



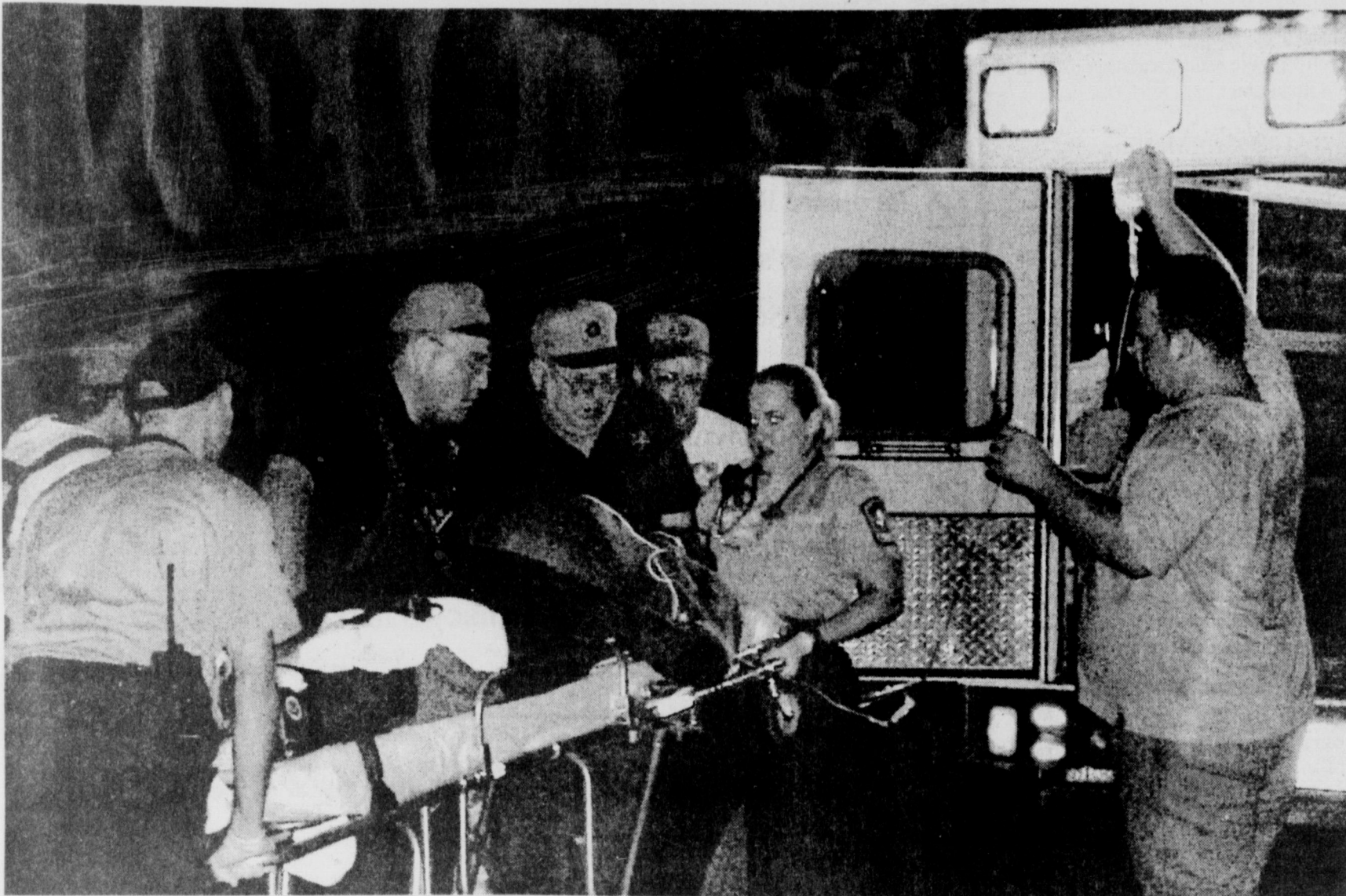

## Autopsy to determine cause of man's death

The body of a 28-year-old client of D&S Residential Services has been sent to Dallas for an autopsy, in an effort to determine the cause of his death.

