The first meeting of the 23 Study Club for the new year was held at the home of Mrs. C. J. Thurber Thursday afternoon when hostess duties were also assumed by Mrs. S. L. Denny. Highlighting the meeting was the election of officers for 1954-55.

Mrs. Chas. Metz was elected to serve the organization as president. Composing the slate of supporting officers will be Mrs. Dave O. Harbourn, vice president; Mrs. L. E. Brooks, secy; Mrs. Gibbons Brubaker, corresponding secy; Mrs. John B. Barbour, parliamentarian; Mrs. C. Birk, custodian; Mrs. Fred Widmoyer, historian; Mrs. Homer Blalock, reporter; Mrs. Earle Denny and Mrs. R. R. Brubaker, executive committee.

The Preservation of Our American Heritage through Welfare furnished the theme for the afternoon program.

Mrs. Widmoyer acted as leader for the program which opened with a meditation by Mrs. Taylor George, Matt. 19:14-15 constituted a scripture background for the devotion thoughts on our children.

Mrs. John B. Barbour, district child welfare chairman discussed child welfare and the handicapped. She listed the objectives of her division as: to focus attention of the membership on the basic needs of all children and to stimulate appropriate action through agencies, legislation and volunteer work to assure every child his birthright continuing. Mrs. Barbour stated "child welfare in its broad meaning includes the social and economic activities and objectives that promote the well being of the "whole child" as a member of the community.

Mrs. Barbour heightened interest in her topic by giving a history of child welfare in the U. S. bringing into review the problems and gains in identifying the needs of children and attempting to meet them. She discussed the five White House conferences that have been largely responsible for the gradual broadening of the child welfare program.

Mrs. Barbour advocated greater employment opportunities for the physically handicapped and told how states and communities were developing committee structures to provide for a program of education and information aimed at rehabilitation and selective job placement of qualified handicapped workers.

Mrs. Carroll Duke contributed an informative talk on Health, Physical and Mental which she prefaced with an article "no wonder you're tired" from Exchange. The speaker asserted that physical and mental health go hand in hand as happiness and health go hand in hand. The condition of the mind has much to do with the health of the physical system; a contented mind, a cheerful spirit are health to the body and strength to the soul," said Mrs. Duke. She listed the following ways in which clubwomen can meet the challenge to help promote the health of our community: urge clubwomen to have regular physical check ups, observe National Health Day, may 1st, cooperate with local health unit, cooperate with the American Hearing Society, inform the public of the critical nursing problem facing our hospitals, join the local health council and take an active interest in the overall health planning of the community, assist in annual drives for health organizations.

Mrs. Widmoyer discussed Gerontology, the science of aging, to conclude the health topics.

In introducing her talk Mrs. Widmoyer stated that the life span in the U. S. has jumped 20 years since 1900 to a high of 68 years and that experts predict the trend will continue indefinitely due to better medical knowledge for prolonged life.

Describing activities for the years of performance between 20-60, the speaker stressed acquiring a proper attitude toward old age, maintaining good health, saving systematically, assuming civic responsibilities, and developing hobbies. During the years of fulfillment, over 60 Mrs. Widmoyer stressed the advantages of part time employment, hobbies and recreation to fill the need for companionship.

The program was brought to an impressive conclusion with a number of appropriate poems rendered by Mrs. Earle Denny.

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Burglars Rip Pouches At Post Office, But Fail to Open Safe

The Iowa Park post office was broken into last Friday night between 2:30 and 6:30 a.m.—Saturday morning, that is.

Fuzzy Lovelace delivered the mail from the northbound FW&D train at 2:30. When Mrs. Lois Lynn came to work at 6:30, she discovered the break-in at the back entrance.

Burglars gained entrance to the post office by breaking two locks and using tools on two others to unlock them.

Eleven mail sacks and pouches were slashed open.

The sheriff's department and the city marshal, Henry Jones, were summoned immediately.

Postal inspectors from Ft. Worth arrived about noon Saturday.

So far nothing is missing, as is known, and the burglars are presumed to have left empty handed. They attempted to open the safe, without success. It sits under a light and the front curtains in the post office are pushed back at night. It is believed the safe was too heavy for the burglars to push around the corner and work on it.

