
## Soil Conservation

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


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

# Water Problem

By J. E. Sturrock Texas Water Conservation Ass'n Record lows in Texas streams, rains that didn't fall, steadily declining water storage in reservoirs, both underground and surface, cast a gloomy shadow over the state as

spring moves toward summer. In March the statewide average of rainfall was less than a fourth of normal. In the first ten days of April ominous clouds of topsoi

swirled and drifted across Texas. Even the Neches river in East Texas flowed only 21 per cent of normal. In varying degrees it's the same from Amarillo to Brownsville from Texarkana to El Paso. The streams are dry, or trickling toward dryness,

Underground storage is dropping at a crucial pace. Barton Springs at Austin had the lowest flow in 62 years of measurement during the month of March.

Comal Springs at New Braunfels

yielded less than a fourth of the

average flow produced over the past 28 years, dropping sharply below its February measurement. Water levels in observation wells throughout the state continued to drop

Texans cannot afford to ignore these warnings. Every gallon of wasted water is taking its toll. Conservation and productive use of water must be the prime concern of every citizen, or everyone

is going to suffer. True, it is a problem for government officials, for state agencies, for cities, villages, industry, agriculture. But even more surely it is a problem for every individual who washes a car, waters a lawn, takes a bath or instals an air-conditioner.