Iowa Park police received a

telephone call from 309 Kathleen at 8:52 p.m. Tuesday, and were told "A client going off, real bad".

Residents at the address are described as "mentally disabled".

Because police were nearby, patrolling during the July 4th celebration, officers arrived at the scene two minutes later, according to the police report.

They found a man, identified as

Marcus P. Davis Jr., lying in the middle of the street.

Three D&S employees reportedly had been struggling with the man, in an effort to get him under control, when he collapsed.

Emergency Medical Personnel of the fire department and attendants with AMR ambulance services attempted to revive him, but without any success.

He was transported to a Wichita Falls hospital, where he was pronounced deceased.

The three employees as well as witnesses are being interviewed by police, as part of their investigation.

Davis was described as being black, and weighing over 300 pounds.

Charges are pending the result of the autopsy and determining the cause of death, according to police.

## County holding local resident

David Mark Spruiell, 54, of Iowa Park, remains in Wichita County Jail after threatening a man with a hand-

gun Saturday afternoon.

According to the arrest affidavit, at 6:45 p.m. Spruiell stopped his vehicle in front of a home on River View Road, southwest of Iowa Park. He began shouting at the resident, Gary Collinsworth. Spruiell exhibited a .357 magnum handgun, pointed it at Collinsworth and said, "You know I'll do it."

## June's permits take big jump

When Collinsworth questioned Spruiell's remark, Spruiell replied, "The first one will be over your head. The next one will be between your eyes." He then pointed the weapon into the air and fired once. Spruiell then left the scene, and Collinsworth called the Sheriff's Dept.

Deputies believe the dispute is over a woman.

Sgt. David Duke said deputies responded to Spruiell's residence in the 700 block of S. Victoria and found his vehicle to be there. When Spruiell did not answer his door, deputies gained entrance and found Spruiell sleeping.

Deputies recovered a .357 handgun at the scene, which had five bullets and one spent casing in the chamber.

Spruiell was arrested and charged with aggravated assault, \$10,000 bond; and unlawful carrying of a weapon, \$2,500 bond.

Iowa Park received almost an inch of badly-needed rainfall Saturday.

Virgil Woodfin reported he measured .88 in his rain gauge after the clouds cleared.

## Charges still pending against six for thefts

Charges remain pending against six young people, concerning a series of thefts from vehicles, according to Iowa Park Police.

"That investigation has been temporarily put on the back burner, with all the other cases that have developed recently," said Lt. Mike Dozier.

Police have the identity of the six suspects who reportedly were involved in at least 17 burglaries from vehicles in recent weeks.

Two of the suspects, a female and a male, were working together, but separately from the other four

males. Charges are pending against them all.

Concerning that string of thefts, a resident in the 600 block of West Rebecca contacted the police station Monday, to report a theft from his vehicle that occurred the night of June 21.

The caller said 95 CDs and a case had been taken.

After describing them, the man was invited to the police station, where he identified all but 58 of the discs. They and the case were returned to his possession.

In an unrelated case, a man and woman were taken into custody

Monday in the 300 block of West Pecan, both of whom were wanted by police in Mineral Wells on charges of theft \$1,500 to \$20,000.

Angela Sue Wyke, 26, and Shawn Lee Wyke, 24, were turned over to a Mineral Wells officer, who transported them back to his city where they were held under \$10,000 bond.

## Short council meeting slated

Only two items were listed on the tentative agenda for Monday night's regularly-scheduled meeting of the city council.

The meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

A public appearance by a representative of Park Clinic is scheduled, requesting the city's participation in construction of off-site parking facilities, with the right of way in the 600 block of North Colorado.

The other topic on the agenda will be a public hearing, concerning annexation of 137 acres of land into the city limits.

