



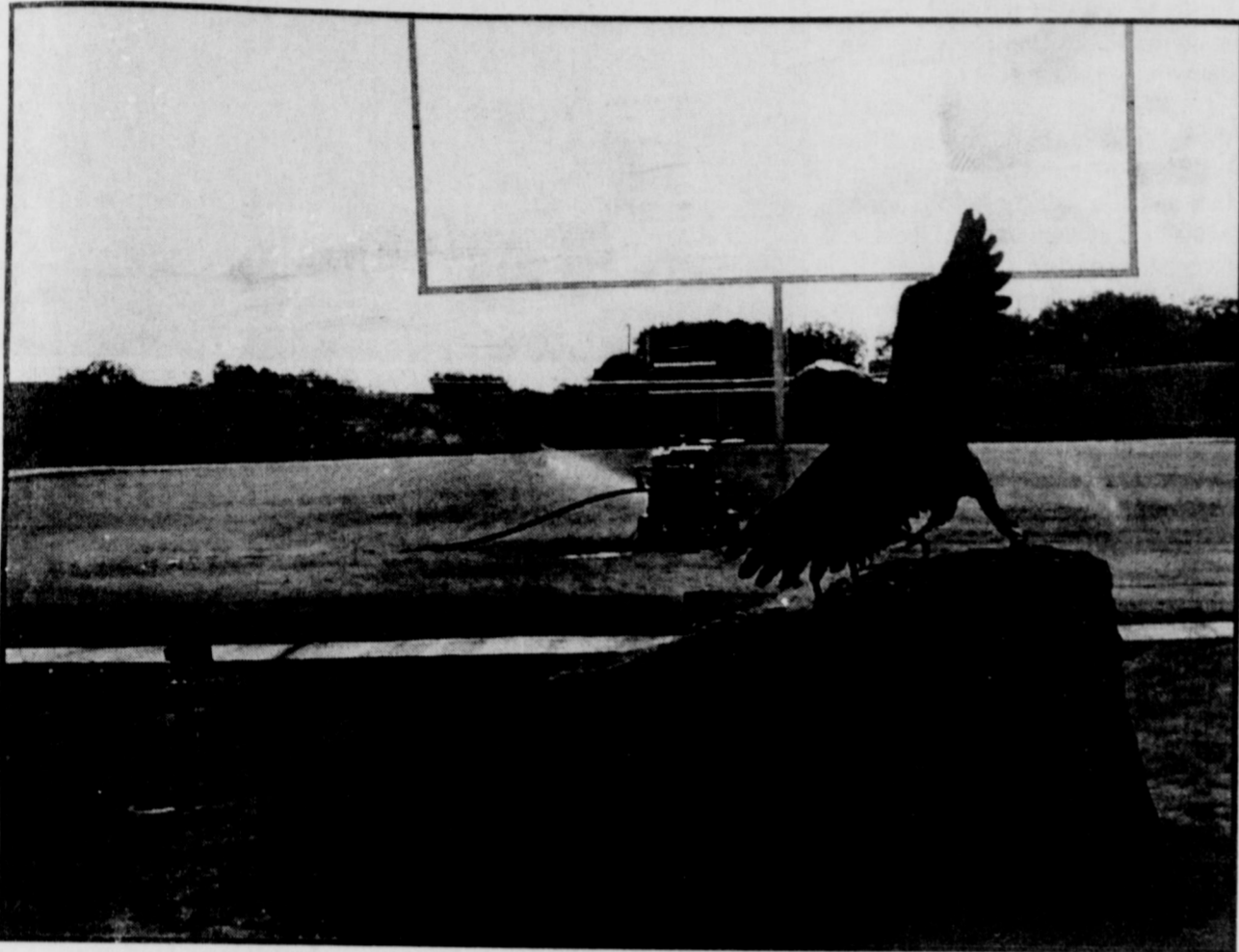

ON COUNCIL'S AGENDA

More water restrictions, setting tax rate Monday

Though no official actions were taken during a called meeting Monday night by the city council, members gave the indication that two major issues will be acted on when the council holds its regular meeting at 7 p.m. Monday.

One of the issues is to initiate Phase Five of the city's water restrictions.

The other relates to retaining the tax rate for another year, which, because of increased values, would in effect be a tax increase.

Monday's meeting will be held in council chambers.

WATER RESTRICTIONS

Stage Five is being enacted due

to emergency water shortage conditions, with a goal of reducing by 40 percent the daily water demand.

All requirements of Stage Four remain in effect, as well as prohibiting all outside watering and irrigation.

One change in Stage Five proved to be agreeable to council members.

The three commercial car washing businesses will be allowed to continue, but that was approved only after the businesses agreed to not operate one day a week, with the date being each of their own choices.

The businesses include Mean Green Car Wash, R & R Restoration and Junior's Service Center.

Responding to a question from the council, City Administrator Mike Price said the city's two lakes could continue to provide water for treatment from as few as 120 days, or as long as another 210 days.

Daily water purchases by city consumers during the first seven days of August ranged from a low of 1,320,000 gallons on Wednesday of last week to as high as 2,160,000 on Monday.

Other restrictions of water use include:

- * washing of sidewalks, driveways and/or parking lots is prohibited;
- * the addition to and/or the use of water for architectural features is prohibited;
- * the flushing of all of the city's water mains by use of fire hydrants, other than the amount required to purge after a leak repair, is prohibited;

* all outside watering or irrigation is prohibited;

* the filling, refilling or adding of potable water to privately owned swimming, wading or jacuzzi-type pools is prohibited;

* all use of water for any type of vehicle washing, with the exception of the three businesses, is prohibited;

* wholesale water customers of the city will be required to reduce their purchase of water by 20 percent over the previous month's usage.

