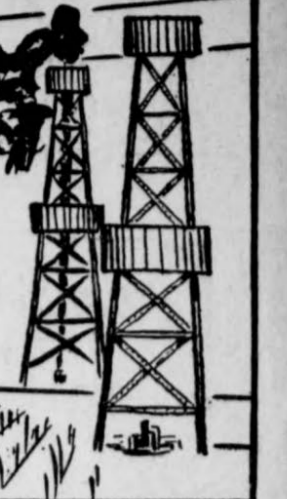

Moffett Files for Re-election

The Iowa Park Herald is authorized to place the name of Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe in our announcement column as a candidate for re-election to the state senate from the 23rd senatorial district, composed of Archer, Baylor, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, King, Knox, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young counties.

The first native to represent this district in the state senate, Senator Moffett has been a leader in that body for several years, and is said to be the author of more amendments to the State Constitution than any other member. They include amendments to speed up court procedure and to build a state office building. The latter will be started soon and will save the state hundreds of thousands of dollars in office rent each year.

Often called "Cotton George," Senator Moffett has vigorously championed efforts to broaden markets for farm and livestock products — especially cotton. He maintains that finding broader markets for farm and ranch products is the best long range solution of the farm surplus problem.

Senator Moffett has shown a strong interest in matters affecting his district, as well as those of statewide importance, including oil development, the schools, and war veterans. He is the author of the County Veterans Service Officer Law and other measures for veterans. He is regarded as being an independent thinker who votes his honest convictions upon legislation.

"I regard public office as a public trust, to be filled in the public interest," stated Senator Moffett.

"I have never been offered a fee during my service in the Legislature. I pay my own campaign expenses.

"I favor, and have voted for, bills requiring members of the Legislature to register the names of companies or persons from whom they receive fees. The people are entitled to such information.

"The last Legislature did the best job of tightening Texas insurance laws that has been done in 50 years. Fourteen hundred insurance companies were attempting to do business in Texas — almost as many as in the other 47 states. I voted for all the bills which closed the loopholes in our insurance laws, and if further strengthening is needed, I will support bills to do so.

"Our state hospital system needs more buildings to relieve badly overcrowded conditions. The system also needs to secure more nurses and doctors, and to increase the very low salaries of present employees.

"I expect to discuss other issues during the campaign.

"I have always voted a straight Democratic ticket, and will appreciate your vote and support in the Democratic primary. Thank you."

Top Seniors

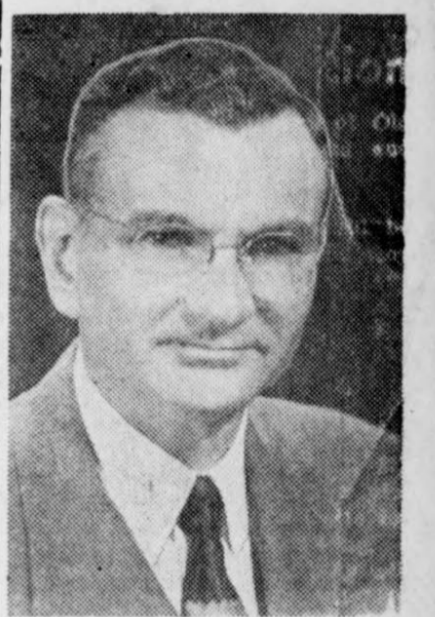
Honor students of the 1956 senior class have been selected. They were determined on the basis of four years' grades, with 10 points as perfect.

The horses sold well, with the top price of \$4,500 paid for Romeo Dexter, a bay stallion that has won many honors. Purchaser was Paul Grafe of Santa Paula, Calif., who also bought a palomino mare for \$1,650.

Hank Weiscamp of Alamosa, Colo., the auctioneer, called them the greatest collection of quarterhorses ever sold at public auction.

Buyers estimated to number 1000 were present from many states.

Mr. Underwood is going out of business, but has not announced disposition of the Underwood Quarterhorse ranch east of Iowa Park.