The land is located North of US 287 and West of Wigley Road, on which an 18-hole golf course is being proposed.

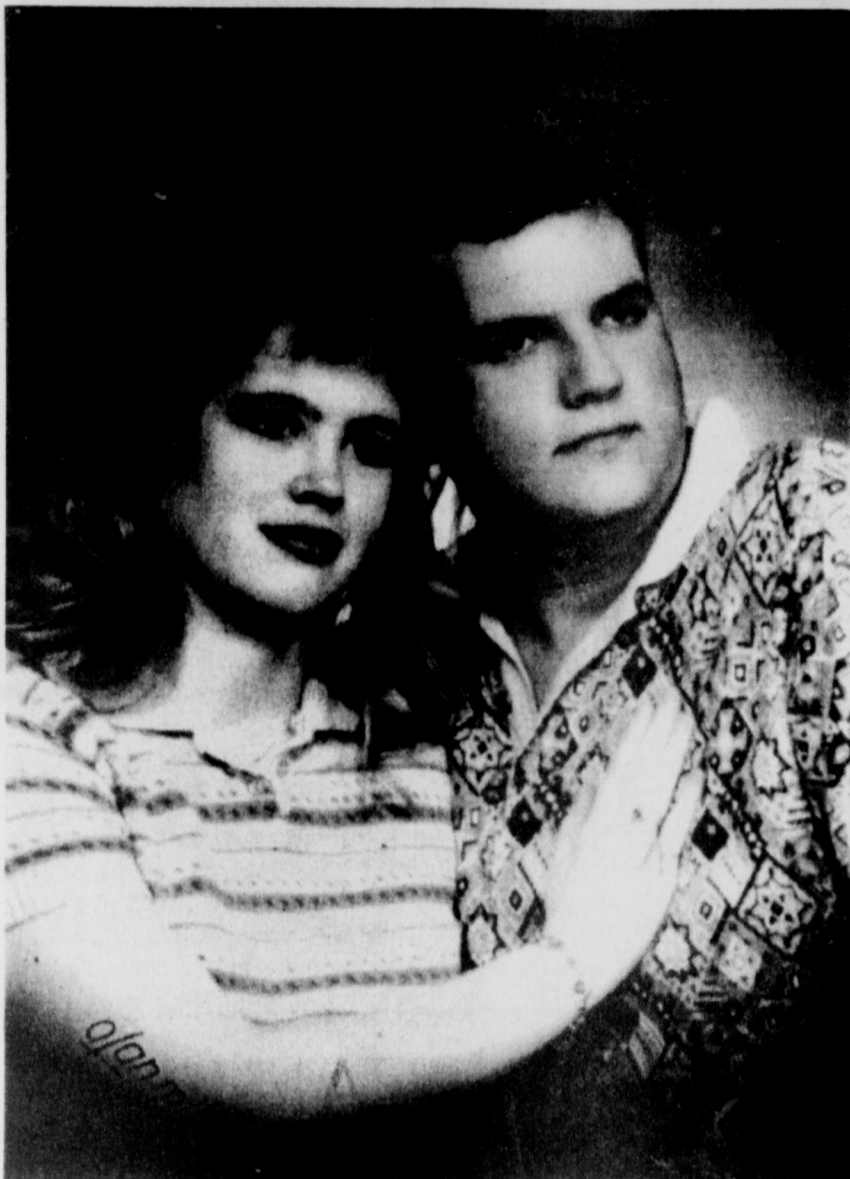

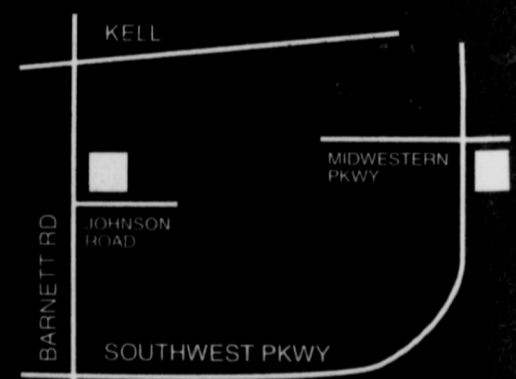

# As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



A bunch of Iowa Parkers learned a lesson I learned several years ago. That is, to lock up your car at night.