The mayor and aldermen have for the past several weeks been attempting to achieve a meeting with the five state agencies that would be involved, to obtain permission to begin using affluent from the sewer treatment plant, by mixing it with Lake Iowa Park water before pumping it to the treatment plant.

Due to vacations and other meetings with other municipalities, no date for such a meeting has yet been set, Mayor Tim Hunter reported.

TAX HEARINGS

The first hearing to discuss and consider a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the certified tax roll for 2000 will be held Monday.

Aldermen on Tuesday night expressed a consensus to not change the 1999 tax rate of .672 per \$100 valuation.

Because the appraised values of the city increased since last year, retaining the same rate will be, in

Students returning to class

Iowa Park students will be returning to their classrooms, one week from today, on Thursday, Aug. 17.

All Iowa Park High School students will report to the auditorium at 8:10 a.m.

The first two days of school will be spent with orientation and back-to-school activities. Students will meet with their advisors all day on Thursday and will have an eight period day to meet in all classes on Friday.

Sixth grade students at W.F. George Middle School will have an orientation day on Monday, Aug. 14.

They may come to the school at any time between 8:30 - 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. on that day to pick up schedules, locker assignments, and find their classrooms. Parents of sixth graders are encouraged to come with them on that day.

All middle school students will report to their home rooms on Thursday, with the tardy bell sounding at 8:05 a.m. Seventh and eighth grade students will receive their schedules on the first day of school.

Students at Bradford and Kidwell Elementary Schools will begin classes at 8 a.m.

Kidwell kindergarten orientation will be on August 17, and students will accompany their parents to school. Kindergarten students will go to school from 8 - 11 a.m. on Aug. 18.

Pre-K students will follow the kindergarten schedule on the first day.

Kidwell Cafeteria Arrangements

Breakfast and lunch will be served in the Kidwell gym until renovations in the cafeteria are complete.

Food will be prepared at the high school cafeteria and transported to Kidwell.

For breakfast, they will be serving "Breakfast in a Bag." This will be a pre-packaged breakfast, free to all children enrolled at Kidwell. "The child will just go through the line and pick up a bag, and a milk, if they want one," said Allen Shewmake, director of operations.

For lunch, the students will have different choices. They will be using disposable trays, and will be offered more pre-packaged items for sides, to eliminate the amount of dirty pans and dishes, and to help the student move through the line quicker.

If parents have any questions, they can call the Iowa Park Food Service Office at 592-4254.

School Bus Service

Iowa Park school bus services will begin on August 17, the first day of school.

There will be no changes in routes and times from last year.

To be eligible for school bus services, students must live two or more miles from the school that they will be attending. Eligibility is determined by the student's home address.

Kidwell and Bradford students who live less than two miles from their school may be eligible if they have to cross Bus 287, Pacific Ave., or FM 368 South. High school and middle school students must live two miles from the school they will be attending to be eligible to ride a bus.

Two new buses purchased by the school district were delivered last May. They will be put into service this year as bus #5 and bus #10.

All of the buses are equipped with radios, which will allow the drivers to be in immediate contact with the Director of Operations. Buses will also have video cameras.

Transportation personnel will be at Kidwell and Bradford the first two days of school to answer any questions concerning school bus service. Anyone needing information concerning bus service can call the Transportation Department at 592-4503.

CORRECTION

Kidwell dress code policy

The wrong dress code policy for Kidwell Elementary School was included in a story in last week's issue of the *Leader*.

Following is a corrected version of the policy:

Kidwell Dress Code Policy

Students need to come to school dressed appropriately for working in the classroom as well as participating in physical education classes and recess. If the weather permits, recess will be held outside and students should come to school prepared for the changing weather in our area.

Mid-thigh length shorts or skirts are permitted at the elementary level. Split-side (jogging) shorts or cut-offs are not acceptable. It is recommended that shorts be worn under dresses and skirts for physical education classes.

Sleeveless shirts will be permitted. The sleeves must be hemmed and not of the undershirt or tank top variety.

Spaghetti strap dresses or blouses, mini skirts, bare-midriff outfits, tank tops, cut-off t-shirts, t-shirts with distractive slogans, and wind shorts are not permitted.

High-heeled shoes, boots, jelly

shoes, and shoes with cleats are discouraged. Shoes with metal taps may not be worn. Shoes should be suitable for both playground and indoor wear.

Hats, caps, or any distracting or unusual hair ornaments will not be allowed on campus except on special occasions. (Knit caps for outdoor use are acceptable.)

Earrings are allowed for girls

This year's school budget will be one of the main topics of discussion at tonight's meeting of the Iowa Park school board.

