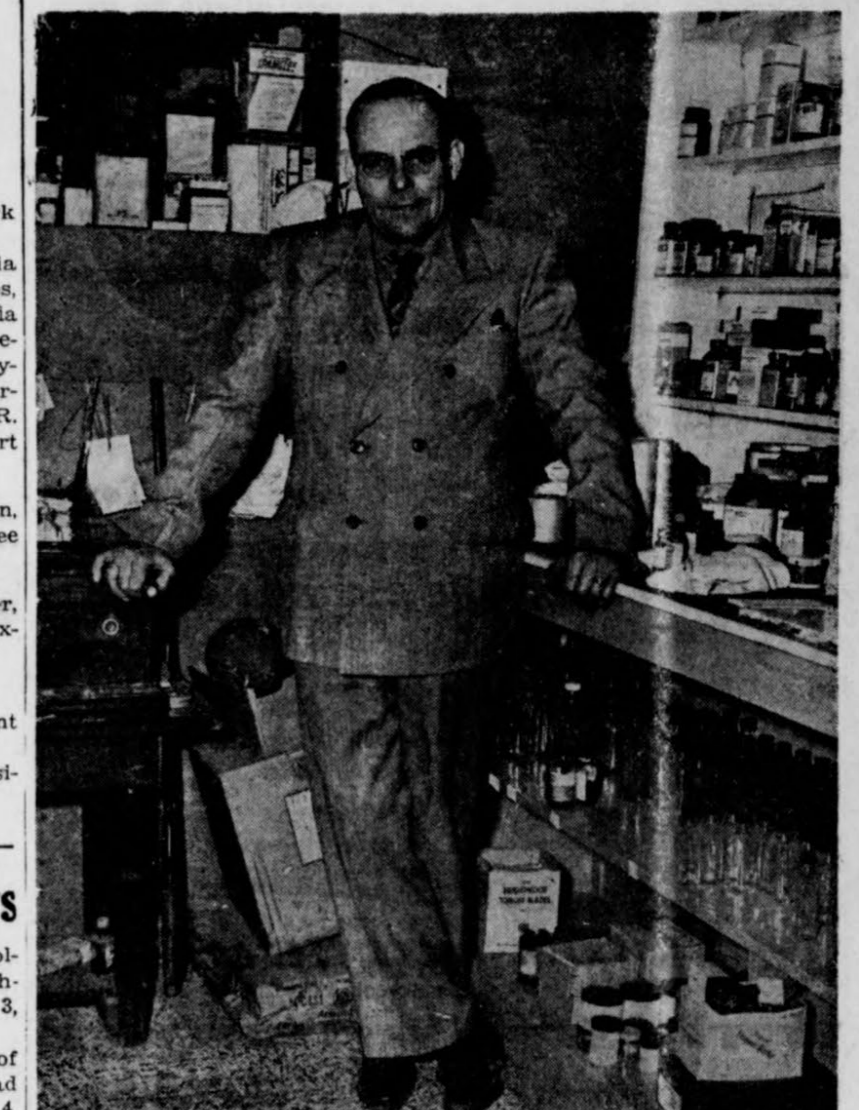

Conservation Is Cited As Factor in Preserving American Heritage

A program featuring a lecture and slides, songs and Bible passages was planned and co-ordinated by Mrs. Dave O. Harbour, chairman of forests and recreation, first district TFVC, to show how national conservation can be a strong factor in the preservation of American heritage.

The program was presented at a meeting of the 23 Study club at the home of Mrs. C. E. Birk, Thursday afternoon, with Mrs. C. Birk serving as co-hostess.

C. E. Birk, a member of the Chicago Mountaineer club, was guest entertainer for the meeting. He gave an informative lecture on national parks, national monuments, national forests, game refuges and wilderness areas which our country is preserving for future generations.

He then showed colorful slides of these places, most of which he had taken on his annual summer climbing trips. An impressive beginning featured slides illustrating light of the sapphire skies, peace of the silent hills, shelter of forest, comfort of grass, after showers, odors of flowers, of good brown earth and friendship of mirth, highpoints of the poem "The Things I Prize," by Henry Van Dyke.

Songs which spoke of the beauty of trees and man's obligation to protect them were rendered by Mrs. C. W. Coppock, who sang "Trees" (Joyce Kilmer) and "I Heard a Forest Praying" (Peter De Rose). Mrs. James A. Sewell provided the piano accompaniment.

The meditation on the theme "Forest and Flame in the Bible" by Mrs. Homer Blalock featured scripture passages showing how forests serve mankind and how they should be protected.

During the period devoted to business Mrs. Sewell was in charge. Mrs. Wilmer Shark of Wichita Falls, representative of the League of Nursing Education, spoke to the members regarding the urgency of a new nurses residence and the request for a county election on the proposal for a bond issue of \$335,000 to build such a structure.

The club voted to favor the proposed citywide recreation project and to endorse the campaign for more strict physical requirements for people working in places where food is served.