And we don't stop there. We consistently lock our home when we leave, also.

I feel sorry for all those neighbors who live on Louisa, Park Place and Van Horn and had their possessions taken from their cars over the past couple of weeks.

But I couldn't believe that after our June 22 issue went out, with the lead story about thefts from cars, that so many people continued to not lock their vehicles, and consequently were losers.

Yeah, these bums hit a bunch of vehicles in neighboring Wichita Falls, also.

They took thousands of dollars worth of possessions, as well as cash that had carelessly been left in the unlocked vehicles.

And Iowa Park police have caught them, or most of them, thanks to an alert resident who reported a situation on his street during an early-morning hour.

We should have a fairly complete wrap-up on the cases this week, because our officers have been working overtime on the cases.

I began locking my vehicles at night some 25 years ago, after I learned my lesson.

Some bum stole a set of golf clubs and bag from my car, which was parked in front of our house one night.

That convinced me of the need immediately, and I don't fail to secure my vehicles anymore.

Actually, our vehicles aren't the only thing we learned to lock up at night.

I'm not blaming my community, but until we moved here in 1969, we had never felt the need to secure anything by locking. There just wasn't any need, we felt.

But it didn't take long for me to learn one of those valuable lessons.

Just a couple of weeks after we moved into a house on West Magnolia, we loaded up for the first out-of-town football game of the fall.

Like I said, we failed to lock the house.

When we returned home and I walked into the bedroom, there on the bed were the books in which I was accumulating a coin collection.

They were empty, except for one single penny.

Since that time, we don't fail to lock the house.

Actually, we have added even more security to our residence in recent years, in addition to locking.

I had a sensor light installed overlooking my driveway, and it is highly effective.

Additionally, because we love dogs, we now have three living in the house, including one that could tear the leg off an intruder.

My parents never locked our house while I was living at home. Well, actually, they did for some reason or another, one time.

I'll never forget that one time. It was the first day of summer vacation after the school year. I worked all that day on my new job as a lifeguard at Hereford's first swimming pool.

Sitting out in the sun all day was nothing for me. After all, I had been active in track all spring, and had my usual suntan.

That's not accurate, actually. I had always worn my track shoes, so my feet weren't tanned.

Boy, they blistered badly, before I knew it.

After the pool closed, I rushed home to change into some tennis shoes, because I was on a softball team that was playing under the lights that night.

For some reason I can't remember, my folks had gone to visit some friends. And they had locked the doors.

I went on and played the game that night... in a brand new pair of leather shoes. It was painful.

It could very well save you a lot of trouble... and our police officers a lot of extra work!

### The Hardcastle Report

Texas prisons are nearly full. In response to growing concerns about crime in the late 1980s, Texas lawmakers lengthened sentences and tripled prison capacity at a cost of \$2.5 billion. This approach became known nationally as the "Texas Solution."

Recently, the Texas Board of Criminal Justice cited prison expansion as a major factor in the reduction of crime. But while the "Texas Solution" has made Texas safer, prison capacity is at 97.9 percent. Today, there are four times as many Texans in jail than there were in 1988. By 2003, the state prison population will be 155,000.

Texas must now consider how to handle this growing population. Expanding the prison system to accommodate the expected 5,000-bed shortage over the next few years could cost up to \$400 million—a considerable expense to taxpayers when combined with other important needs such as funding our public schools.

One alternative is to lease beds from county jails. There are some 4,000 prison beds available in county jails that could be leased by the state. The state has been leasing about 3,000 county prison beds for the past two years. This alternative allows for the continued lock up of people who choose to break the law and could prove beneficial to some local county jails. However, it may prove only a temporary solution.