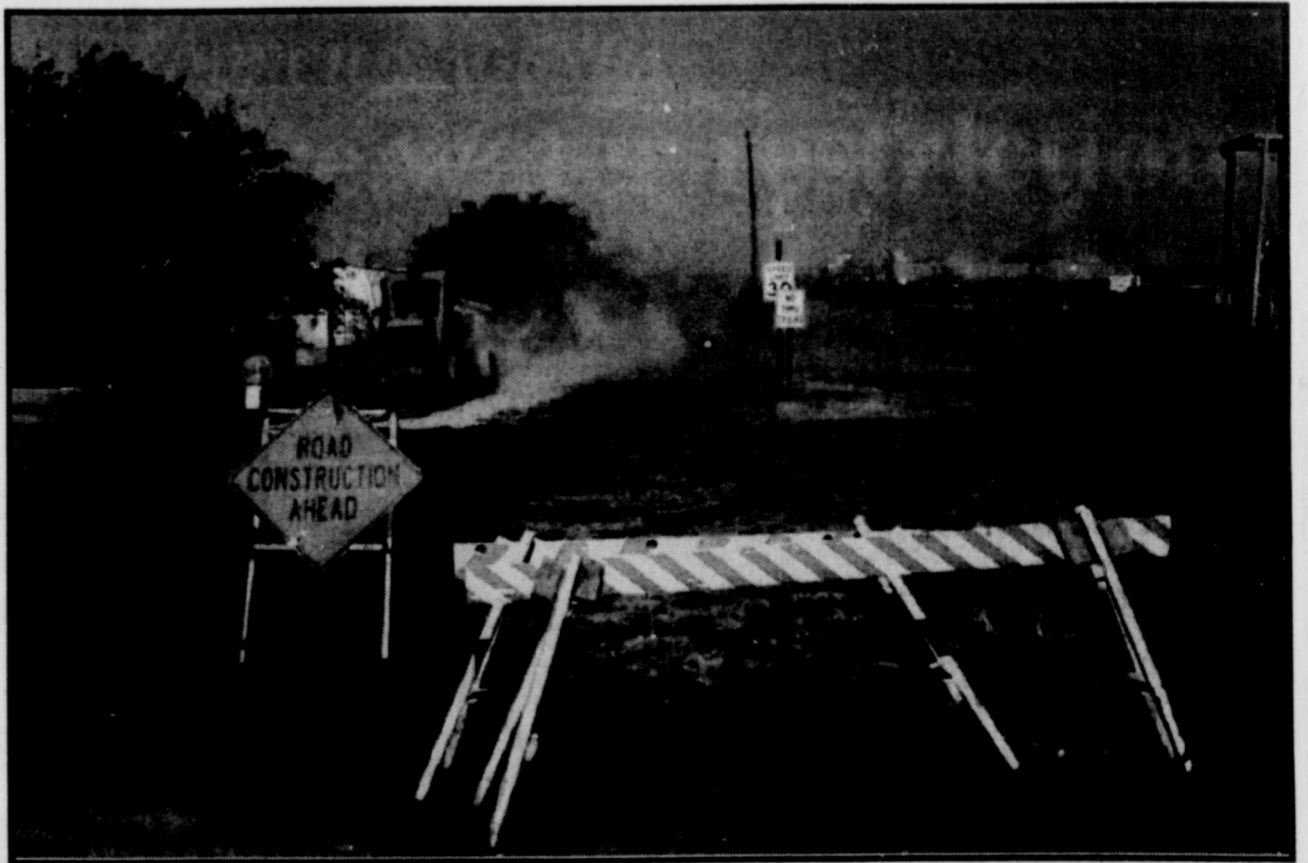

Chris Cray joined the Iowa Park Fire Department in Nov. 1999, and is a 2000 graduate of Iowa Park High School.

Chris says he had visited with Assistant Fire Chief Lewis Skinner on numerous occasions about the many things the fire department does for the community, and decided he would enjoy being a part of the team.

He stated despite the visits with Lewis he was still surprised at how many calls, day and night, the fire department is called out on.

"It's a lot more work than I thought it would be," Chris said. But his place of employment supports him and if a call for help is toned while he is at work, most of the time he is allowed to go.

Chris is employed at B&R Thriftway and manager, Kerri Perkins allows Chris to respond to calls as long as there are enough employees there to take care of the customers.

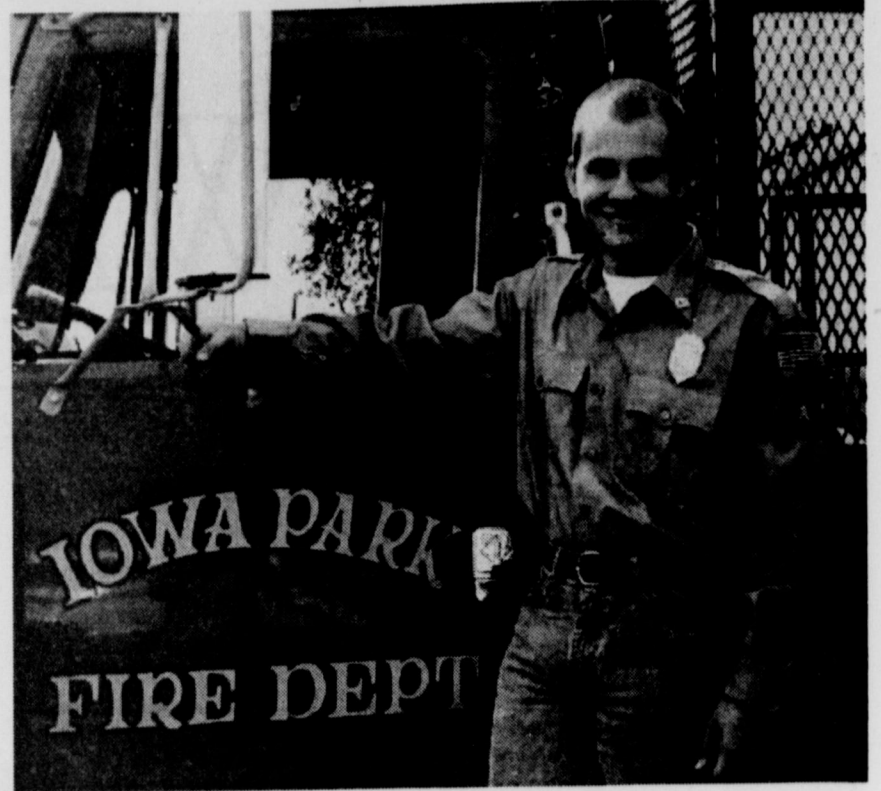
Because of Perkin's generosity Chris is able to help during the day time hours when most of the firemen and EMTs are unable to respond.

