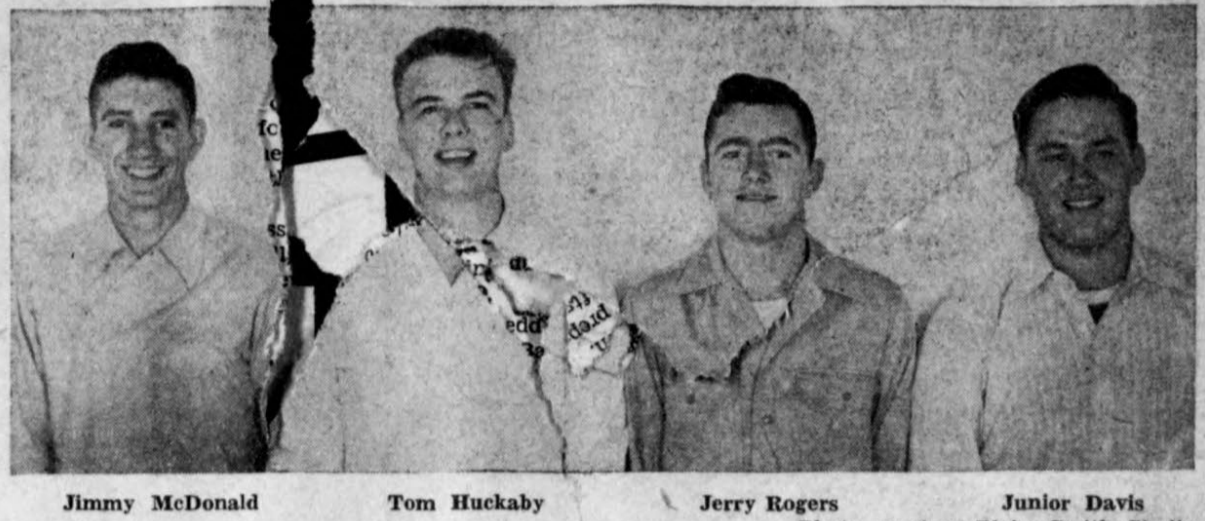

## SCOUT WORK HAS TAKEN INTEREST OF MANY IN DISTRICT

The 1949 program of Scouting in the Northwest Texas Area Council has the profound interest of men who will compose the Council set-up for the New Year. Upon its success depends the attitude of a lagging public in its relation to the boy and his future; the lack, in many cases, of the interest of parents in their sons who might already be in Scouting or who might want to join. This keynote thought was uppermost in the minds of those who attended the Area Council meeting held November 15 at the White Rose cafe in Electra, and thrust upon the shoulders of the new officers who will take over for the ensuing year.

A review of the work in Scouting during the past year preceded the election of officers for the new year. The report of the nominating committee was adopted and the following new officers were selected to reign over the new year:

T. J. Waggoner Jr., Wichita Falls, president.

R. B. Anderson, Vernon, vice-president.

Pierre Stine, Henrietta, and Geo. D. Fox, Wichita Falls, were also selected as vice-presidents.

C. E. McCutcheon, Wichita Falls, treasurer.

Dr. Karl F. Wettstone, Wichita Falls, commissioner.

The election of officers came at an earlier season of the year over previous years, even though the new staff does not take over until January 1949, but their services will reign in the big Scout event of the year when on December 3 there will take place the big Council Round-up, when all Scouts, Cubs, Senior Scouts, and all men and women registered in Scouting in the Council, together with other adults who provide transportation, will assemble on the grounds of the Memorial Auditorium at Wichita Falls for a big free Chuck Wagon Feed, preceding a wonderful program to be held in the Auditorium Building itself. The free chuck wagon feed will be under the auspices of the Electra Chuck Wagon Gang. The feed will take place at 6:00 p.m., at which it is anticipated that 2500 people will be served the proverbial stew with trimmings. If the weather is bad the feed will be held in the Boys Club across the street. Nobody is barred who has any interest at all in the Scouting program.

The keynote speaker of the evening in the Auditorium will be Dr. Elbert K. Fretwell, chief Scout executive of the United States. Prior to his talk, entertainment of interest to all will be furnished by Zeke Williams and his Rambling Cowboy show. Lindy Berry, famous TCU football star, will be present and give some examples of football tactics with explanations, and then present to winners of the lucky numbers, a football to the lucky Scout and another football to the lucky Cub, both of which will bear his personal autograph. Brief remarks by other Council Officers will conclude the meeting. Nothing is being spared to make this meeting one that should inspire new workers and be of additional inspiration to those who are now giving of their time and talents to the Boy Scout movement.