Some believe that early and more frequent parole of convicted criminals is another alternative for creating prison space. In 1990, almost 80 percent of inmates considered were approved for parole. By 1998, this figure was reduced to 20 percent. Some policymakers counter that many non-violent offenders are denied parole who might benefit from job training, literacy, and substance abuse programs to ease them back into society. However, even with low parole rates, more than two-thirds of the 37,000 incoming inmates were parole or probation violators in 1998.

A related issue is prison violence. Some prison officials argue that lengthier sentences and decreased rates of parole have led to an increase in prison violence. In 1990, there were 1,400 reports of violence in Texas prisons; in 1999, there were 14,500 such reports. As conditions become more crowded, inmates feel they have nothing to lose through violence.

## Test dates set for Credit by Exam

Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District students can receive credit for classes by taking a "Credit by Exam" test in any elementary grade level or secondary subject area. The state has identified two different types of these tests:

#### 1. With Prior Instruction Credit by Exam

A student who has received prior instruction in a course or subject but failed the course or subject with a grade of no less than 60 may earn credit by passing an examination on the essential knowledge and skills defined for the subject or course. To receive credit, a student must score at least 70 on the examination. A student may not use this examination to regain eligibility to participate in extracurricular activities. Students must pay the testing fee to participate in this type of Credit by Exam.

#### 2. Without Prior Instruction Credit by Examination

A student will be permitted to take an examination to advance to earn credit for an academic course for which the student has no prior instruction. A student planning to take an examination for acceleration must register with the counselor no later than 30 days prior to the scheduled testing date. The District will order and pay for the test and administer it. A student must score 90 or above to receive credit for the course or subject for which he/she is taking the test.

# Know your local fireman

After witnessing the Iowa Park firemen and EMTs trying to save the life of his grandfather, Michael Fulbright decided he wanted to be a part of the team that works hard to save lives and property.

He joined the fire department in 1996 shortly before his father, Randy joined. Michael says he thought he had to be 21 to join or he would have joined sooner.

Fulbright says shortly after joining the fire department he learned not a lot of people want to volunteer their time. He says the firemen count is not growing with the growth of Iowa Park.

Only six or seven of the firemen are available during day time hours.

Fulbright is employed at Eighth Street Campus of United Regional Health Care Center as a security officer. He recently switched to the night shift so he could be available for fire and EMT calls during the day.

He explained, when they are a daytime fire call, they don't always have enough firemen to give them a break.

When they go into a structure fire, besides their 25 pound bunker gear (fire protection clothes, boots, and helmet), they must pack an air tank that weighs about 25 to 30 pounds. The air tank holds 25 minutes of air but if a firemen doesn't control his breathing the air tank can run out in a lot less time. A bell sounds when they get low on air to alert the fireman it is time to exit the structure. The average time a fireman stays in a structure fire is nine to 12 minutes.

Carrying the weight, coupled with the extreme heat, can quickly take its toll on a person. Some of the firemen handle the heat better than others.

Although a structure fire gets really hot, Fulbright says sometimes fighting a grass fire can be worse. "When the temperature is 100-plus degrees with the fire producing heat and the heavy gear, in about ten or fifteen minutes it can zap you," Fulbright said.

There is more to being a fireman than answering calls. Fulbright says though this department is volunteer many don't realize the firemen and EMTs still must have the same training and abide by the same rules and

requirements as a professional fireman or EMT.

Each year firemen attend training throughout Texas. Many use their vacation time to go to training. Fulbright says he used his vacation time two years ago to attend the Texas A&M Fire Training Program.

"Many times people don't think about what we do until they have to use our service," Fulbright said.

