John Mixon Sr. Dies in Houston

Funeral services will be conducted for John A. Mixon, 60, Friday afternoon, May 18, at the Methodist church with Rev. Elden Cole in charge. Burial will be in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

Mr. Mixon died unexpectedly early Wednesday morning in a Houston hospital. He underwent emergency surgery last week while he and Mrs. Mixon were visiting their daughter Mrs. John Paul Monroe and family in Houston. He had been in ill health for about two years.

Born Oct. 18, 1895 in Red River county, Mr. Mixon came to Iowa Park in 1914 and worked in the oilfields until about two years ago, when he retired because of ill health.

He was married to Miss Aurora Wigley on June 18, 1919 in Iowa Park. Since their marriage the family have resided in Iowa Park and in East Texas.

Surviving are the widow; two sons: John of Iowa Park and Eugene of Valley View; two daughters: Mrs. Monroe of Houston and Mrs. L. C. Wells of California; a brother Mr. L. D. Mixon of Longview; a sister Mrs. D. C. McMullen of Ft. Worth; and seven grandchildren.

Tax Cut Promises Stronger Buying Power for All

News from Washington, D.C., is that congress probably will discuss income tax cuts before long, and when it does, Rep. Frank B. Rowland of Texas will have an important say. He is a member of the House ways and means committee which originates all tax bills.

Of course, everyone is eager for a tax cut. In the cattle and oil industries of north central Texas where relatively high wages are penalized by high federal income taxes, a cut would be especially welcome. Most workers spend almost a month of each year working for Uncle Sam.

But tax relief would mean more than the immediate benefits of higher take-home pay. By leaving people everywhere more money to spend, a tax reduction would boost markets for all consumer goods and bolster long-range prosperity.

No one knows yet whether the tax cut will be confined to persons in the lower income brackets or whether all taxpayers will get relief. Either way the average income earner would get some advantages. In the first instance he would get the entire benefit of the extra take-home pay. A general tax cut would furnish extra indirect benefits.

Tax relief for people who are able to save part of their earnings and who can afford to invest their savings makes more money available for expansion and modernization of existing plants. This means more jobs and when jobs are plentiful all of us feel more secure.

With better tools to work with, the wage earner can increase his output and justify a pay raise for himself. It is enormous mass production that places automobiles, television sets, refrigerators and such luxuries within reach of all Americans.

After swimming we went to P-3 to eat and gave the waitress quite a headache.

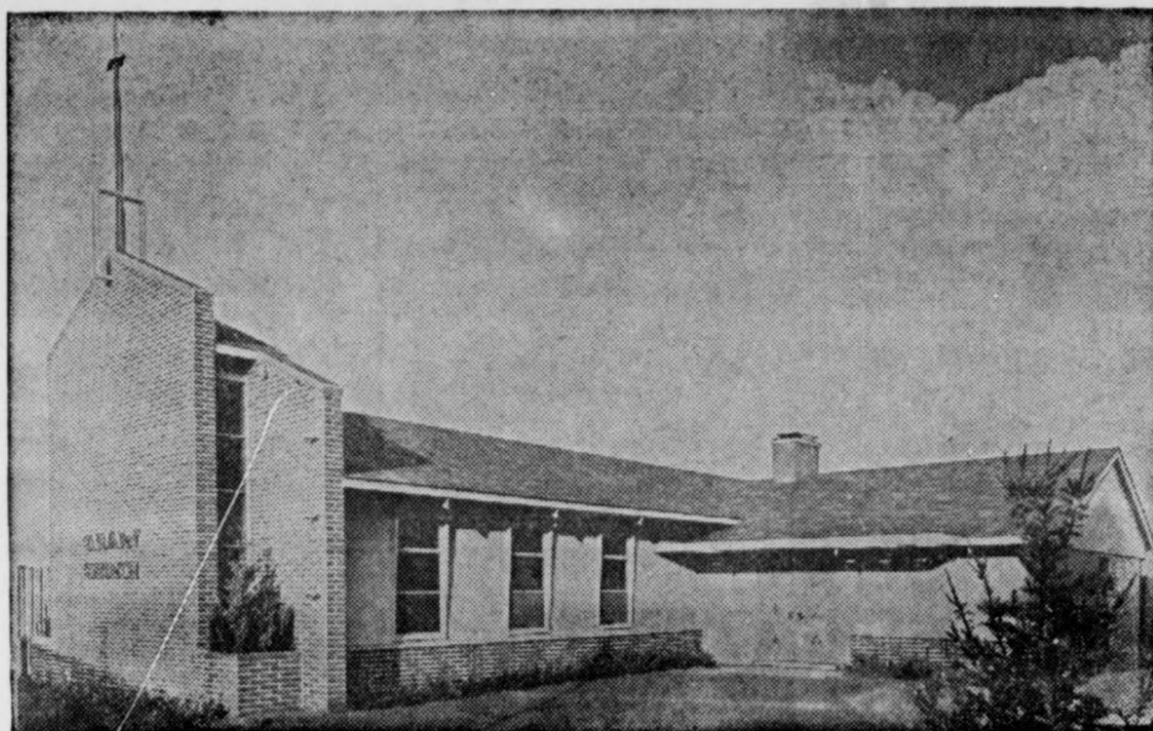
Mothers James, Pierce, Marquart, Thompson and Thomas have been wonderful all year and the Mrs want to thank them.

