbsps. sugar
1/3 cup butter
2 eggs
1 cup milk
Oil for frying, at least 1 inch deep
Cinnamon-sugar (1 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tsp. cinnamon)

Stir dry ingredients together and set aside. Melt butter. In a large bowl, beat eggs, then mix in milk. Gradually stir in dry ingredients. When thoroughly mixed, add melted butter

and, with hands, work butter into the dough. Turn dough onto a lightly floured board and knead gently until smooth and elastic. Divide dough and roll into 30 to 50 balls. With a rolling pin, roll each ball into a thin circle. Pick up the circle and stretch it with your hands as much as possible without tearing the dough. Fry in hot oil (400-425 degrees). Turn to brown on both sides. Drain on paper towels. Sprinkle with sugar mixture. These are wonderful served warm, but leftovers won't be around for long. Dough may be refrigerated up to 2 days, tightly covered, and then rolled as

needed. This recipe may also be cut in half.

Green Chili Rice Casserole

3 cups cooked white rice
1 cup sour cream
1 can cream of celery soup
1/8 tsp. salt
1 cup grated Cheddar cheese
4 Tbsps. butter, melted
1 - 4 oz. can chopped mild green chilies

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease 13x9-inch baking pan. Combine all ingredients and pour into pan. Cover and bake 30 minutes.