He says when the firemen are trying to put out a house fire they are not just trying to stop the fire, they are also trying to save as much of the contents as possible. "People's lives are in that house. Pictures, things their children have made them and many other memories that we are trying to save," Fulbright said. "While we are inside the house trying to contain the fire we often pick up items that we think might mean something to the family and try to keep it from getting wetter or more damaged as we put out hot spots."

Fulbright says what the fire department does with children brings him the most enjoyment.

The Toys for Tots program is one of his favorites, because his heart goes out to children.

The fire department also gives programs at the schools. In addition to fire prevention, they give pro-

grams teaching children not to hide. This involves putting on their gear and getting in the floor with the children and talk with them so the kids can see and hear what they are like when in their fire gear.

Fulbright says during a fire often children get scared and hide behind and under things and it helps when the child knows how a fireman looks and sounds.

He added the firemen are trained to look for children hiding and it is amazing where they might hide during a fire.

Fulbright says in addition to all the things he enjoys doing with the fire department he really enjoys the family relationship they have.

Fulbright says his fiancée, Mindy Atchley, is excited about what he does and she understands when they have to miss a date or something. He says his son, who is a year old, has started waving "bye" when the fire tone is sounded.

### Kid-Friendly Recipes

(that adults will love, too!)

Summertime is a good time for youngsters to develop their cooking skills.

The following recipes can be easily followed by a school-aged child.

It is advised that an adult be present when using the stove or oven, electrical appliances, or a sharp knife.

### Ice Cream & Cookie Sundaes

4 soft oatmeal cookies (2-3 inches in diameter)  
1/2 cup butterscotch, chocolate or caramel ice cream topping  
1 small banana  
2 cups vanilla or chocolate ice cream  
1/4 cup peanuts

Break cookies into small pieces. Arrange a layer of cookie pieces in the bottom of each dish. With a small spoon, put some of the ice cream topping over the cookie pieces. Save the rest of the topping for later use.

Peel the banana. Slice it with a table knife. Arrange some banana slices in each dish. Use an ice cream scoop or large spoon to place ice cream into each dessert dish. Spoon the remaining ice cream topping over the ice cream. Sprinkle each serving with some peanuts.

Top each dessert with whipped dessert topping and serve right away. Makes 4 servings.

### Grilled Meat & Cheese Sandwich

1 Tbsp. butter or margarine  
2 slices white or whole wheat bread  
2 slices American, Swiss, Cheddar, or Colby cheese

1 thin slice fully cooked ham, chicken or turkey

Spread butter or margarine on one side of each bread slice. Put one slice, margarine side down, in the skillet. Put a slice of cheese; a slice of ham, chicken, or turkey; and another slice of cheese on top. Put the remaining slice of bread with the margarine side up, on top of the cheese.

Put the skillet on a burner. Turn the burner to medium, and cook for 4 to 5 minutes or until the bottom side is toasted and golden. To check the bottom, lift the sandwich with a spatula and peek underneath.

With the spatula, turn the sandwich over. Cook the other side about 2 minutes or until it is toasted and golden. Turn off the burner. Remove the skillet. Lift the sandwich from the skillet with the spatula. Cut the sandwich in half. Makes 1.

### Bread Spreads

Toast a slice of raisin bread. Spread with soft cream cheese and your favorite jelly or jam.

Spreak peanut butter over one 6 or 7-inch flour tortilla. Sprinkle with sunflower nuts or mixed diced fruit bits. Roll up.

Toast a frozen waffle. Spread with peanut butter and sprinkle with semi-sweet chocolate pieces.

### Fruit Dip

Stir together 1/2 cup fudge ice cream topping and 1/2 cup strawberry or raspberry yogurt.

Dip apple wedges, orange slices or strawberries into the chocolate mixture.

### Chocolate Chip Oatmeal Cookies

1/2 cup margarine or butter (1 stick)  
1 egg  
1 cup all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup packed brown sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
1 cup quick-cooking rolled oats  
1 - 6 ounce pkg. (1 cup) semisweet chocolate pieces

Remove the margarine or butter from the refrigerator at least 30 minutes before making the cookies.