CAR ACCIDENTS

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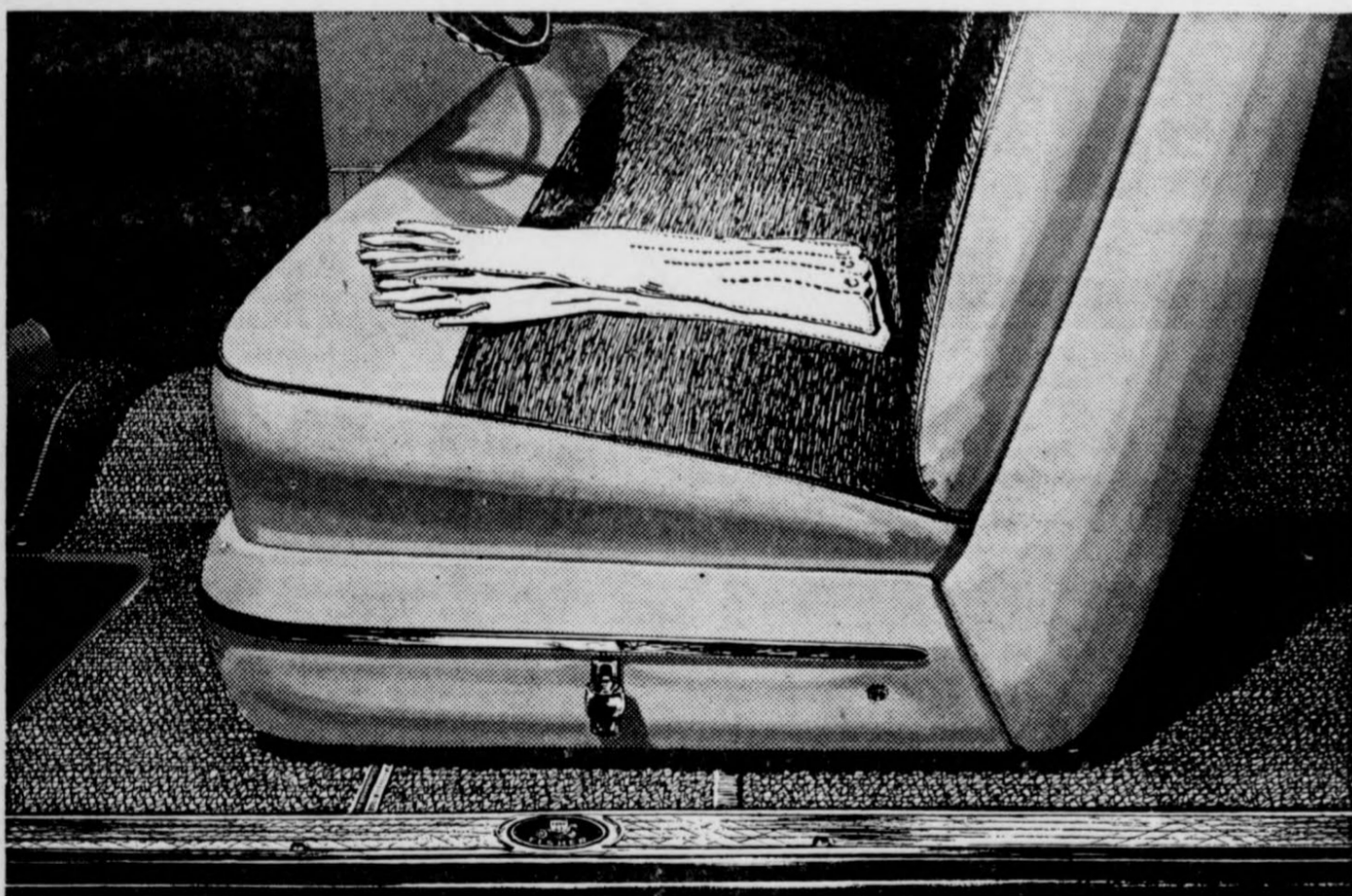

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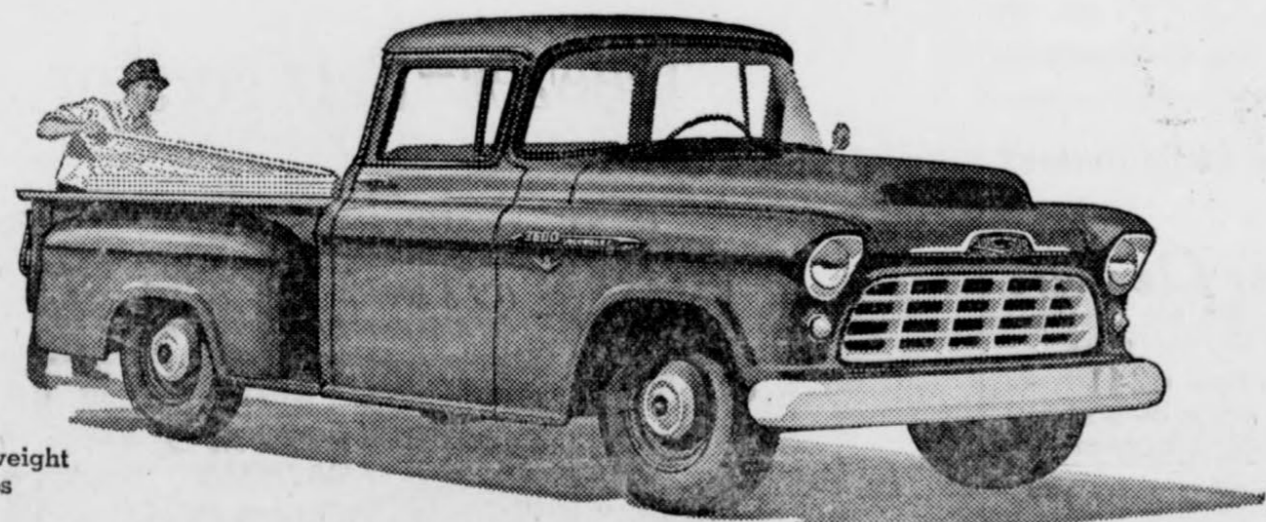
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