Pete May, postmaster, said this week unless personal or company checks were in the mail and not registered, the only damage was to the mail sacks and pouches and to the two locks.

Lone Star Makes Many Changes in Official Family

An increase of Lone Star Gas Company's executive staff to include six new vice presidents, an executive vice president, and the elevation of two vice presidents, to the rank of senior vice presidents, has been announced by D. A. Hulcy, President and Chairman of the Board, following a two-day Dallas meeting of the Company's board of directors.

The action, unprecedented in the company's history, is designed to meet the increasingly complex problems resulting from the tremendous growth of the company and its operating territory, Mr. Hulcy said. While some branches of the company's operations have more than doubled in the past 10 years, other segments have almost tripled, he pointed out. From 1942, for example, through 1952, the company built and added more property than it had accumulated in all of its previous 33 years. Since World War II, number of customers has increased from 336,000 to 685,000.

In last week's board action, Vice Presidents Elmer F. Schmidt and Chester L. May were elected senior vice presidents were elected, including M. L. Bird, operating manager of the company's general distribution division. Other new vice presidents are Marshall Newcomb, general counsel and board member; J. L. Foster, general superintendent of transmission; E. A. Brown, manager of exploration and gas supply; W. F. Wright, general manager of Dallas distribution operations.

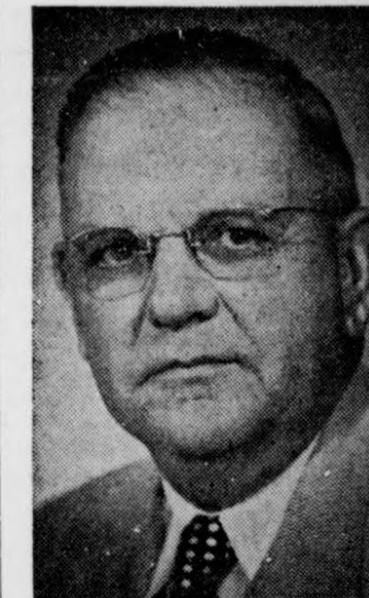

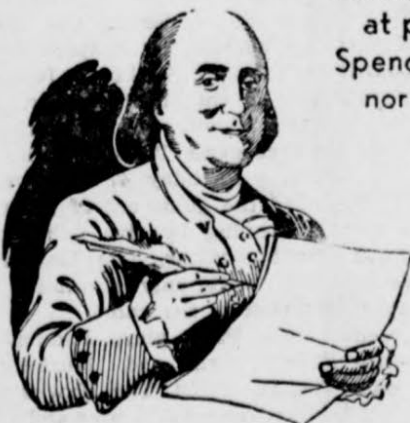

"BLACKMAIL"
by Connie Duckworth

Blackmail is used when an unlawful person has a knowledge of a wrong deed that a certain person wants to keep secret from others. The blackmailer obtains money, jewels, and sometimes property from this person. He almost rules the life of the person that he is blackmailing.

About a hundred and fifty years ago along the border countries of England and Scotland, farmers and small landholders lived in horror of being raided by robbers and outlaws in this poorly protected area. Some escaped being raided by paying regular tributes to the head or leader of these criminals in exchange for protection. This payment for protection was called blackmail to distinguish it from regular rent which at that time was called mail in Scotland. The blackmail was usually paid in labor, grain, or baser metals than was used to pay the legal mail or rent. The leader would usually take the cattle and grain so he could feed the men and stock that he controlled. Therefore blackmail became known as the tribute the farmers and land owners had to pay for protection from raiders.

Blackmail is punishable by law. When anyone tries to blackmail you, you should turn him into the law no matter what the consequences may be.

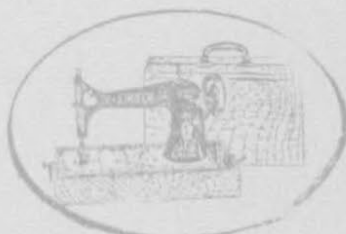

It is urged that those who found no disorder be x-rayed annually, as well as those who did show organic disorder. This annual X-ray is added protection against diseases' getting too deep seated before symptoms appear.