Chris hopes to someday attend EMT classes. He says he feels helpless on EMT calls, especially on possible code calls. He says he always leaves a call like that wishing there was something more they could have done to save them.

Chris says he likes to go inside on a structure fire because he feels he can do more there and doesn't feel quite so helpless. However he explained there are many important jobs when fighting a fire. One is the fireman standing at the entrance of the structure. That fireman must keep up with how many firemen have gone into the burning structure so they can be sure all of them are out in the event the structure collapses.

Chris says he hasn't been inside a structure that fell in but he has fallen through the floor when they were putting out hot spots. He was not injured.

He explained that when responding to a fire within the city limits five people can go out on a single truck. Three in the front and two riding the back. Outside the city

limits only three can go on a single truck. Three up front.

The trucks that are used to fight grass fires only three firemen can ride it at any time.

Chris says his girlfriend, Stephanie Bottles, loves what he does.

He says if they are together when a call comes in she wants to go with him.

Chris is the son of Mike and Pati Cray. He says when he first told them he wanted to join the fire department they were surprised but they support him.

That is always accompanied by the winds out of the South, which again is normal around here.

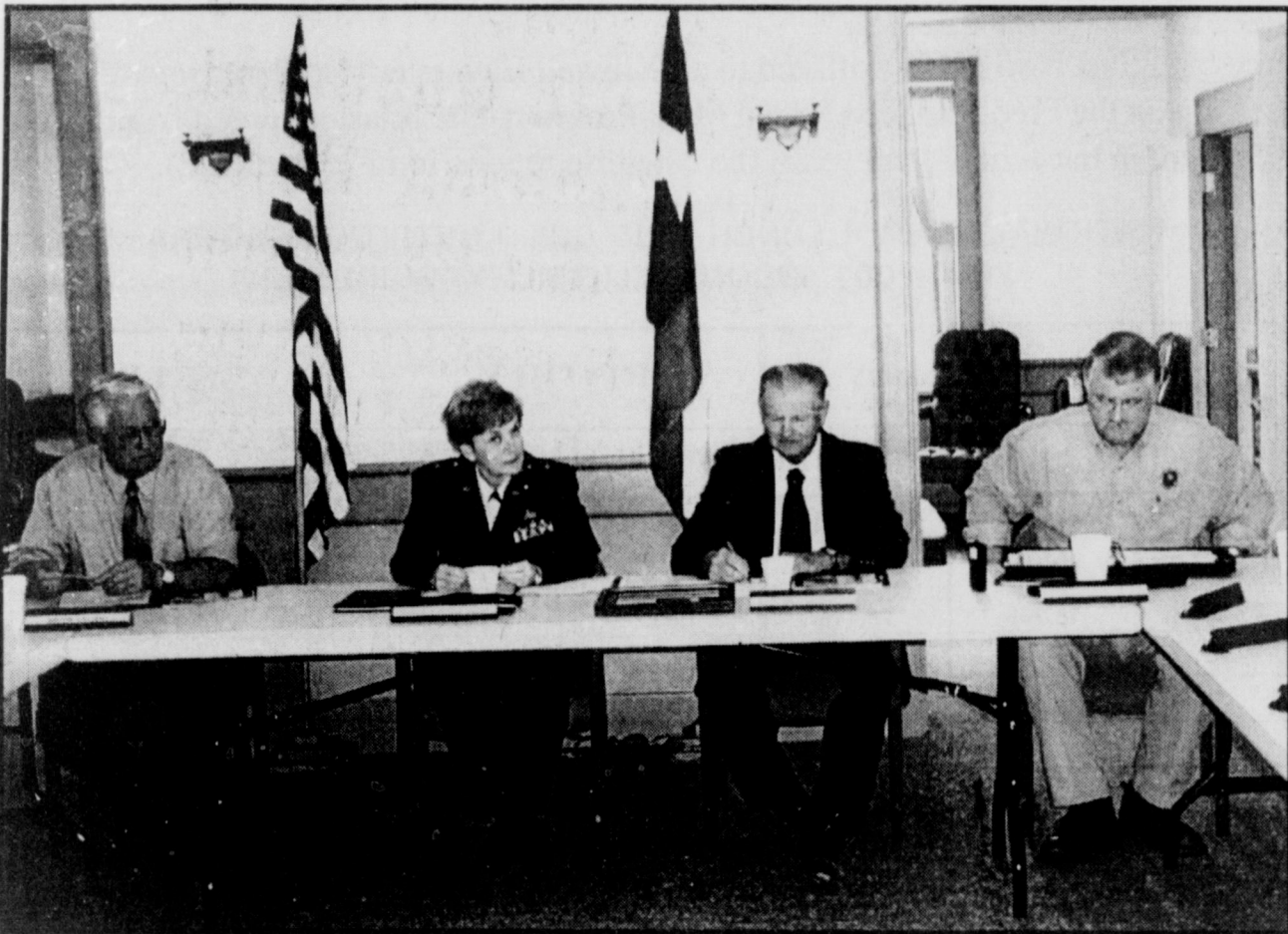
The pesky pests simply rise up to test their wings, catch a ride North-

It would be the last time Don Alexander would preside over a school board meeting before turning over his duties to someone else -- Jimmy Horner, as it turned out.

Though I felt he'd been unnecessarily rude to me on too many occasions to count, I knew I would miss seeing him peer over his glasses, keeping the meetings on track, focused on whatever business needed attention.

And, I thought, it was darned nice that the district was going to present him with a citation thanking him for his six years of service, three as the board's president.

