

INTRODUCTION

Loys D. Barbour, President Class of '29

For months I have been turning over in my mind the idea of a reunion for the members of the 1929 graduating class of the Iowa Park High School. The fellowship we enjoyed as a high school aggregation was so pronounced I felt sure we would enjoy meeting together again and reviewing our experiences during the intervening twenty

With the aid of my memory and information secured through correspondence with members of the class, I have compiled a short history. It is by no means complete and lack of space forbids printing more than just a paragraph about each one of us. Five did not reply to letters asking about their activities and interests. Just the same, the task has been an enjoyable one for me, for my high school days are a most pleasant memory.

So, here we are, gathered in the Iowa Park School Cafeteria on this, the 27th day of December, 1948, in a reunion banquet, with the members of the class who still live in this community as hosts. They are: Mesdames G. E. Payne, Maurice Allred, Geo. A. Lewis, J. P. Gard, Bruce Freeman, and Billy James; and Joe P. Cunningham, Loys D. Barbour, and Franklin M. Love.

ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- I. Were leaders in publishing "The Talon," a full page of school news in Iowa Park Herald.
- II. Left the school a present of \$103 to purchase a program clock, which has been in continuous use since that time.
- III. Organized the first high school alumni association, with an annual banquet observance.
- IV. Pearl, Shirley, and Ruth were members of the senior volley ball team which won 23 consecutive games without a defeat and came out district champions, 1929.
- V. Loys, Loyd, Walter, and Theo were four of the first string basketball team which won county championships in 1928 and in 1929 and were runner-up district champions.
- VI. Earnestine was valedictorian and Walter received the Balfour Award for outstanding scholarship, achievement, and loyalty.
- VII. 100% co-operation in all activities of the class was exemplified by the following:
 - 1. Every member purchased season football and basketball tickets.
 - 2. Every member of the class was in the group that attended the State Fair at Dallas.
 - 3. Every member was present for all social occasions of the class.
 - 4. Had greatest exhibition ever staged by any class on Class Day. The Class Flag is still in the possession of the president.
 - 5. Reserved every seat in the auditorium for four lyceum numbers and sold season tickets

SUMMARY HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAST 20 YEARS



Electric Roasters Are Recommended As **Great Help to Wives**

An electric roaster is a useful addition to the kitchen, and need not be considered a substitute for the range, Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management special-

ist of Texas A and M college thinks. A roaster may be too small for convenient general family cooking, except in emergencies, but it is very useful whenever you are preparing meals for a large group or whenever the range is crowded, she says.

The U.S. department of agriculture has had many queries regarding the use of the electric roaster, and in answer, the specialists have several suggestions which will put the electric roaster to the best use.

Many farm families use a roaster for summer cooking, when larger stoves make the kitchen uncomfortably hot. A roaster can cook a whole meal for a small family, and apartment dwellers will find that a roaster plus a hotplate will do the meal very satisfactorily.

Two important advantages of the appliance are the ease with which it can be moved and the fact that it can be plugged into any outlet. It can be moved from the kitchen to the recreation room, for instance, or used in community halls for special

It's a good idea to have a convenient spot in the kitchen for the rosater, preferably a stand or table near an electric outlet, Mrs. Claytor concludes. It's a nuisance to have t lift it out of a cabinet or supboard each time it is to be used.