C. H. Bowman is manager of the ranch and lives on the place. He and Mrs. Bowman have made many friends in Iowa Park since coming here.

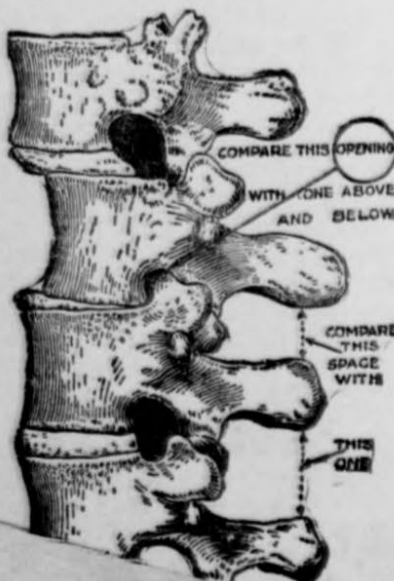

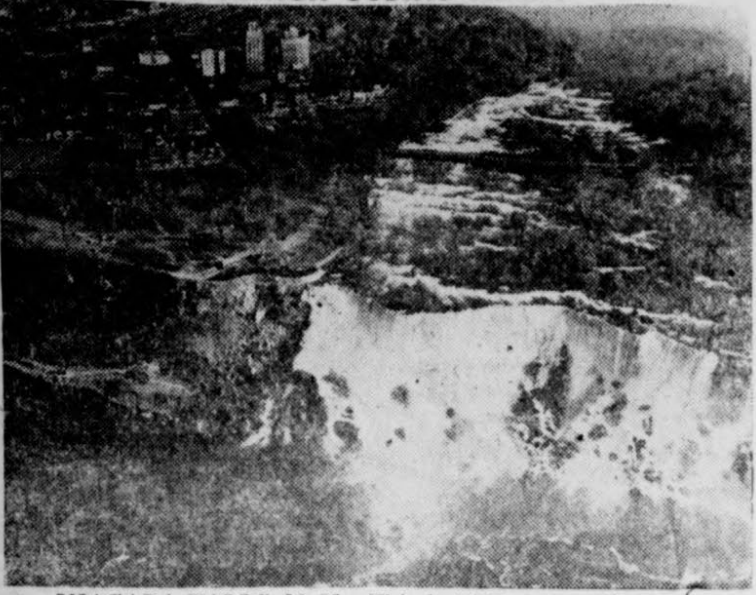

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y.—This is it! Beauty and power combine with many of the world's other greatest wonders for years the most popular spot in America for honeymooners. Here the nation's young newlyweds gaze in awe as the tumbling, rumbling river leaps over the rocky brink 167 feet to the gorge below. Two years ago, a great section of the American falls collapsed, but the magnificence of the scene is unchanged and thousands of visitors never forget the thrill because two visits are necessary to capture all of the primitive beauty of the falls by day and night. Huge searchlight type lamps have been installed for convenience of evening sightseers. 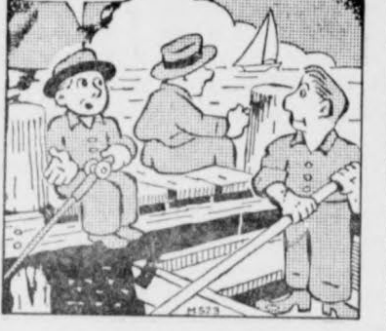

