

### State Aid Needed by Many Texas Schools

If comparable educational facilities are to be made available throughout Texas, state equalization aid must be extended to more districts. Miss Emma Mae Brotze, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, declared in Austin this week.

Higher costs of operating schools make it imperative that some of the poorer districts be given even more aid than they are receiving, she said.

Twenty-seven school districts were unable to pay the minimum salaries for teachers as prescribed by law last year, Miss Brotze said. "These districts all had a high rate of taxation and most of them had a high valuation on property for assessment purposes," the State Teachers' president said. "They were, however, unable to meet expenses."

"With costs rising almost constantly, I fear that even more districts will be unable to meet the minimum teacher salary requirements and keep their doors open for nine months during the next school year."

The state is now spending \$18,000,000 annually for equalization aid. It is a fund intended to help districts which cannot obtain sufficient money from local taxation, plus the usual state per capita apportionment, to bring their schools up to standard.

### Entries to Close Soon At State Fair of Texas

Approximately two weeks remain in which to make entries in classes open for competition in the Textile, Culinary and Antiques Show at the State Fair of Texas, October 9 to 24. Mrs. O. D. Stallard, superintendent of the women's department, has announced. Entries close August 17.

Classes in the textile division include embroidery, lace work, knitting and crocheting, quilts, rugs, plain sewing, fancy handwork, layettes, elderly ladies work and antiques. In the culinary division are classes which include jellies, pickles, canned fruits and vegetables.

Mrs. Stallard was appointed this year to head the women's division of the State Fair which is being resumed after six years of war-induced inactivity.

### Cost of Living Affects College Students Too

Because of rising costs of food and service, room and board charges at North Texas State college dormitories will be increased \$10 per semester, President W. J. McConnell has announced.

"This will make the cost \$180 per semester of 4 1/2 months for the girls' dormitories and for Chilton Hall, the main men's dormitory. Prices in the other men's halls will be slightly cheaper.

Even after the increase the \$10 per week charge will be less than is charged in many other state colleges, a survey shows.

Student deans, the director of foods service and the business office representatives agreed at a recent meeting that it would be impossible to maintain present high meal standards without the slight increase.

### REFRIGERATOR MAY BE FIRE HAZARDS

There may be food for fire in your refrigerator, says Marvin Hall, state fire insurance commissioner.

"The fire hazard in refrigerators is related to the electrical feature and mainly to the motor," he stated.

"Though losses from these fires are usually small and are generally due to smoke damage and the need of replacing the motor, this year in Texas there have been an exceptionally large number of such losses."

Danger signals on a refrigerator are an odor or smoke from the motor and blowing of the fuse, Hall cautioned.

Other than a few mechanical failures, the causes of fires in refrigerator motors are mainly due to overheating and poor maintenance. For proper proper maintenance, he advocated oiling the motor at proper intervals and not permitting combustible dust and dirt to accumulate on or around the motor.

The popular belief that the refrigerator starts fires is untrue, the commissioner stated. In fact the refrigerator most extensively used actually has fire extinguishing properties, and when it escapes the danger is not one of fire but of an irritant gas.

Hall recommended the following procedure if a gas leak in the refrigerator should develop: get everyone out of the house, raise windows and open doors to the outside, disconnect the refrigerator line from the house circuit, call the fire department or the company which installed the refrigerator.

He advised that stuck trays not gas leaks in the evaporator coils. Another place leaks generally occur is at joints which become weakened by vibration.

What can drivers do to reduce their chances of collision on the highway?

In a single word the answer would be COURTESY. That's the belief of George Clarke, managing director of the Texas Safety Association.

"All rules of the road boil down to this fundamental concept—courtesy," said Mr. Clarke.

"The biggest collision maker we have on the highway today is the fellow who refuses to yield right-of-way," he declared. "Yet the simple exercise of courtesy could prevent most mishaps."

The Association is co-operating with the National Safety Council's safety education program for August, emphasizing courtesy and defensive driving.





### Deadline Nears on Claims for Oversea Deaths — August 9

August 9, 1948, is the last day for filing claims for lump-sum death benefits under the Social Security Act on account of the death outside the United States of a qualified individual after December 6, 1941, and before August 10, 1946. According to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls office of the Social Security Administration, any such claims filed after that date cannot be paid.

Tate pointed out that Congress amended the Social Security Act in August 1946 to give special consideration in those cases, where servicemen or civilians died outside the United States during and immediately following World War II by extending the legal limit of two years as provided by law. However, the extension was for two years from the date of the amendment and it expires on August 9, 1948.

The survivors of civilians and servicemen who died overseas, and who had earned wages in employment covered by the Social Security Act, are urged by Tate to inquire as to possible benefits before the deadline. The office located at 412 Post Office building in Wichita Falls will render all possible assistance.