The mood was congenial. Superintendent Jim Malone's award was heartfelt, as he thanked Alexander for his hard work, his support -- and his friendship.

"In a lot of ways, Mr. Alexander has changed my life," he said. "I consider you a very valuable and loyal board member and friend."

I snapped a photo. Don turned to speak to the parents and staff who had attended.

It had all the makings of a warm, fuzzy, pink-blanket Kodak moment. And then the "twister" touched down.

For some reason -- whatever reason -- he chose to respond to the board's gesture of appreciation by threatening them, saying he will mount opposition if trustees go through with their plans to build a new high school.

"I don't think it's the school

Decatur needs, and I don't think it's the school Decatur can afford... I think they'll reject your bond proposal," he said. He said if a bond referendum is offered to voters, "I will take my expertise to the other side to oppose it."

You and whose army?

First of all, Alexander was able to accumulate only 130 votes in the May 4 election. It was a mandate, all right -- for his opponent Mike Sanders. There's nothing to indicate he leads a group large enough to pose a threat to any board project.

Second, and more importantly, it was just plain wrong, wrong, wrong to respond to a gesture of appreciation with a threat.

Everyone in the room sat silent until the storm passed. I was so angry I was shaking.

But an attack on this school board was just too much.

A moment that should have been sweet and happy turned sad, and it's hard to figure out why. I wish that instead of petulance, he'd decide to be remembered as someone who went out with dignity.

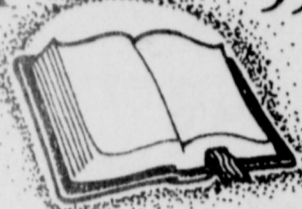

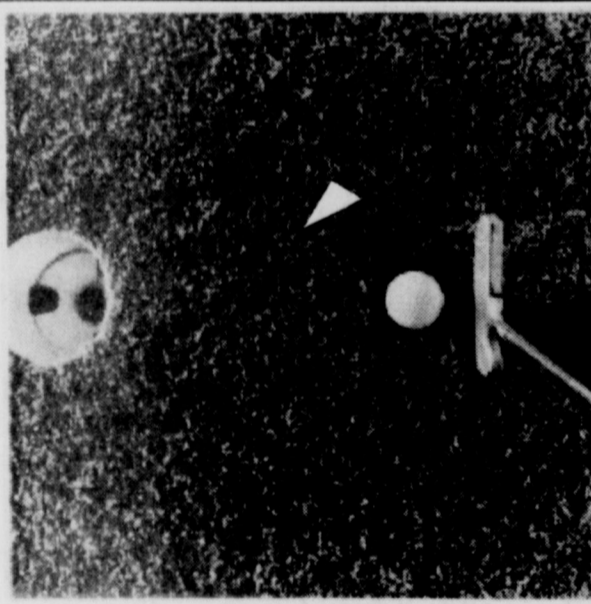

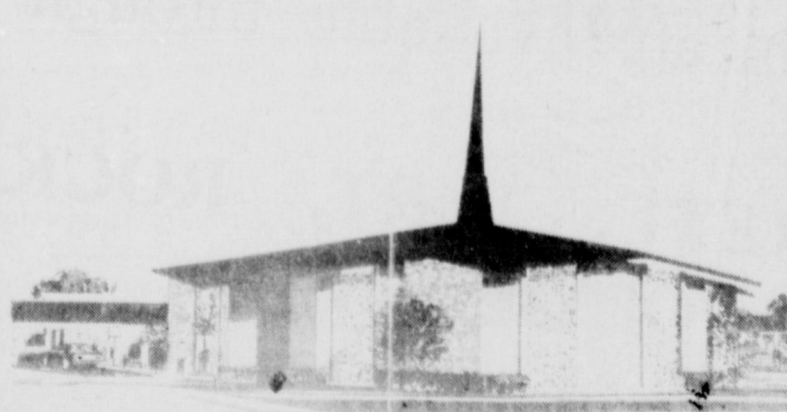

WHAT DOES GOD SAY?

About forgiving one another? "Many hearts are broken because of the lack of forgiveness. Grievances are often so heavy that one says, 'I will never forgive!' God has much to say about forgiveness and no matter what our plight, His word is final to the point that if we are to be forgiven, we must also forgive. In Matthew 6:9-15, Jesus teaches his disciples to pray. In verses 14-15, He says, 'For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.' How could anything be more clearly stated?"