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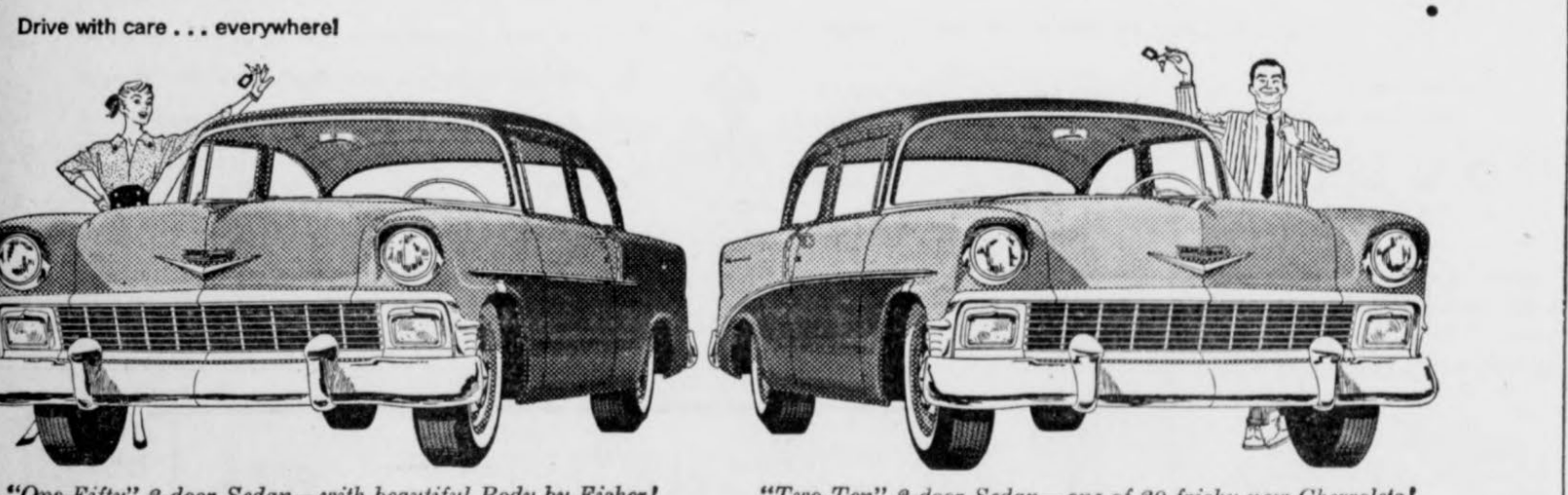
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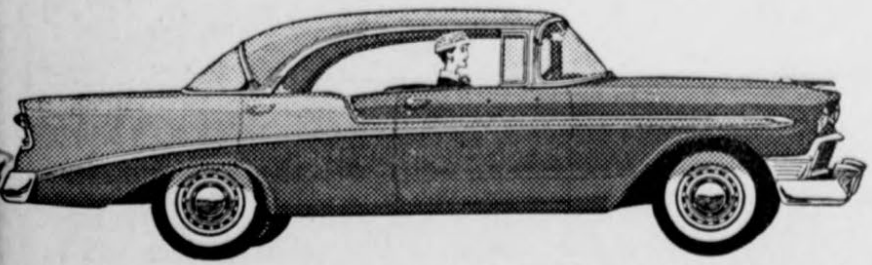

Water Problem

Record lows in Texas streams, rains that didn't fall, steadily declining water storage in reservoirs, both underground and surface, cast a gloomy shadow over the state as spring moves toward summer.

In March the statewide average of rainfall was less than a fourth of normal. In the first ten days of April ominous clouds of topsoil swirled and drifted across Texas.

Even the Neches river in East Texas flowed only 21 per cent of normal. In varying degrees it's the same from Amarillo to Brownsville, from Texarkana to El Paso. The streams are dry, or trickling toward dryness.

Underground storage is dropping at a crucial pace. Barton Springs at Austin had the lowest flow in 62 years of measurement during the month of March.

Comal Springs at New Braunfels yielded less than a fourth of the average flow produced over the past 28 years, dropping sharply below its February measurement.

Water levels in observation wells throughout the state continued to drop.

Texans cannot afford to ignore these warnings. Every gallon of wasted water is taking its toll.

Conservation and productive use of water must be the prime concern of every citizen, or everyone is going to suffer.

True, it is a problem for government officials, for state agencies, for cities, villages, industry, agriculture. But even more surely it is a problem for every individual who washes a car, waters a lawn, takes a bath or installs an air-conditioner.

A city reservoir is recharging just so long as it holds water. A well is only as good as the underground source supplying it.

The picture isn't pretty...but every Texan needs to study it...carefully.