During the afternoon of December 3 various operating committees will meet at 3:00 for a two-hour session of planning.

Not only the Area Council will have its problems, but the various District Committees as well. The members who compose the Archita District have been very busy of late in their plans, first of all, the selection of its new officers. These were elected at the District Meeting held in Iowa Park on November 16. The nominating committee made its report and the following officers were elected:

## Scout Leader Has 30 Years Service

Active as a Scout leader for more than 30 years, Dr. Elbert K. Fretwell has been Chief Scout of the Boy Scouts of America since September 1, 1948, when Arthur A. Schuck succeeded him as Chief Scout Executive.

Before becoming Chief Scout Executive on February 1, 1943, Dr. Fretwell was professor of education at Teachers college, Columbia university, New York City. He has been identified with the BSA since its earliest days and served on its national executive board from 1933 to February 1, 1943.

He has served as chairman of the Division of Program. He has also been vice-chairman of the Division of Personnel, and a member of the editorial board. In 1922 he took part in the Blue Ridge, N.C. conference for Scout executives and served as dean at the Estes Park, Colo. Scout executives conference in 1924.

During the First World War, Dr. Fretwell organized for the Surgeon General's office the program of physical education and recreation



for all the reconstruction hospitals in the United States, following which he was national director of recreation of the American Red Cross. He was chairman of the camping section of the White House conferences on child health and protection in 1930. Dr. Fretwell also served as adviser of the high school section of the National Safety Council.

Dr. Fretwell is an experienced outdoorsman. At Teachers college, Columbia university, he organized and directed for 18 years the training course for camp leaders in America. He is an accomplished speaker, has traveled all over America and knows the Scout organization as few men know it. Dr. Fretwell is a native Missourian. He is actually a "dirt farmer."

## HORN REPORTS OF C.C. WORK, PLANS

It has been a distinct honor and pleasure to serve the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce as president during the past year. I wish sincerely to thank the members, officers, directors and committeemen for the excellent co-operation they have given me. To them is due the credit for whatever has been accomplished during my term of office.

In many cases the labor of their hands will bear fruit in future years. Their reward is the gratitude of alert citizens of the community and the knowledge that they have contributed to the progress and development of their town and the surrounding area.

One of the principal services rendered at all times by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce is in helping to maintain a substitution tax collector's department. Car license and title receipts have been in excess of \$35,000, and a property tax collection of something over \$7,500 during the past year.

Many hundreds of driver's renewal forms have been furnished together with Driver's Handbooks and maps.

The Chamber has bought and made accessible to the public an accumulation of business, tourist and general information and directories.

The Chamber has maintained a rental listing with demands for apartments and houses running far in excess of those listed.

Members, through the various committees, have co-operated with the City of Iowa Park and the Lions Club in the town-wide pest eradication.

The Chamber's committee headed the Community Chest drive in November, reaching the desired quota of \$1600, divided as follows: Boy Scouts \$500; Youth Recreation Program \$400; Camp Fire Girls \$400; campaign expenses \$40; and the remainder to be used for emergency Chest needs.

The Chamber was instrumental in setting up an executive committee to administer the Community Chest funds and the maintenance of a permanent Chest file.

Through its city beautification committee a successful Clean-up Contest was held from April through October. A loving cup will be presented to the winning section of the town at the annual banquet.

The Chamber assisted the City Secretary in registering young men in the Selective Service Survey.

Prompt service has been given to all inquiries. Welcome has been extended to numerous caravans and delegates from surrounding towns and an effort made to create a feeling of good will. Conferences and assemblies have been well attended.

Publicity has been given the town and Chamber through the publicity committee with a generous allotment of space in the Iowa Park Herald, the Wichita Falls papers and West Texas Today. A column "Your Chamber of Commerce" has been written weekly.

A survey of the town for general information was made during the summer and an Iowa Park folder is now in the hands of the printer for two thousand copies to advertise the town's advantages and resources.

Twenty new members were added to the local Chamber during the summer, and memberships in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce now number thirteen, double that of last year.

A new Chamber of Commerce sign has been erected at vantage point to town and highway.

A mid-year meeting of members was held at which the Chamber adopted a Constitution and By-laws. It was also an occasion of fellowship, with iced melons being served.

The Chamber shared with the Lions Club the expense of painting the Skyway Marker on the Fair building roof.

At the present time the Chamber is planning, through its merchants committee, an official opening of the Christmas season in Iowa Park, on Saturday, Dec. 4, beginning at 3:00 o'clock. Santa Claus will make a visit and distribute some 500 bags of candy to the small children of the area. Marchants are offering attractive stock and there will be fun in the form of Turkey Scrambles and square dancing.