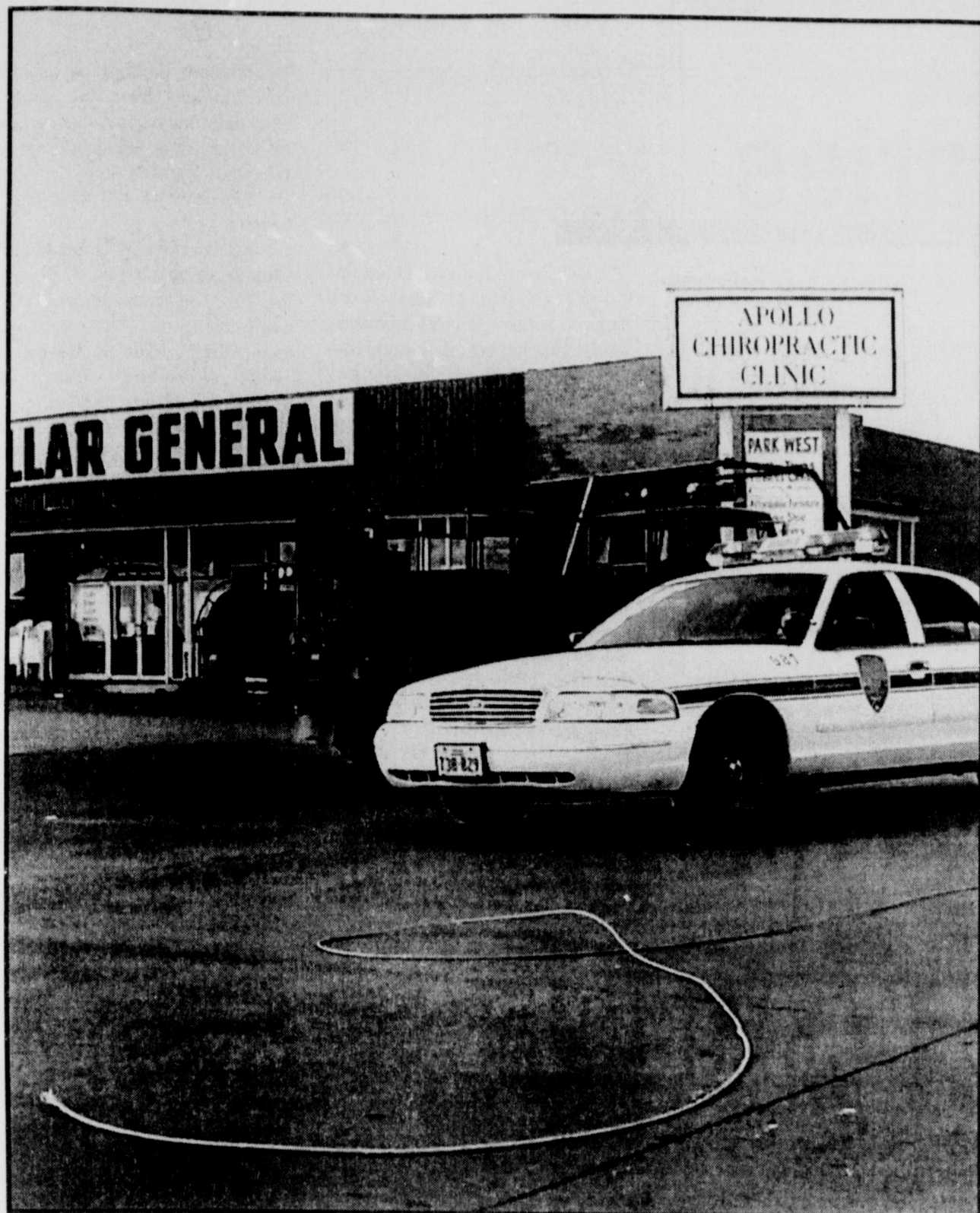
Jesus was the perfect sacrifice on the cross for our sins and we have redemption and forgiveness through His blood (Ephesians 1:7). But God places conditions upon forgiveness: repentance (Acts 8:22), baptism (Acts 2:38), and in the above text, willingness to forgive others. Repentance is essential to God's forgiveness for our sins. Does one always benefit from another's forgiveness? Only by repentance. For example, a wife may be willing to forgive an abusive husband but if he refuses to repent and lovingly treat her instead of abusing her, God will not forgive him. In such a case, the wife is blessed by God for her willingness to forgive, but the husband is condemned for his refusal to repent.

How willing should one be to forgive? In Matthew 18:21-22, we hear the impetuous apostle Peter asking the Lord, "how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Till seven times?" Jesus replied, "I say not unto thee, Until seven times: but, Until seventy times seven." The number "seven" is usually used in the Scriptures to mean complete. In other words, there is no limit! Isn't it amazing how we want to establish our own terms of forgiveness? A limit would have enabled Peter to say "Now, I've reached the point and I have no further obligation!" But Jesus says, "Not so!"

What is the fruit of forgiveness? In Acts 8, a man was baptized into Christ, forgiven of his sins, and "went on his way rejoicing." Forgiveness brings peace of mind. Paul called himself the chief of sinners, but just before his death, he said, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith, henceforth there is laid for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing." Paul could say this because he was forgiven.

Dear reader, we pay a terrible price for our failure to be willing to forgive. There is no far better than we to seek vengeance. Why not enjoy the peace of heart that comes from forgiveness and leave the rest to Him?

GARDENING HINTS

By STEVE CHANEY, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

DROUGHT

As all of you are so very aware we are in the middle of some very distressing times, with the hot temperatures and lack of rain.

Tuesday of last week the temperature was over 108 degrees, and I was thinking to myself what do we do not? Temperatures rise, so do temperatures, and that feeling of defeat in what can we do to keep it going, all of my plants are going to die.

The good thing is that a lot of our plants are very resilient, we may lose some, but a lot will just go dormant and wait for the rain, so don't give up too early.

I have been getting up early and watering some of my plants early while it is cool, and have really been enjoying the sunrises... you ought to try it.

I find that those early mornings give me a chance to reflect on that day the past days, and find all the reasons to be thankful for all of the blessings I have received.

Q. I have a large number of small trees that I have planted over the last two years, and have not been able to water them as much as they need this year due to the water rationing, what can we do to keep from losing any more of them?

A. That is a good question and one that I receive several calls on

every day and unfortunately it is going to get worse before it gets better.

There are several ways to address this question that will apply to most people in this area, but it may take a bit of imagination and hard work.

In Wichita Falls you can currently water one day a week, and the other days only by hand which can get to be tough, standing out there every day watering.

You can invest in some soaker hoses and water deeply and slowly on your day, add mulch to the trees and plants to conserve moisture and reduce soil temperature, or use your imagination and come up with some new ways of watering which I had forgotten about, that seems to work for them and is keeping their trees and shrubs alive.