Turn oven to 375 degrees. Put margarine in large bowl and beat 30 seconds with electric mixer at medium speed.

Crack the egg into a custard cup or small bowl. Add egg, flour, sugar, brown sugar, vanilla, and baking soda to the margarine. Beat on medium speed about 2 minutes or until well mixed. As you mix, scrape sides of bowl with rubber scraper as needed. Use a spoon to stir in oats and chocolate pieces.

Put enough dough on a small spoon so the dough is slightly humped. Use another spoon to push the dough from the spoon onto the cookie sheet. Repeat to fill cookie sheet. Leave about 2 inches between cookies.

Put the cookie sheet in the oven and bake 8 to 10 minutes or until brown. While the cookies bake, drop more cookie dough on another cookie sheet. Use hot pads to remove the cookie sheet from the oven. Put the second cookie sheet into the oven. Use a spatula to lift the baked cookies onto a cooling rack. When the first cookie sheet is cool, drop more dough onto it. Repeat with remaining dough. Makes about 40 cookies.

### Fresh Sweet Butter

Pour 1/2 pint heavy cream into a 1 pint jar with tight-fitting lid. Screw the lid on the jar. Be sure it's tight. Shake the cream until it makes a lump of butter. Spread the fresh butter on toast, biscuits, muffins or pancakes.

There will be some liquid left in the jar. That's buttermilk! Drink it or use it in cooking.

# AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

## Drought Assistance

This is just a reminder of the different drought assistant programs that are available through TDA. I have had some calls from local growers and others about some of these programs, so I thought it would be applicable to list them again.

November 2, 1999, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman declared Wichita County a disaster due to losses caused by drought that occurred June 1 through August 31, 1999. Also eligible, because they are contiguous, are Archer, Baylor, Clay and Wilbarger.

The programs that I am aware of to date are the following: Loan Guaranty Program, The Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAFSA) provides financial assistance through loan guarantees to eligible agricultural businesses that are, or proposed to be, engaged in innovative, diversified, or value-added production, processing, marketing, or exporting of an agricultural product or other agricultural-related rural economic development projects.

These include projects involved in the development of nature-tourism in Texas.

**Direct Loan Program...** TAFSA may provide a direct loan to an eligible applicant in cooperation with the applicant's lender. TAFSA consider a direct loan in an amount not to exceed \$250,000 only when the eligible applicant and a participating lender provide evidence that a direct

loan is in the best interest of the applicant, the lender, or TAFSA.

**Participation Purchase Program...** TAFSA is authorized to provide assistance to lending institutions for eligible agricultural projects through the purchase of an undivided interest in a loan made by a lender. The program provides that the maximum participation purchased by TAFSA cannot exceed \$5 million.

**Young Farmer Loan Guarantee Program...** TAFSA provides financial assistance through loan guarantees to eligible applicants from 18 to 39 years of age who wish to establish or enhance their farm and/or ranch operation or establish an agricultural-related business. The program provides up to a 90 percent guarantee to a lender for an eligible applicant, not to exceed \$250,000.

**Farm & Ranch Finance Program...** TAFSA provides financial assistance to eligible, credit-worthy

applicants for the purchase of farm land and/or ranch land that will be in full time agricultural use. Applicants may finance the land purchase through a participating lending institution with a 5% minimum down payment. The program provides a maximum commitment by TAFSA of \$250,000.

**Linked Deposit Program...** TAFSA encourages private commercial lending at below market rates to eligible applicants for eligible projects. Eligible projects include: production of an alternative crop, a value-added project, a project that is located in a USDA, or Presidential declared disaster area, and a project using water conservation techniques or purchasing water conservation equipment.

**SBA Declaration 9F80...** These loans are available to small businesses that have suffered financial losses and are dependent on farmers and ranchers who sustained crop losses as a result of drought. Farmers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought can apply.