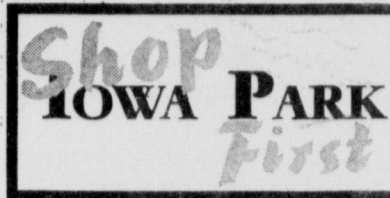
They found some clean five gallon buckets and punched some small holes in them near the bottom with a 16 penny nail, then took them out near their trees and filled them with water from the hose and simply let the bucket do the work.

If you work at it long enough you can come up with a system to water that takes 24 hours to empty a bucket and then move it to the next tree, this will maximize your water use and free you up from standing outside all day.

AG AGENT'S REPORT
By JOE RAFF,
WICHITA COUNTY AGRICULTURE AGENT

Looking around the county and speaking with local growers and ranchers, our situation has not changed that much.

The growers that I have talked to can be categorized two ways: those that have grazing and no tank water and those that have tank water but no grazing.

The weather service has said time and again to get ready for the floods in the fall (by the way, it's interesting to me that they have a hard time predicting the weather for the next six days, but have a good handle on the weather six months from now).

Well if it's true, fall can't get here quick enough for me.

Lots of things are happening around the county and I wanted everyone to get a head's up.

If you are going to be showing lambs and/or goats this year at any major stock show or the county stock show, you need to get with your Ag teacher or me to make tag orders.

The cost of the tags and all DNA work will be \$6 per animal validated. The deadline for ordering tags is Aug. 14.

The DNA work is new this year to all sheep, goat and hog exhibitors and will be run the same way as the steer validation program. We will take blood from each sheep and goat and the blood will be archived at A&M.

If there is a question about ownership of a 4-H or FFA project, a sample will be taken and matched with the sample at A&M. If they do not match, the exhibitor will be disqualified from the show.

Hog exhibitors will also need to start thinking about how many projects they will have on feed. As soon as you know, we need those orders after the sheep and goat deadline.

Friendly Door boasts 'friendly kitchen'

Recently Friendly Door board members and a committee of Iowa Park citizens have been discussing changes needed at Friendly Door.

The group came up with a five year plan, part of which was for Friendly Door to be able to prepare their meals at the center within two years.

But their plan is becoming a reality sooner than anyone had dreamed possible.

Executive Director Linda Perry and the board of directors were approached with a deal they could not pass up.

Owners of SalaDeli in Wichita Falls, Stephen and Nanette Shipp, closed one of their locations on 9th Street, and had much of the equipment Friendly Door needed at a huge savings. The equipment included a combination walk-in refrigerator, gas convection ovens, a 10-burner gas range with two ovens, reach-in refrigerator, food slicer, vent-a-hood, and fire suppression system.

The equipment is only two years old and still has two to five warranty remaining.

The Friendly Door Board of Directors voted to put down \$10,000 and Mr. Shipp is holding the note at no interest for up to sixty days.

In addition to the \$10,000 needed to pay off the balance of the equipment, an estimated \$20,000 will be needed to build a storage facility to house the walk-in and supplies.

According to Perry there are only a few items they still need. The only remaining large piece of equipment they need is a commercial mixer.

Perry explained that the entire of the meals served at Friendly Door is prepared at Red Door Senior Citizens Center in Wichita Falls and transported to Friendly Door.

An average of 65 clients are served lunch at the center and 50 through Meals on Wheels. They have served as many as 134 patrons at the center.

Perry says there are a lot of disadvantages with the food being transported, such as during the time it is transported it must be kept at or above a specified temperature; at times they are short food items or someone forgets to send a food item. This results in a "mad dash to the grocery store" to purchase and prepare what they are short.

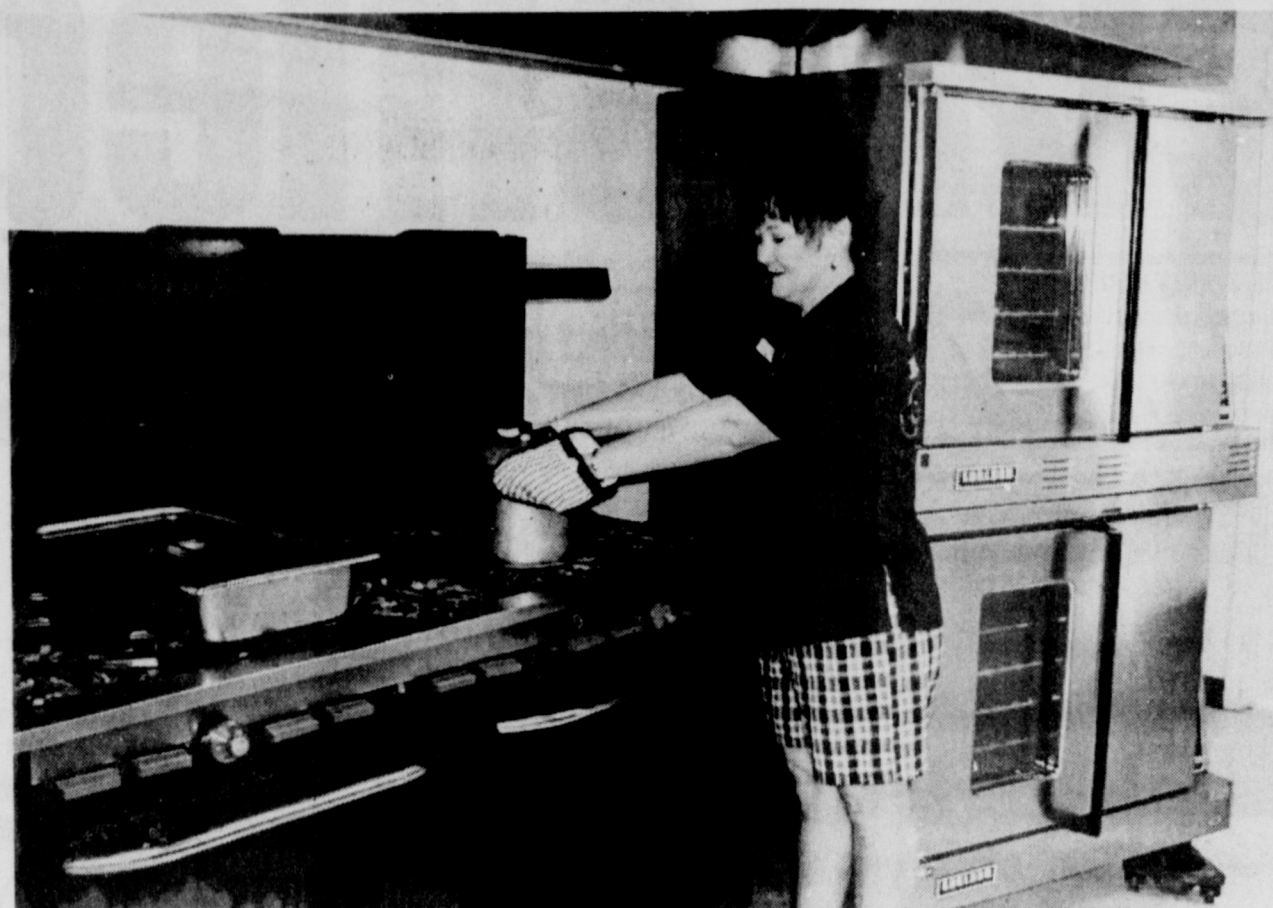
The entire meal for home delivered meals is prepared in Wichita Falls, transported to Iowa Park and divided into routes.

Perry says they have applied for funds to help purchase groceries and that will take 60 days, adding that it will be 90 to 100 days before they can start preparing the full meals.

She explained they have always been able to do part of the food preparation such as the vegetables, some desserts, some breads and even some of the entrees.

Perry says they currently have two part-time kitchen staff employed by Red Door. When Friendly Door starts preparing their own meals they will take over the salary for the kitchen staff and one will go full time.

The goal of preparing meals at Friendly Door is really a dream that is not new. When plans were drawn up for the new Friendly Door built in

1996, the thought of being able to prepare the entire meal at the center was part of the plan, but funds were short for the needed equipment.

Perry emphasized that meals at Friendly Door is just the icing on the cake. They offer many services to Iowa Park seniors such as transportation to and from doctors appointments, nursing service for pressure and Glucose screening and recreation,

to name a few of the services available.

They also have guest speakers with informative information for the seniors. Police Chief Lynn Collins visits the Friendly Door monthly with programs on scams and other things the seniors need to watch for.

Thanks to the generosity of the Iowa Park Optimist Club, Friendly Door has a 2000 van for transporting

clients.

Perry says with the van they are able to take clients on a short out of town trip once a month and go to the Archer City social and dance.

Raising the funds to complete the kitchen might be a lot of work but it's work of love, Perry said.



In Iowa Park, like it is in so many small towns across Texas, the start of high school football season is more than just another day.

In a way it's like Christmas.

The players and fans started thinking about this year's team just after the final seconds had ticked off the clock in the Crane game last year.

What will the team look like this year? Who will play quarterback? What will the team be like under coach Ellis?

All those questions and many others compare in a way to, "I wonder what's in the big box with the silver bow? Did I get the G I Joe with the Kung Fu Grip? I wonder if I got that new Big Bertha Titanium driver?"

Everyone is excited. Players, coaches and fans alike. It's like Christmas.

Well, I guess you could say that the Hawks put up the Christmas tree Monday morning at 7 a.m., when 116 players took the field for the first workout of the 2000 football season.

The workout schedule for the upcoming week will see the Hawks on the field today from 7 a.m. until about 12:30 p.m. and on Friday, the varsity and JV will lift weights in the morning and return in the afternoon for the first workout in pads starting at 4:30 p.m.

Pictures will be taken on Saturday starting at 8:45 a.m.

Starting Monday the players will do some conditioning work in the morning and will practice in the afternoon starting at 4-4:30.

"Defensively, we're looking pretty good right now," Ellis stated. "Our linebackers came in with a lot of experience and our secondary is really coming along well. We're going to have some battles in the defensive line positions as well as two spots on the offensive line and at tight end, but that's not a bad thing to have. We want to have several players that we can plug in and not miss a beat and I feel like that is one of our strengths this year. We're looking for more speed and quickness this year defensively and I think we have the kids that can get the job done."

"I'd like to invite everyone out to watch us practice," Ellis added. "The kids kind of enjoy seeing people out there and we welcome everyone to come out and see what we're doing."

So remember the tree is up and there are only 15 more practice days until Christmas (or the Holliday game, whichever you prefer).

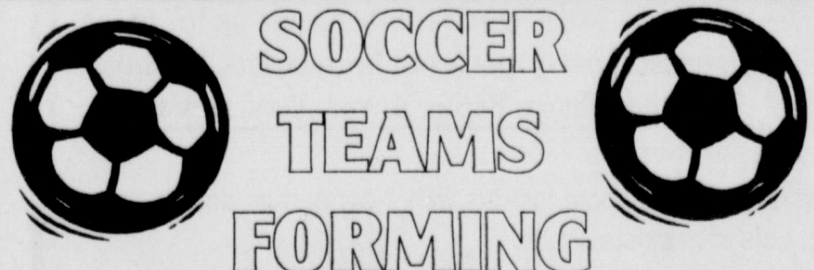
